## REPORT OF THE KIRK SESSION.

---

The Kirk Session take this opportunity of presenting a brief review of the affairs of the Congregation during the past year.

At the time of the last Report, the Pastor was still abroad in Europe, but from that date till his return in the month of June, the Church was fortunate enough to retain the services of the Rev. Dr. Jenkins, whose pulpit ministrations were conducted with great ability, and with marked benefit to the entire Congregation. At the Reception Social which was tendered the Pastor on his return, an address was presented to the Rev. Dr. Jenkins, expressing the high appreciation in which his work amongst us was held, and the earnest hope that he might long be spared for useful service in the Church of Christ.

The Session record with pleasure the fact of the sustained and growing attendance at the Sabbath Services. They note with great satisfaction the very marked improvement on Sabbath evenings, and desire to express their hearty welcome, as representatives of the Congregation, to those strangers who from time to time may join in worship with us.

The Wednesday evening Lecture and Prayer Meeting has been on the whole well sustained, the numbers present being largely in advance of previous years. It has been felt, however, that the attendance of men is disproportionately small, and with a view to the correction of this state of affairs, and the greater convenience of those who honestly desire to be present, it has been decided to change the hour of meeting from half past seven to a quarter to eight o'clock. It is hoped that by this slight alteration in time, those engaged in active duties till evening will be able to effect, without serious inconvenience, a more punctual and regular attendance.

The Record of the three Sabbath Schools connected with the Congregation must be gratifying to all who take an interest in this department of Church work. The main school, which meets in the basement, continues to prosper under the superintendency of Mr.

Gibson, assisted by a staff of efficient teachers. Mr. Larmonth and the earnest workers by whom he is sustained have ministered, as in former years, to the needs of the families residing in the eastern portions of the City. The Stewarton school, under the leadership of Mr. Chrysler, has been enabled to maintain and extend its operations in the new building erected last year. The Session have granted \$127 towards the liquidation of the debt, and they have now great pleasure in stating that the entire obligation has been discharged.

The Session view with much satisfaction the establishment of a Congregational Bible Class during the winter months. It is conducted by the Pastor in the body of the Church at ten minutes past three on Sabbath afternoons, and all are made cordially welcome. The average attendance has been about seventy. The Session desire to commend this class to the consideration of any persons who may be in a position to attend, and they would bespeak especially the presence of the young men of the congregation, who are not engaged in other legitimate duties.

The District Visitors have maintained the high degree of usefulness which has marked their efforts in former years, and have sought to begin the development of the Pastoral side of their work in visiting the sick and distressed, and bringing the message of the Gospel to those who stand in especial need of it.

The operations of the Ladies' Aid Society have been carried on with much vigour, and welcome aid has been afforded by the Poor Relief Committee in several cases of poverty and distress. The members of the Society, as in former years, have sought, not merely to relieve but to instruct, and in many cases have followed the outlay from the pocket by the christian sympathy of the heart.

There has been considerable growth in the Congregation during the past year, but as there is a large number of persons in regular attendance upon the Sabbath services, of whom no record has been made, it is not possible at this time to present any accurate statements in figures.

There has been also a slight increase in the Communion Roll, seven new names having been added on profession of faith; eleven by certificate and one by re-admission. The removals have been fifteen in number—nine by certificate and six by death. The total number

on the Roll at present is three hundred and sixty-four. The Session desire to express the hope that there may be a larger proportion of the members present at the dispensations of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. They confidently anticipate the addition to the Communion Roll of the names of many young persons who, while they are seeking to lead Christian lives, have not openly avowed their profession by uniting with the Church.

The returns from the schedules in support of the schemes of the Church are slightly in excess of last year, excepting in the item of augmentation, which was regarded then as a special effort. From the amount at the credit of the Schedule Fund Account, \$3,771.81, the Session have allocated to the various schemes of the Church the following amounts, viz.:

While the Session fully appreciate the liberality of those who have contributed to the Schedule Fund during the past year, they nevertheless regret that so few, comparatively speaking of the members of the Church and Congregation, have availed themselves of the privilege of joining in this act of Christian worship. They would impress upon each member of the Church and Congregation the duty and privilege of giving at least something towards the various departments of the work carried on by the Church at home and in the Foreign Mission field.

In order to secure the more thorough discharge of their duties to the Congregation, the Session propose to make some additions to their number, early in this new ecclesiastical year.

In view of the increased attendance at the Sabbath Services, and the fact that a number of persons are now waiting for permanent sittings in the Church, the Session would venture to suggest that those having greater accommodation than they require, would agree to the division of their pews, or make such changes as would enable the Temporal Committee to provide for the needs of those who are at present prevented from securing any fixed position in the Sanctuary.

The Session in closing their Report, desire to look back upon the past with gratitude, and out into the future with hope. The material prosperity of the Church may leave little to be desired ; but they would earnestly pray that the work of the Holy Spirit may become more abundantly manifest in our midst, in order that the Church may be blessed, not only with outward increase, but with that inward grace which is the only possession of abiding value and power.

## REPORT OF THE TEMPORAL COMMITTEE.

---

*To the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church in General Meeting assembled:*

The Temporal Committee beg respectfully to report the condition of the Church finances under their control, including all transactions during the year ending this day, 2nd March, 1885, leaving the account ending 15th February herewith to speak for itself.

The Pew rents collected amount to.....	\$4,250 95
Against last year collected from same source.....	4,182 00
Being an increase of.....	68 95
Collected from Glebe rents for the year amounts to	593 25
Against collections for last year.....	697 15
Being a reduction of.....	\$103 90

This reduction is occasioned by a change of Tenants on the Mutchmor Park, the Committee not being satisfied with the uses made of that property previously, prohibited a continuance thereof, and in consequence was obliged to let it at a lower rent.

Finding the Manse in a very dilapidated condition, and that the Church required some considerable repair, a heavy extra expense had to be incurred in putting both in good order, which amounted to a total of \$2,283.25; and your Committee found that a special effort was required to meet the same, hence the necessity of calling on the Members of the Congregation for subscriptions, which was heartily responded to, the amount collected being eleven hundred dollars, names given in supplementary statements. This enabled your Committee to pay every known liability to the present time.

Your Committee would most respectfully call your attention to the anomaly of having so many Treasurers connected with the funds, and think this might be simplified were the Temporal Committee to receive

and account for *the Sunday Collections*, and also to make the payments made by the Kirk Session from this fund. In this way both revenue and expenditure as a whole would be placed more clearly before the Congregation at its Annual Meetings. The revenue from Pew Rents and Glebe is all the Temporal Committee have to depend on to meet all engagements and necessary expenditure, and as it is not sufficient (and not likely to be increased) to meet the same, it seems reasonable that it should have the Sunday Collections which are as much a part of the Church revenue as the pew rents.

The interest on the Church debt must be looked for from the Schedule money as heretofore.

Your Committee close by congratulating the Congregation on the very fair exhibit which they have been enabled to make of the Church finances

## REPORT OF LADIES' AID SOCIETY.

---

In submitting their tenth Annual Report the Ladies' Aid Society are happy to be able to record a prosperous year, as well as regards attendance as the work performed. The smallest number present at any one meeting has been sixteen (16), and the largest, twenty-nine (29), while the average attendance has been twenty-two (22), as against twenty-one (21) last year.

The ladies hope that these figures may be taken as evidence that still further interest will be evinced in the work of the Society next season. They have again to record the death of two warm friends—Mrs. Eastwood, of Toronto, for many years an active member, and Mr. Neil W. McLean, upon whom they could at all times depend for assistance in every way in his power. One complimentary and three pay entertainments have been given during the year : from the proceeds of the latter and from other sources another hundred dollars (\$100) have been handed over to the trustees of the Stewarton Sabbath School building fund ; twenty-five dollars (\$25) have been donated to the Women's Christian Temperance Union, to assist in furnishing their rooms, and a donation of six (6) white quilts, six (6) comforts and twelve hoods have been made to the Orphans' Home. It is also intended to make up some underclothing and present it to that institution.

The ladies desire again to give expression to their gratitude to their many friends, as well those belonging to other congregations as to St. Andrew's, for the kind assistance and support so generously accorded them. The Treasurer's statements are herewith submitted.
