NEWFOUNDLAND GETS A LOAN

BRITISH CAPITALISTS COME TO THE COLONY'S RESCUE. A Forty Year & Per Cent Loan of \$500,000 to be floated in London if the Legal Points are Not Fatal - Attempts to Place Part of the Loan in Montreal Failed.

Montreal, May 29.—It is quite evident that Canadians have been all along hunting the Bond loan up the wrong tree, and that the Newfoundland Financial Secretary's visit to the United States was a blind pure and simple.

It is understood in fact that the Newfoundland loan has been subscribed for in Great Britain, and will be issued by Glyn, Mills, Curry & Co. one of the foremost banking houses in England.

The loan in question is for \$500,000, four per cent, 40 year term. All this is subject to all legal requirements being fulfilled.

It is known that the Montreal agents of the loan here, but the influence of the Bank of Montreal was against the deal, which failed to go through.
