






LARGER B. C. PLACER CLAIMS.

Another B. C. Labor War. The Sandon, B.C., Paystreak says: The storm clouds of another labor struggle are gathering in Rossland. For many months gathering in Rossiand. For many months past the managements of the War Eagle, Centre Star and Le Roi properties have been quietly letting out Canadian and American miners and filling their places with Italians. These Italians are brought from the iron ranges of Minnesota and reach British Columbia under an agreement, for which it is impossible to prosecute the companies under the allen labor law. They are a very illiterate class, and few of them can talk English. As they live on the Dago plan, they are of no profit to the community, and Rossiand merchants resent their presence in the camp, as it can lead to nothing but ruination of their business. Labor men have been slow to assert themselves, hoping to gather the Italians into the unions, but last week the matter took a serious turn, when the superintendents of the War Eagle and Le Roi posted notices ordering the walking delegates of the Miners Union to keep off the properties. This order is a direct breach of the agreement which was made between the miners and the mine-owners at the time of the threatened strike, about 18 months ago, and it may lead to hostilities.

Smelter for Vancouver Island.

Victoria. B.C., Feb. 28.—Negotiations are going forward for the establishment of a big smelter on the Alberui Canal, west coast of Vancouver Island. The promoters of the enterprise are Puget Sound capitalists, who are expected in the city to day, when they will wait on Premier Dunsmuir with reference to procuring a supply of coke from him. The site has practically been selected, but will not be disclosed till all is finally arranged.

Mr. Nelll states that the site is a most advantageous one, that the smelter will means a big boom, for all the west coast, where now unable to ship to the Tacoma smelter, will easily do so to this one. The company will not ask a subsidy. There will be two important shippers to it, the Hayes and Monitor, who are now sending ore to Tacoma, while Clayoquor and other properties hitherto unable to ship will also take advantage of the facilities provided.

It is hoped that a spur will be built from Duncan, on the D. & N. Rallway (where the Lenora Tyhee mines are situated), to Alberni, thus bringing two more shippers immediately tributary to the enterprise.






