New Ticket Regulation.

Toronto, Dec. 30.—A circular has been issued by the passenger department of the Grand Trunk relative to the regulations as to redemption of railway passen-ger tickets sold in Canada. The circular will take effect January 1 and reads/as

follows: "Any wholly unused passenger tickets sold in Canada and presented for redemption at the ticket office where sold within 30 days from date of expiration of such ticket shall be redeemed immediately by the agent in charge of said tacket office at the price paid for the ticket. The word 'void' must be written by agent in ink heavily across the face of the ticket at the time of its redemption."

Passengers presenting such tickets at the office where they were not sold will have some delay in having them honored. If presented at the office where it was sold the ticket will be immediately honored. The object of the new regulations is to expedite the settlement of claums for such tickets. honored. Furser Beaumont.

Purser Beaumont, of the ill-fated steamer Monarch, lost on Isle Royale deserves some special recognition for his valiant services on the night of the disaster.

Confused accounts have been given of what he did. The facts seem to be that the passengers and crew landed in the Monarch's life boats, when a fire was made. The signal was answered by the light keeper on Passage Island, who rowed to the scene, four miles distant, in a heavy sea. He was unable to land, and Purser Beau-ment swam out, boarded the lighthouse keeper's boat, and told him the story. Together they rowed back to the light, and the steamer Edmonton, which was passing at 11 o'clock at night, was signalled for help. She stopped and was given particulars, but being unable to render immediate help, she returned to Port Arthur at 2 a. m., and no time was lost in sending tugs with ample provisions.

It is not because they do not wish to grow. Nearly every town and vil-lage has a sleepy demand to expand and grow big and outreival its neighbors. People there would like to see industries coming, the town limits expanding and property value increasing, but, of course, with no effort on their part whatever. Then why do all the municipalities in Ontario where a future for manufacturers is assured and opportunities are so numerous, not enlarge as would a well regulated and healthful business in time of prosperity? Apart from natural advantages the reason and solution lie with the citizens themselves. In most instances those who could and should help to build up the place in which they reside and hold their business interests, are either too engrossed in their own affairs or else entirely indifferent. Take town after town, and municipality after muni-cipality in Ontario and this is found to be the case. The growth of the town is found to be in direct propor-tion to the public spiritedness of the men who mould opinion and who take the lead in public affairs. This might be laid down as an axiom and holds in the case of Ontario towns today.

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

into the icy waters and struck out for the
boys. The task was beyond his power, boys. The task was beyond his power, and his strength beginning to fail, he clung to the edge of the rotten ice. By this time other willing hands had arrived. at the scene and a rope was thrown out to Mr. Kelly, whose position was becoming precarious. He managed to grasp it and he was pulled to shore.

Nothing more was seen of the two boys, bodies and so far they have not been recovered, although many boats are out dragging the creek. It is feared that they may have been swept under the ice and held there. If such were the case, their bodies might not be recovered till spring.
