



DAY'S RECORD OF TRAGEDIES

Brooklyn Man Murdered In

EXPLORERS KILLED

George Street of Ottawa Said To Have Met Death at Hands of Esquimaux—Brantford Boy Vic-

Ottawa, Sept. 9—The body of Charles' Robinson, of Brooklyn (N. Y.), an employe of Nathan Shapiro, a bookmaker, of St. Louis (Mo., was found in the cellar of a vacant building on Somerset street late this afternoon, under a pile of coke, while nearby was a blood-stained trunk in which the ramains had evidently been brought to the place.

Robinson was last seen the night of Thursday, Aug. 28, last, and his employers notified the Ottawa police of his disappearance from his rooms and work at Connaught Park race meet the following day. The body was badly decomposed, but that Robinson was murdered the police have no doubt.

Ottawa, Sept. 9—A story from two sources, differing only as to minor detail reached Ottawa today announcing the death at the hands of an Eskimo band in the far north of Canada last summer of two explorers, George Street, of Ottawa and H. V. Radford, an American with whom the Ottawa man left for a journey into the Arctic Circle two years ago.

The first story, received by meil Ottawa, Sept. 9-The body of Charles

Schultz Lake, intending to proceed to Vathurst Inlet on the Arctic ocean. Shortly afterwards an altercation occurred between Radford and one of the tribe and the latter drove his spear through the white man's heart. Street attempted to go to the rescue of his companion but met death in like manner. The story was kept secret by the Eskimos for several months but finally reached the ears of the Mounted Police at Chesterfield two months ago, and a special detail has been sent in to investigate the story.

From Commissioner Perry, of the Mounted Police at Regina today a message was received by Street's relatives, stating that the commissioner had received word from the superintendent at Chesterfield giving another account of the tragedy. According to this version, brought to Chesterfield by an Eskimo, it would appear that the murder had occurred not at Schultz Lake, but after the party had reached their temporary destination at Vathurst Inlet and were proceeding to Fort MacPherson en route to the Yukon. The Eskimo whose name is Akulak, stated that the fight took place near Vathurst on June 5, 1912, and that both Radford and Street were killed in the manner already detailed.

While regarding the story of the Eskimo as apparently authentic because of its circumstantial character, the Mount-cd Police authorities are not inclined to give it complete credence as native stories are frequently magnified and distorted in the telling, travelling as they do from one band to another in the course of their chance meetings. What gives hope that the men may be alive is the fact that on July 22 last Howard Allan, a traveller from the Arctic reported in Edmonton that he had heard that Radford was alive and well at Herschel Island, but no mention of Street was, however, made.

Street is a son of C. F. Street, of this city. He played football on the Ottawa College team which won the intercollegiate championship in 1907.



The Playgrounds Association made a great deal of satisfactory progress with its work this year. The number of supervised playgrounds was doubled, the number now being six, and a much larger amount of money was spent on capital account for the provision of new and permanent apparatus than was received by the association from the city treasury. One citizen when asked to give some assistance in connection with the work of the playgrounds asked why he should give anything of the sort when he was taxed to keep up the playgrounds. He did not know that the amount given by the city represents little more than a third of the amount expended for playground equipment, mails and salaries. The association is that this port will soon be face to face with the problem of providing accommodation for the steamers. WHEAT CROP

THE LARGEST EVER PRODUCED

Washington, Sept. 9-An enorm corn, and indications of the biggest wheat crop ever produced, were the features of the government September crop

tures of the government September crop report issued this afternoon.

Hot weather and dorught in a number of the principal corn growing states during the month ending September I, caused a deterioation of corn, which experts calculate has resulted in the loss of 321,000,000 bushels, reducing corn estimates to 2,871,000,000 bushels. This destructive weather caused a loss of about 300,000,000 bushels during July and August and brought the total up to 121,000,000 bushels since the first estimates of corn crop prospects were made

d August and brought the total up to 1,000,000 bushels since the first estitates of corn crop prospects were made the government.

Never before in the history of the untry has there been such a bountiful heat harvest as has been gathered this ear. This was due principally to the unper crop of winter wheat. Today's overnment estimate of the spring wheat rop showed increased prospects for that rop, making total production 248,000,000 bushels, or an increase of 4.3 per ent. over the August estimate. This increase brought the estimate of total wheat crop of the country to 754,000,000 bushels, or six million bushels more than the great record crop of 1901.

Out crop prospects, too, showed an increase of 3.7 per cent. as a result of the conditions existing during August and the crop now is estimated at 1,066,000,000 bushels, or 38,000,000 bushels more than predicted in August.




AEROPLANE BOOZE LINE NEXT, IS IDEA FOR MAINE

ABILITY TO READ

Knowledge of English Necessary Under The Franchise Reform

Calgary, Sept. 10—Important fran-chise reforms have been instituted by Calgary and the privilege of voting in municipal elections will now be extend-ed on a much wider basis than former-

d on a much wider basis than formerly.

Briefly the basis of the electoral franchise is to be a test of the would-be voter's knowledge of the English language as expressed by his ability to read any portion of the second grade reader used in the Calgary public schools.

The exact wording of the charter amendment is as follows: "That the elective franchise be extended to all persons, twenty one years of age or over, of twelve month's residence in the city, British subjects, and able to read any portion of the second reader in use in the Calgary schools."

This test will be applied when the voter goes to have his or her name put on the list, It gives to women the same voting rights as men.

Another important principle which has been adopted is that of "one person, one vote."



TO HELP IN ROAD WORK Peters Property at Hampton Has Been Purchased - A Large

Washington, Sept. 10 — Canada has called upon the United States for aid in improving its highways and J. A. Pennybacker, chief statistician of the joint congressional committee on federal aid in the construction of post roads, has been loaned to the roads committee of the dominion.

Mr. Pennybacker, who also is secretary of the American Highways association, will organize a statistical bureau for the Canadian commission.

The province of Ontario is said to have already appropriated \$10,000,000 for the beginning of work on its highways, and the sum is to run up to five times that figure before the programme of improvement is completed.
