Loss of About \$3,000 in Marysville Blaze

Neighbors succeeded in saving the dwelling house, two horses and several head of cattle. The loss is about \$3,000, partially covered. The fire is supposed to have been set by tramps.

BELGIAN RELIEF SHIP SALES FROM HALIFAX

The sight presented on Thursday when the steamer Tremorville bound for Antwerp left Halifax with an enormous cargo of relief supplies, sailed from the people there. She left amid the cheers of hundreds, the tooting of steamship whistles and the playing of "Tipperary" by a man-of-war band on a British cruiser. She was filled to capacity with relief supplies, some of the heavier items are: 16,281 barrels, and 18,354 bags of potatoes; 385 barrels of apples; 428 barrels and 2,820 half barrels of flour; 194 barrels of dry codfish; 191 barrels of pickled fish; 894 barrels and 123 barrels of clothing; 2,469 boxes of biscuit, and a huge stock of canned pork and beef, evaporated fruit, condensed milk, coffee, tea, sugar, beans, bacon, five carloads of lumber, and other articles of value in the Belgian hour of need. Included in the shipment were many contributions from New Brunswick.

Man Builts Outdoor Living Cabin Only to Find He Had Regained Health and Does Not Need It.

A middle-aged resident of Fairmount tells a story which, he declares, shows how one's labor is so often lost and good intentions go astray. Incidentally the narrator is now a traveling salesman who weighs nearly 200 pounds and is as strong as a rail mauler. This is his tale: "While doing service for Uncle Sam as a soldier in the Philippines about fifteen years ago I contracted tuberculosis, which grew worse so rapidly that I was discharged with the warning to go immediately home to Fairmount to die. The army surgeon was kind enough to tell me that if I should take good care of myself I might live several months and at least would linger long enough to settle up my earthly affairs. So, discouraged and disheartened, I sailed on the first ship for home. I first suspected that perhaps I was not entirely 'in' when I had to defend myself on a shipboard from a drunken sailor armed with an iron bar. I took his weapon away from him and beat him—which was not bad for a consumptive.

CANADA IN THE WAR

A new pension act is to be introduced by the government next session to provide for pensions to Canadians in the present war. It is reported that the scale will be that of half pay. Reports at Ottawa say that recruiting is proceeding satisfactorily, but that difficulty is experienced because of a scarcity of recruiting officers in some provinces.

THE WAR NEWS

There are great differences of opinion as to the immediate results of Turkish participation in the war. Some writers are of opinion that Italy, Greece and Roumania will take up arms against the Turks while some appear to be a little doubtful concerning Italy, because of some friction between that country and Greece over the occupation by the latter of Epirus in Albania.

It was incorrectly stated yesterday in this column that a son of Prince Louis of Battenburg had given his life to Britain's cause. The young man was not his son but his nephew. He has a son, however, in the navy.

The announcement that large quantities of hay and oats are to be shipped by steamer from St. John during the fall and winter means a better market for the farmers and more work along the St. John water front.

In Mahomedan countries the Kaiser is being represented as a near-convert to that faith. In Poland he is represented as the instrument of God to "restore her saints." The traditional horns and tail, however, must still cling to the man who sacked Louvain, and whose soldiers kill and maim women and children.

Wife beating, wife desertion, and neglect to provide for wife and family are crimes which deserve severe punishment. Rev. Mr. Barraclough will speak at the annual meeting of the Associated Charities that the man who willfully deserts his family or neglects to support them should be given to understand that he must provide for their support by his labor either out of prison or in it. When we have a prison farm we will be in a better position to deal with this particular class of human brutes.

Major-General the Hon. Sam Hughes says he saw it coming, and that he is ready to furnish Britain with 800,000 men. Our war minister should hasten back to Canada and get some of that 800,000 in military training. This country does not wish to supply mere food for powder; but trained and hardy soldiers who have learned something of the art of war, and are qualified to take care of themselves and of the enemy under all circumstances. What Canada needs today more than anything else is the work of the drill-master.

Referring to the operation of the parole law, which was adopted in Maine a year ago, the secretary of the Maine Conference of Charities and Corrections says:—Sixty men have been paroled, three have been returned. Three have run away, the total breaking their parole being six. Sixteen were discharged by expiration and thirty-eight are remaining. Their earnings for the month of August were \$859.86, and their expenditures were \$718.98, leaving \$140.88 in their pockets. Prisoners on parole average \$1.00 a day earnings, and in prison forty-four cents.

Business conditions in the province of New Brunswick are evidently better than in many parts of Canada at the present time. Wholesale merchants in various lines of trade state that there is a good demand for general merchandise, and that collections are fairly good. The industries have not been seriously affected by the war. The outlook for farmers is excellent, and there is a prospect that lumbering operations will be on a larger scale than was anticipated a couple of months ago. Speaking generally, conditions are healthy. 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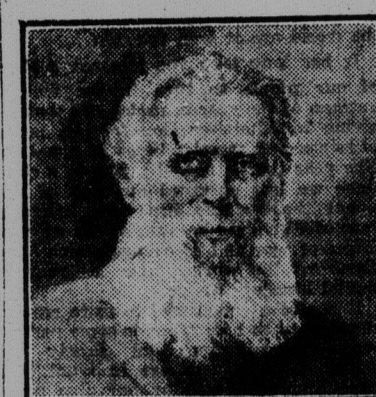

MODISH DESIGN IN CLOTH

It is trimmed with self-colored soutache braid in a longwise thread of the material. The tunic is cut from an open width and the sleeve, flare cuff and outer front are laid along a lengthwise thread of the cloth. Arrange the back and front gorse, back of waist, back yoke and collar on a lengthwise fold. Note carefully difference in arrangement on cloth before cutting of the back and front parts of hip yoke.

The hip yoke bears a very important relation to the skirt, and the front piece should be laid on a lengthwise thread of the material. The tunic is cut from an open width and the sleeve, flare cuff and outer front are laid along a lengthwise thread of the cloth. Arrange the back and front gorse, back of waist, back yoke and collar on a lengthwise fold. Note carefully difference in arrangement on cloth before cutting of the back and front parts of hip yoke.

To make the tunic, which is attached to the yoke, first lay the front edge on left, centers even and stitch from large "O" perforation to lower edge. Close center back seam. Pleat, bringing "T" to corresponding small "O" perforations and tack. Gather upper edge between double "T" perforations. If desired omit pleats and gather entire upper edge. Turn hem at lower edge on small "O" perforations. Join yokes as notched. Center-front indicated by large "O" perforations. Sew to upper edge of tunic, centers even, large "O" perforation at side seam of yoke. Arrange on skirt, centers even; stitch upper edge together. Sew to lower edge of waist over stay, centers even.

The braid may correspond either with the color of the cloth or the satin. Cloth covered buttons are the smartest to use for the front of the dress. The linen collar may be finished in round or square effect at the back.

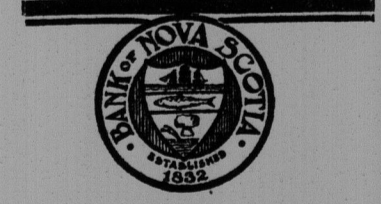

WASHINGTON WILL NOT HAMPER LOANS TO BELLIGERENTS

Belief That Credit Funds Will Lead to Purchases of Big Supplies.
 Washington, Oct. 30.—Viewing credit loans to belligerent countries as private transactions, the Washington administration will not attempt to interpose its influence against such transactions on the part of American bankers.
 This was learned on the highest authority today after it became known that German financiers were contemplating the establishment of a credit loan in this country similar to the \$10,000,000 credit fund negotiated by the National City Bank of New York and other bankers for the French government.
 The decision of the Washington administration may lead to the purchase in the United States of about \$50,000,000 worth of supplies by Russia, and an equal if not a greater amount by Germany. Details of the expected transactions are lacking here.

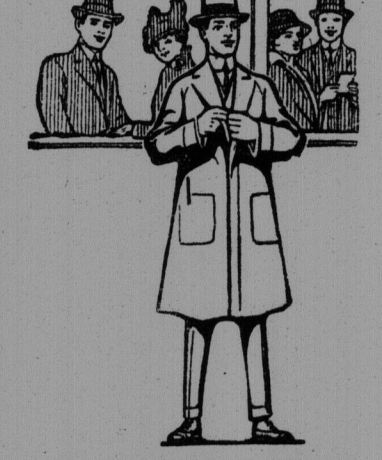
DUKE IS OFF TO WAR

Get Winter Flannels Ready Now; Little Folks Will Need 'em Soon

BY ANNABELL TURNER
Instructor, Home Economics, University of Wisconsin, Extension Division

Jack Frost isn't here yet, but he is on his way and Mrs. Goodmother is not piling every one's nose and toes until she gets the flannels and woollens ready for the little folks to wear. While the weather is still mild she will unpack the flannels and the woollen frocks, wash them and mend them ready for cold weather.

Washing woollens is not the easiest thing that comes in the way of the housekeeping woman, for unless they are washed in exactly the right way they are apt to shrink, and the garment must then be made over or discarded. On this important subject of washing woollens Miss Annabell Turner has written an article for the benefit of the Times housekeeper readers.

An even temperature throughout both the washing and drying process is more important than any particular temperature in washing woollens. Tepid or lukewarm water is recommended as that temperature can be most conveniently retained while drying. Woollens should never be dried close to a fire as the steam formed will cause the material to shrink.

Avoid rubbing soap on the fabric. Many prefer ammonia or borax to soap. Borax or ammonia are especially valuable if the clothes are badly soiled or if the water is hard. Punch and knead the garment to loosen the dirt, but do not rub. Use as many waters as necessary being careful to have the temperature as nearly the same as possible. Put through a wringer which has been loosened, or squeeze the water out with the hands. Avoid twisting as that also causes shrinkage.

SAVE THE PIECES IT WILL PAY YOU

Some wiseacres say—though they've never proved it—that "a French family can live on what an American housekeeper throws away."

This may be no more true than half true, but even so it may be well for the American housekeeper to pay heed to the way they do things in France. These are some of the rules followed by French cooks:

Never throw food away, no matter how small the amount. Save it for soup. Save also all drippings and bones, all water in which vegetables have been boiled and put aside for the soup.

Add a little barley or tapioca balls soaked over night to the clear soup. Sometimes you will want a clear soup. Take broth from the pot, add and for soup for the next day add noodles. There are many ways to cook these soups at little or not expense, but the best way is to use your leftovers and experiment in combining ingredients and you will soon be an expert at soup making.

CITY TO BUY APPLES

Ottawa Council Decides to Try Experiment Suggested.

Ottawa, Oct. 31.—Acting on the suggestion of Dan Johnston, fruit commissioner, that municipalities should organize to secure apples direct from the farmers to sell cheaply to the consumers, the City of Ottawa has decided to try the experiment. The city council will secure as a trial a carload of apples from western Ontario. The apples will be purchased loose for about forty-five cents a barrel and loaded into the car with hay padding to protect the apples. Counting freight and all, it is figured that the apples can be retailed in Ottawa for about 81.25 for two bags. If the plan works well and the apples arrive in good shape, the city will purchase several more carloads.

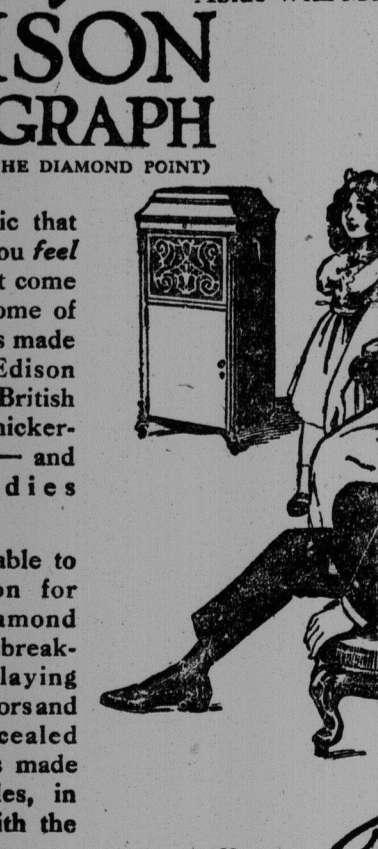

The Empire and therefore Canada is engaged in a struggle that tests out the national character of every country under the British flag. THINKS FARMERS SHOULD HELP FEED SOLDIERS AT FRONT

Saskatchewan Man Makes a Novel Suggestion in Letter to General Hughes.

Ottawa, Oct. 31.—The suggestion by a western farmer, born in the United States, that every Canadian farmer be required to help feed the soldiers and horses of the Canadian expeditionary force has been received by the Minister of Militia.

S. B. Whitney, of Bruno, Sask., has addressed a communication to General Sam Hughes, in which he advocates such a course. The letter is as follows: "Let me make a suggestion. Could you not make a draft on every resident farmer in all the provinces that they must help feed our soldiers and horses that have gone to the front to defend this land of sunshine. "I think that no farmer is too poor to give, say, one sack of wheat of good grade and one sack of oats. I am a poor farmer with a large family, born in the United States, and have been in Canada five years. I would like to see my proposition in effect at an early date. Let every farmer deliver to the elevator or a sack of each on a specified day, take receipt for same from agent to the government. Make a demand that nothing less than third Northern be accepted, this grain to feed men and horses."

At Yale and Harvard have taken the lead in learning from the Canadians, the smaller schools will not be slow to follow.

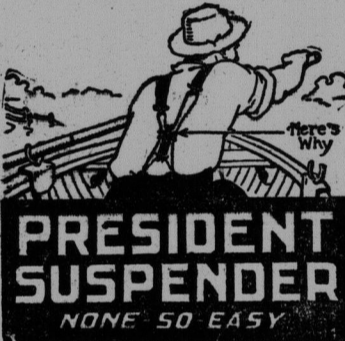

Left Estate of \$40,200 — The Joseph Shannon Estate

In the probate court today the will of T. Barclay Robinson, insurance agent, was proved. He gives all his estate, real and personal, to his wife, Lucy Helen, for life. After her death he gives to the executor, etc., of St. Paul's Valley Church, \$1,000; to his son, Henry Barclay in trust for his grandchild, Lucy Florence Barclay, \$500; to his son Guy delancy in trust for his grandchild, Frederick Barclay, a like sum, and on her death the rest of his estate to go to his two sons named and his other two sons, Philippe Clinton and Frederick Gerald, and he directs that in the event of any of his four sons dying before his estate has been finally divided amongst his sons then the share of such son shall go to and become the property absolutely of the wife of such son. He further directs that in consideration of his having admitted his son, Henry Barclay, to be a partner with him in the insurance business it is his wish that he pay to his mother, \$500 a year for life. He nominates his two sons, Henry Barclay and Philippe Clinton Robinson executors, and they were duly sworn in as such. Real estate consists of his late residence, assessed at \$8,900; personality \$31,000, total estate \$40,200. Bowyer S. Smith is executor.

The court took up the matter of the estate of Joseph Shannon, packer. He died intestate in January, 1914, leaving his wife, Mary Ann Shannon; one daughter, Annie McCaskill, wife of Gordon McCaskill; one son, James, of Fredericton, N. B.; and the five children of a deceased son named Joseph. The widow was appointed administratrix, but died in August last without having fully administered the estate. She by her will appointed Sheriff Wilson executor, and now on the petition of Annie McCaskill and herself, Sheriff Wilson is appointed administrator de bonis non. The undistributed portion of the estate amounts to \$2,000. Kenneth A. Wilson is proctor.

ARE BULGARIANS

Eight Held By Militia Were Thought to be Austrians

So Far Forty or Fifty Have Been Before Examining Officer Here—Germans Returned to Tur

Eight men arrested last night on suspicion of being Austrians were this morning found to be Bulgarians, and have been allowed to go. They were brought before Colonel L. McAvity in the army. The men had been employed on the new C. P. R. hotel at St. Andrews, and were arrested while on their way to Houlton, being taken in custody near McAdam. They spent last night at Central station, where they were taken under a guard from the 62nd regiment in charge of Lieut. Percy McAvity. This morning they were escorted to the army.

Since the outbreak of the war there has hardly been a day when the local infantry on home duty has not made an arrest of Austrians or Germans. Altogether between forty and fifty suspects have been taken in custody, but with the exception of one who was arrested yesterday in Fredericton, all are now at liberty. The three sailors taken from the tug "Security" have been returned to the steamer on Ottawa advice.

BULLET MAKES TERRIBLE WOUND IN LITTLE SISTER'S HIP

Tragic Occurrence in Carleton County Home While Parents Are Attending Funeral

Woodstock, N. B., Oct. 31.—While Mr. and Mrs. Roy Briggs of Lindsay, were attending the funeral of Robert Briggs yesterday, they left their two little children at home in care of a hired man. The boy, who is about six years old, found a rifle and in some way it was discharged, the bullet striking his three year old sister in the hip, making a terrible wound. Slight hopes are held out for the recovery of the child.

THIS IS NOT GOOD SEASON

Number of Sportsmen in the Woods Smaller Than Usual

"It looks as if most of the sportsmen have gone to war," said P. Scribner, local issuer of game licenses, this morning. Although the big game season is in another month to run there has been only one big game license issued here to a non-resident and one license for an outsider.

The commission is composed of Mayor Frink, Commissioner Wignamore and J. H. Hayes and W. F. Burditt.

NO CONTRACT YET FOR ARMORY WORK

No contracts have yet been given for the work to be done at the armory in connection with the establishment of a New Brunswick and P. E. Island battalion of infantry. This means a further delay in the task of recruiting which already in this province is far behind the activities of Ontario, and the western provinces. Despatches from there this morning said that "in Toronto almost the desired complement of men was enlisted, and further west "the full quota would be had in a few days."
