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

The Reid Nfld. Co. were advised by the Postal Telegraphs last night that their steamers Bruce, Glencoe and Home were at Trepassey, having arrived there during the afternoon. The ship is now twelve days on the run from Port aux Basques, nine days of which was spent at St. Lawrence. 

They did their best, working in relays all through the night and until seven o'clock this morning. 





War News.

Previous to 9 A.M. ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

Messages Received

PARIS, via St. Pierre, March 2. Between the sea and the Oise raher fierce artillery contests took lace in which we scored the advanage. On the entire front of Rheims section, especially near Alger farms and Pompelle fort, the enemy delviered this morning several attacks which were easily repulsed. In Beausejour district our progress is continuing on several points, and we have taken foot in the woods, which the enemy had fortified, and even advanced beyond. In the district of Vauquois, in Argonne, we have maintained yesterday's gains and made 100 prisoners. A night attack delivered by the Germans on Le Perthe woods, failed.

The Minister of War announces that he efforts of the French aviators during the past fifteen days have been successful. Following is one of their exploits: On February 17th a French aviator discovered the positions of 21 German batteries. Next day he gave the position of a heavy German batery, which was immediately bomparded and its caissons destroyed The bombardment of Metp barracks s also recorded as another excellent aviating exploit. The report closes by declaring that the military value f Zeppelins is considered very small and gives a list of four German airships brought down recently.

FIERCE FIGHTING IN FRANCE.

hirty mile front in Champagne district, where the French and Germans are struggling for possession of strategic positions. Both sides have lost heavily in that region, and at some points both sides claim victory, French official despatches state that French troops have captured a number of German artillery supports, as well as trenches and barricades constructed of fallen trees and bags of The feature of the fighting along the northern end of the battle ine is the heavy artillery fire. The French and British are now on equal erms with the Germans in the matter f big guns, and the German artillery is kept on the move from position to position, avoiding the accurate fire of the Allies' cannonade. Stormy weather conditions prevail, and at some points the soldiers are lying in renches that are nearly half full of water. This has led to a great increase in cases of rheumatism and pneumonia in the hospitals. A severe snow storm is raging over the Vosges. AUSTRIAN SUBMARINES OF F CORFU.

GENEVA, March 3. An Austrian fleet consisting of six Austro-German submarines, accompanied by several torpedo boats and torpedo boat destroyers, left Pola yesterday for the Mediterranean bound for the Dardanelles, according to a telegram which bases its report upon what it characterizes as information received from a reliable source from Trieste by way of Innesbruck. The fleet is said to have been last reported off Corfu.

IN THE DARDANELLES.

LONDON, March 3. A despatch from Athens states that e batteries of Kalia Bahr and for iltano, guarding the narrowest part of the Dardanelles, have been sile ced, but this is not officially confirmed. It is said that the losses of the British and French in killed and wounded are less than 600, despite the fierceness of the fire to which the Allies' fleet was subjected.

RECIPROCITY.

AMSTERDAM, March 3.

The Cologne Gazette, commenting n Asquith's recent speech in the ommons, in which he outlined Great Britain's retaliatory measures for Germany's submarine blockade in the British Isles, says: Our submarines will now, we hope, endeavour to destroy all goods destined for Great Britain. Great Britain wishes war to the knife. She will have it.

BRITISH STEAMER ATTACKED.

DUNDEE March 3. The British steamer Dalblair re ports it was attacked off the Essex oast by two hostile aeroplanes that dropped bombs. This is the first aerial attack upon British merchant ships reported from British war zone

North Sea Fight

WAS FOUGHT AT A RANGE OF OVER TEN MILES.

London, Feb. 26 .- The report of Adniral Beatty's action in the North Sea on January 24 states that the first shot was fired at a range of 18,000 yards, and hits were made at 17 000 vards which is about ten miles. Discussing this plan of the fight an expert on naval affairs writes as follows:

"Assuming that the freeboard to the weather decks in the rival squadrons is in both cases seventeen feet, then the horizon when viewed from the level of the weather deck of the cther at this range of ten miles. By ascending to a point on the mast 50 feet above the water level rather more than one-half of the enemy's hull can theoretically, be seen, and by ascending 100 feet the whole of the hull can be seen, theoretically, and with dead

"Even under the most favorable conditions that could reasonably be expected at this time of the year in the North Sea the enemy's vessels could certainly not have been more than a blur on the horizon to the gunner, and even the men at the range finders could have seen but little more. With anything like a swell or sea running neither the gunners nor the range takers could have seen the enemy's hull at all for half the time of the opening action; it therefore shows the wonderful skill of the British sailors and is intensely gratifying to the layman to learn that the guns of our magnificent battle cruisers can hit hard, hit first and keep on hitting an enemy that they practically cannot see, while the vessels are tearing through the water at a rate of thirtyfour land miles an hour.

"It would appear that at no time was the range much less than 12,000 yards, i.e., practically the range at which it had been frequently thought the opening rounds would be fired. Owing to the enormous range and the consequent comparatively steep angle of descent it is probable that few projectiles got through the armour of the Derfflinger, Sedylitz and Moltke, and hence their engines were not seriously damaged, thus allowing them to keep up nearly full speed. The havoc caused on the decks and upper works. however, must have been frightful.

"In the action off the Falkland Is lands it appears that the Invincible opened fire at a range of about 35,000 yards, and the Scharnhorst was sunk, while a distance of between 10,000 and 11,000 yards separated her from the Carnarvon, the vessel which administered the coup de grace to her."

WOULD LET OUT RISSIA'S WHEAT.

(New Haven Register.) Russia is the only rival of America in quantity of wheat product. Last year, by estimate, Russia produced about a billion bushels against 1,142,-717,000 bushels from the United States and Canada. But a greater share of that wheat is locked up in eastern Europe, cut off from the markets which seek it, and the people who starve for it, by reason of a Turkish blockade of the Dardanelles against

The forces of Russia and England are co-operating to break that blockade. Probably they need no urging. but are doing everything in their power. But surely it is no breach of neutrality to wish for them early success. Let the Dardanelles once be opened to let out the stream of Russian wheat, and watch the market bulls scurrying to cover. Watch the corners break. Watch the fictitious prices tumble-not back to their July level, but to a living scale. Watch the poor rejoice at bread once more at the old weight and at the old price.
