### Broken Pledge.

On April 10th, 1909, some two and a half years ago, the leader of the so-called People's Party, but now better known as the Civic Party, made the following promise over his own signature. We quote what Sir Edward Morris wrote word for word:—"During the past three years the sealing steamers Greenland, Walrus, Grand Lake, Panther and Virginia Lake have been lost the seal fishery, with the owner's share of the catch on board or the prospects of a catch, insured, what a share has been uninsured, leaving the men to endure great hardship and suffering as well as the fruits of their perilous pursuit. It ought not to be difficult to devise a plan whereby in future, if such should occur, the men would stand on the same footing as the owners. . . . I shall be glad, ere the next seal fishery begins, to take up this matter in the same spirit."

At the time Sir Edward Morris made this promise in writing over his own signature, he was Prime Minister. Since that time he has spent more than two and a half years in charge of the Administration, and within that time has held Three Sessions of the Legislature, and has failed absolutely to evolve a plan which he declares can be done with ease. Although he has spent considerable time picking abroad and much time picking at home, he has had surely time enough to do for the sealers what he promised to do before the spring of 1910.

## Cable News.

**WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.** The United States Government today formally offered China the services of 2,000 American troops now stationed in the Philippines, for keeping open the railway from Peking to the sea, and for the protection of foreigners in China.

**LONDON, Nov. 29.** Suffragettes, in pursuance of the militant policy recently revived, invaded the City Temple to-night, and by noisy interruptions prevented Premier Asquith from delivering a speech. The Premier, having failed to get a hearing, after repeated efforts, left the church, very much disgusted.

**ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 29.** Russia is about to demand the resignation of Shuster, the American financial adviser to the Government of Persia, acting on instructions from the Russian Minister at Teheran. Shuster is supposed to have unduly interfered in the demands made by Russia upon Persia to recoup herself for the cost of sending troops to that country. Britain, it is understood, approves of Russia's demand for Shuster's removal.

**PARIS, Nov. 29.** The Havas Agency publishes a despatch reporting that Father Catene has been killed near the town of Yunan Province. The residence of the Vicar Apostolic de Guebriant has been pillaged and burned by robber bands, and eight Christians killed. The despatch also says that all the Europeans

means escaped when the entire mission was attacked two weeks ago.

**PEKIN, Nov. 29.** The Foreign Legation has received circulars purporting to come from the revolutionary organization, threatening to boycott merchandise from any nation making a loan to the Government. The Premier, Yuan Shi Kai, has notified members of the Legation that the crisis will be terminated in eight days. He is endeavouring to obtain a loan and to conciliate the provinces. No direct private press despatches are permitted to leave.

**HANKOW, Nov. 29.** The Government and Consular despatches now forwarded from Nanking say that the attack on the city by the revolutionists failed. They were forced to retire with heavy losses, and the Imperialists retain possession of the city.

**LONDON, Nov. 29.** The dispute which threatened to tie up the Atlantic transport line of teachers, has been settled by the company reinstating the seamen of the Minnehaha, who were discharged for disobeying orders.

## Seeing by Wire.

**View of Living Beings by Telegraph.**  
The problem of seeing by wire is gradually being solved, although the difficulties to be overcome before any general results will be obtained are still very great.

One of the newest systems is that of Professor Rosing, of the Technological Institute of St. Petersburg. It depends on the "seeing power," or sensitiveness to light, of what is termed a photo-electric element. Some recent work by Drs. Elster and Gettel has resulted in the discovery of a much more sensitive element of this kind, and thus further improvement may be looked for.

Professor Rosing has made very real advances, because he succeeded in constructing a receiving apparatus which is compact and which requires no complicated mechanism. The whole system is very ingenious, and so simple that development of it to actual general use appears quite possible.

**How the Pictures are Transmitted.**  
A fine pencil of light traces very rapidly a picture on a screen and reconstructs any image facing the transmitting apparatus. Suppose, for example, that a man stood before the transmitter just as he might stand before a telephone instrument to speak. Two sets of compound mirrors move in such a way as to project his image—a small portion at a time—upon the sensitive photo-electric element. The person watching the receiver sees a dark screen, which is lighted up by a small fluorescent spot when a current comes from the element over the telegraph wires.

This spot of light is caused by the invisible rays of a specially constructed vacuum tube, which strike the screen and cause it to glow. The strength of the glow being regulated by the amount of light falling each instant on the sensitive element in the transmitter.

The movements of the mirrors are also made to vary a series of electric currents which make the spot of light follow exactly the same course as the rays of light proceeding from the person standing in front of the transmitter. The result is that as the mirrors reflect the image of the person on the screen, the other person sees his image reconstructed on the screen. The whole thing takes place in an instant, and after one complete cycle it takes place again and again, so that a continuous image is seen on the receiving screen.

This wonderful apparatus is as yet only in the experimental stage, so that only small and simple objects can be seen over the wire; but in the opinion of a well-known expert there is every reason to look forward to developments which may lead ultimately to our seeing people with whom we are conversing on the telephone.—Daily Mail.

**'Sir Humphrey Gilbert.**  
Mr. Gosling is to be congratulated not only on the way in which he has written this biography, but on his good fortune in finding a subject, if it is decidedly remarkable, that no life of Gilbert has been written, except one issued to the members of a Boston Society. Possibly, as Mr. Gosling suggests, since Gilbert failed in his imperial designs, the world has been content to pass him over. Possibly, too, his brilliant half-brother, Raleigh, has eclipsed him. But the first man to endeavour to plant a British Colony deserves a niche in British biography, and Mr. Gosling has risen to the occasion. His book is scientifically written. Original documents are quoted, and an attempt is made to depict his personal character as well as to estimate his services as a pioneer of English colonization in the West. Financially, he was imprudent. As a leader of men he was practically a failure. But he was a high-minded patriot and a far-seeing explorer. It is a genuine pleasure to have the data for an appreciation of his work and character arranged with such skill and sympathy. "There are periods," said the Regent Murray in "The Monastery," "when men's spirits shine bravely through their grief." The Elizabethan period was some of the vital epochs in English history, and Sir Humphrey Gilbert had a spirit of adventure which shone bravely among his contemporaries, and shines among us still, as we look back to these restless years of imperial expansion.—British Weekly.
