To the Honorable

THE PROVINCIAL SECRETARY.

SIR,

We hasten to submit the medical report of the Quebec lunatic asylum, for the fiscal year ending the 30th June, 1878, in order that it may be immediately laid before the Legislature.

In the hope that the printing of this report will be authorized at a sufficiently early date to allow of its being annexed to that of last year, which is not yet printed, we merely give, without any comment, the statistics of our medical report; the numerous remarks made for the year 1877, being also applicable to that which has just expired.

We yearly notice, with regret, that the delay in publishing certain official documents deprives them, by their absence, of a great part of their interest. It would be extremely desirable that the reports of the superintendents, as well as those of the inspectors of asylums and prisons, should be laid before the House in printed form, in the same manner as the various reports of the public departments, so that members would not be obliged to wait a whole year for the official information and details which they may require.

The association of medical superintendents for american and canadian asylums, understanding the immense benefits which might accrue to institutions devoted to the insane, from the interchange of the observations made by their directors, on the various wants of their institutions, on the improvements introduced or required, and on the internal management as well as the medical treatment adopted, have deemed it advisable to pass resolutions calling upon its members to exchange their annual reports and to adopt the same size for their books in order to facilitate the binding of these documents and their being kept in serial form.

Thanks to the interest taken in the unfortunate insane, the Legislature, since 1872, has generously responded to the philanthropic appeal of the specialists and has not lagged behind the other provinces of the Dominion or the United States by supplying us with a sufficient number of reports (as requested) for exchange with foreign institutions of Great Britain, France, the United States and Belgium.

We are thus enabled to judge exactly of the treatment followed in foreign lunatic asylums, and to take advantage of the advice and observations of eminently qualified gentlemen; this has largely contributed to keep us in a position to fulfill our obligations, and incite us to emulate our sister institutions.

On the first of July 1877, we had under treatment 918 patients, 455 males and 463 females.

The number of admissions during the year was 162; 92 men and 70 women.

The whole number of patients treated during the year is 1080; 547 men and 533 women.

Although the number of the insane, admitted at the expense of the Government, seems to have increased, for the

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past few years, to an alarming extent in the Province, we may say that, in our institution, this augmentation is nearly proportionate to the general increase in the population; being only 18 patients more for the year.

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There have been 81 patients discharged, 34 men and 47 women, being fifty per cent of the admissions during the year.

The deaths amounted to 63, 38 men and 25 women, representing a percentage of 5.83 on the whole number of inmates under treatment during the year.

This exceptionally favorable result, as compared with that obtained in other institutions of a like nature, shows clearly that our establishment combines all the best conditions which hygiene requires. We have not a single case of epidemic disease, and we are happy to be able to state that there has been not a single case of serious accident.

Our efforts, as in the past, have been directed towards providing for our patients, besides necessary comforts, all the means of amusement and diversion which are so useful in the treatment of mental diseases.

In conclusion, we are proud and happy to say that 'he officers of the establishment always perform their responsible duties in a satisfactory manner, and deserve the greatest confidence.

The inferior officers accomplish their painful task with much zeal.

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MEDICAL REPORT.

The various statistics which accompany our annual medical report always form the basis of our work.

They are essential to enable one to thoroughly comprehend the condition of the inmates, and indispensable in order to show the results obtained.

The extremely limited time remaining at our disposal to enable us to take advantage of the present session, prevents our presenting this report in its ordinary shape and complete form; but we desire, at least, not to deprive those who take an interest in this speciality, of useful information which they may obtain from statistics prepared with care and exactness.

For the proper understanding of this report, we shall submit to the reader the various statistical tables in the order that we have adopted and followed in our previous reports.
