the Russian aviators nor gunners and had any experience at all. "Thus Russia committed the same mistake Germany committed at the beginning of the campaign against Belgium. Germany under-estimated the immensity of the little country, the immensity of the little country, acroplanes, relied entirely on the over-whelming strength of her formidable army." Thereafter the Germans de-veloped aviation on a large scale, which Russia is planning to do.



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
