**New Beverage  
Playing Havoc**

One is Dead and Twenty-five Are Nearly as Bad Off After Drinking "Coroner's Cocktail," Made in a Paint Store

CHICAGO, Feb. 14.—Chicago has discovered a new beverage, a "coroner's cocktail," but one should arrange affairs with an undertaker before indulging in it. One is dead and twenty-five are hanging on the rope perilously near the pearly gates, from absorbing it.

People anxious to avail themselves of the new drink will be interested to know that it is a mixture of nitro benzole and grain alcohol, with perhaps some minor ingredients, but these are the basic staples. It smells like a combination of benzine and glycerine and gets in its deadly work very rapidly.

Singularly enough, investigation into the latest death and twenty-five serious cases show that the new beverage was compounded at a paint store. The men met there last Sunday, mixed up the concoction and went to it. James J. Sullivan who professed a liking for the drink, helped himself liberally and is dead. The proprietor of the paint store had in stock what he supposed to be denatured alcohol for use in mixing paint or shellac.

Deaths from wood alcohol drinking have dropped to the minimum, following general warning during the recent fatal cases here and elsewhere, and finally resulting in druggists and others refusing to sell it until made unfit for human consumption.

**MINISTER WOULD  
ALLOW SPOONING  
IN CITY CHURCHES**

Pittsburg, Feb. 13.—Downtown city churches as places where young couples may make love was the suggestion made by the Rev. John Thompson in his address before the council of cities of the Methodist Episcopal church, in session here.

"I am speaking seriously," he said, "in regard to the duty of the downtown city church toward young couples. Every city pastor will bear me out in the statement that here are hundreds of girls in every metropolitan district who have no suitable place in which to entertain their male friends.

"There is every reason why our churches should fit up rooms with cozy corners, where there is not too much light, so that city young persons may do their love-making under favorable circumstances."

**CLUB WOMEN FAVOR  
EUGENIC MARRIAGE**

Detroit, Feb. 13.—Detroit club women through the action of the Board of Directors of the Detroit Federation of Women's Clubs at a meeting today came out strongly in favor of eugenic marriages.

It was voted to support actively the eugenic marriage bill which will come before the Legislature at the next session.

Mrs. C. E. Kilburn, Chairman of the Legislative Department proposed the following measures which will also be supported by loyal club women of Detroit. Making wife desertion felony rather than misdemeanor, to increase the mother's pension amount and make the law function throughout the State instead of merely in Detroit, a legal child born on of wedlock, and to raise the age of consent to eighteen years in all cases.

**French Sore Over  
British-Russ Policy**

Paris, Feb. 13.—The new Orientation of British foreign policy, as outlined in the King's speech and by Premier Lloyd George is measured with careful criticism in the French press today. The question of the British attitude toward and intentions in Russia is especially the subject of comment. No alternative policy is proposed, but the writers are agreed that at present it is impossible to trade with the Russian Co-operatives and not at the same time come to an agreement with the Soviet Government. August Guavaun, editor of the Journal des Debats, writes:

"It is characteristic that Lloyd George should put into the King's speech the declaration that the re-establishment of peace and economic life in Russia and the Orient is indispensable to Europe. Such a declaration definitely engages the British Government, Lloyd George forbids the neighboring states of Russia to engage in any offensive against the Soviet Government. After yesterday's declaration she must renounce her plans. France is not able to help her alone in a campaign against the Bolsheviks and she must take this into account, too, that the new British policy is that of the country, not of a party."

Much criticism is also expressed of Lord Curzon's statement that the treaty must be revised. With a kind of surprised and despairing cry at the new British policy, all articles end on the same note, that whatever else is done, the alliance and unity must be maintained.

**SHORTER SKIRTS**

Money No Object, Especially in Stockings.

Paris, Feb. 13.—Dame Fashion, having apparently reached the limit in evening gowns, has now decreed that skirts for day wear shall come no lower than one inch below the knee next season. Fourteen inches is the regulation length.

Judging by the showings of models by the most prominent costumers, where there is considerable variety in cut and texture, the main rule followed by the designers of next season's gowns is that woman's form must be revealed as much as possible.

While gorgeous materials are generally used, rough goods have been employed by some house for a "house maid gown," designed to meet the present servant crisis, which often forces the fashionable matron to cook her own breakfast and dust the parlor.

Money is no object, especially in underclothing, the prices of which rise in direct ratio to the fineness of the garments. Fifty dollars a pair for stockings is not considered expensive, provided they are of the "invisible" variety.

Several houses have provided a sensation by going back to sleeves, or rather an excuse for sleeves, which owing to the lack of backs in the gowns and just above the elbow, leave the upper arm uncovered in order to exhibit the heavy Egyptian slave armlets, which are riveted on the arm by a jeweler and cannot be detached.

**STEAMER CHICORA SOLD**

The old steamer Chicora, which for years ran between Lewiston and Toronto, has been sold to Frank W. Callaghan, a Toronto barrister, for \$4,400. It is probable that the boat will be refitted for passenger service and will be used on one of the Toronto routes.

The vessel was launched in Liverpool in 1864 and was one of the fastest boats of its kind. It was built to run the blockade between the ports of the Confederate states and England. Before the war the Chicora was valued at \$43,000. In 1870 the boat was again called into war service and transported troops and supplies from Collingwood to a point on Thunder bay where the expedition for the suppression of the Riel rebellion was landed. The boat won further distinction in 1874, being chartered as a special yacht for Lord Dufferin, who was then governor general of Canada.

400,000 IN GERMAN ARMY.  
Government Able to Execute Treaty If It Desires.

PARIS, Feb. 13.—The German army is still 400,000 strong, according to a report received by the committee of foreign affairs yesterday from General Niessel, head of the Baltic mission. In addition there are 100,000 policing forces, officers and non-commissioned officers. Germany also is well supplied with tanks, machine guns and airplanes. In the neutral zone alone on the right bank of the Rhine, the policing forces number 15,000.

General Niessel adds that the German minister of defense, Noske, is in the hands of the general staff and that the German government is capable, if willing, of obtaining execution of the treaty clauses by the country.

**NEW ACTION STARTED  
BY SOUTH GRIMSBY**

Judges Refuse to Give a Decision on Townships Appeal

When South Grimsby appealed the decision of Judge Campbell, re the North and South Grimsby agreement over the Q. and C. Road, the Justices who sat on the case reserved their decision.

Mr. McColachie acting for North handed down but the justices refused to give one. Had they done so the case would have been settled for all time to come but as they did not South Grimsby has now made another appeal. This time to the Supreme Court. Mr. McColachie tried to block the new appeal, by applying for an order restraining South Grimsby from appealing until they had paid the costs of the first action which they lost, but the justices refused to give this order.

Rushed to Join Jewish Legion

But Thousands of Refugees Were Deluded By Mirage and Must Be Fed.

Deluded by the mirage of a Jewish legion at Constantinople, many Jews from the Balkans embarked to that city some months ago and now without money, clothing or food, according to the report of a Jewish relief worker just received in this country. These returned soldiers found that in their economically ruined countries work the war, and when the report that a legion was being formed in Constantinople under British command, hundreds of them took their families and emigrated across the Bosphorus. They are now being supported by Relief funds until some way of self support can be found.

NO CLOTHING TO COVER NAKEDNESS

Destitute Jewish Children of Eastern Europe Suffer Terribly From the Cold.

The destitute Jewish children of Eastern Europe are almost entirely without clothing to protect them from the ravages of the winter, according to Samuel Charner, a Jewish writer and critic of Vilna, Poland, who has recently arrived in New York. "It is not a question of their being without shoes, or without underwear, or without any one thing," he reported. "It is a question of their being altogether without clothing to cover their nakedness, and to protect them from the cold. There is almost a total lack of linen, cotton or woolen clothing in Eastern Europe, and what there is sold at a prohibitive price. The rag that the poverty-stricken Jews have worn all through the war are falling from them. The clothing problem is almost a greater issue than the food problem to-day."

SIX MILLION JEWS HAVE LITTLE FOOD

Heart-Rendering Stories of Suffering and Death Come From Eastern Europe.

The cans in which oil was sent to the destitute Jews of Poland are being turned to still another use, according to reports brought back to the Canadian Jewish War-Relief Committee by relief workers abroad. For several months these cans have been serving in a number of lightning-change capacities, ranging from chocolate containers to sheet-iron stoves. Now that the epidemic of typhus is such a menace in Poland, where there are 100,000 cases, and throughout Eastern Europe, the old cans serve as portable bath tubs, and Canadian Jewish relief workers and Red Cross nurses are striving to combat the dread disease with cleanliness. All through the stricken lands of Eastern Europe little Jewish children are receiving their daily baths in these old oil cans.

BLACK TYPHUS IS KILLING THOUSANDS

Hundreds Upon Hundreds of Children Become Orphans and Wander Until Overcome by Starvation.

The tragedy of the wandering little orphans of Poland and the sorry efforts of the mothers of that war-stricken country to care for the homeless ones, is an appealing phase of the big heart-breaking story of destitution that relief workers bring back from abroad. Thousands of youngsters, motherless and fatherless through the ravages of the "black typhus," trudge wearily from village to village over the desolate country seeking what food they can find to keep life in their starving bodies. Sometimes bands of refugees find the little folk and take them in charge. Now and then some almost equally poor peasant gives them shelter and divides his small portion of food. And then, in the course of a day or two, the children take up the tramp again like so many small apysies. Once in a while a woman will mother the little travellers and aid them until starvation overtakes them. Jacob Bashein, who had been in charge of a relief unit for the Joint Distribution Committee, which handles funds collected by the American Jewish Relief Committee and other Jewish fund-raising relief organizations, told of these tragic pilgrimages. The Canadian Jewish War-Relief Committee is appealing for funds to alleviate this terrible suffering.

The jury was out only fifteen or twenty minutes, although Cutrone had admitted making wine in his cellar. The county council has adjourned to February 25th.

Mark Twain of Canada

In the days when interesting people came to Canada to find it freshly interesting there was nobody could reveal the spirit of the land to them like George Ham of the C.P.R. It is said he put Major Pond of the United States out of business. Why go on a wearisome lecture tour under that line President's guidance when George Ham could transport you to the delights of the Rockies in all the comfort of a Pullman? Great personages beseech him to call them by their first names. He has loaned matches to kings and potentates and autographed photographs of his features for admiring authoresses of best sellers. There did once seem to be a time when the Pullman would not venture to come to Canada without first ascertaining whether George Ham could receive them. He is said to have got so "fed up" with dukes and royal bodies that he did not mind, for a change, escorting untitled personalities of international fame. Many men whose signatures command impetuous power would no more think of forgetting to sign their Christmas cards than they would think of neglecting a royal command. He is so very much persons' great that all kinds of people in Who's Who, when he arrives in London, the coronator has to be enlarged to publish the invitations issued in his honor. Now he has achieved the equal honor of an unpaid-for mention in the exclusive Morning Post. It feels relieved to know that the plutocrat was dignified, the official entertainer of the C.P.R., is keeping his health and reveling in his high spirits. This bright though unadorned paper says George Ham is the Mark Twain of Canada. His jests are beyond computation. He is as generous with humor as he has been a profitable acquaintance for professional journalists. As he never has patented any of his inevitable quips he often laughs at them when he hears them on the stage. Until he realized that they were of his own making. You may have heard of the Cincinnati millionaire he took to Muskoka. While there the plutocrat was attacked by brigands from Toronto. The chief brigand later complained to the police that in the encounter his watch and chain had been stolen. It should be added that George Ham was not out with his Cincinnati charge when the watch and chain were stolen. Thousands of personages who have enjoyed seeing Canada have testified to how much their enjoyment was due to his kindly wit and indefatigable attention. They have paid tribute to the courtesies he knows so well how to extend in behalf of his railway. But perhaps one of the best tributes ever paid this incomparable humorous cleverness of the railway was a copy of verses by Mr. Neil Munro, the Scottish author. He says how George Ham had "frightened laughter ten thousand miles" when acting as uncle, aunt, brother, father and grandfather to a party of British scribblers. Russia a Big Battlefield; Reds and Bolsheviks Fighting

LONDON, Feb. 13.—The pursuit by the Bolsheviks of the remnants of General Denikine's forces into the Crimea, the launching of an expected Red attack on the north Russian front in the Dvina sector, and the conclusion of the Lettish operations against the Reds are pointed to by the military observers as the most salient developments of the past week's operations in Russia as reported to the War Office here.

On the western sector of the south Russian front the resistance of the volunteers against the Bolsheviks appears entirely to have collapsed with the Red occupation of Odessa. The Reds now are pushing toward the Dniester along a front of 120 miles.

The reports show that the Bolsheviks suffered disaster in their attempts to force the line of the Don and Manich Rivers, having lost heavily in men killed or made prisoner. The Reds, however, are making rapid progress in the Steppe region, probably attracted by the possibility of occupying Sebastopol and Theodosia, Black Sea ports in the Crimea, and seizing the Petrovsk railroad. The taking of this line would constitute a serious threat to the anti-Bolshevik communications with the volunteer fleet in the Caspian Sea, which has its base at Petrovsk.

The British detachment is withdrawing from Batum to Constantinople. The advice does not state whether the situation at Batum, which recently had been regarded as threatening, had improved, warranting the withdrawal of the British, or if it has grown worse and the British were compelled to withdraw.

There have been no operations of great moment on the Polish front. Following the virtual dissolution of Admiral Kolchak's armies in Siberia, Vladivostok did not resist occupation by the rebels. Authority there has been taken over by the Provincial Zemstvo. The city is reported quiet.

Claims Labor Federation Would Set Up Govt. of Autocracy

UTICA, N. Y., Feb. 13.—Charges that behind the announced plan of the American Federation of Labor to obtain the election of a Congress and a President favorable to its policies exists "a sinister movement of a small coterie of labor leaders, who have grown powerful by the contributions they have levied upon labor" to set up a "government within a government," were made here last night by United States Senator Miles Poindexter of Washington in an address before the Utica Republican club.

"The farmers and laboring men of America," he asserted, "have in every crisis been the great bulwark of our free institutions, and they will not follow the mistaken leadership which would place the government under the despotic control of a 'government within the government.'"

"Ruled by Few Leaders" This government within the government is not ruled by labor, but is an autocracy of a few

leaders who would not only impose their will upon labor itself, but would extend it, not only by the ballot, but by strikes and starvation of the entire people of the United States. It is as obnoxious as the 'invisible government' against which the people protested in 1912. There is no question of the right of the American Federation of Labor to gain control of Congress and of the President by way of the ballot box, if it can do so in accordance with the programme it has just issued. most of all for labor itself. If any class in this nation, whether employers or employees in industry, capital or labor, should succeed in any such program; but that is one of the perils which the nation must face as the price of free government.

"Mr. Gompers curses Congress," he continued, "but is not specific in his complaints. On the contrary, the announcement stated that 'all of the essential legislation in labor's bill of grievances of 1906 was enacted. This proclamation states that the 'free institutions of the country are menaced,' but the only specific reference is to the proposed anti-strike legislation. The right to throttle the transportation of the nation on which the lives of the people depend is not one of 'our free institutions.'"

"The officials of the American Federation of Labor, oppose not only the anti-strike legislation, but even the establishment of a government tribunal for the hearing and settlement of industrial disputes. The position of Mr. Gompers is that these questions must be left to the labor unions themselves to settle under the compulsion of tying up transportation and essential industries. This would seem to present clearly the issue of government by due process of law or government by coercion. To claim the right of any private organization to lay an embargo upon the people's supply of food and other essentials of life, is to claim the right of private and civil war by one class in the community against the community itself.

"Labor Deserves Much" "Labor, as the foundation of our industrial structure, is entitled to every consideration—perhaps the first consideration—at the hands of the government, and, in general, it has received such consideration. The railroad bill as reported, contained liberal provisions for profit sharing and other benefits for labor. These were opposed and stricken out at the instance of the officials of the American Federation of Labor, presumably because it would tend to lessen the control of these leaders

over labor." The American Federation of Labor the senator declared, "claims the right to enforce its demands by taking the control of transportation out of the hands of Congress, where it is vested by the constitution, and to assume such control itself. If this question is admitted to the ballots of the farmers, and of labor itself, and, to all classes of American people, who in the last analysis must decide it, there is no question that the constitution will be preserved."

Grimsby Man is Richer By \$50,000

Thomas Little of Grimsby has been bequeathed \$50,000 in his uncle's will. Little was born in Halton county about fifty-five years ago, the son of Thomas and Mrs. Little. His father was born in Dumfriesshire, Scotland, and married a lady of English birth and they came to Canada and settled in Halton. The father had two brothers, William and Franklin. Franklin had one son named William who now resides in Hanover, Mass., and who is a joint heir to the fortune. William Sr. remained in Scotland and followed up the profession of clog making and later branched out into the leather and shoe business. He never saw either of his nephews and it is doubtful if he ever heard from them to any extent.

According to the letter received by Little the old uncle died about the first of January and left twenty thousand pounds to be divided equally between himself and his cousin in Hanover. No other particulars were given, except that further information and documents would be forwarded in due course of time.
