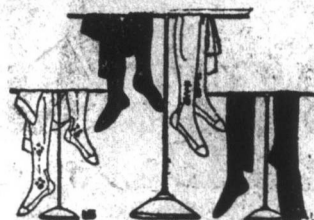

**When a Bonus is
Not a Bonus?**

Under authority of "An act to en-
courage the development of the sea
fisheries and the building of fishing
vessels," the government distributed
\$150,000 to fishermen and vessel and
boat owners on the Atlantic coast
last year. It has been doing the
same thing since 1882 and in the
same way. Keeping in view the ob-
ject of the expenditure as defined in
the title of the act authorizing it, it
is illuminating to study the effective-
ness of its distribution.

Each vessel owner got a bounty of
\$1 per registered ton, payable on any
one vessel not exceeding \$50.

Each owner of boat measuring not
less than thirteen feet keel, \$1 per
boat.

Each vessel fisherman, \$7.

Each boat fisherman, \$3.30.

Altogether, bounties were paid on
586 vessels and 11,068 boats; to 4,273
vessel or deep-sea fishermen, and
19, 128 boat or inshore fishermen.

We can imagine the enthusiasm
stimulated among the young galleys
along the Nova Scotia coast to "go
down to the sea in ships." Who
would not be impelled to weather
the elements on the Banks and even
risk his life, with the pros-
pect in view of a \$7 bonus
at the end of the year? Why by lay-
ing that aside each year for a thou-
sand years one will have built up a
tidy fund to provide for his old age.
Of course if he has the misfortune to
live only a few hundred years, why
he's simply out of luck.

And as for inshore fishermen, we
can imagine the men folk pump-
ing about in kiltish glee over the
prospect of a \$5.30 bonus, the where-
withal to procure a new pair of sus-
pender, some wollen socks, some
strong shag and a few plugs of
chewin'. What, say: A season's
work should justify such dissipation.

And Mr. Duff and other prosperous
vessel owners in the east must chuck-
le mirthfully at the gratuity of a dol-
lar a ton to make sleek swains of
their homely fishing craft. We can
imagine Angus Walters gazing specu-
latively at his cracked and weath-
ered spar and calculating what
his vessel bounty of \$70 or
\$80 will do towards replacing
it. With his bounty in one hand he
goes about his vessel studying what
he can do with it and, finally, in ab-
solute surrender, he calls the boys
together and invites them ashore to
have a ham sandwich and a cup of
coffee—just a little mug-up.

Mr. Boat-owner on receipt of his
one dollar gratuity straightway pro-
ceeds to bedeck his craft and rally
forth in splendor to stupy with
amazement the fishes of the sea and
dip-net them in their bewilderment.

Scattered over forty years the gov-
ernment has spent six millions and a
half, excluding interest, and it has
just drifted through the sieve in dol-
lars and five dollars. Originally it
was said to be the interest on the
Halifax award of 1877 by which the
United States paid us \$4,500,000 for
certain concessions. Immediately
someone conceived the brilliant idea
of instituting a waste fund and he
certainly accomplished his purpose.
Six millions and a half shot to the
devil in forty years! And the un-
concern with which the matter is
being regarded by politicians gives
promise of another few odd millions
being shot before the country wakes
up.

We perhaps would not be so criti-
cal if the industry was provided with
all the money necessary for its honest
expansion and we were rolling in the
wealth of Croesus. But such is not
the case. The government is crying
for economy, and up to the present
a matter of \$25,000 is denied us for
the very essential reform of institu-
ting a separate fisheries department.
We have little reason to doubt that
the fisheries administrative officers
realize the utter futility of the fish-
ing bounty and would, if nothing but
the facts of the situation were to be
considered, make other use of the
money. Responsibility would seem
to rest with the politicians. They
see the danger of creating a bit of
criticism among a few interested
people and shy clear of the issue. Be-
cause a wrong exists is no reason why
it should continue. Let those people
in the House of Commons who are
interested, or profess to be interested,
in the development of our fisheries,
show some initiative in the matter.
One who hesitates because he fears
to lose his seat at a subsequent elec-
tion lacks the backbone required by
men who are safe to trust with our
affairs. We are not averse to the
government's paying each and every
fisherman \$1,000 a year. God knows
they could make good use of it; but
we frankly feel that it is not a square
deal to anyone to have the impres-
sion abroad that the Atlantic indus-
try is bountied to the extent of \$160,
000 annually when, in effect, it gets
nothing. A pound of flour is of prac-
tical use and one may make a loaf
of bread, but when that pound is
scattered hither and yon, there
is not enough for anyone to
employ usefully.—Canadian Fish-
man.

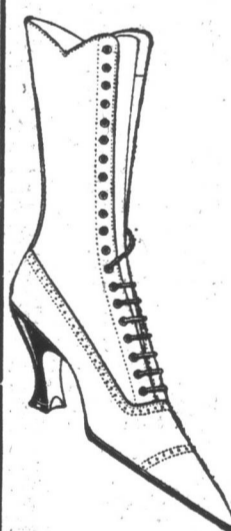

Municipal Council
WEEKLY MEETING.

The weekly meeting of the Council was held yesterday afternoon. The business was a very short one, only the Mayor occupying the attention of the Board. Mayor Cook and the full Board were present.

At the condition of pavement along their premises, which was being repaired. They stated that owing to same being raised near the street car rails, the water drains to the curb near their door, and caused them considerable inconvenience and expense. The City Engineer reported that he had arranged to have a gully placed there, so as to carry off the water.

The Newfoundland Board of Fire Insurers asked if Section 377 of the Act, regarding the roofing of new buildings, was being carried out, and if not, what steps were being taken to see that it was given effect.

The St. John's Light & Power Company stated that a regular inspection of the City lighting had been undertaken, and all the lights would be given attention.

Mr. T. P. Hickey called attention to the dangerous condition of wall, rear of his dwelling, Henry Street, which the Council are at present having repaired. He informed the Board that he had asked the advice of a fully qualified mason, who was of the opinion that it would be necessary to take the wall down and remove the top and back pressure before rebuilding. The City Engineer stated there would be no need or anxiety, as every precaution was being taken, and that there would be proper inspection of the work and the specification strictly adhered to.

Mr. J. Quigley asked permission to see slaughterhouse on Mundy Road. The matter was referred to the City Engineer for report.

Contractor W. T. Penn, on behalf of Mr. N. Andrews, asked permission to build dwelling on the Waterford Terrace Road. Permit will be given conditional upon his paying provision of cost, according to frontage of property, for water extension.

Mr. James Phelan will be allowed to erect carriage shed on Merryweather Road, subject to the approval of the City Engineer.

The application of Mr. R. J. Coleman to build garage, Circular Road, was referred to stand over.

The City Health Report for the week showed one case of diphtheria, one of scarlet fever and one of Typhoid.

The reports of the City Engineer, Sanitary Supervisor, etc., for the week were tabled, accounts presented were ordered paid, after which the meeting adjourned.

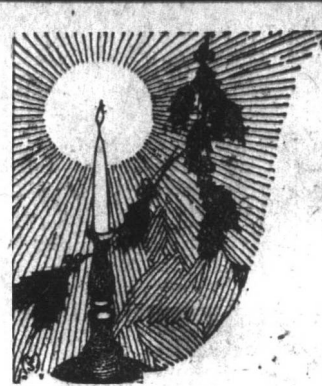

Canadian View of Allied Debt.

In view of the necessity of finding a solution to the problem of the Allied debts, the appended letter from a prominent Canadian financier has special value. Bernard Baruch in a letter to Senator Borah, dissected the Balfour note, and made important constructive suggestions, which Mr. Macanlay would further develop.

"Dear Mr. Baruch: Canadians have noted with satisfaction the broadminded views expressed in your widely published letter. We in the Dominion have no direct interest in the Allied debts. We are united by strong friendship, both to the Mother Country and to our neighbor brother, and can we think, view the matter impartially. May I briefly discuss the case?"

You frankly agree that such portions of the Allied loans as were expended for munitions and other fighting purposes, were used for the benefit of all, and that the debts may fairly be reduced to this extent.

When your country declared war you took your place beside the Allies to prosecute the struggle as a joint enterprise. You required over a year for preparation, and during that time the Allies gave to the cause one million lives, besides billions of their own money. You could not help with men, but you did help financially. The claim now that you were only lending while they were giving is so contrary to all ideas of co-operation and justice, that it will not stand for even a moment's investigation. Were your dollars worth more than their lives?"

During the whole war in actually killed, France lost 2,100,000; Britain 1,500,000; Italy 1,000,000; the United States 50,000; Canada 52,000. In lives there was no equality of sacrifice; must there also be no equality in finance?"

I need not dwell further on these points, for you admit that money borrowed for military purposes should be deducted from the so-called debts. Coming from the head of the Government Commission which made the advances, this declaration should carry great weight with the American people. Its general acceptance would be a first step towards a fair solution.

You hold, however, that money applied to purposes not strictly military, should be repaid. You also hold that the United States has counter-claims.

Among non-military items you list food for Britain's civilian population. This food, purchased at inflated prices was sold much below cost, and the proceeds were at once applied to strictly military purposes. Was it not all therefore a war expenditure?"

You also suggested that Britain should have transported American troops without charge. Why? These vessels were private property, and their owners had to be reimbursed. Why should Britain pay for their use while they were transporting American troops? American railroads were likewise under government control. Should they have carried without any charge the munitions purchased by the Allies? British of course gladly furnished the naval squadrons that transported the transports.

You make out a better case on another point. Any amount paid to J. P. Morgan & Co. to cover an overdraft of the British Government on April 6th, 1917, is in a different category, as it represents expenditures before the United States became one of the associates.

But there is another point. Your advances were limited to covering purchases in the United States, which incidentally benefited your own people practically the only exportable item for Russia. No other nation imposed such a restriction. We this quite in harmony with full co-operation, and with the wealth and density of your country? If a broader view might widely have been taken, and the restriction had not been imposed, Britain would not have had to continue to borrow the domestic requirements of her Allies, a burden which she would have paid for her own American purchases in cash. If it becomes of no importance for what purpose the money was used, and even the Morgan overdraft is of no account.

There is still another point. These funds did not leave the United States. They were expended in purchases there at war-time prices. An American writer estimates that apart from the wealth which this brought to individuals, the United States Government itself received back in excess profits and other taxes over \$2,000,000,000, reducing the actual advance by that amount. Should this be ignored?"

I heartily agree that if there is to be any just settlement all points must be carefully considered, and among these points I would include the question, whether if these debts were collected the United States would have borne a reasonable share of the burdens, particularly for the first year, and also the effect of the limitation of your advances. My own impression is that the maximum amount if any, which an impartial Commission would award as due by Britain, would be the Morgan overdraft of \$50,000,000.

Mr. Hoover says that the Allies can pay these sums. This has no

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

NO CONFIRMATION. LONDON, Dec. 1. There is no confirmation yet of a report on Wednesday night that the Turks in the western theatre have revolted and are marching toward Dedagatch on the Aegean Sea. Although press despatches continue to mention disturbances without giving details of any actual fighting.

ANOTHER FREAK FOR U. S. NEW YORK, Dec. 1. Sergel Michailowitch, known as Iladore, the mad monk of Russia, and before the revolution Abbot of Traktyn, and a prominent figure in Russian church politics, arrived yesterday on the Lithuanian. Iladore was exiled from Russia by Czar Nicholas and unfrocked by the Holy Synod of the Russian Orthodox Church after disobeying the orders of the church for eleven years. He said he came to this country to become a citizen and a minister among Russian Baptists. He was allowed to land after a close inspection by immigration agents.

ABOUT THE WORLD IN MOTOR BOAT.

MIAMI, Florida, Dec. 1. The ninety-eight foot motor cruiser Speedeaks, owned by Albert V. Gowen of Chicago, Vice-President of the Portland Cement Co., completed a thirty-five thousand mile around the world trip yesterday, having set out from Miami on September, 1921, and circled the globe. It is said to be the smallest boat that ever accomplished this trip.

POLICE SLAUGHTERED CIVILIANS

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 1. Federal troops to-day are guarding the badly battered City Hall, while the city is counting casualties from last night's pitched battle between protesting citizens and police, when the former rushed the building as a protest against the water famine. The police turned machine guns upon the crowd, killing seventeen, seriously wounding eighteen, and slightly wounding thirty three.

NEWFOUNDLAND, OF COURSE, WILL BE REPRESENTED.

LONDON, Dec. 1. It is understood that invitations to an Imperial Economic Conference, to be held in London, have already been despatched to the various Dominions. The conference is to be held, it is expected, between February and June of next year, at a date suitable to delegates. Invitations leave the Dominions the privilege to propose the personnel and site of delegations, but it is expected the Premiers themselves will attend.

Laurie Jackson's Running Record.

COMES TO NEWFOUNDLAND WELL RECOMMENDED.

The fleet footed Canadian runner, in the person of Laurie Jackson, who caused quite a sensation in running circles on Oct. 15th last, for the Halifax Herald and Evening Mail Trophy is at present staying at the Crobbie Hotel, having arrived from Halifax yesterday by S.S. Silvia, accompanied by his brother Stanton, an all round athlete, who comes as his trainer.

Yesterday afternoon many of our sporting enthusiasts made a call on the young athlete and heartily welcomed them to the city. Laurie, the runner, was born in Parrboro, N.S., twenty-five years ago. He is 5 ft. 6 in. in height and weighs but 130 lbs. Although he suffered somewhat from sea sickness on the trip from Halifax, he felt nothing the worse after his unpleasant trip, and after a good night's rest he is bent on having a trial spin over the course at the rink to-day. Jackson is in excellent shape, and by his appearance looks as though he had undergone rigorous training, because it was only last week that he won the Dunn Trophy from a large field of starters at Truro, N.S. Jackson first started his running career while overseas with the Canadian Forces. On two occasions he made 3rd position in the one mile events at the Canadian Sports Championship, held at London, Eng., and Seaport, Sussex. Having defeated several well known cracker from Upper Canada. Before his return home in 1919, he ran second to McAulay in a one mile race, and during the same year went to Charlottetown to complete in the Olympic trials, finishing second in the 1/2 and 1 mile. Jackson defeated several well known runners who at present hold championships in the Lower Provinces, viz: Bill Mooney, the 1/2 mile champion, who is now at Pennsylvania University, and Barney Francis who defeated Lapierre only a few months ago. He did not take a liking to the long distance running game up to 1921, having always specialized in short distance running. The first 10 mile race that he ever attempted was in the fall of 1921, when he ran under the imperial colors, and although he only found 10 position, he made a most sensational finish. Bell who took part in the same race, came second during the early part of this year Jackson had settled down to hard training with his team mate All Rogers who was twice winner of the Halifax Cup. His first real test of the year was when he started in the one mile event at the Wanderers' track in July last when Grant Holmes won out by 20 feet in 4 min. 39 1/2 sec. Jackson's time was 4.41 having defeated McAulay, who finished 3rd in a hair raising finish. On Aug. 4th last, he won the 5 mile race at Dartmouth, the second man, Hanson, being 1/4 mile behind. Two days later on the opening of the Dartmouth Track he won a beautiful silver cup for the five mile race, and on the same afternoon ran second to Holmes in the mile. The six mile road race, under the auspices of the D. B. C. A., held at Dartmouth on Thanksgiving Day, was won by A. Hanson, Jackson, who led the field up to 4 1/2 miles of the course, gave away his position, suffering from a cold was due to his defeat, but he pluckily held on and finished in 4th place. He, however, redeemed himself in the Halifax Road Race held on Oct. 15th last, when he ran the race of his career, which was his second attempt over the 10 mile route, having finished second to the best footed Windsorian runner McAulay, and was but 25 seconds behind the winners previous Maritime Record, having covered the course in the record time of 56 min. and 7 sec., which was a surprise, not alone to the sports enthusiasts of the Maritime Provinces, but to himself. Had Jackson set out at a much faster clip from the outset, he would very probably have overcome McAulay's lead, as his time over the last half of the course was quicker than the winners, while he was faster by 2 min. and 26 sec. over Belts performance of the previous year, and he bettered Belts local record by 33 seconds which was established by our local champ before he left for Halifax in the same year. Stanton Jackson, the trainer, is well known

an all round athlete in Canada, having figured only a few years ago in the Championship sprinting events. He holds the 1/4 mile indoor championship, while he has also a mark of 25 seconds flat in the 1/2 mile, which was held during Carnival week at the Wanderers track in 1920, having defeated Holmes, Ross and Charlie Hall at that time. Stanton is also well known for his hockey prowess. He is a player member of the Amherst Hockey Team of the Nova Scotia League, having played against New Glasgow, Moncton and Halifax Senior teams. Last winter he had a try-out with the Toronto St. Pats, who later won the World's Championship. He did not make the team, owing to not being weighty enough. He plays forward and defence positions. A younger brother of the Jackson family, named Avery, is well known through the Provinces as a brilliant baseball player, having figured with Dartmouth in the Dartmouth Senior League. He is noted for his spectacular catches in the outer gardens, while last season he came second in the league batting list. The Jackson boys are visiting Newfoundland for the first time, and from what they have already witnessed in St. John's they bespeak for themselves a very enjoyable stay. Laurie Jackson comes to St. John's well recommended by the Halifax sports, and they have every hope that their second best bet of Canada will uphold his past reputation. Jackson is a splendid type of athlete, and can be relied upon as one of the finest runners ever trod our shores. He is physically fit, and running in splendid form, and it can be safely vouched for that the coming race will be hotly contested from start to finish.

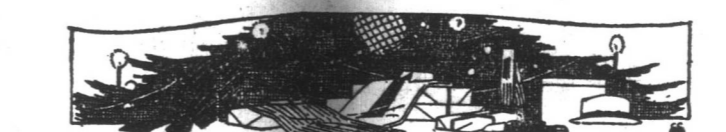
