THE THIRD FROM Canadian List Now FAIRVILLE IN Has Grown To 4,751

CASUALTY LIST Of This 678 Are Killed and 867 Missing —Five Maritime Province Soldiers, One a New Brunswicker, in Today's

Ottawa, May 17—The honor list now reaches the enormous total of 4.751 and the end of the casualties from the battle of Langmarcke is not yet in sight. The total is made up as follows:—

Wounded, 3,206; killed, 678, and missing, 867.

The Canadians saved the day in those fearful four days fighting, but it took a terrible toll. The week end casualty lists contained 634 more names, 131 killed, 251 wounded and 252 missing. Half the missing, or 127, were from the 22nd battalion raised in eastern Ontario. Thirty-three names of missing from the 3rd battalion, which contain Toronto units, were also reported. The gallant 74th, which lost its commander, Col. McHarg, has reported thirty-five missing.

This total of 4,751 composes the casualties from April 22, the day on which the big battle opened. However, it also contains the lists of the Princess Patricia's in the recent heavy fighting at Ypres and also names of some Canadian artillery men who have been engaged in the terrific artillery duels of the

The Liberals are sure of what the result would be, but, in the interests of the country and of the empire, they would rather remain in opposition than see the dominion plunged into a general election during war times.

With Friendly Guard

Lewiston, Me., May 17—It is not generally known that Lewiston has become the home of a Belgian who was through the awful siege of Liege and later a prisoner in Germany. For eleven weeks he was in the midst of the awful carnage that marked the beginning of the European war, and no man in these cities has more reason to hold the German militarists in horror and hatred than he.

This man is Jeophile Fagard, a citizen of Liege, but whose property and home were destroped at the capture of that town in last August. He is now with his sister and her husband, Jean Heutz, at their home in Middle street, and there for the present he will remain.

At the breaking out of the war Mr. Fagard was working at his trade as a gunmaker in Liege. For several days before the attack on that city it was generally known what was coming and many of the people fled. The first attack was not on Liege proper, but on an outlying village named Julimont, Previous Previous Alriand Helped to Escape.

"It was on a dark night when we made the attempt. The guard from Alsace cut the wire near where I was and together we started on the run. Out objective point was Holland, but we both realized that if we were caught we should be shot instantly and without mercy. All night broke, we hid in some bushes through the day. 



Dr. Duval Was Doing Heroic Work When He Was Wounded

Rumors at Front That He May Get The Distinguished Service Medal-Dr. G. G. Corbet Writes of His Gallant Conduct and His Injury

A letter from Captain (Dr.) G. G. Corbett of this city to his sister-in-law, tells how her husband, Major (Dr.) J. L. Duval of the Medical Corps was injured, under circumstances which showed his heroism and which, according to his friends, should entitle him to the distinguished service medal. The let-

No. 11 Stationary Hospital, Rouen, France, May 3, 1915. "With you I can praise the Almighty at Joe's escape from death. Just as soon as I found out where he was I proceeded to get permission to go to him

"Last Sunday evening about 12.15 midnight, as Joe was removing the last patient from the advanced dressing post, a shell exploded about twenty feet from him, fracturing the tibia and tibulo of the right leg, leaving a gaping wound. It is what we call a compound comminuted fracture. Also a fragment of the shell went through the muscles of the left thigh, went in at the front and out at the side; so both legs are out of commission. He was operated on and a fragment of shell taken out of the right leg. He is doing well. I spent two days with him and saw the legs and I think I can honestly say he felt better for my visit, and that he is improving.

"He probably will be invalided to England first and perhaps home. It will be six months before he will be real well. In three months he will be about on

rutches; probably he may be slightly lame in the right leg.

"It seems several officers had been given the chance to volunteer for this angerous post; they refused; Joe was asked and he did not like the prospect, dangerous post; they refused; Joe was asked and he did not like the prospect, but said if they wanted him to go he was ready. So he went with the boys. They were two days under shell fire. When he was wounded two other poor fellows were also. They fell on him, but he managed to drag himself away from underneath and so was put on his own ambulance wagon and brought home. I am awfully glad to know that he received his majority on March 17. There are some rumors that he may get the D. S. medal, but we have to wait. I hope

His action has helped to cover our little section (St. John) with glorying with the brave, heroic acts of the Canadians, as you have seen in the . No other St. John Boys are injured."


