

HIS SCHEME TO SWINDLE COUNTRY.

A BOGUS ITALIAN PRIEST

MEN IN TORONTO.

Pretended to Be a Director of the Toronto Railway Company-Promised the Ital-Month and Then Attempted to Defraud

Them of Their Hard-Earned Savings. A few days ago the priests of Toronto ocese were notified by some of their brethren in the United States that a number of vagabond priests were making a tour of the continent soliciting money from Italians for charitable institutions and religious work in Italy, and it was thought some of them were making to wards Toronto.

The authorities were notified to keep a lookout for them, but knew nothing of their presence until a day or two ago. It was then discovered that three members of the gang had been here plying their schemes, in which they were foiled by a mere accident.

Father Antonio's Great Scheme Ten days since a respectably-dressed Italian, giving the name of Father Antonio, representing himself to be a retired priest of means, engaged a room at 176 Chestnut-street, agreeing to pay \$5 per week for his board, in addition to a substantial remuneration for the use of the room. He appeared to be prossessed the room, He appeared to be possessed of unlimited wealth, furnishing the room in an elegance of style that surpassed the understanding of his more modest and humble fellow-countrymore modest and humble fellow-country-man. To those who, were of an enquir-ing mind he stated he was a director of the Toronto Street Railway Com-pany, and was devoting his time and wealth to philanthropic work among Italians. On the strength of this illu-sionary directorate he spread among young Italians the story that he would give them all constant employment through the winter at a salary of \$40 per month.

By these and other like plans he ingratiated himself into the confidence of the Italians with whom he associated, and then shrewdly used the confidence placed in him to discover just who was possessed of money and likely to become an easy victim.






