



Three to four quintals of codfish is too much to barter for a barrel of flour, and un-less some relief is forthcoming in the way of prices, our people will have to adopt substitutes for the high priced articles.—Western Star.





#### COLLISION IN ST. LAWRENCE.

The accident hap-pened about 45 miles below Quebec, at head of the Traverse, where a dense fog had settled over the river. #### HIGH SEAS JURISDICTION.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18. Formal notice that it cannot recog nize the jurisdiction of United States over the high sea, beyond the three mile limit fixed by international law for many years, has been served by the British Government in connection with the seizure, twelve miles off Long Island coast, of the British schooner Marshall, reported to have been laden with liquor. It is expected, however, that the British authorities will await the outcome of court pro-ceedings and the final establishment of the vessel's registry, before any further diplomatic step is taken. It has been deemed necessary, however to give notice in advance that Great Britain cannot acquiesce in the ex-tension of American jurisdiction over the high seas beyond the usual limit.

#### PREMIER LAUDS DOMINIONS.

Lloyd George said it had been decided in war time to have discussions on the constitutional aspects of the Empire, and he was bound to include that in the agenda but the concensus of opinion was tha it would be a mistake to lay down rules, because thereby, the indefinable things that make the British Empire would be limited, and its unity weakened. Two and a quarter millions of fighting overseas men were better than written rules. The gigantic events of the war had consolidated the Empire in so fast a fashion, that done. ers of the Protestant church throughout Europe are showing lively interest in the announcement that the burial place of John Calvin, the Swiss divine and reformer, has been revealed after having been unknown for 357 years. Calvin died in 1564, and was buried somewhere in the Plain-Palais cemetery here, but no stone has marked the spot. According to the legend, he was buried secretly from fear that his grave would be desecrated. Knowledge of the location of the grave is said to have been held by one family for more than three and a half centuries. The secret is said to have been handed down from father to son for all these generations. Disclosure at this time is accounted for by the statement that the last holder of the secret. 




