THREE MILLION TURKISH POUNDS.

Extraordinary Army Expenses Will Cause a Surplus of 5 Per Cent.

Constantinople, March 8.—The statement is confirmed that the Government, with a view of meeting the extraordinary expenses of the army, is considering the proposal made for a loan of 3,000,000 Turkish pounds, to be guaranteed by the proceeds of a 6 per cent. surtax on the taxes of the Empire with a 2 per cent. surtax on inland customs duties.

The increase in deaths is probably due to the excessive heat during the month of August.

LIQUOR PERMITS IN YUKON

The Commissioner Will Look After Their Issuance Hereafter, Instead of Minister of Interior

ONLY LICENSED WHOLESALERS

Can Procure Permits, and the Fee Will Be \$2000—Private Bills Introduced.

Ottawa, March 8.—(Special.)—A return brought down by the Minister of Interior yesterday contains the order-in-Council passed on Feb. 25, making new regulations for the issue of permits to take liquor into the Yukon. It provides that hereafter permits shall be issued by the Minister of Interior as formerly. Permits shall, however, be granted only to licensed wholesalers.

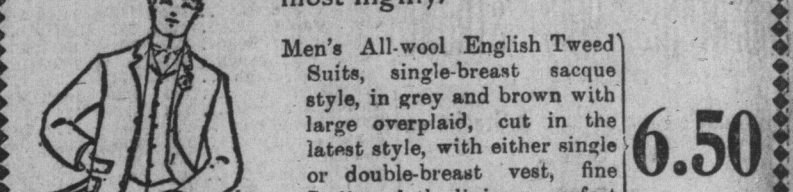
