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
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

Why Should I be an Auxiliary ?

I.—The Need.

“ Of all the things which God has made, the human heart is that which sheds most light, and, alas, most night.”

Nobody can deny the fact of the sin-disease in this world of ours. It is a stern reality confronting us at every step in an almost infinite variety of form and phase. Every thinking mind recoils with horror, every feeling heart

quivers with pain when the existing evil is individualised and brought for a time into startling relief in the person of some one offender more daring than the rest of his kind. A Jack the Ripper's abnormal fiendishness, or a deliberately plotted cold-blooded Cronin murder brings to a common platform of wondering horror and more determined effort philanthropists and social reformers of every class and type, every shade of belief and opinion. Again and again the question is echoed : "What is to be done ? Is there any salvation for the lowest, the criminal stratum of society, any way of bringing it up from spiritual darkness and lawlessness to light and liberty ?" Many a noble life has been ardently

devoted to the discovery of a remedy and its practical application,—but every purely human lever has failed, must always fail. A divine power must be implanted in the heart, a something "not ourselves" must "make for righteousness" from within.

III.—Our Quest.

Everybody who knows anything about the Salvation Army is also well aware of the nature of its quest—to

bring the souls of men "under the government of Christ." This is our "Holy Grail," for whose blessed vision we are content to become "as strangers and pilgrims on the earth," to toil and suffer the loss of all things. We live for the salvation of all, but seek chiefly the great non church-going class, comprising the roughest elements of society, the lowest, the vilest, the thief, the drunkard, and the outcast. Ordinary methods failed to reach these social outlaws; therefore, we have tried, under God's direction, extraordinary methods which have been crowned with success in countless instances. When the Army forgets its *raison d'être*—the compulsion of the highways and hedges into the Christ King-

dom of righteousness and peace—it will simply collapse like a pricked bladder. It is scarcely necessary to add that we are not anticipating so dire a catastrophe.

IV.—Our Army Friends.

(a) WHO THEY ARE. Wherever the Army has been stationed in Canada and elsewhere, God has raised up a host of friends and well-wishers who attend our meetings, and often testify to the blessings received therein. (4) HELP US FINANCIALLY by subscribing to our League. Although we everywhere endeavour to make our work, as

far as possible, self-supporting, there are yet many cases where assistance is urgently needed from our friends and supporters. Our Rescue Homes are still in their infancy, and are not yet able to walk alone. Gifts of food or of cast-off clothing are ever thankfully received. There are also our Training Homes for cadets, our Home of Rest for sick and invalided officers, not to mention many other sources of constant demand upon our resources. In short, every fresh departure, every new effort, to which our friends often strongly urge us, means a corresponding and increasing need of money. Hitherto hath the Lord helped us and we have unwavering confidence in His ability and willingness to supply our

every need, but He uses human channels. Will you not let Him use you, dear auxiliaries and friends?
