Ponderous Personages

DANIEL WEBSTER
By GEORGE FITCH.

Author of "It Good Old Sivash."
Daniel Webster, the most tremendous orator who has ever reverberated in America, was born and educated in New Hampshire—after which feat the said state has remained ever since in a partially exhausted condition.
Webster arrived on earth in 1782, just before the close of the Revolution and eighteen years afterward delivered a Fourth of July oration in Hanover which contained many words used for the first time in that vicinity.
At nineteen, he became Dartmouth College's greatest alumnus and later went to Boston, where he studied law and full-organ conversation with thunder and lightning trimmings.

Webster was at that time a frail lad, with a head several times too large for him. He was intensely earnest and chose his pie for breakfast with an eye toward the future preservation of the republic. At the age of thirty-one, he went to Congress and a few days later he began to make speeches against the administration. After the first speech, it was generally conceded that when Webster had anything to say, the opposition had better get into the bomb proofs. He continued making speeches for many years on various subjects and most of these speeches can be bought to-day bound in buckram or leather or full morocco, the price varying with the binding and payable on easy terms. He took great delight in explaining to all comers that the Union was greater than any part thereof and he made several men famous by debating with them along these lines—the kind of fame that Alton Parker got by running against Roosevelt.

Webster was a great lawyer and won the Dartmouth College case behind which the vested interests have defended themselves ever since. He also knocked out one of the first monopolies—the Fulton Steamboat concession. He served in Congress off and on for many years and also in the Senate, but he was fondest of being Secretary of State, holding that office twice. He got four electoral votes for president once and could have been Vice-President when William Henry Harrison was elected, but he refused the nomination. That was the worst guess ever made by mortal man. Harrison died a month after he was inaugurated.

In his later years Webster was a stern sad man with massive overhanging eyebrows, tightly sealed mouth and large crazy face. He looked like two tons of dynamite ready to go off and when he spoke, it sounded like a volcano spouting dictionaries. He dedicated more monuments and was the orator of the day on more occasions than any other American and each time he tore a large irregular hole in the enemies of the Constitution. Webster was the greatest friend of the American Constitution and the worst enemy of his own—in consequence of which he became extinct at the age of seventy while still hard at work.

Webster was the greatest friend of the United States when it needed friends and assayed 100 per cent patriotism. He and Noah Webster worked closely together, Noah discovering new and deadly words for his celebrated dictionary and Daniel trying them out on the enemy and making them popular.

His Royal Highness, as Governor of Canada, is due to arrive at Quebec on the morning of the 19th of July.

Cable News.

Special to the Evening Telegram. GLASGOW, To-day. Kingston Dock is destroyed by fire. Over a million lost.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. Premier Asquith has capitulated to suffragettes and consented to receive a deputation of East End working women on Saturday. Sylvia Pankhurst's attempt to carry out her threat of a hunger strike, at the entrance of the House of Commons until the Premier yielded to the demand that be listen to a delegation of women, was largely responsible for the Prime Minister's decision. The victory is a distinct one because Sylvia Pankhurst was arrested a week ago for attempting to lead a procession of East End women to Westminster to demand the audience which Asquith has now promised.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. Three women were drowned and it is feared a dozen other persons perished yesterday when a passenger train went through a culvert and into a torrent at Carr Bridge, 28 miles south of Inverness, Scotland. A thunder storm that ravaged the north of England and Scotland, was responsible for the accident. A train from Perth was crossing the culvert, and became derailed, and a culvert which had been undermined, collapsed. A passenger coach fell into the water. Many persons on the train escaped from the car, but drifted about in the stream and were badly injured before being rescued.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. The divers' examinations of the Kaiser Wilhelm and passenger stories show good construction as well as good management and fair weather saved her from a tragic end. She lies at Southampton Dock with two rents in her side of twenty-four and eighteen feet long, below the water line with two compartments flooded. The incense which cut into the Kaiser Wilhelm has also been docked with her bows badly damaged. The collision almost duplicated that between the Empress of Ireland and the Storstad and promises to furnish the courts with a similar controversy to settle.

Confederation.

We are in receipt of a letter signed Observer, which opens a discussion on the subject of Confederation with Canada.

Our correspondent suggests that it is advisable that a public discussion should be induced on this subject, as he recognizes that considerable discussion is going on outside of the press.

We recognize with him that the topic of Confederation has been occupying attention of many persons for some months, and we agree with him that it may be advisable to discuss the matter more publicly.

We have therefore given a place in our columns to his observations, and we shall welcome further contributions from him and others.

It will be observed that our correspondent eschews personalities, and discusses the matter from the standpoint of the merits of the questions, devoting himself in this letter to general comments as to the effect of Confederation on the industries of the city.

We shall be glad to receive for publication letters to be published over the actual signature or over a nom de plume, but of course correspondents must in all cases follow the custom of supplying us with their names and addresses, even though the names may not be sent in for publication.

We ask for a clean discussion on the merits of the matter. We invite contributions based on facts and principles, not on prejudices and personalities. We shall not publish any injurious reflection on public men, nor shall we give publicity to declarations or insinuations or innuendoes meant to reflect on the honour of public men, or to attribute unworthy motives or sinister ends to them.

We shall welcome all contributions, whether in favor of or against Confederation with Canada.

Beri-Beri.

Editor Evening Telegram.
 Dear Mr. Editor—I want to thank M. B. for commencing a discussion of beri beri in the papers. In Newfoundland the newspapers are the means of dissemination of information, the people, especially in our outports, reading few books at all, that is my apology for so constantly troubling you.—I sincerely hope others will add to the discussion and keep alive an interest in the subject. The Government has been obliged to send relief immediately to the sufferers at Hooping Harbor, and there are many other cases. The object of the discussion is to interest people in finding out what to do to prevent the great economic loss and suffering entailed. As M. B. suggests, the causes are very likely plural, the evidence rather points that way. The district at present affected is very steep, rocky, and on low lying ground or marshes at all. Diet is universally accepted at present, either as causing the disease directly, or leaving the person in a condition which permits some other cause possibly a germ, to lead to the

disease. The people of the country should remember these facts. The disease is essentially one of poor diet, it may even affect babies at the mother's breast where they are infected themselves. The two ingredients that are needed are nitrogen, and phosphorus. A fish eating people should have plenty of phosphorus, for beri beri has been mostly a winter disease when fish has been scarce. Beri beri is a disease of the crew's cabin, only seldom of the officer's. As M. B. points out, a poor diet means nitrogen starvation and a lessened resistance to infections of all kinds. People of the coast should remember that meats, fats, and vegetables containing nitrogen, such as peas and beans, are valuable. Mr. W. G. Goaling points out that the Manitoba flour contains more nitrogen than the Kansas or second flours, this is practically so small an amount anyhow it counts for little.

As to the infection and its possible method of reaching the human being, very careful experiments have been made and are not yet conclusive. Sir Frederick Manson, the famous specialist in tropical diseases, believes that the infection is carried largely by the vermin which infect the body, called body lice; these are, alas, too common among the poor, they have never been warned properly of the real danger these are, and there is no excuse for them. The bed bug is more difficult, in wood houses, to get rid of, but Sir Frederick Manson states that it is a cause of danger, just as the mosquito carries malaria and yellow fever.

To make this contribution to the discussion practical, it would be a very great help if the people were told through your columns that they should use whole wheat—which carries phosphorus and possibly a ferment or alkaloid yet unisolated, that it is good always to eat some meat, or fat, or peas, or potatoes in their skins. And secondly, that they ought to make a regular campaign against body vermin and bed bugs. The doctors of this country can speak with authority on the danger and evil results that they have seen from this all too common cause of danger. Perhaps I might add that the careful work done in Malta revealed the fact that in the milk of the goats, which the people had considered their very safest source of food, lay the germ which destroyed so many lives, when that was forbidden as a diet 95 per cent of the disease disappeared. And since, in 1911, the Governor of the Philippines passed a law against the use of polished rice in the Army and Navy, both native and American, beri beri ceased to exist. Rice containing less than one half per cent. of phosphorus is called polished rice.
