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
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
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#### FIRE PREVENTION CONGRESS.

The secretary of the British Fire Prevention Committee sends the following information relative to the forthcoming International Fire Exhibition in London:

There will be an important Fire Prevention Congress, July 6th to 10th, which will bring together practically the whole of the architects, engineers, building officials, fire brigade officers and municipal officers, insurance experts, etc., interested in the subject, not only from Great Britain but also from its colonies and from abroad. The programme has already been issued, and the active co-operation of the public authorities may also be anticipated.

The National Fire Brigades' Union is arranging its tournament for the National Challenge Shields and for a display to take place from the 9th to 16th July, when a very large attendance of fire brigade officers and firemen throughout the country

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Awards of diplomas for gold, silver and bronze medals will be made by juries of high expert standing representative of the different interests concerned and divided into sub-committees. Beyond these exhlbition awards, it is anticipated that special medals will be granted by some of the great scientific societies.

The Society of Arts has already decided to present a society of arts gold medal, two silver and two bronze medals for the best chemical fire engine shown at the exhibition, and the same society has offered similar awards for the best long ladder shown at the exhibition, the ladder to reach a height of 80 feet.

FOREIGN CO-OPERATION.

The exhibition is exciting considerable interest abroad, where special sub-committees are arranging for a representation of their respective countries both by individual and collective exhibits. Thus, for instance, the German fire brigade authorities and the industries connected therewith have decided to support the

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exhibition, and will be represented by an important section.

#### NOTES.

The town of Edmonton, N.W.T., will appoint a town engineer.

The ratepayers of Strathroy, Ont., have voted in favor of municipal ownership of the electric light and waterworks systems.

The ratepayers of Richmond, Que., have voted in favor of assuming control of the waterworks system and of issuing debentures for \$24,000 for payment of same.

In the city of Vancouver, B. C., the extensions made to the waterworks during the past year comprise 35,950 feet of pipe, varying in size from one inch to twelve inches. Twenty-five new hydrants were put in and five old ones were replaced.

During the year 1902 the city of Winnipeg laid 64 miles of sewers, 27 miles of macadam pavements, 9½ miles of asphalt pavements, 16½ miles of cedar block pavements, 10 miles of granolithic sidewalks, 176 miles of plank sidewalks, and 74 miles of water pipes.
