ONTARIO CONSERVATIVES

Condemn G.T.P. Proposal and Premier Ross' Attitude in Toronto-Hamilton Railway Struggle.

The convention of the Ontario Liberal-Conservative Association in Victoria Hill yesterday was remarkable for the enthusiasm among the delegates and the confidence expressed in the favorable results of the by-elections to be held this fall.

Maclellan, Cornwall; John McCosh, Orillia; O. Aubin, Nipissing; secretary, A. Claude Macdonell; treasurer, E. H. Ryckman; chairman of executive committee, E. B. Oiler, M.P.; vice-chairman, Dr. Beattie Nesbitt.

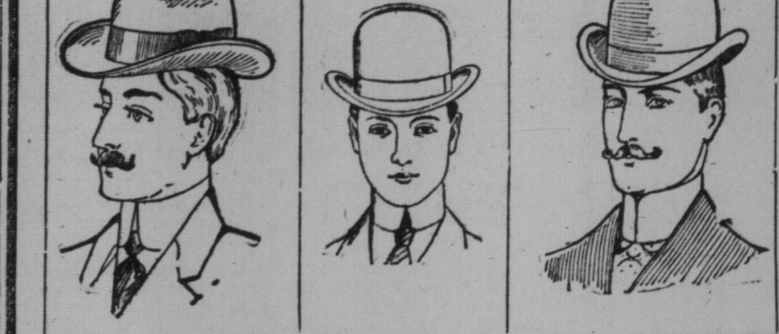

Dr. Willoughby was glad to see the "made in Canada" signs around the Fair. Canadians were making as much of the country and there was no reason to be alarmed. Canada was a great land and bound to prosper.

Canada's Creamery Industries. Prof. Ruddle had noted progress in the dairy department, and he was confident the department would grow and become the most popular in the entire Fair. In connection with the butter industry, we were approaching a crisis. The connection with the fish trade was holding the minds of commercial men to a large extent. Competition in fancy creamery butter from Russia and other countries was hurting the business in Canada. New Zealand was one of Canada's strongest competitors, and we must make the very best article if we wished to succeed.

"New Zealand has made better progress in the past ten years than Canada has ever done," said the professor. Some of the best prizes for butter gone to Quebec, and he thought the whole of the Dominion was indebted to the Fair Association for good work done by the exhibition.

Mr. H. Barr, instructor of dairy products for Western Ontario, said there was something at the Fair that was a help to the farmer and cheese maker of this country. There was too much cheese and butter put on Canadian tables which was not strictly first class.

"Factories are improving throughout the country," said Mr. Barr, "and the conditions are improving greatly. Instructors are going around among the factories and showing the men how to make the cheese and butter on more strictly scientific principles."

Mr. G. G. Publow, instructor in Eastern Ontario, also spoke for a minute or two.

Distinguished Visitor From St. Louis. An interested visitor to the Fair yesterday was Miss Florence Haywood of St. Louis, special commissioner for the Louisiana Purchase Exposition. Miss Haywood is practically responsible for the King's presence at the Fair.

Speaking to The World, Miss Haywood said she thought the Toronto exhibition was the best she had ever seen. She had never seen a better exhibition than this one. She was satisfied with their visit.

Miss Haywood was one of a party and Mrs. Clark saw the Jubilee gifts after the performance before the grand stand.

Horticultural Society. The Canadian Horticultural Association met in the hotel building at 4 p.m. for a short business session. A discussion on the formal section of the floral exhibit was carried on with some spirit. William Ramsay of London led the talk. He said he was regrettable that their own trade exhibit was not in any way equal to the one held in London last year, and in view of the fact that this was the first Dominion Exhibition and the association meeting at this time, the trade should have had something of interest to show.

W. King of Toronto and R. W. King of London both expressed views along the same lines. About 100 delegates were present, and the meeting was most enthusiastic. The association presented Thomas Mantol of Eglinton, retiring president, with a handsome roll-top desk as a token of the esteem in which he was held during his term of office.

Export Butter Makers. Butter making was carried on in the dairy building theatre both morning and afternoon. Ten contestants were entered, but for some reason three bucked out at the last meeting, and those who competed were: Miss M. Clark, Toronto; Miss J. McAllister, Coventry; H. W. Burns, Havlock; N. E. Green, Loyal; Miss R. Wolf, Hespeler, and R. W. King, on own sound. The prizes for the professional contestants are \$40, \$30, \$20 and \$10. The number of points possible was 100, of which half were granted for the mechanical process of making the butter and half for the quality of the product. The competition continues today.

A Criticism. Catholic Register: Mr. Kiraly is unquestionably a great scenic artist, and knows how to dress a ballet. He has done these things in his "Carnival of Venice" show in front of the grand stand at this year's exhibition. But he has added to them an utterly senseless travesty of the Church down to the costumes. At the Women's Building. The little girls from Queen Victoria School teaching them in the art of bread making. Twelve dainty little loaves of the staff of life were finally turned out for the inspection of the onlookers. When sliced and buttered the bread proved, as one lady said, "as light as a feather." This part of the exhibition is becoming extremely popular with the lady visitors. There was a large crowd in the demonstration room all morning.

Lieut. Governor Clark and Mrs. Clark made their first appearance at the fair at this meeting, and Mrs. Clark accepted the honorary presidency of the association. Miss Fitzgibbon gave a short address outlining the objects and work of the society. Frank Yeich was effective in his address on Historic Scenes in Eastern Canada. Commencing an imaginary Journey from the old historic fortress of Louisbourg, N.S., he dwelt upon the days of the strife between Great Britain and France. Taking his audience, still in imagination, Mr. Yeich traveled thru the beautiful and historic Annapolis Valley, the home of Evangeline. Here the first sturdy pioneers of Canada began the tilling of the rich fertile lands, which were afterwards so richly torn away from them. Passing from Nova Scotia westward, through Quebec and Ottawa, Mr. Yeich touched upon the vision of the visionary excursion came up the St. Lawrence thru Kingston to To-

ronto and landed at the Exhibition grounds, where the monument marking the site of old Fort Moulton stands. The site of Toronto and all the historic spots in that locality were described by Mr. Yeich in a masterly way.

Champion Cats. The cat show was well patronized all day, and has proved a drawing card of no mean importance. The judges of the show were Messrs. A. Burlingame and H. F. Vidal. Many notable prizes of the line were in the show, some of them coming from the west, away as Chicago. The judging was all morning and all afternoon, and the list was compiled by noon the following day.

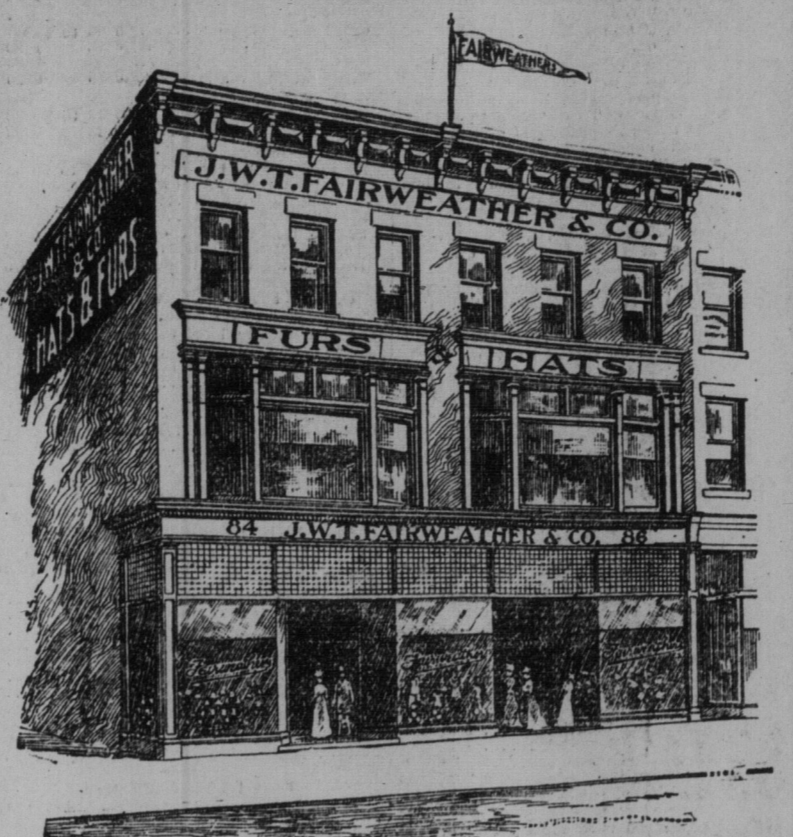

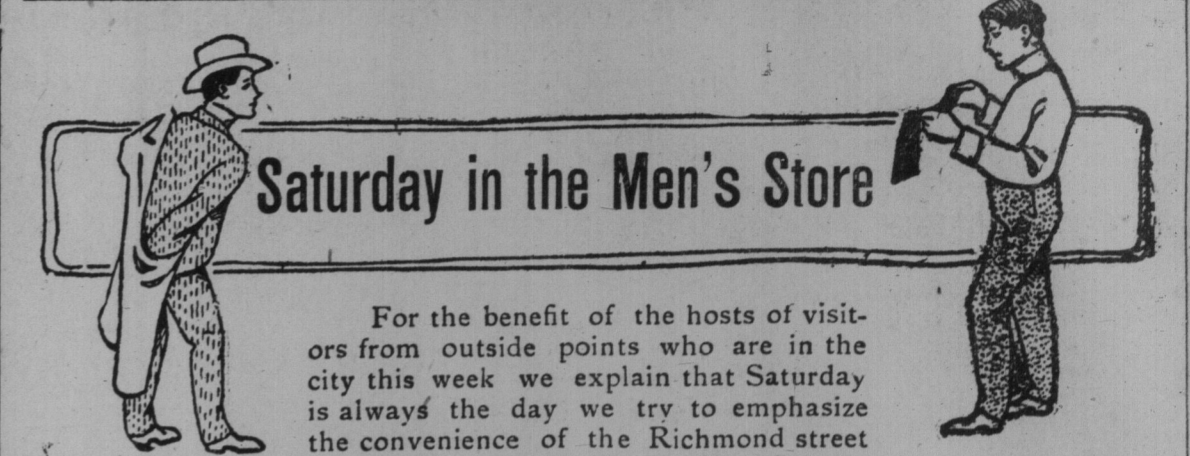
