

Names U. S. Skaters For Olympic Games

International Union Selects Jew-traw, Moore, Kaskey and Steinmetz.

Cleveland, Ohio, Oct. 31.—Skaters who will represent America in the Olympic games at Chamonix, in the French Alps, next January, were selected by the International Skating Union of America at the closing session of its seventeenth annual convention here.

The speed skaters selected are Charles Jewtraw, Lake Placid, international outdoor champion; Joe Moore, New York, international indoor champion in 1922 and runner-up this year, and William Steinmetz, Chicago, last year's international outdoor title-holder.

Richard Donovan of Johnson City, N. Y., and Valentine Blais, Lake Placid, N. Y., were chosen alternates. Proceeds from races to be held at Saranac Lake, Lake Placid, New York City, Boston and Newburg, N. Y., will be used in financing the trip. Dates for these exhibitions will be set by the Board of Control of the International Union, with the exception of the one at Newburg, which will be held Jan. 1, N. Y., and Valentine Blais, Lake Placid, N. Y., were chosen alternates.

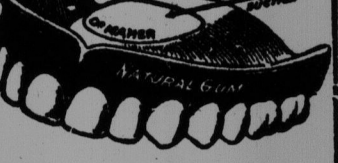

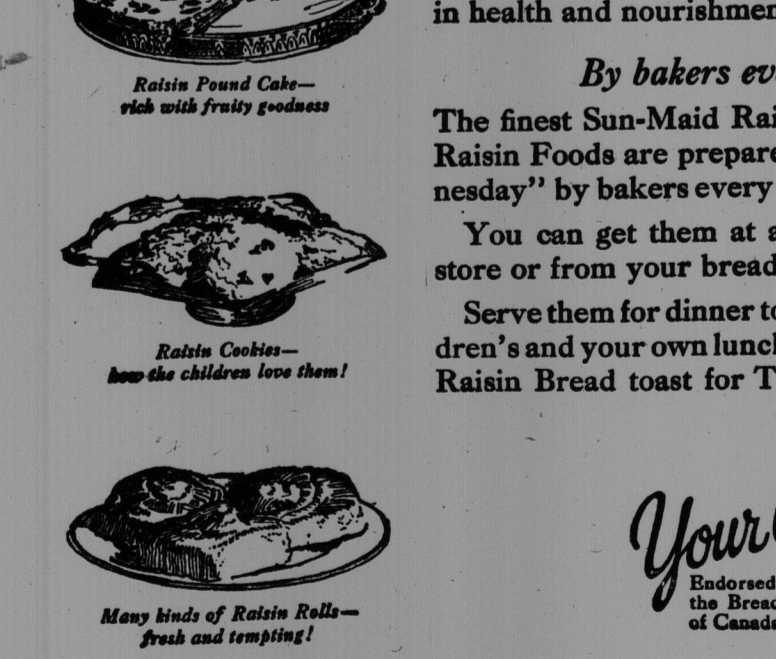

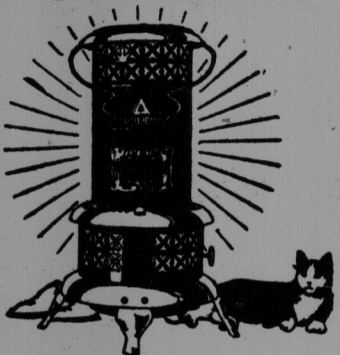

U. S. TO GO IN FOR FULL PROGRAMME

Changes Viewpoint on the Olympic Games—Outlook for 1924.

Europe should see the full strength of the United States in all fields of sport in the 1924 Olympic Games at Paris, says the New York Times. This speaks well, for it proves that America was inclined to view the Olympic Games as purely track and field tests, in which this country has ruled supreme in all the modern Olympics, and did not give attention to the other sports on the Olympic programme, with the possible exception of swimming and a few others.

Some of the other nations, however, have maintained that the Olympic Games should be a world congress of sport in which the nations should meet in sporting events more or less common to all—an opinion shared generally by Europeans. In the Olympic Games of 1908 at London, England even went so far as to announce that all sports would count in the point score, listing track and field as merely one event. The United States refused to accept this, holding to the view that track and field alone constitute Olympic honors, with the result that two sets of scores were kept.

The year 1924, however, should find the United States accepting the Olympics in their broadest sense. At the enthusiastic meeting of the Executive Committee of the American Olympic Committee held last week at the Hotel Astor, probably the most important fact brought out was that America will have practically a 100 per cent representation on the Olympic programme. Every sport, beginning with the hockey and ice skating events in January and running right through the list of rugby, soccer, polo, trap shooting, fencing, wrestling, rowing, gymnastics, weight lifting, equestrian sports, cycling and yachting will find the American colors entered.

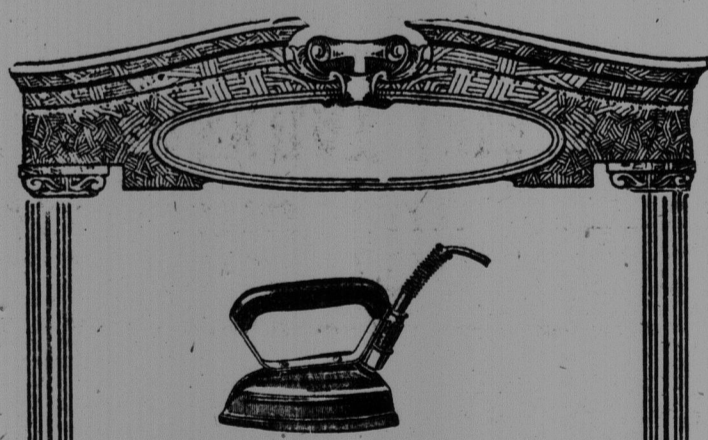

MORE SAILINGS ARE ANNOUNCED

Indications of Good Winter Season Here in Reports From Lines.

From present indications the winter port sailings this year will be as good, if not better, than last year. Local agents for trans-Atlantic lines are making preparations for the opening of the season and are receiving official notification as to the date of the first sailings.

J. T. Knight & Company announced this morning that the first South Africa sailing season will be the S. S. New Georgia, which is due to leave this port on or about December 12. Their first sailing to New Zealand and Australian ports will be the S. S. Durham, which is scheduled to sail from West St. John on or about December 20. Sailings will be monthly during the season.

The first sailing of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine will be the Canadian Conqueror, which is due to arrive here from Antwerp on November 20 and will leave for London and Antwerp on December 5. The Canadian Planter will sail for the same ports on December 19. The Canadian Victor is due here from Swansea on December 2 and will sail for Cardiff and Swansea on December 14. The Canadian Mariner will sail from here on December 28.

The Scandinavian-American line, which will operate out of St. John this season have advised their local agents McLean Kennedy, Ltd., that their first sailing will be the S. S. Kentucky which will leave here December 12 for Copenhagen and Berlin. Their second sailing will be the S. S. Delaware, which is due to sail on January 2. From that on the sailings will be fortnightly.

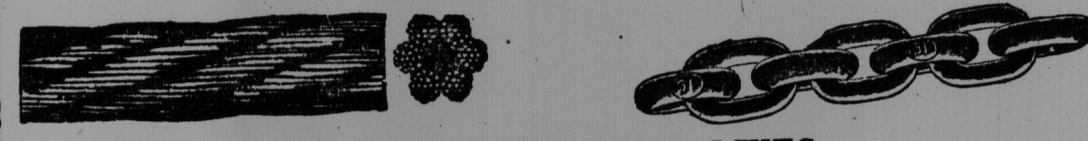

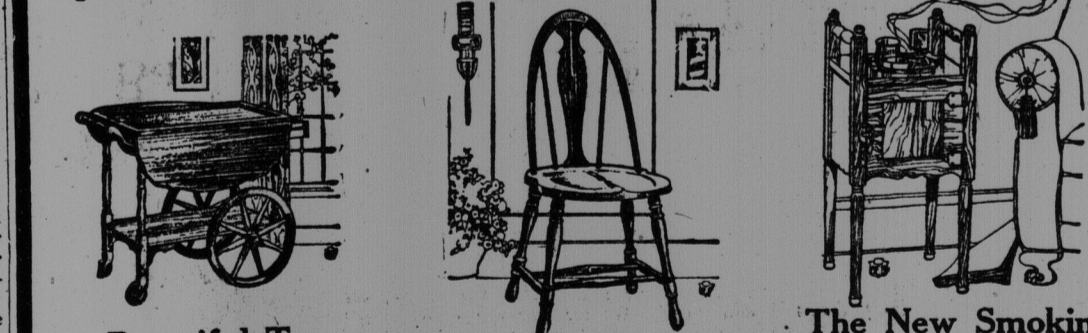
