SINN FEINERS CAUSE TROUBLE.

CORK, Ireland, Sept. 28. A police sergeant was shot in the high at midnight last night while he was preparing a squad at the court house to charge a crowd which had been making an attack with stones. He had given the order to fix bayonets when five shots were fired and the sergeant dropped seriously wounded. The shooting was the culmination of night disorders fomented by Sinn Feiners, small groups of whom paraded whistling Sinn Fein anthems and cheering Sinn Feiner Thomas Ash who died. Jail windows were smashed and five youths received scalp wounds from police batons. The convention of delegates had left the city before the demonstration occurred.





Cheaper Food.

London Daily News: Bread is to be heaper and meat is to be cheaper. The ninepenny loaf will make its appearance universally in little more than a fortnight. The fall in retail! meat prices should take effect next week. The principles followed in the cases of these two staple commodities are diametrically opposed. In the case of bread economic laws have been thrown to the winds, and the citizen as a consumer is to get his loaf for 9d at the price of a State subsidy of £40,000,000, which will fall on the citizen as taxpayer. It is a momentous experiment, but it will at any rate mean the spreading of a burden that at present falls with oppressive weight on one class of the community. The only question is how great a reduction is justified, and while the magnitude of the subsidy involved must inevitably arouse misgivings, there are no adequate grounds for challenging the decision taken by Lord Rhondda and the Cabinet after what must be assumed to have been a comprehensive survey of the situation. In the case of meat the Food Controller has been able to proceed on sound economic lines. He has fixed first maximum prices for live meat, then maximum prices for dead meat, then the maximum margin of retailers' profits.






