




Objects of the Company—This Company has been incorporated for the purpose of carrying on a general ranching, farming, grazing, dairying and butchering business, and for these purposes to acquire, own and operate steamboats.

SOME OF THEIR UNIQUE ADVANTAGES

Immense range for cattle over a territory about nine miles long by about six miles wide.

Abundant supply of the very choicest qualities of natural and cultivable grasses for grazing, fodder, etc.

Lavish supply of the purest and freshest water, so distributed that no matter upon what part of the ranges the cattle or other stock are grazing there is water, and in abundance.

Good driving roads and telephone line crossing the ranges.

Electric light and power line also crosses the ranges at about the center, by which electric power for running all sorts of machinery, as well as light for the buildings, stables, etc., is available.

RAILWAY AND CANAL TRANSPORTATION FACILITIES

There are at present two railways running at convenient distances from the ranges, viz.:

The Northern Division of the Grand Trunk Railway at Severn Bridge, about six miles to the east, and

The Midland Division of the same road at Coldwater, about six miles to the southwest, besides which

The James Bay Railway (now in course of construction) crosses the property about the center, and will have a station there.

The Canadian Pacific Railway (also in course of construction) will run very convenient to the western boundary of the ranch.

The Trent Valley Canal (also in course of construction) is expected to be running through the Severn River, on our northern boundary, in the near future.

Steamboats already plying on the Severn River and Sparrow Lake call at our landing, and connect with trains at Severn Bridge. It will thus be seen that the ranches are unusually well served, and will soon be practically surrounded by rail and water transportation facilities, thereby guaranteeing not only the maximum of convenience, but the minimum of freight and passenger charges.

ADVANTAGES WITHOUT PARALLEL IN AMERICA

The ranches are so convenient to the great markets of Toronto, Hamilton, Buffalo, Lockport, Rochester, etc., that buyers from either of the two former cities may visit the ranches, make their purchases, and return the same day. Those from Buffalo, Rochester, etc., can leave home in the morning and be on the ranches the

same afternoon. In fact, it is possible that carloads of cattle shipped to Buffalo in the morning will reach there in the evening, and we may have the returns for them the next or the following day.

And if the Ontario farmer can profitably raise

live stock in the very limited numbers or quantities possible on his 50-, 100-, or 200-acre farm, where the relative cost for feed, grazing, labor, and other expenses, exclusive of capital invested in his farm, is enormously greater per head than on a large ranch—because his land, taxes, labor, etc., cost him more, and the same labor that is required to care for and attend to a comparatively few heads on a farm will care for and attend to a much

greater number on a ranch - hence, if the small or average farmer can profitably raise stock on his farm,

from a ranch of about 15,000 acres, and having capacity for 5,000 head or upwards? The facts in this connection are so patent that any elaboration is superfluous.

Unlike almost every other commercial, industrial or mining enterprise, where the average investor has to rely upon the glowing statements of the promoters, because he knows little or nothing about it himself, any stock-raiser or farmer can sit down in his own house, verify these statements, and approximately estimate what the increase and profits of the ranch, as well as his share of them, ought to be in any year. 
ITS MARKET IS THE WORLD

capacity for grazing, say, 5,000 to 7,000 head of cattle, besides sheep, hogs, etc., he would pass right over Ontario, and his mind would instantly soar away to the distant unoccupied lands of Alberta or the far West. He would probably try to locate it somewhere along the banks of the Bow, Belly, or Saskatchewan rivers, with as many coulees or other muddy water holes on it as possible. It would also doubtless be very remote from human settlement or transportation facilities of any kind, and several thousand miles distant from the seaboard or world markets, because it would not likely occur to him that such a large block of land (exclusive of its other unique advantages) could be acquired more conveniently situated, much less within twelve miles of the flourishing town of Orillia, Ontario, or with the unusual rail and water transportation facilities already established or in course of construction across or at convenient distances from all sides of the ranch, by which this ranch is now, or soon will be, practically surrounded, thereby ensuring



Probably the most interesting department of the Severn River Ranches, to the Canadian public, will be its herd of Angora, or Cashmere, Goats. These beautiful and valuable animals are natives of Asiatic Turkey, and are very hardy in all American climates, even where the temperature descends to thirty below zero.

Although Angora breeding is a growing and extensive industry in the United States—there being

extensive ranches in Texas, California, Nevada, Missouri, Dakota, Maine, and even in Alaska—except for a few Angoras kept for exhibition purposes in a couple of public parks, it is an entirely new enterprise in Canada.

Angora Goats are bred for their wool (called Mohair), which is long (10 to 20 inches), silky, lustrous, and snowy white, as well as for their meat, skins and pelts. They are exempt from the offensive odor of

the common goat, and where known are classed among the most useful of domestic animals, and have been so for thousands of years—so much so, that the Sultan has absolutely prohibited their exportation. The fleece furnishes many of the finest fabrics of ladies' wear. The fine fabric known as "camel's hair" is of the best mohair, and not from the camel, as generally supposed.

Mohair is mixed with silk and wool in a great variety of beautiful fabrics, improving the luster, quality and durability of each. Mohair braids contest the market with silk. It is also used in the manufacture of ladies' shawls, dress and knit goods, plushes, and many other fine lines. The short and coarser qualities of hair are used for blankets, lap-robes, rugs, carpets, etc.

The skins are used for leather, and the pelts for robes and rugs

The meat is so nearly like the best Shropshire lamb that it requires an expert to detect it, and it is exceedingly nutritious and palatable.

The milk is richer than that of cows or the common goat.

They are great browsers, every leaf, twig, and even most of the weeds and bushes usually considered poisonous to other animals, are eaten. They will desert the finest clover or blue joint grass for such browse.

The Company is now negotiating for a small herd of these interesting animals, believing—especially as the enterprise is new in Canada—that a large and profitable business can be done by introducing and breeding them in this country.


RAGGED RAPIDS ELECTRIC POWER AND LIGHT PLANT

These works are situated at "Ragged Rapids," a series of beautiful cascades on the Severn River, on the northern boundary of our ranch, and transmit the power over a "Pole Line" 19 miles long, and running from "The Rapids" all across the ranch, and on to the town of Orillia.

THE ORIGINAL INTENTION OF THE COMPANY
