A report is in circulation in the western part of the province that the D. A. R. intend putting the car used by the smallpox patients at Meteghan into service immediately. The Yarmouth officials have taken the trouble to investigate, and Mr. Giffins, in a letter to the Mayor of Yarmouth, says: "We now have a man engaged at Meteghan with instructions to cut out and destroy the upholstery and everything else in the car except the wood and metal works and then to thoroughly scrape, wash and disinfect the car. After this is done it will be brought to our work shops here where it will again be scraped, washed and fumigated under the direction of our medical officer, Dr. Moore. It will then be re-upholstered, painted and varnished before going into service. No pains will be spared to make the car safe from contagion. Anything else would be a crime."

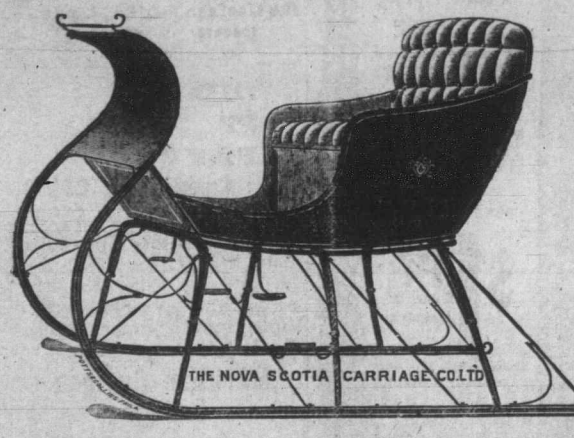

President Roosevelt in carrying out his independent views, has greatly annoyed some of his people, especially of the Southern States, by dining with Booker T. Washington, a colored man.

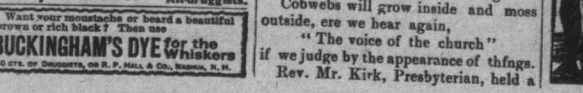

Hantsport

The new metallic telephone line is completed from Kentville to Windsor.

J J Coade, of Windsor, made the century run on Friday, riding from Windsor to Kingston and return. Time 9 hours and 20 min.

Capt McKinlay's schooner M D S is being copper painted near the wharf here. She will afterwards proceed to some Kings County port to be loaded with potatoes for Havana.

The goose supper at Avonport on Tuesday night, 29th, was a grand success. There was a good crowd present to partake of the geese and other eatables provided. The supper was continued Wednesday night. The proceeds amounted to some \$87, to be used in repairs on the Methodist and Baptist place of worship at Avonport.

Mr. Alex Menis of Kentville, has removed to the place lately occupied by Robert Grierson on top of Joe Bell hill. Mr. Menis has rented his former residence to the town of Kentville as a hospital for the new cases of Small pox. There was another case discovered on Friday last, Mrs. James Yould.

There is a great demand for shares in the Hantsport Mining and Development Co. but the \$3500 stock has been taken up long ago. Nearly every day Secretary Comstock receives requests for stock. One of the shareholders says he will not take \$20 per share for his stock. The boring is proceeding favorably. On Monday the drill had sunk to 115 feet and the good work is being confidently pushed forward with encouraging signs of success in finding coal.

The barquentine was successfully launched at Parraboro on Oct. 15th. The Reynard is a vessel of 638 tons gross and 560 tons register. She is 164 feet long, 34.8 feet wide, and 18.4 feet deep, and has a hurricane deck the full length of the vessel. She is all coppered, has steam hoisting gear, and is all rigged, sails bent, and ballasted. She will proceed at once to Hantsport to load for South America. She was built by D. A. Huntley, under the supervision of W. R. Huntley Lloyd's inspector. She is classed for thirteen years. The Reynard is owned by Capt. Wm. Baxter, of Canning, and others, and will be commanded by Capt. Asa B. Bateaux.—News.

The Reynard loaded lumber at wharf here for S. P. Benjamin Co. last week.

Afterwards they had a royal good time at the Hantsport Hotel, where Mr Wall spread a delicious supper for the club in his usual hospitable way. **The King's Birthday.**

To-morrow is the birthday of King Edward, and throughout the British Empire loyal subjects will give him reverence. The same loyal support that was given to Queen Victoria will be given to our present King, and he deserves his full share of public honor.

To-morrow the day in town is to be celebrated by a horse show in the afternoon and Band Concert and fireworks in the evening. All indications lead us to believe that a large number of people will be in town, and that those who come will see one of the best shows of horse flesh ever assembled in the County. The prizes offered are handsome ones, and the competition is open to anyone who may bring a good horse to town that day. Good prizes are also given for cattle, and as many handsome cattle come here from south of Kentville with wood, lumber, etc., that class will be well represented.

Our readers will see by the Bulletin we publish that now no danger from smallpox exists here. Every house where danger exists is quarantined and carefully guarded. Most of the houses quarantined contain no one sick with the disease, merely quarantined for public safety, as the inmates have either recovered entirely, or being in perfect health were quarantined because they formerly came in contact with some one who had the smallpox.

The statements in the Board of Health Bulletin are true in every particular and any reports our readers may have heard as to further danger or other cases are false and misleading to the public.

**CORRUPT GOVERNMENT MUST CEASE**

Within the last six years party government in Canada has almost become synonymous with corruption. The present party in power in Ottawa relies entirely upon its "machine" to keep it in power and this machine is being well greased for every election that takes place. Tarts who was too corrupt a man for the Conservatives to have in the party occupying even the lowest position has become the controlling power of the present Liberal administration and it is needless to say that as long as Israel rules here the system of running elections will not be any better than the methods of Tammany Hall.

King's County has been said to be by people in other parts of the province, the most corrupt county in Nova Scotia. The Conservative candidates were beaten by a large majority but the party has not suffered by this defeat as the right and manly advocacy of pure politics of that party has won the esteem and will have the future support of many independent thinking Liberals.

Bribery and corruption must go before the awakening intelligence of the people. We see hopeful signs that the people are awakening from their lethargy and bid fair to overthrow political machinery of every kind.

**Board of Health Bulletin**

KENTVILLE, NOV. 7th, 5:30 P. M.

The following detailed statement regarding small pox cases is presented with the consent of and upon information supplied by the physicians in attendance, for the purpose of correcting false rumors within and without the town.

There are seven houses only under quarantine, and a Hospital at the outer borders, near the upper mill pond, containing one patient, the only severe case. The Peck family living on the hill south of the business centre and some distance away, are all well, and only quarantined longer for safety. The Porter family living in the same neighborhood, are all well, except Mr. Porter, and he is rapidly recovering. The Tully family living away at the eastern border on the hill opposite the cemetery are all well, and further quarantined for safety. The people in the jail are all well, although further quarantined. The McCarthy family living near the crossing are still under quarantine. The Thos Cox house on well, with one exception and he is convalescent. The Thos Cox house on Webster Street is quarantined, with no cases, for safety, the one case there having been removed to hospital at an early stage, and the James Yould house on Webster Street, has one case of a mild type. To review, there are four cases still sick, two of whom are improving rapidly, and the remaining two, the only new cases for some weeks, are doing as well as could be expected; one being a very mild type in a delicate lady who had been out of health for some weeks, before having the disease, and the other a very severe type in a man who had never been vaccinated. No cases have occurred in any of the hotels or boarding houses, and there has only been one death during the present outbreak. The following fairly strong statement is justified by reason and experience, namely, that while the possible occurrence of an occasional case or few cases, need cause no surprise, any further widespread or severe outbreak of the disease is scarcely possible in this town, now, or for time to come.

aroused by perfectly correct means. The lesson should not be lost in Canada, where we have a similar organization entrenched in power, and which openly defies the moral sentiment of the whole people. The smallpox scare has been succeeded by a reality in this county at last, and a well developed case is quarantined at Carleton's Corner, a short distance from Bridgetown. The disease was contracted by a young man named William Woodland, who had been working on a D. A. R. ballast train near Kentville, and had, in company with other of the laborers, slept in the car attached to such trains for this purpose. Mr. Woodland says he was in Kentville but once, and then he only visited a jeweler's store, so it is perhaps hardly right to charge Kentville with this case. It is understood, however, that the car was visited at night by men from Kentville and the infected districts of Cornwallis. He came home over a fortnight ago, and the disease developed last Thursday. The house is now strictly quarantined and the patient is being cared for by a nurse, Miss Pineo, who came here from Kingsport. The other inmates of the house have been removed to the old cheese factory on the Morse Road, which will be used as a house of detention. A house in Centreville, which was visited by an inmate of the Woodland's house, has also been quarantined. Dr. Armstrong, the county medical officer, and the local board of health are doing everything in their power to isolate the case and no spread of the disease from this source is anticipated.—Monitor.

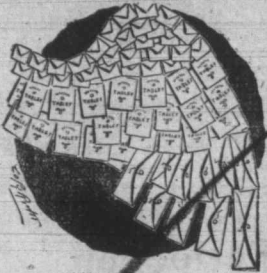

Men, It is Alleged, Are as Much Infected as the Women.

"And would you believe it, that man, whose transactions run into the millions, went on telling my employer of bargains in clothes, stationery, etc., and Mr. B. stopped in the midst of his estimates on a big contract to note addresses and to tell Mr. A. of bargains he had discovered in underwear and shoes and household supplies."

**Cost of a London Fog.**

A London fog is an expensive visitation. A day of it, counting the day at eight hours, is estimated to cost anything from \$50,000 to \$100,000 in hard cash. No small proportion of this goes to the gas and electric light companies, which have to supply about a third more power than usual. But there are also the railways. Fog signaling is expensive. At Clapham Junction alone \$50 has been spent by a single railway company during a day's fog in extra pay to the plate layers. When the red light cannot be seen at a distance of a hundred yards, the plate layers become fog signallers, and for this they are paid a shilling a day in addition to their regular wages and fourpence per hour overtime, providing the overtime does not run into a second shilling.—London Chronicle.
