BOY WAS STOLEN BY WHITIA RELATIVE

So Says Boyle, Now Under Life Sentence—His Sensational Story Is Titled 'A Lie' by Parties Named in It.

MERCER, Pa., May 10.—James Boyle, who was sentenced to-day to life imprisonment in the Western Penitentiary at Pittsburgh for the kidnaping of "Billie" Whittia.

Mrs. Boyle, indicted as Mary Doe, received a sentence of 25 years with a fine of \$500 and the costs of the prosecution.

Both prisoners utterly collapsed. Judge Williams, in imposing sentence, pointed to Boyle's bad record for larceny, assault and jail-breaking.

To-night Boyle issued a statement, implicating Harry Forker, a brother of Mrs. Whittia, in the kidnaping, and asserting that he had turned over incriminating letters to Mr. Whittia under promise of immunity from prosecution.

"I don't believe there is the slightest foundation for the Forker story in any way," said Judge A. W. Williams, who presided over the trial of the Boyle case.

J. M. Linniger, district attorney, said: "At no time has our secret or open investigation indicated that there was a third party, and I cannot believe now that there is."

"I have known Harry Forker for a great many years," said Judge H. S. Miller, chief counsel for the Boyles. "I am confident there is nothing at all in the story regarding him."

H. H. Stranahan, who assisted Judge Miller in defending the Boyles, said: "I do not believe there is any truth in the sensational story told by Boyle, who is a notorious liar, and several days ago and the essential parts will not hold water."

The association of the name Forker by Boyle with allegations that he was connected with the death of Dan Rebel, Jr., in June, 1895, has not been confirmed by the police records in Youngstown.

Must Make the Best of It. In the penitentiary to-night they made each other out a fair game. They cannot meet again.

Mrs. Boyle threw her arms around Jimmie's neck and kissed him. She said, "We must take it like we can take it."

The prisoners then shook hands and the matron escorted Mrs. Boyle from the room. When she returned, she said she burst into tears and asked to be permitted once again to see her husband.

The request was granted and she kissed and embraced Boyle. The man maintained silence.

When Mrs. Boyle gave her belongings to the matron she asked permission to see a suit of clothes which she had hidden in a trunk. She said she did not want to leave it behind, as that would make her have several years of bad luck. The matron was reluctant to let her see it and she would have to keep it in her cell.

When asked how she felt, Mrs. Boyle said "pretty bad." On arriving in Philadelphia she remarked, "Mercer will sleep quiet to-night—sleepy old Mercer—since we are out of it."

As he said in a razor was found concealed in Boyle's clothing and that his wife last night took a large quantity of morphine.

When Mrs. Chess said he was glad to get the prisoners out of his custody, as he was afraid they would be successful in their announced intention to commit suicide. The matron stated he believed Boyle had intended to kill his wife and then commit suicide with the razor the sheriff found in the kidnappers' possession. Neither of the prisoners deny that this was true.

Boyle's "Confession." Before he was taken to the penitentiary Boyle gave out an interview, to be used under his name and purporting to be "the complete history of the kidnaping of Willie Whittia, the origin of same and what led up to it." It said:

"On the morning of ——— between the hours of one and two, Dan Rebel, Jr., was found dead on the sidewalk in front of the Mauer Block, East Federal-street, Youngstown, and over the prostrate form was Harry Forker of Sharon, Pa., holding in his right hand a package of letters that was gathered from the sidewalk near the dead body of Mr. Rebel.

"As he was about to depart from the vicinity he was intercepted by the writer and a man who has since passed to his reward, Mr. Dan Shay, a saloon-keeper of Oak-street, Youngstown, O."

"Mr. Forker's hurry to leave the scene he failed to find two envelopes that contained four letters. The same were picked up by Mrs. Shay and later taken to his place of business on Oak-street and read the contents of same, which proved beyond a doubt the presence of Mr. Forker there at that time.

The letters were written by a lady, two from a party in New York State and the other from Cleveland, Ohio."

"With these letters Boyle successfully blackmailed Forker into paying for his release and in six months he demanded a final payment of \$5000 under threat of exposure. The statement continues: 'On March 16, 1909, I received an an-

Kidnappers Who Get the Limit



WILL ASK GOVERNMENT TO AMEND RAILWAY ACT

City Council in Favor of Seeking Legislation to Check Future Discrimination.

Endorsation of an aggressive policy to compel the railways to abandon discrimination in suburban service commutation rates, was given by the council yesterday afternoon, when it was decided to press at once for the necessary amendment to the Railway Act.

Mr. J. H. Graham, chairman of the special committee, and the city solicitor, will see the minister of railways at Ottawa this week.

The board of control's proposal to await the decision of the supreme court on the railway commission's application to make the jurisdiction of the act would mean tying the case up in the courts for two or three years, while an amendment to the act would give valuable support to Brampton and other municipalities which were seeking legislation along this line.

The vote to send the deputation to Ottawa was: For—Ald. McChie, Chisholm, Church, J. J. Graham, Adams, Dunn, Maguire, McMillin, Hilton and Keeler—10.

Against—Controllers Harrison and Geary, Ald. Bredin, O'Neill and Welch—5.

SWEEP FOR MORRIS

Has Nine Members Already Elected to Comfortable Majorities.

HALIFAX, N. S., May 10.—(Special.)—The latest Newfoundland election news shows that in those constituencies where the count has been completed, Morris' (government) candidates have carried nearly all the seats as follows:

ITALY AND CANADA

Negotiations For Trade Agreement Now Under Way.

ROME, May 10.—(C.A.P.)—In the chamber of deputies to-day it was stated that the government had vainly tried to open commercial relations with Canada and had also recently repeated its invitation to Canada to conclude a treaty. Canada had now promised to open preliminary negotiations and it was hoped that this time they would be successful. (Cheers.)

21 MILLIONS LESS TO SPEND

Supplementary Estimates Are Smallest in Years—A Busy Day in the House.

OTTAWA, May 10.—(Special.)—Hon. W. S. Fielding will move on Wednesday a resolution that it is expedient to authorize the governor-in-council to raise a fifty million dollar loan for the purpose of paying maturing loans and obligations of the Dominion and for the carrying on of public works.

The supplementary estimates were brought down to-day. They amount to \$1,016,689, of which \$83,550 is chargeable to consolidated fund, and \$933,139 to capital account.

Along with the main estimates brought down earlier in the session they total \$113,506,460 for the current fiscal year of which \$81,011,721 is chargeable to consolidated fund, and \$32,494,739 to capital account.

Further supplementary estimates for the past fiscal year were also tabled, including \$100,000 for the Italian earthquake fund; \$100,000 for the cost of the cattle quarantine along the international boundary and \$10,000 for the expenses of Canadian representatives to the agricultural conference at Rome.

The expenditure which parliament has been asked to authorize this year shows a total decrease of \$2,747,772, as compared with last year. Of this decrease \$3,811,846 is on consolidated fund account and \$1,163,826 on capital account.

Some of the increases. The chief items in the supplementary estimates for this year include: The expenses of the conservation commission and to pay the salaries of the office staff, \$22,500; to provide for expenses connected with the fisheries attraction, for the Hague tribunal, \$90,000; for the Canadian section of the royal commission to enquire into trade relations between Canada and the West Indies, \$20,000; for seed grain distribution, \$20,000; grant to the quinquennial conference of the international conference of women at Toronto, \$100,000; grant of memorial tower at Halifax, \$50,000; for a monument to Laura Secord at Queenston Heights, \$200,000; for the removal of squatters from the Cootes Paradise forest reserve, \$14,000; for D. R. Grenfell's experiments with reindeer in Labrador, \$100,000; for the deputy head of the new department of internal affairs, \$50,000; to provide for an increase in pay for the Dominion police, \$800.

In the department of agriculture there are items of \$7000 to provide for fruit, and \$10,000 for the expenses of a commission to investigate the wine industry of Great Britain and Denmark.

The commons spent a quiet day today and more was accomplished than probably any day. The evening sitting was occupied with the immigration bill, which will be considered further before the session closes.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier's resolutions regarding the organization and classification of the houses of commons and employees of the house of commons, the parliament library and the printing distribution office were passed. There was a long discussion over the salary of Col. Smith, sergeant-at-arms, 40 years' service his salary is \$2500. He is classified at \$3300, but \$3000 is charged for rental of rooms in the buildings.

The opposition made an effort to get the government to increase the salary of Col. Smith, but the reply was made that nothing could be done at present. Mr. Fielding said he would be perfect in willing that Col. Smith should live outside the house, where probably his rental would be less, but W. F. Maclean contended that the sergeant-at-arms was jester of the house and could not perform the functions of the office without offices in the parliament.

Hon. A. B. Aylesworth's resolution to provide for additional county court judges carried. The salaries will be \$2500 for the first three years, and \$3000 after that period.

Obstacle to Canal Building. Claude Macdonell asked the government "whether or not the parliament waterways and boundaries treaty will prevent the construction of the proposed enlargement of the Welland and St. Lawrence Rivers canals, or the construction of the proposed Georgian Bay Canal, without the consent of the commissioners under the treaty, or cause of the fact that these works, or either of them, may reasonably be expected to affect the height of the water on Lakes Huron, Erie and Ontario."

Hon. A. B. Aylesworth said that the matter was under consideration.

Hon. W. S. Fielding informed Mr. Crosby of Halifax that no delegations had recently waited upon the government to urge the necessity of a bounty being given on steel shipbuilding in order to establish that industry. The government felt that it could not give the additional steel bounties asked for.


HIS MAJESTY'S RETURN

PATRIOTIC ALDERMEN SEND ADVICE TO OTTAWA

City Council Wants "Permanent Naval Policy"—Political Move—Says Controller Harrison.

"That a humble petition be presented to the parliament of Canada, now in session, urging on the Canadian Government some more immediate and practical action on behalf of the people of Canada in developing a permanent naval policy, as demonstrating Canada's readiness to strengthen and support the empire in any crisis of its fortunes, thus giving practical expression to the sentiment and desire of the great mass of Canadian people by sending to the mother country some practical and substantial aid to the defence of maritime freedom."

The above resolution was passed by the city council yesterday afternoon, on the initiative of Ald. Church, despite the objection of Controller Harrison that such a move would practically indicate lack of confidence in the Dominion Government.

The motion, which had Ald. McMillin as seconder, was sprung unexpectedly, but the appeal to the loyalty of the assembly wasn't in vain. Ald. Church, with a gift of rhetoric unsuspected by his warmest admirers, waved the grand old flag in the air, figuratively speaking, and the patriotic flood bore away all sane Controller Harrison and two other Liberals.

"The government has taken such action as it considers necessary. I am sorry to see politics interjected into the city council," said the controller.

"We don't want stump speeches from the former candidate for Halton," returned Ald. Church, who declared that public bodies all over Canada were passing kind resolutions.

The resolution carried by 12 to 3, as follows: For—President Ward, Controller Geary, Ald. McGhie, Chisholm, J. J. Graham, Adams, O'Neill, McMillin, Hilton, Dunn, Foster and Keeler.

Against—Controller Harrison, Ald. Bredin and Welch.

STAND FOR PROVINCIAL RIGHTS

Consideration to Be Given Further Steps Against Connor's Power Bill.

Notwithstanding the passage of the Ontario and Michigan power bill in an amended form at Ottawa last week, Sir James Whitney will not relinquish the fight for provincial rights.

The Ontario Government is not content that its protests have been heeded, and an immediate consideration will be given to such further steps as may be necessary to put the protest into practical effect.

The Globe, speaking of the bill, said yesterday: "The Connor bill has been shown of several objectionable features, but it does not at all follow that it ought to become law. There is left a good deal of uncertainty about the whole matter, including the jurisdiction of the Dominion Parliament in the premises, that the balance of convenience and safety seems to favor leaving the whole question over for more careful consideration and more thorough discussion."

SULTAN ENTHRONED

Constantinople Is Permitted to See the Ceremony.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 10.—Mehmed V. ended his "coronation day" by plowing a furrow in the lawn at Dolmabahce Palace, symbolically at least, by holding the low handles for a fraction of a minute, while two horses dragged it a few yards. In carrying out the ancient test, Mehmed V. showed himself to be sound of body and fit to bear the physical burdens of the empire.

It had been a day both of fulfillment of ancient customs and of the breaking of them. Christians were for the first time admitted to the small mosque attached to Ayoub Mosque and allowed to see the ceremony of girding the sword of Osman upon the sultan.

Among thirty persons present were Bucknam Pasha, a Canadian, and Woods Pasha, an Englishman, both of whom are in the Turkish service.

MINERS OFF TO COCHRANE

Rich Finds Are Reported

An Extensive Placer Mining Area Reported Which Is Yielding \$75 Per Pan.

MONTREAL, May 10.—(Special.)—The discovery of a placer mining area, fifteen miles by five, near Cochrane, or 150 miles northwest of Cobalt, is the latest mining news to reach here from the north.

A gentleman who arrived here today from Cobalt says that from three to four hundred men stamped from Cobalt to Cochrane on Saturday and Sunday, and are more preparing to follow.

One man came down to Cobalt and reported that \$75 per pan was being secured. This man had \$1500 in nuggets.

BRID POLICE SPOTTERS

And Then Put the Evidence Before the Chief.

MONTREAL, May 10.—(Special.)—Several more of the saloonkeepers who had charges against them of selling on Sundays, dismissed on payment of costs, appeared before the civic commission to-day and testified that they were subscribers to the election fund of A.P.R. Some admitted that they had sent cash on election day to work for other aldermen.

One had been told that if Proulx was not elected another man would take his place on the police committee and Sunday selling would no longer be tolerated.

Evidence was also given that there was a conspiracy to compromise policemen specially charged by the chief with watching places for Sunday selling by bribing them not to report, and then placing the evidence before the chief.

Capt. Belnet, who retired on pension in charge of No. 11 police district, he had the C.P.R. Stockyards Hotel reported for selling on Sunday on three occasions, and one day Inspector Lamouche notified that the hotel had been taken out of his district.

MURDER AN "ACT OF GOD"

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PLeads for Liberation of Insane Man to Go to His Family

MORE IN JURY'S HANDS TO-DAY

PLUSHING, N. Y., May 10.—One hour more to-morrow of summing up by the prosecution, afterward the court's charge—then the case of Capt. Peter C. Hains, jr., for the killing of William E. Annis at the Bayside Yacht Club last August, will pass into the hands of the jury.

Mrs. Virginia Hains, the mother of the defendant, with her husband, Gen. Peter C. Hains, and their son, Major P. Hains, sat in court during the hours of John F. McIntyre's vivid plea for the life of the prisoner. The mother embraced Capt. Hains when she first entered, and clung to her boy until gently led away by Gen. Hains, and thrust McIntyre's remarks went quietly.

Except for a few moments when his lawyer forcefully took hold of the prisoner and asked the jury to study him as the living evidence of an insane man, Capt. Hains displayed no emotion or interest in the proceedings.

While Mr. McIntyre's address was basically an argument to show the insanity of his client, he nevertheless seized every opportunity to emphasize the dramatic and the pathetic and to hint at times at the "unwritten law."

One of his melodramatic declarations was that Annis met death by "an act of God." All reference to the "unwritten law" were promptly squelched by the court.

In closing his plea, Mr. McIntyre said: "I ask you to acquit him on all the facts in this case, to let him go in the interests of all justice, and not to strip from him the uniform of an American soldier and substitute the stripes of a felon. I ask you to let him go back to his old father and mother, to look after his children again, not as a convict, but as a free man. I ask you in the name of the love that you bear your own, to let him go."

With the beginning of the summing up by the prosecution in the afternoon, the prisoner's mother and father withdrew, and Mrs. Helen Annis, in deep mourning, appeared with her mother and sister. They remained in court while Mr. Gregg was speaking. The former district attorney bitterly denounced the insanity plea of the defence, declaring that it was conceived and manufactured by the defence's lawyers as a last resort.

He asked the jurors to discard the testimony of the insanity experts on both sides, and to decide for themselves on the strength of the lay testimony. Instead of it being "an act of God," he branded the shooting a cowardly murder, committed with deliberation and premeditation.

DRAWNS ALL MEN BY MAGIC POWER

The Need of Following Jesus the Keynote of Eloquent Address by Gipsy Smith, Welsh Revivalist.

"How does Mary, in the kitchen, feel about your religion?"

"The Welsh revival began by people confessing their faults to each other."

"It seems to me the majority of professing Christians I meet have one dominating idea, and that is to receive from God, without any thought or idea of giving out."

"I'll ask you to be honest, and put the question to yourself in the light of this Book and the Cross. Is my life glorifying to God? Look at it! Don't shrink! It will do you good to get alone with God and ask the question: Is my life—the life I lead in my home, in my business, in the circle in which I live, in my political associations, in my domestic life, in my social relations—is the life I live Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, glorifying to God?"

"The old-time religion" is the boast of his own way of preaching it.

One of St. Paul's hearers fell out of a window after hearing four hours of the good man's views. St. Peter was a subtle, a lively talker, and St. James had a neat turn in philosophical discourse. No doubt the sons of thunder, the other James and his brother John, had an effective delivery, but modern audiences have preferences of their own, and it is doubtful if a more successful apostle than Gipsy Smith could be found for the people with whom he has to deal.

One quality he possesses which is said to be unique. He is the only man who invites all classes and sects of church people. Strange stories are told of his power of blunt and direct speech received without offence, and led to hear in the epistle in which his messages are delivered. Some men call a spade a spade. Gipsy Smith spells it out so there can be no mistake.

Draws All Churches. Ministers of all the churches gather to hear him. Rev. George Jackson sat on the platform in Massey Hall last night. Canon Dixon was there, too. Rev. A. L. Geggie and A. Hines assisted in the service. Sir Charles and Lady Clark sat in front seats. The weather made little difference.

A group in the front seats began to talk before the afternoon meeting began. One of them was an old lady of apparently 70 years of age.

"She is 92," volunteered her companion to the man next to her, and who seemed about 70 also. He began to tell of the old gentleman who always sat on the end seat which he now occupied.

"He was 88," the lady was informed. "And how old are you?"

"I'm in my sixties year."

"Oh, you're young yet," remarked the nonagenarian.

The meetings yesterday were larger than Dr. Torrey's early meetings. Even the noon prayer meeting had an attendance of sixty.

Gipsy Smith does not shun competition or comparison. He welcomes the coming of another revival meeting. At the afternoon meetings he takes up the theme on which some minister has spoken, and like some master following his pupils, plays a new symphony on the motif. Even such capable speakers as Rev. W. J. Southam or Rev. Dr. Taylor, with the clearness of mind and sensible observations, found their ideas taken up and whirled away into a new sphere with strange lights and shadows playing about them, till they seemed to have newly sprung like radiant butterflies from dull chrysalids.

Culture of Honest Thinking. Gipsy Smith talks about the humble and uneducated apostles. But he will not admit their lack of culture. There is only one kind of culture worth anything, the culture of honest and real thinking. Gipsy Smith is and has been a thinker. Behind any emotional or sentimental appeal he makes there is the solid ground of reason and experience, appealing irresistibly to the common-sense of his hearers. When any speaker leaves the solid ground of common sense he needs no hope of retaining a following among reasonable men. But his reason follows a deeper knowledge, too.

"I knew the things of God by heart."

CONTRACT GOES TO PEOPLE

Vote on Jan. 7.—So Does the Hydro-Power Bill.

HAMILTON, May 10.—(Special.)—The city council this evening decided to send the Cataract-power contract and the plebiscite on hydro-electric power to the people on January 7. The mayor and a majority of those who spoke on the subject, said that the Cataract by-law was a great improvement on the one rushed thru the council last July. It provides that the company must give Hamilton and its inhabitants power at 16 or 10 p.c. lower rates than charged by the Hydro-Electric Commission in any place, and also at as low rates as any place that sells power. The people will be asked in January their opinion as to the introduction of a board of control, and the purchase of a \$30,000 site for a new hospital. A bylaw was passed keeping dogs off the streets, except when held on a leash, from March to November.

Two Accidents.

While at work at the Canada Screw Company's factory this afternoon, John Bryan, 204 North Queen-street, was severely burned by acid. It is feared that the sight of one of his eyes may be destroyed. Oliver Beatty, 57 North Catharine-street, a teamster, fell off a wagon, the foot of James-street to-night and was taken unconscious to the city hospital.

The annual meeting of the Hamilton Camera Club took place this evening. The club decided to enter the American lantern slide interchange for the coming year. New officers are: President, E. G. Overholt; Vice-President, T. H. Wingham; Secretary-Treasurer, Sinclair G. Richardson; Executive, C. A. Herald, Wm. Acheson, James B. Bertan, W. E. Hill.

Poles Stopped at Border.

Owing to the heavy traffic on Barton-street during the summer months, the street railway is considering the advisability of postponing the reconstruction of its tracks there until next fall. A party of thirty poles that were being brought in to work for the company were stopped at Niagara Falls.

Kitty Mack, corner of Cannon and Macdonald-streets, was fined \$100 this morning for keeping a resort. The inmates had been warned that the police were coming.

A few sharp right and left wallops that Johnson landed in the open and the punishment administered in the clinches tilted the white man the more, and that Johnson's only way of winning. Burns was not much in danger of a knockout. Indeed, six rounds further looked a tolerable easy distance, unless the wearing down process was to proceed much more rapidly than in the former rounds.

One thinks Johnson evinced every confidence throughout, and this is emphasized by showing his white teeth and grinning at regular intervals and whether this characteristic will be apparent should the colored champion get in the ring with Jim Jeffries, is a matter of conjecture.

On the other side, sporting men are preparing to give the negro a cold reception.

Promoter James Coffroth has sent a wire to Young Corbett that he has Jimmy Britt some time in the near future. Corbett was accepted as Britt is an enemy with whom he is anxious to square accounts. Britt is in Europe at present, but as soon as he receives Coffroth's offer he is expected to sail for home. Corbett will box fifteen rounds with Harry Scroggs in Baltimore to-morrow night, and a red-hot argument is looked for.

Jim Corbett says Ketchell has a chance to beat Johnson. He declares that if Ketchell sticks close and can get in several terrific stomach punches, the negro will quit. Corbett says he never saw a colored pugilist who was game enough to stand up against such punishment.

Tone of Mining Market Better Higher Priced Issues Strong

Chambers-Ferland Advances on Acquisition of Welch Claims—New York in Evidence Again.

World Office, Monday Evening, May 10. The tone of the mining market today was distinctly better than has been the case for the last few weeks. The recent shake out has not been without its use in eliminating the weaker bull issues and placing the market on a more satisfactory basis than before. The feature of the day's trading was the strength shown by the higher priced stocks. La Rose sold up to 7.20 on the standard and 1.22 on the Toronto Exchange, closing firm at 7.16 bid and 4 points higher than Saturday's close. The market was also strong and closed 10 points up from Saturday, at 8.25 bid and 850 offered. New York was credited with the greater part of the buying.

The rest of the market was steady with an upward tendency and dealing was fairly well throughout the day. The whole list, with perhaps Beaver and Temiskaming the most active stocks.

There was an excellent demand for Chambers-Ferland during the two sessions, the price advancing to 77 1/4, 2 1/2 points above the last closing, with little stock changing hands. The reason for the sharp advance in this issue is due to the fact that the company have purchased the well-known Welch properties in Gowganda. The acquisition of these properties is considered to be a very important one, as they are bounded on the west by Bartlett's and the Welch claims have been well prospected and have excellent showings. Work will be started almost immediately.

Brokers report that the general outlook points to a steady market with a general advance from north to south. Stocks closed firm, with the tendency upward.

KERR LAKE DISTRICT

Misses Are Paying Dividends and Bigger Than Expected.

The continued advances in the stocks of the Kerr Lake district properties are attracting much attention. Yesterday Kerr Lake advanced to 8.50, showing a rise of a clear 100 points within the past week. Within a week it was selling at 2.25 and yesterday closed at 8.25 bid. Crown Reserve sold in Montreal at 3.06. The Cobalt Nugget says that there can be no surprise shown at the advances in Crown Reserve. Last month it sent out \$200,000 worth of ore, and in the first four months of this year has shipped \$750,000 worth of ore. Crown Reserve can pay almost any dividend it pleases. From New York comes the news that Kerr Lake's April or May shipment yielded 200 ounces of silver, also the announced policy of the company was to keep down to 180,000 ounces a month. The ore shipped was evidently richer than was expected. La Rose was very strong again today on the development of the Lawson, which promises big shipments. With the other properties from one solid block of territory—the Kerr Lake, Crown Reserve, Lawson and Hargrave are all shipping—Kerr Lake district has had a phenomenal showing. Lawson is being rapidly developed and will no doubt be shipping rich ore. Hargrave is, probably, the best speculation of all the Kerr Lake district issues. In the past year Kerr Lake has advanced from 350 to 850. Crown Reserve from 200 to 350. La Rose now on the Lawson, from 1.50 to 7.25. Hargrave is quoted at 55 to 56, but no doubt when it starts shipping a big amount it will be in the 70's. Predictions are made that it will easily double its present price. Also Crown Reserve and Kerr Lake have risen almost seasonally, much higher prices are predicted for them, simply on the very rapid increase in their asset value now going on. It seems quite reasonable from the figures already available that Crown Reserve will earn over \$1,000,000 net this year, which would be close to 60 per cent, on its outstanding capital.

JAMES TWP.'S PROGRESS AS A MINING DISTRICT

Development Work Going Ahead in James and Montreal-River District.

BLK LAKE, May 6.—(From the Man Up There).—As a mining district, James Township mining progress, and at the present time the outlook for a good return on the money invested is all that could be desired. Just now James Township may only be said to be a prospect, and that is all that any of the new districts in the siverland of the north are as yet. But James is showing better every day, and has as sure a chance of making good as any new district in Northern Ontario.

Many of the companies operating in James have put in, or are putting in, the necessary mining machinery to carry on development work, while others are carrying on extensive operations by hand.

Yesterday The World correspondent visited some of the properties lying on the easterly side of the Montreal River in James.

At the Elk Lake Discovery Mine the work of development is moving forward at a quick pace. The shaft is down to a depth of 103 feet, and timbering has been done to a depth of about 85 feet. The main shaft, the main gater, expects that the 150-foot level will be reached about the end of this month, and from that level drifting to the various veins will be commenced. If things turn out as Mr. Harris expects they will, the Elk Lake Discovery will be bagging shipping ore by about the middle of next month. One of the drifts will be made to No. 4 vein, which carries about 6000 ounces of silver near the surface, and if this vein is continuous and increases in width with depth, then the future of this mine is assured.

A similar plan to that at the Elk Lake Discovery is now being erected on the property of the Elk Lake Cobalt Mining Co., Limited, on the property included in the Hawthorne Syndicate. This plant comprises a five-drum compressor, two 60-horsepower boilers, hoisting engine, air drills, etc. The work already done on this property has been done by hand. However, the air plant will be in operation shortly, and the level drifting to the various veins will be commenced. At the Toledo Mining Co. and the Cummings Mining Co., several air plants are being put in. The United States Cobalt and on some other properties operations are being carried on by hand.

On all the properties on the east side of the Montreal River, in James, the indications are good, and the development work is showing results that are quite satisfactory to those interested. In fact, on nearly all the properties the preliminary work was done by hand, and the results were so favorable that a number of them decided to put in machinery.

There will be no hot air plants in James this coming summer, and before next winter it is safe to say that some funds will be made to which the attention of the investing public will be directed.

WORKING ON LAWSON

Development Work Started on the Old Silver Leaf Shaft.

COBALT, May 10.—The La Rose has begun developments on the Lawson; the old Silver Leaf shaft is down less than 100 feet and driving has already been started at the 100-foot level on a stringer that is expected to lead to the main Lawson vein. At the La Rose main raises are being made on the main shaft. Good ore is being taken out of No. 2 and 3 raises. No. 4 raise was recently started near the main shaft and the drills are in rich high-grade ore. The raise on the surface tunnel has been made to the surface and this is now being worked by open cut.

ROTHSCHILD MINING CO.

This Company Transfer Their Holdings to the Drednought Mining Co.

The shareholders of the Rothschild Mining Co. met to discuss the sale of the company at New Liskard last week and accepted the offer for the sale of their property in Coleman. The offer was made by the company transfer their holdings to the Drednought Mining Co., whose capitalization is \$1,000,000. It is possible that the Rothschild, B. H. Pope, capitalist of Montreal, buys the extra 500,000 shares at 10 cents a share, giving the treasury a sum of money to finance operations on the property at once. An organization meeting of the new company will be held in Montreal this week, at which the officers will be elected, and it is expected that the Rothschild shareholders will get share for share.

BREAK-UP BULLETIN

First Day of Real Spring Weather at Elk Lake.

BLK LAKE, May 6.—(From the Man Up There).—To-day has been the first real spring day we have had so far. It has been bright with sunshine the air balmy, and just such a day as which one feels the influence of spring. The break-up is drawing nearer every day, and a week of weather such as we have had to-day should bring it nearer than has already been anticipated.

IRON LANDS IN NORTH 60,000 ACRES LOCATED

Sudbury Mining Engineer Gives Some Information About the Mining Prospects in New Ontario.

"The Canadian people have not as yet come to a full realization of the great extent and worth of their mineral resources," said Mr. C. H. Miles, the well-known mining engineer of Sudbury, who was in the city yesterday.

"It will surprise you and a great many other people," he said, "to learn that over 60,000 acres of iron lands have been located by various prospectors in Northern Ontario for the Illinois Steel Co. The north country is being prospected year in and year out systematically with no thought of the possibilities for the present generation and entirely in consideration of the future of the large steel interests which are gaining control of that product on this continent."

"While prospecting for iron has been going on for some time, it is only within the past twelve months that the great possibilities of the country as a silver producer have been appreciated.

"When the average man to-day talks of Gow Ganda, he thinks only of the west shore of that lake on which are located such discoveries as those of the Bartlett mines and several other much-talked-of properties. All that has been said of these well-known mines I can say is quite true from personal knowledge, but Gow Ganda is really larger than the district in this immediate locality. It really extends from Welcome Lake on the south to Oshkosh on the north, a distance of about 80 miles. There are over twenty properties in the Welcome Lake district on which silver has been found.
