IRELAND'S UNHAPPY LIFE.

CONCILIATION APPEARS TO BE DOXOR AND COERCION TAKE PLACE.

The Conservatives Pressing the Government to Deal Summarily With the Agitation New Going on Among the Irish-Jury Trials Resumption.

LONDON, March 3.—Sir William Harcourt writes to the Times to show that the troubles in Ireland arise from the attempt of the Government to enforce the payment of rents, which their own land commission has declared the people are unable to pay.

LONDON, March 3.—In spite of the pressure of the Cabinet in favor of coercion, the council today decided to conclude the coercion debate before the production of the Coercion Bill.

The Cabinet Council fixed for yesterday was postponed by Lord Salisbury in order to enable him to have a conference with the ministers, and try to reconcile the differences on the extent to which coercion shall be carried in Ireland.

THE NEW REICHTAG.

BREITEN, March 3.—At the Emperor's presence at the opening of the new Reichstag to-day, Prince Louis of Bavaria occupied a seat in the Imperial box.

The Emperor, on his way to the Reichstag, expressed gratification at the benevolent disposition of the Pope towards the empire.

The House adjourned at 4 o'clock.

Rocky Ahead! Mr. Mercer, the new Premier of Quebec, finds it difficult to provide for the pressing pecuniary wants of his province, and has apparently made up his mind to resort to the old expedient, a debt upon the already overburdened treasury of the Dominion.

It does not appear, however, to make the demand for the Spanish sugar on the roadside with its solitary market. He thinks it safer to invite co-operation. In a speech at St. Hyacinthe, largely quoted from elsewhere, he announces his intention to call upon other confederate members to send delegates to Quebec, which he says is mother of all the provinces, to provide a remedy for the impetuosity of some of them. Some may consider Quebec a "step" rather than a real mother, and complain instead of making her offspring she has drained a good deal of their blood for her own nourishment, but we are more disposed to think of the future than the past.

Quebec, it is thought, is right about the pecuniary question, what the younger Demas called his father, is more profuse. She has a debt of eighteen millions, and is in many different ways, too costly in railways. She has a government far too chiefly in her hands, and a scale of general expenditure which even Ontario would find it impossible to maintain. Instead of seeking by retrenchment to make both ends meet, she seeks the aid of the Dominion and asks other discontented provinces to join with her in the movement.

There can be no doubt in any reasonable mind that the part of the confederation plan which made the Dominion collect the revenue and distribute it at a weak per head among the provinces was a weak device to get rid of a temporary difficulty. The main purpose was to induce the provinces to give up their own revenue, and to give the Dominion the power to raise the money for them. The increase in the resources of the company within the last three years places it beyond question in the front rank, the credit of which is largely due to the efforts of G. E. Mulvey.

The new owners of the steamship Great Eastern ought to celebrate the Queen's jubilee by making a bonfire of the vessel. They would thus remove a huge elephant from the nation's hands and cover themselves with patriotic glory at the same time. Montreal citizens are complaining of the size of their gas bills.
