PLEASING NEWS FROM FRONT

London, Oct. 31—A despatch to the Central News from Petrograd says that up to a late hour on Friday no declaration of war had been received from Turkey. Neither the Russian ambassador nor the Turkish ambassador have left their posts. The despatch "Consternation prevails in Constantinople and the Turkish ministry is sitting continuously. The secretary of the Turkish embassy in Petrograd says that he hopes the misunderstanding will soon be cleared up. The head of Moslems in Russia condemns the folly of Turkey and declares that his followers are loyal to the Russian

London, Oct. 31—The Athens corre spondent of the Daily Telegraph con-firms the report that the Russian ambassador to Turkey has left Constantinople London, Oct. 31—A Reuter dispatch says that the Russian authorith have suspended all steamship traffic to and from Odessa.

NO WAR DECLARATION YET

London, Oct. 31-No declaration of war has yet been made by either Turkey or Russia and from various sources comes the suggestion that the German commanders of the cruisers Goeben and Breslau may have forced the situation without the authority of the Turkish government owing to Ger at the defeat on the Vistula.

According to one report the entire Turkish fleet left Turkish waters unde ended and the ships are now cruising about on the Turkish coast. The Petrograd correspondents remark that the Turkish army is not alto-gether to be despised, especially as it is entirely under the command of Ges-







It is trimmed with self-colored soutache braid.


Broadcloth is not yielding its popularity to other materials, although there are many applicants for smart approval. Taupe broadcloth is suggested for the unusually pretty frock shown here, blue satin and braid being combined with it for chic effect. The facing of the under-skirt and sleeves are of blue. White linen forms the turn-over collar. To make the dress requires 1 bunch of braid (12 yards), 3 yards of 40-inch satin and 4% yards of 54-inch broadcloth.

The hip yoke bears a very important relation to the skirt, and the front piece should be laid on a lengthwise thread of the material. The tunic is cut from an open width and the sleeve, flare cuff and outer front are laid along a lengthwise thread of the cloth. Arrange the back and front gores, back of waist, back yoke and collar on a lengthwise fold. Note carefully difference in arrangement on cloth before cutting of the back and front parts of hip yoke.

To make the tunic, which is attached to the yoke, first lap the front edge on left, centers even and stitch from large "O" perforation to lower edge. Close center back seam. Pleat, bringing "T" to corresponding small "o" perforations and tack. Gather upper edge between double "TT" perforations. If desired omit pleats and gather entire upper edge. Turn hem at lower edge on small "o" perforations. Sew to upper edge of tunic, centers even, large "O" perforation at side seam of yoke, Arrange on skirt, centers even; stitch upper edges together. Sew to lower edge of waist over stay, centers even.

The braid may correspond either with the color of the cloth or the satin. Cloth covered buttons are the smartest to use for the front of the dress.

The linen collar may be finished in round or squape effect at the back





Ottawa, Oct. 31—Acting on the suggestion of Dan. Johnston, fruit commissioner, that municipalities should organize to secure apples direct from the farmers to sell cheaply to the consumers, the City of Ottawa has decided to try the experiment.
