**TOWN AND COUNTY NEWS.**  
It is stated that the Government have given an assurance that the Granville canal improvements shall be completed by the opening of navigation.

**THE RATEPAYERS OF Oshawa** are about granting a bonus of \$5,000 to the projectors of a straw factory, to be started in that village.

**RAILWAY MEETINGS.**—The meetings in favour of the Southern Extension of the W. G. & B. R. at Rockie and Bervie on Friday were in the strongholds of the enemy still the broad gauge was not without friends.

**RAFTS.**—Many car-loads of pine timber are going to Hamilton over the G. W. R. and W. G. & B. R., and are being dumped on to the ice in preparation for being formed into raft in the spring. This lumber is of excellent quality and very valuable.

**ICE BRIDGE.**—The Welland Telegraph says that there is another ice bridge here extending from about the American Fall nearly to the toll-gate. This makes the sixth "Natural Bridge" within a few years. The Falls themselves are very fine now, with the additional charm lent them by old King Winter and Jack Frost. The traffic over the new Suspension Bridge seems to be paying well.

**FALSE REPORT.**—A report was circulated in Hamilton on Saturday, to the effect that the employees of Messrs. Wilson, Bowman & Co., at their factory in Fergus, had struck for the nine hours movement. There is not a word of truth in the report. All the men employed there are content, and have shown no disposition to follow their "shop mates" in Hamilton.

**A BOLD BAGGAGEMAN.**—On Thursday last, one of the baggage-men employed on the Guelph Branch of the Great Western abstracted the Galt cash bag, containing \$225, and succeeded in escaping across the Suspension Bridge, to Manchester, New York State, where he now is. The company offer a reward of \$100 for his apprehension, but up to this time without success. The man had always borne a good name before this event. So says the London Free Press.

**THE Fergus Easter fair** and fat cattle show will be held on Tuesday, 12th of March. The last Fergus cattle fair was one of the briskest of the season. There was an unusually large quantity of good beef in, and it was nearly all sold at prices ranging from 3 to 4 1/2 cents per lb. live weight. The demand was very keen, but there was but little or no advance in the prices at the last monthly fair.

**HEAVY BEREAVEMENT.**—The Orangeville Sun says public sympathy has been deeply moved by the great and sudden bereavement which has befallen the family of Mr. W. J. Middleton of that village. On Wednesday, his eldest daughter Annie, an amiable and intelligent girl about twelve years of age, died of scarlet fever; on Friday, Mary Jane, aged ten years, died of the same terrible malady, and on Tuesday, Willie, aged six years, succumbed to the fatal disease, and followed his sisters to a better world.

**THE JOSEPH HALL MANUFACTURING CO.**—We notice by the Oshawa Vindicator that the annual meeting of this Company was held on the 14th inst. Mr. P. W. Glen, was re-elected President, Treasurer, and Managing Director; Mr. R. Wood, Secretary. The capital stock was increased to \$300,000, the additional \$100,000, all being taken by the present stockholders. This is now, we believe, the wealthiest manufacturing corporation in the Dominion. The sales the past year were nearly one hundred thousand dollars, and it is expected they will largely exceed that amount this year. We understand that the Company has one contract for machinery amounting to nearly one hundred thousand dollars.

**ORANGEVILLE AND THE NARROW GAUGE.**—As a set off we suppose to the article in the Orangeville Advertiser, pitching into the narrow gauge, we notice that a meeting of the merchants and business men of that village was held on Thursday night last, when a resolution was passed stating "that this meeting has entire confidence in the Toronto, Grey & Bruce Railway Company, which is greatly indebted to the thanks of the public for the energy and enterprise it has shown in constructing and equipping the road; that we deem the gauge perfectly satisfactory, and the power and capacity of the railway all that the trade of the country can possibly require; that under the influence of the road the trade of this town has been augmented ten-fold; and that when the line has been extended to Kincardine and Owen Sound and thoroughly equipped, it will, judging by our experience of its operation during the past six months, afford every facility for the transit of traffic and the accommodation of the public."

J. is lying dangerously ill with pneumonia. He has been ill for several days, and fears are entertained for his recovery.

## THE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE.

**VISIT OF THE COUNCIL OF THE AGRICULTURAL AND ARTS ASSOCIATION TO GUELPH.**  
We stated on Saturday that, at the request of the Hon. Mr. McKellar, the Council of the Agricultural and Arts Association visited Guelph on on that day to look at some farms in the neighborhood of the town, which were considered much better adapted for the Experimental Farm, in connection with the Agricultural College, than the one selected by the late Government near Mimico.

After making a careful inspection of Mr. Wm. Hood's farm, and the Moreton Lodge Farm belonging to Mr. F. W. Stone, the members of the Council held a meeting in the Royal Hotel, but as the time at their disposal was too short for coming to any decision, they adjourned to meet in Toronto to-day (Monday), when they will report on the farm visited.

Without giving any opinion as to the result of their deliberations, or of the report which they will lay before the Council, we are at liberty to state that the members were most favorably impressed with the situation of the farms visited, the excellence of the soil and buildings, and all the surroundings connected therewith, also with the appearance of the Town, and the surrounding country, and from this we surmise that their report will be in favor of locating the Agricultural College and Experimental Farm in the vicinity of Guelph.

After the Council had adjourned the members, on the invitation of the South Wellington Agricultural Society, were invited to partake of their hospitality at the Royal. There was only a short time before the departure of the train allowed, and that was taken advantage of. Accordingly the members met with the President and a number of the Directors, along with several members of the Town Council and other leading citizens, when a basket of champagne was discussed.

Mr. James Laidlaw, President of the Agricultural Society occupied the chair, and Mr. Storton, M. P. the vice-chair.

Mr. Laidlaw in a few appropriate remarks proposed "The Agricultural and Arts Association of Ontario." He expressed the great pleasure they felt in having so many representatives of the agricultural interests of the country present, and hoped that they had gained a favourable impression of this part of the Province, and its agricultural capabilities. He was only sorry they had not had longer time for their disposal, and that they had not visited this section at a period of the year when they could form a better opinion of its appearance. He coupled with the toast the name of Mr. White, President of the Council. The toast was drunk with all the honors.

Mr. White responded, and on behalf of his colleagues expressed the pleasure he felt in visiting, along with his colleagues, this part of the Province. He was most favorably impressed with all they had seen to-day. He must confess that he did not find the land bought for the Agricultural college at Mimico equal to what they had seen to-day. A very responsible duty had been put on their shoulders, and they would endeavor to discharge that duty in a way that would do justice to the whole Province. They would have to consider their report carefully and in order to do so, had adjourned to meet at Toronto on Monday. He thanked them for the handsome way in which they had been received and entertained.

Mr. Storton, in a few very suitable remarks, gave "Success to the Agricultural College," which was drunk with great enthusiasm.

Hon. Mr. Skead responded in a few humorous remarks. He remarked that they had an important duty to perform to the country. The Government, in selecting the farm, had made a bad choice. The soil had a clear grit bottom (laughter), and was not suited for the purpose. In making their decision the Council would endeavor to do their duty irrespective of locality. He hoped by and by to see an Agricultural College established in the Eastern section as well as the Western.

The Rev. W. F. Clarke, also responded. He was anxious that this College and Farm should be located in the most suitable place. If there was any other part of the country better adapted than Guelph, he was willing that it should go there. He pointed out several objections to having it located near Toronto, and considered that this County, from the high position it occupied in an agricultural point of view, was entitled to every consideration at the hands of the Council and the Government.

The company, after spending a few minutes very pleasantly together, then broke up, and accompanied the members of the Council to the train, who on their departure were greeted with three rousing cheers.

## ONTARIO LEGISLATURE.

Feb. 23.  
Mr. Clarke (Wellington)—From Robert Cochrane and others, against the repeal of the superannuation clause in the School Act.  
On motion of Mr. Blake it was ordered that the House do meet at one o'clock on Saturdays, for the remainder of the Session, and that on that day Government orders have precedence, but that there be no evening session on that day.

Among the bills which passed a third reading was a bill to legalize a certain law passed by the Corporation of the town of Galt, and to enable the said Corporation and the Grand Trunk Railway Company of Canada to obtain certain powers to construct a railway from the village of Doon to the said town of Galt, and to enable the said Company to extend their railway from Berlin to the village of Waterloo, and to legalize and give power to carry out an agreement entered into between the said Corporation and the said Company.

The debate on the railway aid resolutions was then resumed, when the Speaker put the amendment moved by Mr. Orange, on Friday. Lost, 7 for, 57 against.

Mr. McNair moved another amendment as follows:—That until the excess of the debt of Ontario and Quebec over \$62,500,000 of joint debt, amounting to \$10,500,000, has been apportioned between the Provinces, and the debt of Ontario definitely ascertained, it is inexpedient for this House to entertain any proposition towards granting \$400,000 for Railway Aid Fund in addition to one million and a half already voted, and to pledge the credit of the Province to the extent of \$100,000 a year for twenty years as proposed.

Lost, 10 for, 56 against.  
Mr. Rykert moved an amendment to the effect that it was not right to expend such a large amount on railroads, while no appropriation is made to the older counties. Lost, 19 for, 51 against.

Mr. Rykert then moved that the following be added to the original resolution:—That it be an instruction to the Committee to strike out the resolutions providing for a railway subsidy fund of \$100,000 a year for twenty years." Lost, 21 for, 43 against.

The resolutions were then adopted and the Committee reported.  
Feb. 24.  
Mr. Blake moved that till the close of the session there be two sittings of the House daily. Agreed to.

Mr. Blake moved the reception of the report of the Committee on the resolutions respecting aid to railways. Carried 31 yeas, 7 nays.

Mr. Blake introduced a bill founded on the resolutions. It was read a first time; second reading on Monday.

Mr. Blake moved the reception of the report of the Committee on the Bill to render members of the House of Commons ineligible as members of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario.

The report was received; and the Bill was ordered to be read a third time on Monday.

Mr. Scott (Ottawa) moved the reception of the report of the Committee on the resolutions respecting settlers in the free grant townships. Carried.

Mr. Scott introduced a Bill founded upon the resolutions.  
Second reading on Monday.

On motion of Mr. Mackenzie the House went into Committee of Supply on the supplementary estimates. The several items of which were passed.  
The House then went into Committee of Ways and Means, and adopted a motion by Mr. Mackenzie, granting \$2,392,072 as a supply to Her Majesty. The Committee then rose and reported.  
Mr. Mackenzie introduced the Supply Bill. Second reading on Monday.

**Affairs at Antwerp.**

**Matters in Mexico.**

**The Alabama Claims Question.**

**The Prince of Wales.**

Antwerp, Feb. 26.—There were some riotous demonstrations last night, but all the large assemblages of men were dispersed by the Gens d'Armes.  
Paris, Feb. 26.—Thiers is understood to be opposed to the continued residence of the Count De Chamber at Antwerp.  
London, Feb. 26.—After the thanksgiving ceremonies at St. Paul's the Prince of Wales will go on a tour to the Italian Lakes, staying abroad two months.  
Paris, Feb. 25.—The counsel of the United States before the Geneva Board of Arbitration are engaged in preparing their reply to the case submitted by Great Britain. They think England will finally consent to the arbitration, but that Gladstone's Ministry will be out of power before she reaches that determination again.

Matamoros, Feb. 25.—A special courier arrived to-night from San Luis Potosi, with letters up to the 16th inst., confirming the previously reported death of Porfirio Diaz, in the mountains of Querretaro, on the 12th inst., from dysentery. The following Diaz had proclaimed for Lerdo De Quejedo or Juarez for President.

The Juarez Government is said to have published a new tariff, which abolishes Jora Libra on the frontier.  
Gen. Correlia, with 4,000 Government troops, is inside San Luis Potosi, while Gen. Rocha has 5,500 men, with 24 pieces of artillery inside, supporting Correlia. Gen. Quera, with 11,000 revolutionists, is confronting Correlia and Rocha. Some severe fighting occurred, with undecisive results, however, both parties maintaining their ground.

New York, Feb. 26.—The Herald's Washington special says that our Government has authorized the American Banking Houses to make an offer to the Gladstone Ministry to settle all questions at issue, growing out of the Alabama claims, for ten million pounds sterling. It is believed this position will be well received, as Earl De Grey and Ripon said to Attorney-General Williams, while the Joint High Commission was in session in this city, that England was ready to arrange the whole matter, including a reasonable sum for consequential damages. If the question cannot be settled on the basis of this offer it is not doubted that the answer of our Government to Lord Granville will be a triumphant vindication of the position assumed in the American case.

**The Nine Hours' Movement.**  
A mass meeting of workmen, under the auspices of the Nine-hour League, was held in the Mechanics' Hall, Hamilton, on Saturday night. The avowed object of the meeting was to express sympathy with the late employees of Wilson, Bowman & Co., who are now on a strike, and to assist them by the progress of the nine hour movement generally. The chair was occupied by Mr. J. Pryke, President of the Nine-hour League. On the platform were seated representatives of the various trades' unions of the city, and two representatives from Toronto. The hall was filled with a standing audience of sixteen or eighteen hundred men. After speeches from Messrs. Jas. Ryan, Scott, Fahy and others, the following resolutions were passed:

That it is the inherent right of every freeman to express his wishes and opinions fearlessly and without prejudice, and that any infringement of this liberty is highly dangerous to the constitutional privileges of all free citizens.  
That whereas, under the circumstances in which they were placed, this meeting considered that the workmen of Messrs. Wilson, Bowman & Co., were justified in the course of action which they adopted, therefore resolved that this meeting pledges itself to contribute to the support of the workmen of Messrs. Wilson, Bowman & Co., until a satisfactory arrangement be effected between the workmen and their late employers, or till they obtain work elsewhere.

The hands at Wilson, Bowman & Co's struck work between nine and ten on Thursday last, on Friday eighteen hands were on strike, including two of the party which quitted the shop on the preceding day. On Saturday these same continued at work. Applications sufficient to fill the vacancies have been received, and from these sixty have been selected who are expected to start work on Monday, of whom about a dozen were old employees.

**Reform Meeting in Bruce.**  
PORT ELGIN, Feb. 23.  
A large number of the electors of the North Riding of Bruce attended the meeting of Mr. K. McKenzie, the nominee of the Reform Convention here, to-day. Mr. Thomas Greer, of Saugeen, was appointed chairman, and Mr. N. A. Ray acted as secretary. Mr. McKenzie made an able speech, condemning the policy of the Dominion Government; gave a history of the Reform movement in Canada, and reviewed their motives and actions during several years. He referred to the recklessness of the Government at Ottawa in increasing the debt \$2,450,000, and their management of affairs at Manitoulin, and different other acts of corruption. Mr. McKenzie was well received by all present. A motion, pledging to support Mr. McKenzie if he became a candidate for the House of Commons at the next election, was carried by a vote of over three to one.

THE ALABAMA QUESTION.

A special from the Washington correspondence of the New York Herald on Friday says:—The morning mail brought the text of note written by Granville to Shenck, in reference to the Alabama case. It does not differ materially from the despatch indicating its tenor, telegraphed from London, but is written in the elaborate diplomatic phraseology characteristic of the communications of the British Foreign Ministers. The point of the note is virtually what was expressed by the Queen in the Speech from the Throne. This is clothed by profuse assurances of the friendship entertained by the English for America. Regret is felt at the existence of any misunderstanding and the expression of an earnest wish that some means may be found to reconcile the difficulty, and enable the two countries to proceed with the arbitration. This note is accompanied with most voluminous extracts from English and Continental newspapers, commenting upon the treaty.

EDITORIAL ITEMS.

The organs in Ottawa contradict the report that Sir F. Hincks is to run for North Middlesex.

The steam dredge for the Dominion Government, which has been constructed on the Clyde, is completed. It is intended for use on the St. Lawrence.

Mr. LARKIN, Barrister of Toronto, has been appointed immigration agent to Ireland by the Dominion Government, in the place of Mr. J. G. Moylan.

The Brockville Recorder says there are fools in the world of various classes, and probably Mathew Crooks Cameron stands head and shoulders above all others as an educated fool. His conduct on the Wood-Blake slander being proof of his right and title to wear the fool's cap.

A TELEGRAM from London states that although the appointment of Lord Northbrook to the Viceroyship of India was pronounced premature, there is little doubt it will ultimately be made, and that the Marquis of Lansdowne will probably succeed him as Under Secretary of State for War.

THE PROVINCIAL TREASURER.—In the Lower Provinces Mr. Mackenzie is highly respected. The Halifax Chronicle says:—"Hon. Mr. Mackenzie has received, we observe, the unanimous nomination of West Middlesex for the next House of Commons. He will serve any constituency which has the honor of electing him with unsurpassed fidelity and ability."

The London correspondent of the New York Herald telegraphs that two German army corps have been ordered to be in readiness; and he assigns the cause of this action to the unsettled condition of political affairs at Paris and Versailles. There is a probability of a change of Government in France at any moment, and Germany claims the right of judging as to how far any new Government which might succeed the present one would be willing or able to carry out the terms of the treaty of peace.

Mr. CLARKE, member for Centre Wellington, proposed and succeeded in carrying an amendment to the Credit Valley Bill which, while admitting the "grouping" system, provides that, unless twenty freeholders in any township proposed to be included in the group, petition that such municipality be so included, the County Council cannot force it into the proposed division. This prevents any township being unnecessarily compelled to vote unless at least twenty of its freeholders are favorable to the scheme.

It may be that the next session of the Ecumenical Council will be held in Austrian dominions; but, even if it is, there is no further possibility that the Pope will leave Rome, as it was reported he would, in that event. It is now said that the Pontiff will be present at the Council by proxy, and though this need not make his departure from the Holy City impossible, it renders it highly improbable. The convocation will be invested with a certain pathetic interest to all good Catholics by the apparent necessity for its being held on other than Roman soil.

The Proton Committee. The Proton Committee met on Saturday morning. Mr. McKellar was called, and made the same statement he made in the House with reference to the interview with Mr. Lewis. Mr. Lewis was also examined. He contradicted himself frequently, but declared he had no instruction whatever directly or indirectly, with any member of the Government except the conversation he had with Mr. McKellar, which was as stated by him (Mr. McKellar). His examination related merely to his coming from Houghton Centre meeting Oliver at Ingersoll and Kerr at Hamilton and McKellar at Toronto. He will be examined on Monday with reference to the statements he made in Proton.

TRADE AT SAENIA.—The Observer says: The business of the Sarnia Branch of the Great Western Railway has been increasing very rapidly of late. This is partly owing to the accession of traffic and travel consequent on the opening of the Port Huron and Lake Michigan Railway, and partly to the fact that this port has been found to be an excellent point for landing the gravel used in manufacturing

on the Georgian Bay, to be sent eastward by rail for the supply of Stratroy, London and all other important places in the Western Peninsula. To such extent, in short, has the business of the road increased of late, that the Company find themselves very much hampered for room to do there business satisfactorily, and are under the necessity of adopting measures to procure more yard accommodation than they now possess.

The river and Frith of Tay, in Scotland, overflowed their banks on Saturday night, and the whole level country between Dundee and Perth is flooded and much property destroyed.


