## JAPS THREATEN HARBIN BY EXPEDITION UP AMUR

### Landing Chronicled at Dekastries Forehadows Well Plan; Next Attempt to Send Naval Assistance for Attack on Fortifications.

London, July 27.—The correspondent of the Daily Telegraph at Tokyo sends a report received from Osaka, Japan, to the effect that a Japanese army of many thousands is attacking the Russian position on the Tumen river.

### ATTEMPT TO SEIZE MOUTH OF AMUR RIVER

London, July 27.—The Japanese landing at Dekastries, which is the terminus of the only cable line connecting the mainland with the island of Sakhalin, is regarded by the London morning newspapers as an attempt to seize the mouth of the Amur River, in order to enable the Japanese to dispatch an army up the river to the mouth of the Korean peninsula and of the Liaoting peninsula and of the railway as far as Harbin; the recognition of Harbin as the predominant influence in Korea and the return of Manchuria to China.

### KAISER HIS KING-MAKING WITH HIS EYES ON NORWAY

Interview With Czar Was in That Connection, Nicholas Con-senting if—

London, July 27.—The correspondent of the Daily Mail at Stockholm says: "The object of Emperor William's interview with Emperor Nicholas was to obtain the consent of the latter for a prince of the house of Hohenzollern to ascend the throne of Norway, in the event of the Russian Emperor will consent, provided Russia is permitted to slightly restrict her frontier on the Atlantic."

### NO FIRE INQUEST YET.

Authorities Undecided What to Do About Mimico.

Crown Attorney Gibson was unable to say last night what the authorities would do to get to the bottom of the Mimico fire mystery. Constable Burns stated that he has recovered a little in his three days of investigation, and has no clue to the perpetrator. The insurance companies, who are interested to the extent of \$500, are the Atlas and the Home. They have appointed D. C. Edwards and Wm. Power adjutors, and are awaiting their report.

### THAT INVITATION TO TORONTO.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, July 26.—At the congress of the British Medical Association at the Colonial Secretary Lytton, who held its next annual meeting at Toronto. A resolution in favor of Toronto was carried. Professor Cameron, on behalf of the Toronto branch, said the success of the meeting would depend as much on the members on this side as those on the other side.

### MUST WAIT AWHILE.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, July 26.—The Social Democratic Federation, having sent a letter to the King containing a copy of the resolution protesting against the Newfoundland concession to Messrs. Harmsworth, have now received a letter from the Colonial Secretary Lytton, in which the King has declined to whom their letter was forwarded, saying he will not be in a position to give advice to the King until the act of the legislature confirming the concession has been forwarded by the government.

### NO TRUTH IN IT.

Regarding the St. Thomas despatch which stated that the C.P.R. Railway had assumed complete control over the Canadian Pacific Railway, the Canadian Minister of Railways, Mr. Tupper, has issued a statement to the effect that the C.P.R. had already secured the purchase of the lines would mean an addition of 3000 miles to the C.P.R. system.

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## HORSE BACKS INTO "EYED" 2 WOMEN KILLED TO DEATH

### Misses Inglehart Palmero, Victims of Level Crossing Accident at Oakville.

Oakville, July 26.—(Special.)—As a result of a little recklessness and a frightened horse, two fatal accidents occurred here this afternoon when the Misses Inglehart Palmero were instantly killed by the International Limited of the G.T.R.

The accident occurred at the sixth line level crossing, a short distance west of the station. The ladies had been shopping in Oakville during the afternoon, and were on their way home. As they neared the crossing they were warned by a farm hand of the approach of the flyer. The view of the track, however, was obstructed by the station and by a number of cars on the siding.

They drove ahead and managed to cross the tracks in safety. Unfortunately the horse became frightened by the noise and excitement and, stopping, backed up.

The locomotive struck the buggy and demolished it. One of the occupants was killed about a quarter of a mile from the crossing. The other was badly mangled, the other was but little more than a mangled mass.

### HORSE FRIGHTENED BY GRAVEL WOMAN HURLED TO DEATH.

### ODESSA GOVERNOR IN LAMES FEELING AGAINST THE JEWS

Issues Proclamation in Which He Blames Them for the Kniaz Potemkin Affair.

Odesa, July 26.—The governor of Odesa, has issued an extraordinary proclamation which, when posted in the city tomorrow, may have the effect of increasing the already bitter feeling against the Jews among the troops and more ignorant classes of the population. The governor says he has received a number of anonymous letters denouncing persons as socialists and revolutionists, which he entirely ignores, believing that in most cases these communications were inspired by motives of personal vengeance. The proclamation continues:

"Letters have also come from the Jews charging the police with preparing for a Jewish massacre."

The governor then declares that such action is impossible and will not be permitted, but he adds: "The governor is astonished at the Jews addressing such a letter to him, seeing that it is the Jews themselves who caused the disorders, bombs and prohibited literature, number of houses, but for the Jews there would be no disturbances and no Jewish impertinence to bring charges against the police."

### SIR ANTHONY MACDONNELL INTENDS TO RESIGN

Dublin, July 27.—Sir Anthony Macdonnell, under secretary to the 3rd Viscount of Ireland, has recovered from the severe operation recently performed on him, but owing to the state of his health it has been decided to resign his position in the autumn.

### INJUNCTION AGAINST DUNNE.

Chicago, July 26.—The Chicago City Railway Company today filed a bill for an injunction to restrain the city of Chicago from interfering with any of the company's lines.

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
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## THE GENERAL STORES BUILDING, PORTSMOUTH NAVY YARD.

## Vegetable Growing in Cuba

EXTRACTS FROM PROFESSOR C. F. AUSTIN'S REPORT.  
Chief of Department of Horticulture, Cuban Experiment Station, Santiago de Las Vegas.

### All Classes of Vegetables Successfully Grown in Cuba.

Comparatively few people in the United States know that nearly all classes of vegetables with which they are familiar in their home gardens or markets can be successfully grown in Cuba, and the few who are aware of the main fact usually have mistaken ideas as to the conditions which govern truck gardening here.

During the past winter, from November to May, the horticultural grounds of the Cuban Experiment Station have yielded a continuous supply of the following vegetables in excellent condition: Forty varieties of American lettuce, all classes of garden and stock beets, radishes, turnips, rutabagas, endive, cabbage, tomatoes, egg-plant, Bermuda onions, Swiss chard, cabbage, kohlrabi, parsnips, sweet potatoes, Irish potatoes, peppers, carrots and celery.

#### People Coming to Cuba Can Count on Good Gardens.

From this report it will be seen that people coming to Cuba may not only count upon being able to make good gardens for their own use, but may consider vegetable growing for market as one of the openings which the country offers. Already Cuba exports several hundred thousand crates of vegetables every winter, the principal varieties now grown commercially being tomatoes, egg-plant, peppers and Bermuda onions. Guineas, about thirty miles from Havana on the United Havana Railroad, has for years been the leading district for truck farming, though there is now a considerable acreage of vegetable fields at Tacas and some other points on the Western railroad. Along both these roads the opportunities for vegetable growing are excellent, as they have quick and competent service in connection with the steamship lines.

Cow peas, velvet beans and probably other leguminous crops grow successfully during the summer or rainy season and may be turned under in the fall, thus putting the fields in good condition for vegetable crops during the winter. The use of commercial fertilizers has largely been abandoned.

#### Three Distinct Types of Soil.

In the region to which I am confining this discussion there are three distinct types of soil—the red, the black and the sandy or loamy. The red soil is of the highest quality and is the most fertile. It is a deep, sticky, heavy soil, known as "mulatto" land, an intermediate between the black and the sandy. This is a deep soil, sticky in wet weather, but loose and mellow in the dry season. When properly handled it gives excellent results. The sandy

and loamy soils which prevail in Pinar del Rio Province are also proving well adapted to vegetable growing and seem to hold water better than either the black or the red lands, so that by thorough cultivation crops may be produced on them with less water than on soils of any other type. As a rule the black lands are considered to be better adapted to sugar cane than to truck gardening, being very heavy and having a poor natural drainage, yet suffering badly from dry weather on account of their tendency to bake into friable crusts and clods.

#### Red Soils Not Profitable for Vegetables Without Irrigation.

On the red lands we have been able to grow all classes of vegetables successfully, yet this soil probably suffers more severely than any of the others from drought, having almost too perfect a natural drainage and at the same time a tendency to dry out; even with the most careful cultivation watering has been necessary in order to maintain the amount of soil moisture necessary to a growing crop, so that without a good system of irrigation I do not believe the red lands would be profitable for vegetables. On the other hand, I wish it distinctly understood that with irrigation just as fine vegetables and just as large a yield can be produced from this soil as from any on the island.

#### Profitable Vegetables for Cuba—Celery.

Returning to the subject of the vegetable crops which can be most profitably grown in Cuba, I wish to call special attention to some of the more promising ones. As I have already said, tomatoes, peppers, egg-plant and Bermuda onions have made their way from Cuba into the markets of the United States and I believe that celery can also be successfully grown here for export and for local use. Our work has demonstrated that its production is possible. I enclose a photograph of our celery fields here at the station. Seed planted in October gave us excellent stalks in March. For commercial purposes the crop should be ready to handle during January, February and March, for in April the weather begins to be too warm and several fungus diseases appear, doing great damage. The celery now sold in Havana is imported from the United States and I believe that celery to grow that a little poor stalk of American celery will bring 25 cents and bring it quickly. The people of Havana seem to be exceedingly fond of this vegetable and would buy it eagerly if it were supplied to the market.

Governor-General Charles H. Allen says: "A ten-acre orange grove, once in bearing, gives a comfortable income, sufficient to support a family in the best country style." When an orange tree is in full bearing it is valued at \$100.—Florida Fruits and How to Grow Them.

#### Profits on Oranges and Other Citrus Fruits

As an indication of the profits to be derived from raising oranges and other citrus fruits, I quote from an official work on Cuba, recently published: "The person owning an orange grove in a country free from frosts is the most independent and happiest person in the world. A full-grown orange tree will yield from 1000 to 5000 oranges yearly, and, like the lemon tree, begins to bear the third year. Before Cuba got its setting back during the war orange lands were selling from \$150 to \$200 per acre, and a three-year-old grove was worth \$1000 per acre. The oldest trees in Cuba are some 100 years old, and each year the crop is greater than the previous year. No limit is placed upon the size of the orange tree, so in beginning an orange grove, remember, if four or five years are required to bring it into bearing, it will continue to yield its golden harvest for generations to come, and when once in fruit you can sit beneath its shade almost in idleness and have an abundant competency."

This morning the privy council granted the application of the attorney-general of Canada for special leave to appeal the case against Cain and Gibbula. Their lordships said the Dominion must pay the respondents' costs in any event. The appeal is on a purely hypothetical case, as the court is not likely to give a decision within the statutory twelve months' period allowed for deportation.
