




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

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
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Map showing the Exhibition Palace, the Royal Dublin Society's Premises,

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REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE,

PRESENTED TO

His R. Y. the Prince of Wales,

ON THE

OCCASION OF THE OPENING OF THE EXHIBITION

On the 9th MAY, 1865.

THE building in which we are now assembled owes its origin to the desire to supply a want which long existed in this City, that is, of a structure where the Citizens might enjoy rational recreation combined with the elevating influence of the Arts.

A Company was formed for the purpose of providing an Exhibition Palace and Winter Garden, after the model of the Crystal Palace of Sydenham; but on a scale suitable to the population of the City, and yet not discreditable to the capital of Ireland.

A tract of about seventeen acres in extent, formerly known as the "Coburg Gardens," lying within a few minutes' walk from the busiest centre of the City, having passed into the possession of Mr. Benjamin Lee Guinness, that gentleman, with his characteristic liberality in the promotion of all that can add to the comfort and happiness of his fellow-citizens, placed the land at the disposal of the newly-formed Company, at the price for which he had purchased it; and it was chosen as the site for the proposed Buildings and Garden.

The design of Mr. Alfred Jones was selected as the one best calculated to meet the requirements of the Company. The first stone of the Building was laid in March, 1863, by the then Viceroy, the lamented Earl of Carlisle, whose zeal in the encouragement of every undertaking for the benefit of Ireland, can never be too gratefully remembered by the people of this country. As the Buildings advanced, their suitability for the purpose soon suggested the idea of inaugurating the new institution by holding an International Exhibition. And as nothing of that kind, on a large scale, had been attempted in Ireland since the Exhibition of 1853, the origin of which was due to the noble public spirit of William Dargan, and which had been honoured by the august presence of Her Majesty, the project of an Exhibition in the present year was favourably received; but it soon became apparent that difficulties would be encountered by a Company in accomplishing an enterprise, the success of which must so largely depend on the spontaneous support of those whose sole aim is the advancement of the people in skill, knowledge, and refinement.

A new organization was therefore resolved on, and the Company leased their premises, at a fixed rent, for the period of the Exhibition, to an independent Committee, composed of many of the nobility and of other influential personages, who came forward with alacrity to lend their co-operation to so useful a project. A portion of this large Committee constituted the Executive Committee, in whose hands was placed the management of the details.

The precedents of former Exhibitions, and especially that of 1862, have been followed as far as circumstances admitted. The objects for exhibition have been divided into six great classes—five containing the Industrial Products, and the sixth comprehending every branch of the Fine Arts. A Committee of Advice, composed of gentlemen selected for their special knowledge and fitness, took charge of each Class, sought out the best specimens, so that each department should be represented in a complete and effective manner. Many members of these Committees have given their time and most valuable services with a zeal and devotion to the interests of the Exhibition which we gladly take this opportunity to acknowledge.

In London, the Society of Arts, so honourably associated with the history of Exhibitions, gave us their most timely and cordial support. Under the auspices of the Society the London Committee was formed, who have heartily co-operated with us, and, on many important occasions, have guided us by their counsel.

In the capital of Scotland also, and in many of the cities and towns of the United Kingdom, Committees were formed to further the objects and extend the interests of the Exhibition.

It is needless to state that for the favour with which the undertaking has been so generally received throughout the Empire we are largely indebted to the patronage of the Queen, and to the approval which Her Majesty has been pleased to manifest to the Exhibition, not only by many valuable Contributions from the Royal Collections, but also by the special recommendations with which the Exhibition has been officially introduced to the attention of the authorities of the British Colonies and of foreign Governments by Her Majesty's Secretaries of State. A large proportion of the Colonies have responded to the appeal. And most of the Sovereigns of Europe, emulating the example of Her Majesty, have honoured the Exhibition by their countenance, by becoming contributors, and recommending their subjects to avail themselves of its advantages. It is but just to acknowledge that the Exhibition owes much of its attraction and its success to the cordial spirit in which Earl Russell advocated its claims to the enlightened support of foreign Governments.

Most of these Governments have deputed special representatives to attend the exhibition, to oversee the interests of the exhibitors from their respective countries, and to aid in the selection of the jurors, who will, it is hoped, proceed, early in the month of June, to adjudicate upon the merits of the productions which compete for the distinction of honorary medals.

From these gentlemen we have derived most valuable assistance, and we trust that the efforts we have made to provide suitable accommodation in the building for their respective exhibitors will be found satisfactory.

The space is about equally divided between the foreign exhibitors, on the one hand, and those of the United Kingdom and the Colonies on the other.

The demands made upon us for space in the home sections were five-fold in excess of the quantity at our disposal. Hence the task of selection was difficult and embarrassing. We have remembered, however, that the Exhibition is international; and we have endeavoured, therefore, to secure what would best illustrate and represent the excellence of each country's productions. Accordingly the preference has been given to the inventor, the producer, and manufacturer, over the agent or retailer. Under these circumstances it is gratifying to note how numerous are the Irish exhibitors in very many branches of industry.







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GUIDE FOR THE VISITOR.

As it will be impossible for the Visitor to thoroughly inspect or find the objects enumerated in the Catalogue without some little instruction as to arrangement and position, it may be well to sketch out a line of route which can be followed or not at will, and which will gradually lead through the various sections into which the building and its annexes are divided. The plans given in the Catalogue should first be carefully studied, and then some such circuit as the following may be pursued :—

Entering the building from the main entrance in Earlsfort-terrace, facing the Sculpture Hall, the best course is first to take a survey of the extensive Fine Arts Departments. In the principal or main avenue of the Sculpture Hall the visitor will find ranged right and left of him certainly one of the finest collections of statuary that has been gathered together at any International Exhibition, the best works of art from the principal British and Foreign studios having been freely contributed. The best course to pursue is to inspect the statues on the right hand of the main avenue, and, after reaching the end, turn round and inspect those ranged on the opposite side. To enumerate these would be impossible, but they are all numbered, and the name of the country from which they come is lettered on the back, so that reference to the Catalogue, under "Rome," "Italy," &c., will give the title and the artist.

After the main avenue has been carefully inspected, the visitor should turn into the inner walk, and notice those on his left hand, proceeding towards the Transept; then into the opposite inner avenue, which will be on his left hand, proceeding towards the entrance of the building. He should then ascend the staircase, and make a tour of the Central Picture Gallery, which is immediately over the Sculpture Court. The pictures hung on the walls over the staircase recess are of the Scandinavian and Spanish schools. Proceeding towards the centre of the building, on the walls to the right are Italian pictures. On a screen facing to the east are some choice Norwegian pictures. The German, French, and other Foreign pictures, occupy the walls to the west and south. Having made the circuit of this Central Picture Gallery, we enter, by a door on the east, a small room, containing pictures of the Belgian school.

The walls of the long passage running north and south are hung with fine specimens of Axminster tapestry, Persian, Brussels, Kidderminster, and other carpets, and oil cloths, &c. In a window recess is a collection of oil paintings, mostly by Irish artists. Turning now to the right, on the walls of the passage running east and west, we find seven of Leech's coloured sketches, shown by V. Brooks, and some good chromo-lithographs. The first door on the left hand leads to the Victoria Cross collection, illustrating the deeds of valour which have secured the coveted distinction of the Victoria Cross. The next long room on the left is devoted to water-colour drawings and a few cartoons. Leaving this the visitor may enter the Eastern Gallery of the Transept, and take a superficial survey of the Transept, and main building, and opposite galleries. He may also look down into the Music Hall, where he will see the large organ by Hill, a smaller organ, orchestra, pianofortes, and cases of brass instruments, &c. Hung round the upper part of the walls are several fine cartoons from Munich, and beneath some very effective foreign oil paintings. The architectural effect of this fine room should here be noticed, the admirable manner in which it is lighted by windows above, and sun gas-lights for illumination at night.

Proceeding along the gallery towards the north, and entering the Central Picture Gallery, we may pass by a door on the left into the Medieval Court, where church furniture, antiquities, stained glass, and metal work, claim attention. We pass through, and enter by a door on the right hand of the corridor the Great Picture Gallery. This is a fine lofty room, with sofas, and is devoted to pictures of the British School. Round the walls will be recognised, by those conversant with good pictures, many gems of art from the National Gallery, the Vernon Collection, the Kensington Museum, and other public and private collections.

After making the circuit of this room the visitor may pass through the east door en to the passage, where, in a window recess, are some fine specimens of chromo-lithographs by various exhibitors, and, opposite, specimens of woodcuts. Then proceed due west down a passage, the walls of which are lined with maps, school-books, panoramic views, &c., to a door on the right hand, which admits to the Small Picture Gallery, a long room devoted to the works of the Ancient Masters. This completes the tour of the Fine Arts Collection, with the exception of the three Photographic rooms which are situated in the basement, on the extreme south, near the First Class Refreshment Room, and must be reserved for a future visit.

Leaving the room of Ancient Masters by the east door we may enter upon an inspection of the British Industrial Department, commencing with the collection in the galleries. Entering the inner passage on your left and proceeding due west we pass cases of linens, hats, clothing, basket work, ropes and fish nets, cottons and thread, blankets, kerseymeres and broad cloths, printed felts, woollen shirtings and flannels, Paisley shawls and tartans, laces, fancy hair work, silks, gold embroidery, silk scarfs, sewed and embroidered muslins, &c. Turning round to the right, for the outer passage, we may pause for a few moments to take a general glance of the nave and transept and opposite galleries devoted to India and the Colonies. Then we come in succession, on the right hand, upon cases of cotton and thread, down quilts, feathers, furs, and other applications of feathers, down, &c., to dress, upholsterers' and coachmakers' trimmings, hosiery, boots and shoes, buttons, court costumes and liveries. Proceeding round the cross gallery we next come upon handsome show cases of minerals, chemicals, colours, products of seaweed, perfumery, confectionery, starches, candles, and soap, fresh preserved provisions, isinglass, cigars, whiskey, wax flowers, stationery, book-binding and printing, paper making, guns and fishing tackle, toys, croquet, racquet, archery, and other games, bog oak ornaments, brushes, tortoise-shell work, India-rubber and gutta percha. This completes the gallery display of British Industries.

Then we arrive at the beautiful Indian collection, contributed by the India Board, and arranged by Dr. J. Forbes Watson, which occupies a large space, and is most attractive, embracing most of the choicest articles of the India Museum, London, many rare and valuable articles lent by the Queen, by Lord Gough and other exhibitors. There are, first, three very large cases extending across the gallery filled with rich articles of gold and silver work, jewellery, embroidery and fabrics. There are two smaller cases of silver and bidri, or inlaid metal work, and further on two cases neatly arranged and labelled of agricultural produce and raw materials generally, including substances used in manufactures. A cabinet containing seventeen bound volumes of specimens illustrative of the textile fabrics of India, with coloured photographs, showing the costumes of the people of India, should not be overlooked. Then there are three wall cases of arms and armour, and ornamented, carved, and other work in metal, jade, papier mache, sandal wood, horn, and ivory. Rich carpets and mats of Oriental design decorate the walls, and a raised map of India, showing the mountain ranges, rivers, railways, &c., hangs on the stairs, where there also stand some state umbrellas. There are also suspended on screens twenty or more frames, with photographs of the tribes and castes into which the native population of India and the adjacent countries is divided.

The next tour of inspection may be taken as follows.—After entering the building turn down the passage on the right hand, past the post office, and the ordnance exhibited, and enter the Carriage Court, which is a temporary annexe to the main building. Here the visitor passes in the corridor, Perfumery Stalls, and illustrations of Naval Architecture, with some Plaster Statues and other objects. Passing round the Carriage Court we come upon a row of allotments in the east, devoted to Sewing Machines in operation, with attendants; and several manufacturing processes in operation are seen on the north side, including pearl button making, steel pen making, pipe making, lithographic printing, &c. We then enter the Machinery-at-rest Court, and from thence the Machinery-in-motion Court. Here are spinning mules, looms, atmospheric hammers, cask-washing machines, and others in active operation.

At the end of this Court we leave this noisy region, and ascend by steps once more to the quiet of the main building, and find ourselves in the most attractive British department of the north transept, looking directly down the transept towards the south. After inspecting the stands of beautiful glass and porcelain, the visitor should enter the inner line of Furniture Courts, and proceeding towards the east, inspect at leisure the many elegant objects exposed here by the principal London and Provincial manufacturers. He may then return and inspect the large central show cases on each side of the main promenade, consisting chiefly of shawls, poplins, minerals, jewellery, perfumery, candles, &c., and Benson's great clock.

To complete the circuit of the products of the British Empire, the visitor should ascend the staircase on the right, and inspect the various Colonial Courts, running from India along the western gallery to the central apes. The fine trophy of horns, skins, and objects of the chase, &c., from Natal, over the stair-head and adjoining wall, will first command attention. There the visitor enters Canada, which fills three courts with its various productions, mineral, agricultural, and manufacturing. Then Nova Scotia, another North American province, fills a large court with attractive objects, especially an ingot of gold worth £2,000. Returning from this, and proceeding due south along the gallery, the visitor passes, in succession, Mauritius, the West India Colonies, and a fine model in various woods of the west front of the Royal Exchange, London. Here he may pause and going out by a door on the balconies, take a glance at the gardens, and the Harcourt-street entrance, Mr. Guinness's house and grounds, &c. Proceeding in this circuit we pass the collections contributed by Malta, South Australia, New South Wales, Queensland, New Zealand, and Victoria. The latter colony, which is the only Australian province which has contributed officially, occupies a very large space with most attractive objects; and its gold produce is especially interesting. Then the curious native products and manufactures of Lagos, the Gold Coast, and Sierra Leone, are shown, and a collection from the Bahamas completes the Colonial collections. Here are some attractive objects from China and Japan, especially porcelains, bronzes, enamels, and a curious Chinese state bedstead, with a group of female Japanese figures, life size, at the toilet. The visitor may now commence here his inspection of the Foreign exhibits, although it is an unfavourable point to begin from, but it will complete his tour of the galleries, and save fatigue. Proceeding along the gallery we reach a number of French works in bronze, and other articles of vertu, with various industrial products. We then pass the Austrian collection, that of Prussia, and other states of the Zollverein; then on the opposite gallery we pass in succession collections from Belgium, Holland, Russia, and Italy.

The best course now to pursue is to descend by the staircase, leading from the Central Picture Gallery to the Sculpture Hall, and entering the central transept complete the inspection of the Foreign collections. Turning to the left, we may first enter the Music Hall, and take a survey of pictures and instruments; then pass to the Belgian Court, and bearing round on the opposite side, we reach the products of the German Confederation and Austria.

The dais, with its canopy, intended for the Pasha of Egypt, and under which

the royal circle were grouped on the opening day, should be noticed. The magnificent Sevres China and Gobelins tapestry of the Imperial manufactories of France, and the fine bronzes and other works of French industry.

Some French show cases, filled with rich dresses, shawls, silks, laces, &c., will command attention; and on the opposite or Eastern side of the transept the collections of Italy and Rome, rich in sculpture, mosaics, cameos, and other objects of fine art, complete the tour of the building.

The First-class Refreshment Room and Ladies' Retiring Rooms, it will be seen, are situated at the extreme left, with entrances from the transept. The Second-class Refreshment Room is near the Sculpture Court, in the transept, and the Third-class Refreshment Rooms lead out of the Machinery-in-motion annexe. There are refreshment counters about the galleries in different parts of the building, and a Reading Room, Post Office, and Telegraph Office, in the building. Visitors are not permitted to take sticks, parasols, &c., into the Sculpture Courts and Picture Galleries, but these must be left with the female attendants at the umbrella stands, who charge 1d. for the custody. Catalogues are sold in the building by the liveried attendants.

If the weather is fine, a circuit of the gardens should be made, where there are many objects exhibited for which room could not be found in the interior, such as in the north avenue a column of coal from Nova Scotia, thirty-six feet high, showing the great depth of the seam of pure coals; a peal of bells, iron gates, Barbezat's French fountains, tents, conservatories, &c., besides the rockeries and flower beds, rosary, maze, cascade, &c.

Those interested in agricultural implements and machinery, seeds, and vegetable substances, should pay a visit to the premises of the Royal Dublin Society in Kildare-street, which are only about five minutes walk from the Exhibition Building, where are shown many domestic machines, metal work, farm implements, manures, building materials, stable fittings, draining pipes, kitchen ranges, and other objects for which room could not be found in the building.

4 GENERAL MINING Co. FOR IRELAND (LIMITED), 20 Westmoreland st. Dublin.—Raw and dressed calamine; arsenical pyrites; fire-clay; ochre; oxido of zinc; lead and copper ores from the Company's mines.

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

1A Matchlock (*Bundook*), N.W. India.—Fine Damascus barrel, rifled; breech and nose ends richly "koofit, or inlaid with gold; muzzle, a crocodile's head, with eyes of rubies; side-plates and bands of perforated gold; piercer attached by two gold chains.

2A Matchlock (*Bundook*), Boondi, Rajpootana.—Stock painted with lac, and varnished; plain polished barrel. Formerly the property of the Rajah of Jyengore.

3A Matchlock (*Bundook*), Western India.—Stock painted white, with gold flowered pattern; Damascus barrel; butt and muzzle inlaid with gold; touch-pan cover displaced and replaced by motion of trigger; bayonet attached to muzzle projected by action of a smaller trigger.

4A Matchlock (*Bundook*), Western India.—Stock decorated with animal figures in relief; barrel square externally; butt and muzzle inlaid with gold; bands of silver wire.

SWORDS.

5A Sword (*Tulwar*), Western India.—Blade grooved, and set with a row of pearls; hilt enriched with fine enamels upon gold, and set with emeralds and pearls; scabbard of black leather, with mountings of gold, richly enamelled and set with emeralds and pearls; waist-belt with buckle also beautifully enamelled, and set with emeralds and pearls; small ivory-handled knife, sheathed in outer side of scabbard.

6A Sword (*Tulwar*).—Persian blade; hilt of ivory, mounted with gold and enamels, in the form of ram's heads; scabbard, black leather, mounted with gold and enamels; belt of gold lace, with gold buckles.

7A Sword (*Tulwar*), Persian.—Fine Damascus blade; hilt and cross-guard finely enamelled with blue and green flowers; black scabbard, embossed, with gilt metal mounts enamelled with blue and green flowers; sword belt of blue velvet, embroidered with gold wire; buckles enamelled *en suite*.

8A Sword (*Tulwar*), Khrossan.—Blade water-marked; grip white on one side, black on the other; silver cap, enamelled in blue and gold flowered pattern; gold lace tassel and string of pearls, &c., attached to hilt; cross-guard of silver, enamelled with flowers of blue and gold; scabbard embossed, and ornamented with gilt work; chape of silver, and studs and clasps enamelled as above; leather belt, blue, embroidered with gold.

9A Sword, Persian.—Plain ringing blade; cross-guard inlaid with gold; cap of gold, richly enamelled and set with three emeralds; scabbard, black leather, embossed and mounted with fine enamels on gold; strap of tablets similarly enamelled.

10A Sword, Persian.—Damascus blade; small grip; hilt beautifully enamelled on silver; scabbard, crimson velvet, mounted with fine enamels; belt of gold lace, and buckles of silver and enamels.

11A Sword, Travancore, S. India.—Blade polished, with plate of embossed silver extending three inches down from guard; hilt, grip, and cross-guard of griffin's head design, elaborately embossed and chased in gold and silver, and set with rubies; scabbard of silver, elegantly chased and embossed throughout.

12A Sword.—Damascus blade, water-marked; hilt and cross-guard of gold, richly enamelled and set with diamonds; pomello of hilt formed by head of paroquet, enamelled, with eyes of rubies; scabbard, leather, embossed and gilt; belt, gold lace, with mountings of gold and enamels; clasp of waist-belt also enamelled, with fine rose diamond in centre.

13A Sword, Pertaubgurh.—Bright blade; hilt of enamel, inlaid with gold; pomello, cross-guard, and guard of tiger's head design in gold and set with rubies; scabbard of gold perforated and chased, with mountings of fine enamels in colours.

14A Sword.—Very fine Rhorassan blade, black watered steel; hilt of gold, richly enamelled and thickly set with "table" diamonds; cross-guard set with fine brilliants, scabbard of velvet, mounted in gold and enamels, and studded with "table" diamonds

15A Sword.—Fine Khorassan ringing blade; hilt of white jade, set with emeralds and rubies; scabbard of arabesque design in chased silver, and studded with rubies and emeralds of large size.

16A Sword.—Blade short, broad, and of scimitar shape; hilt of massive silver gilt; tiger's head pomello and cross-guard; scabbard, massive silver gilt, chased throughout. This weapon was taken from the body of Tippoo Sultan, at the fall of Seringapatam, A.D. 1799.

17A Sword (*Puttah*).—Gauntlet sword; blade, plain, polished; gauntlet gilt and set with precious stones; front face of gauntlet of elephant's head design.

18A Sword, Bhotanese.—Grip covered with shark's skin, with silver gilt mounts; scabbard of leather, mounted with silver, richly chased.

DAGGERS.

19A *Korah*, Nepal.—Burnished blade; hilt of wrought design, gilt; scabbard, crimson velvet, mounted with richly chased gold work.

20A Dagger (*Kunja*), Nepal.—Damascus blade, double-edged; hilt of agate and jasper; scabbard, green velvet mounted in gold finely chased.

21A Dagger (*Kunja*), Nepal.—Damascus blade, double-edged; hilt of jade, finely carved in foliage design; scabbard covered with red silk, with chased and gilt mounts.

22A Dagger (*Peishkubz*), Lahore.—Damascus blade, double-edged; hilt and guard carved in jade; scabbard covered with crimson velvet, and mounted in jade, with inlaid flowers of lapis lazuli.

23A Dagger (*Peishkubz*), Lahore.—Damascus blade; hilt of ivory, to which is appended a tassel of pearls; scabbard of gold, beautifully enamelled in colours.

24A Dagger (*Kunja*), N.W. India.—Bright steel blade, curved and double-edged; grip of jade—form, a horse's head, with bridle of gold, inlaid, and eyes of rubies; scabbard, red leather, with mounts of embossed gold.

25A Dagger (*Bi-hwa*), Kutch.—Double-bladed, curved; guard engraved and gilt.

26A Dagger (*Bichwa*), Kutch.—Double-bladed, curved; guard engraved and gilt.

27A Dagger (*Peishkubz*), Central India.—Damascus blade; hilt of silver, with birds, flowers, &c., engraved, and inlaid with enamels; scabbard with mounts of silver, similarly engraved and enamelled.

28A Dagger, Hyderabad, Deccan.—Plain blade, polished, deeply curved; hilt of horn, mounted with gold and medallions; scabbard of crimson leather on one side, the reverse being of silver, richly chased and embossed.

29A Dagger, Malabar.—Blade elaborately mounted with chased silver, hilt finely carved in horn, with silver mounts; scabbard also of horn, mounted in silver.

30A Battle-axe (*Tubbur*), Scinde.—Blade finely wrought and perforated, and studded with diamonds, emeralds, rubies, &c.; the back of axe containing a large cut emerald; shaft of gold, finely enamelled and set with diamonds, emeralds, and rubies; point of shaft set with fine emerald, surrounded by eight large pearls.

31A Battle-axe (*Tubbur*), used on State occasions.—Blade finely wrought and engraved, leaf and cone design; border pattern of inlaid gold; spiral shaft of silver.

Horizontal scale 1 inch to 15 miles. Vertical scale about 1 inch to 3,000 feet. For the lesser heights of the Himalaya range the horizontal scale slightly differs. The white ridge on the culminating parts of the Himalaya represents the line of perpetual snow. The sandy tract near the Indus shows the great desert, the limits of which are very imperfectly known. The lines of railways are coloured red.

44 Luk Rheu—Bastard Cardamoms. Both species of *Cardamoma* form not only an article of export, principally to China, but are used for culinary purposes, and as a stomachic. Seeds used in headache.

45 Manglack. Basil seeds (*Ocimum* sp.) The seeds placed in water, swell to a large size, and form a mucilage like the Bungtaihi seeds, which, mixed with cocoanut water and sugar, makes a refreshing beverage.

46 Kamyah. Gum Benjamin (*Benzoin*), is placed in hot-water, and when cooled used as a drink for inward pains. It is likewise employed in rheumatic pains. The gum is sometimes mixed with Leeploos (49), and Prickthai (black pepper), to increase its efficacy in rheumatic complaints.

47 Ngah-met. Till seed (*Sesamum orientale*, Lin.) The seeds yield a fine bland oil, which is a good substitute for olive oil. It is used in curries, and also burned in lamps, and employed in ulcerations of the head.

48 Luk Maikan Liqui (soap nuts). The seeds are burned, or rather roasted, and an infusion made of it, employed as a cooling drink.

49 Leeploos, an infusion; used in colds and catarrhs.

50 Prickthai, black pepper (*Piper officinarum*); exported and used at home.

51 Long pepper, the fruit spikes of *Chavica officinarum*.

52 Bungtaihi seeds (*Sapindus rubiginosa*), immersed in water they form a gelatinous mass; which, sweetened with sugar and lime-juice, forms an agreeable beverage. It is considered abroad as an excellent remedy in diarrhoea and dysentery.

53, 54 Zaropi and Pihkoon, used as stomachics.

55 Prickhang; infusions, after the seeds have been pounded, are used inwardly against headaches and fevers.

56 Bilang Karta; a decoction of the seeds pounded is used against vomiting.


