



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LATEST CABLEGRAMS.

The Week's News the World Over.

The rinderpest is reported in Derbyshire. The rising against the Russians in Central Asia is increasing.

Russia has presented to Bulgaria another war ship, also 10,000 roubles. Greece has ordered nine million cartridges to be made in France.

Several cases of famine and fever have occurred in the south and west of Ireland. Sixty-three persons were killed during the late terrible storm and water-pout near Dresden.

Three thousand colliers have struck in Lancashire against the 10 per cent. reduction in wages.

The river Tay has never been so low as at present, and the enormous quantity of salmon taken daily will be much less than usual.

Pope Hyacinth yesterday delivered the first of a course of four lectures in French at the Victoria Theatre.

Several French firms having large orders from the Chinese Government for rifles have been instructed to complete them as quickly as possible.

A Berlin dispatch says in the district of Lubow, near Breslau, Prussia, a torrential rain killed fifty persons and destroyed a hundred and five houses.

The Royal Commission appointed to inquire into the agricultural question in Ireland have arrived in Dublin to-morrow, and will at once commence their investigation.

The Monmouth iron works and collieries are now in full working order. It is only one month since they were started, and now they have ten thousand hands employed.

The oldest son of the Prince of Wales, now in his seventeenth year, is to enter the Royal Military College, and will receive a commission as an active company officer in the army.

It is reported Charles Reade is writing for the stage in consequence of his desire for a constant attendance at Bible classes, prayer meetings, and contemplative practices.

The Paris Figaro prints an exposure of the alleged Ligotini conspiracy. It is said Count De Chambord, the Bourbon pretender, is privy to the plot and large sums have been collected to buy the admission of Ligotini to the army.

A Paris dispatch says that at a meeting of the Committee on the Trans-Sahara railway, it was resolved to ask the Chamber of Deputies for a further grant of 60,000 francs, in order to continue the surveys, and that the engineers may start for Africa immediately after the close of the fine season. DeLesseps earnestly supported the resolution.

The Committee of the House of Commons have decided that Bradlaugh should not be allowed to take the Parliamentary oath, but at his own risk make an affirmation.

DISMISSIONS IN THE ENGLISH CABINET. Grave dissensions in the Cabinet are reported. It is said that Mr. Chamberlain, the President of the Board of Trade, wishes to retire in consequence of the Government's failure to recall Sir Bartle Frere. A hint has been telegraphed to Sir Bartle Frere that his resignation would be acceptable.

IRISH DEPRESSURE GRANT. The Irish members of Parliament have received a grant from the Government of £200,000 for the relief of the Irish distress, and charge a uniform rate of one penny per acre on the land in Ireland, instead of £200,000, to be voted for the construction of fisheries plants. If the amendments are rejected, Farnell will move that the bill for the relief of the Irish distress be referred to a special committee of Irish members, under chairmanship of Mr. Foster.

THE NEW INDIAN LOAN. The new loan of a half per cent. Indian Government loan, £2,500,000, has been taken entirely by a syndicate of French capitalists at 103 3/4.

NEW ARRIVAL AT HOLBURN. The Prince of Wales, with a retinue of prominent personages, is presiding to-day at the ceremonies of the opening of the new harbour at Holybourn in construction, and is in every way an admirable work.

THE FINANCES OF THE DUBLIN MANION HOUSE COMPANY have been replenished by the gift of £2,000 from Dr. MacHale, of the Catholic University, and the Rev. Mr. Gifford, of the Protestant University.

THE PRICES TO THE SUCCESSFUL EXHIBITORS at the Berlin International Fishery Exhibition were distributed yesterday. It is understood that Governments to which it is proposed to send a gold medal with an accompanying diploma of merit, will be recommended a prize of £200, and a diploma of merit.

THE BLUE BOOK OF EASTERN CORRESPONDENCE just issued, contains a dispatch dated April 30th, from Earl Granville to Mr. Layard, which recounts his interview with the Turkish Minister to England, speaking of the non-execution of the Treaty of Berlin, he says he made Mursur understand that although the Government abstained from all menace, yet it would invariably adhere to the notification of the course it was about to take. A dispatch from Earl Granville to Lord Lyons of the 4th May insists on the necessity of ending the delay in the execution of the Treaty of Berlin, and proposes to Premier De Freycinet an identical note to the Porte. A dispatch from Mr. Layard of April 27th, mentions that the irritation of the Sultan against England was caused primarily by the proposal that England made at the Berlin Conference for the annexation of Bosnia and Herzegovina to Austria, and was afterwards increased by the despatch of the fleet to the Turkish coast in October, and the technical committee met this morning and the plenipotentiaries this afternoon.

THE SITTING OF THE PARLIAMENT was continued, and it is consequently believed the conference will terminate its labours in a few days. The sitting, on the 29th, will be presided by a meeting of the delegates.

Gen. John A. Suter, the discoverer of gold in California and one of the earliest prospectors on that coast died at Washington on Sunday.

It is understood that Mr. Sandford Fleming has, after consideration, decided to decline the office of Engineer in Chief of the Intercolonial railway, which was tendered to him some days ago.

Mr. Maximo Von Weber and Mr. Bohmstedt, sent to this country by the Prussian Government to study the American railroad system and the regulations of rivers, have arrived in Washington on their way across the continent.

THE ARMY WORMS. The army worms have reached Wheeling, W. Va. The worms are numerous in Washington county, Pa.

The census enumerators' complete returns show the population of Brooklyn, N.Y., to be 550,000, against 482,000 five years ago.
