DISTRICT No. III.-Mr. ROBT WEIR and Mr. ALEX. McFee.

From Bleury street (not inclusive) to St. Lawrence street (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River and St. Lambert.

DISTRICT No. IV.—Mr. T. A. GIBSON and Mr. JOHN TAYLOR.

From Union avenue (not inclusive) to Bleury street and Park avenue (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to the Mountain.

DISTRICT No. V. - Mr. COLIN MCARTHUR.

From Beaver Hall (not inclusive) to Bleury street (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River by St. Peter street.

DISTRICT No. VI .-- Mr. JOHN L. MORRIS and Mr. P. S. ROSS.

From McGill College average to Union avenue (including both) and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to the Mountain.

DISTRICT No. VIII. -Mr. ALEX. MACPHERSON.

From McGill College avenue to Mountain street (not including either) and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to the Mountain.

From Metcalfe street (not inclusive) to University and Hanover streets (not inclusive), and from St. Catherine street to the River by Duke street (including both).

DISTRICT No. X .- Mr. JAMES CROIL and Mr. ALEX MITCHELL.

From Mountain street (inclusive) to St Mark street (not inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the Mountain.

DISTRICT No. XI.-Mr. WILLIAM REID.

From Mountain street (not inclusive) to end of Dorchester avenue, and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to Dorchester street (inclusive).

DISTRICT No. XII .- REV. Dr. J. CLARKE MURRAY.

From St. Mark street (inclusive) to Cote St. Antoine, and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to Cote des Neiges.

DISTRICT No. XIII.-Mr. WILLIAM WALKER.

From Mountain street (inclusive) to Metcalfe and Cathedral streets (inclusive) and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River by Ann street.

PUBLIC WORSHIP on the Lord's Day, at II A. M. and 7 P. M.

WEEKLY SERVICE. Wednesday Evening at a quarter past Eight o'clock.

THE SABBATH-SCHOOL meets every Sabbath at Three P. M. —except in the months of July and August, when the School is closed.

THE MINISTER'S BIPLE CLASS for Young Men, meets every Sunday afternoon at Three o'clock.

THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER is usually administered on the last Sundays of January, May, and October.

ORDINARY MEETINGS of the Kirk-Session are held on the first Sabbath of each month, immediately after the Morning Service.

THE MISSIONARY AND BENEVOLENT SCHEMES of the Church are under the management of a Committee, consisting of the Minister, three members of the Kirk-Session, three members of the Board of Trustees, and four members of the Congregation appointed at the annual meeting.

The fund for the support of a Missionary in India, undertaken by the Congregation four years ago, is now under the management of Mr. ALEX. F. RIDDELL, to whom contributions for this purpose should be sent: Address No. 22 St. John street.

THE ANNUAL MEETING of the Congregation for the transaction of business is held in the School-room of the Church, on the second Monday of January in each year.

THE DORCAS SOCIETY and LADIES' AID ASSOCIATION meet at half-past Two o'clock on Tuesday afternoons during the winter months.

APPLICATIONS FOR SITTINGS may be made to Mr. ALEX. F. RIDDELL, the Treasnrer of the Board of Trustees, or to the Sexton, 77 Monique St., near the Church.

MEMBERS changing their residence are requested to notify the Minister or the Elder of the District in which they reside.

Cases of Sickness should be made known to the Elder of the District and reported by him to the Minister with as little delay as possible.

THE MINISTER can be seen usually any morning between the hours of nine and ten.

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Missionary and Benebolent Junds.

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY appoints Collections to be made annually in all the Congregations and Mission Stations for the following purposes:—

- Home Missions.—In nearly all the Presbyteries there are groups of Presbyterian families, few in number and so widely separated as makes it impossible for them to undertake the support of a minister. But for the assistance of the Home Mission Committee many localities would be entirely destitute of religious services. The number of missionaries employed by this Committee during the past year in the Home Mission stations of the Church was 345. number of places where services were conducted regularly for longer or shorter periods was over one thousand, scattered over the whole Dominion from Labrador and Newfoundland to Vancouver Island. The contributions placed at the disposal of the Committee amounted to \$64,462.84. In addition to this \$36,291. were expended by the College Missionary Societies, the Lumbermen's mission, and other agencies. Owing to the preponderance of Roman Catholics in the Province of Quebec, there are many places there, where there is little hope of the mission station attaining the status of a self-supporting congregation. In the western districts, on the other hand, owing to the continued influx of Protestant settlers, the assistance given to mission stations is more of a temporary nature, but the vast area over which the settlements are spread must, for many years to come, call for larger contributions from the congregations of the Church. The estimates for this year are, \$50,000 for the Western section, and \$12,000 for the work in the Maritime Provinces.
 - Augmentation of Stipends.—The object of this fund is to supplement the salaries of ministers in the smaller and weaker congregations, so as to secure them a minimum income of \$750 a year, with a manse. There are about 140 congregations in the Western section requiring aid, and a proportionate number in the While additions are annually made to the list of Lower Provinces. aid-receiving congregations, there has also been a corresponding removal from the list, as one after another of augmented congregations takes its place on the roll of self-supporting charges. This affords satisfactory evidence that the fund has been judiciously managed and is answering the purpose it was originally designed to serve, viz: that of encouraging new and struggling congregations to put forth stronger efforts for their own support and, in turn, to lend a helping hand to others. The amounts required for the current year are, \$32,000 for the West, and \$9,000 for the East,—an increase of 40 per cent. over the contributions of last year.

III. French Evangelization.—The missionary operations of the Board are carried on at ninety-three stations, chiefly in the Province of Quebec, but extend also to portions of Ontario and New Brunswick, besides the well-known field of St. Anne, Kankakee Co. in Illinois. There are 70 stations in Quebec where the Board carries on its three-fold agency of colportage, schools, and preaching Twelve colporteurs were employed last year; they distributed 1886 Bibles and Testaments, and some 25,000 tracts and booklets. There are 31 Mission schools in which 1,059 scholars are enrolled, of whom 363 are reported to come from Roman Catholic families. The Pointe-aux-Trembles Schools are in a high state of efficiency. The total number of labourers, including teachers, was 86; the expenditure for the year was \$55,770. The amount asked for this year (including part of the cost of enlarging the buildings at Pointe-aux-Trembles) is \$70,000.

IV. The Colleges. The same amount is asked for the Colleges as last year, namely, for Knox, Queen's, and Montreal, in all, \$15,000; for Manitoba College, \$10,000, and for Halifax and Morrin College, Quebec, say \$10,000. Fifty-one students completed their theological curriculum in these six colleges last session, and the number in attendance this year is larger than ever before. Donations to the Endowment funds of the colleges or for bursaries or scholarships are always acceptable, as well as gifts of books for their respective libraries.

Winisters' Widows' and Orphans' Funds. The annual amount required to supplement the revenues derived from investments is about \$10,000. The number of annuitants is close on 150. When it is added that the average annuity does not exceed \$150, enough has been said to enlist the practical sympathies of the whole Church in behalf of this most deserving but too often neglected fund.

VI. The Assembly Fund. This fund provides (1) for all expenses connected with the General Assembly—clerk's salary, stationery, printing the minutes, &c.; (2) expenses connected with committees that have no authorized fund of their own—such as the committees on Statistics, Sabbath Observance, State of Religion, &c.; (3) special claims presented to the Assembly from time to time, which cannot be ignored—its proportion of expenses connected with the Presbyterian Alliance, and other objects.

VII. Manitoba College. The exceptional circumstances of this College, and the important work it is doing for the Church in the North-West and British Columbia, have caused the General Assembly to authorize a special contribution from the whole Church in its behalf. While the College authorities have succeeded in extinguishing the debt on the buildings, the increasing attendance of students, and the urgent demand for still more, to overtake the rapidly

extending work, has made it necessary to incur additional expense in the way of supplementing the teaching staff. The great benefit of Manitoba College to the western part of the Church, and to the Dominion, has never been more apparent then now. The amount asked for this year is \$10,000.

VIII. Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund. Along with the effort that is being made to raise an endowment fund there is an urgent call for greater liberality in support of this fund from the congregations than has been manifested in the past. The present scale of annuities to the retired ministers is inadequate—not reaching an average of \$200 per annum. It ought to be doubled. The number of beneficiaries on the roll is close upon ninety. A considerable sum has been subscribed towards the Endowment Fund, but a great deal more is required to make it worthy of the Church. A few generous contributions from the wealthier members of the Church would be very acceptable, but in the meantime an increase of the congregational contributions is called for.

IX. Foreign Missions. We are living in the "Missionary age" of the Church, and it behooves the Presbyterian Church in Canada to recognize its duty and privilege in obeying the last command of the Saviour-"Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth." Our missions in the New Hebrides, in Trinidad, in China, in Central India, and to the Aborgines of our own country, are all yielding good fruit, and their usefulness and extension are only limited by the means placed at the disposal of our Assembly's Foreign Mission Committee; the proposal to commence a mission to the Jews in Palestine, and to the Chinese on our Pacific coast, together with the contemplated appointment of a paid Missionary Secretary, involve a very considerable increase of expenditure, not to speak of the loud cries that come to us from fields already occupied for "more labourers." The amount asked for this year is \$123,000 -about \$10,000 more than last year.

N. B.—In addition, and quite distinct from these, it is to be remembered that this congregation is pledged for the support of a missionary in **Central India** under the auspices of the General Assembly's Committee on Foreign Missions. The amount annually required for this purpose is about \$1,400.

REV. HUGH A. ROBERTSON.

Mr. Robertson is a native of the County of Pictou, N. S.—one of the earliest homes of Presbyterianism in Canada, that has given more of its stalwart sons to the ministry than any other county in the Dominion. He was born in 1841. He received his first missionary impulse while still a youth. The dream of his early years became a reality, and in 1863 he sailed from Halifax in the "Dayspring" in company with James D. Gordon, who, a few years later, fell a martyr to the missionary cause on Erromanga, in the New Hebrides. On arriving at the scene of his future labours, Mr. Robertson soon saw heathenism in its most revolting forms, and when the question came to be asked some years later, "Who will raise the fallen standard and come to the rescue of the savages of Erromanga?" his ready answer was, "Here am I, send me." Perhaps the lines which he quoted in one of his letters about that time had something to do with his decision:—

"My soul is not at rest; there comes a strange And secret whisper to my spirit, like A dream at night, 'Why live I here?' The vows Of God are on me, and I may not stop To play with shadows, or pluck earthly flowers, Till 1 my work have done, and render up Account. The voice of my departed Lord, 'Go teach all nations,' from the eastern world Comes on the night breeze, and awakes my ear; And I will go. I may no longer doubt To give up friends, and home, and idle hopes, And every tender tie that binds my heart To thee, my country. Why should I regard Earth's little store of borrowed sweet? I, sure, Have had enough of bitter in my cup To shew that never was it His design Who placed me here, that I should live at ease, Or drink at pleasure's fountain. Henceforth, then, It matters not, if storm or sunshine be My earthly lot; bitter or sweet my cup; I only pray, 'God fit me for the work!' God make me holy, and my spirit nerve for the hour of strife! RIDDELL, In 1872, with mingled feelings of doubt and thankfulness, the missionary and his young wife took possession of the "manse" at Dillon's Bay—within sight of the spot where John Williams was murdered by the natives, and there they have ever since prosecuted their self-denying labours with manifest tokens of success. Erromanga is no longer a cannibal island. "The people who sat in darkness have seen a great light." Many of the natives have been gathered into the Christian fold, and in the "Martyr's Memorial Church" hundreds assemble at stated seasons to celebrate the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. The entire population of the Island is now a little over 2000, of whom fully one-half have embraced Christianity. Mr. Robertson is assisted in his work by some 35 native teachers, and there is good reason to expect that ere long the whole of the people will be brought under the influence of the gospel.

Pastoral Letter.

TO THE MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS OF ST. PAUL'S CHURCH:

MY DEAR FRIENDS,

There is nothing very special to record with regard to the past year, unless it be that sickness has been very prevalent, and the number of deaths unusually large.

There has been a movement made towards a greater interest in the missionary life and work of the Church. A branch has been formed in connection with the Ladies' Association, whose aim and work will be to deepen the missionary spirit in the congregation, and give a helping hand to the work both at home and abroad.

The young men are also being enlisted in this good work. Their sympathies are being awakened in, and their support asked for the Church's needs in the North-West. It would be a great joy to me and a pledge of much future good to the Church, if our young men could be stirred up to a living interest in the life and work of the Church-it would be a great safeguard to themselves, it would be one great help saving them from a carnal, selfish, pleasure-loving life. It is a sad thing to see so many young men in this community, able to give time, the very busiest of them, for athletic sports and social amusements, but no time at all for edifying reading, or for meetings, whose object is to provide culture for their mind and soul. A day is coming in their life when they shall bitterly but vainly deplore this. It is sad to see a young man, gifted by God with high capacities, satisfied with making provision only for the lowest part of his nature, for the merely animal part of him, and making little or no provision for his intellectual, moral and spiritual wellbeing. I have been very anxious, and I have been ably and generously helped by several in the effort, to get the young men in the congregation to take a larger and grander view of life, and yet with many, I fear, the effort has hitherto proved fruitless. There can be no greater joy or strength to a Christian minister than to know that the young men are seeking wisdom, and with all their getting, getting understanding, and that they are fellow-workers with himself, helping the Church's work when and how they can and, above all, by their lives, witnessing to the world by their character and conduct of the living power of the Gospel of Christ in human life. Think well what life means—why it has been given to you—what God means you to make of it.

The attendance at the services on Sunday has been gratifying. The attendance at the weekly Prayer Meeting showed a marked improvement towards the close of the year. I regret to have again to call attention to the irregularity of attendance at Communion, on the part of some of the members, and I hope they will take this reminder in good part and think over it seriously. I regret also to have to say again that there are several in the congregation, not only amongst the young, who have not yet seen it to be a duty or a privilege to accept the invitation, "Do this in remembrance of Me." Can there be any good reason for refusing one of the greatest helps of the Christian life, and losing that precious privilege which more than anything else unites in one all who bear the Christian name.

I regret also to have again to call attention to the fact, that there are many in the congregation who are contributing nothing to the missionary work of the Church at home or abroad. This should not be, it is a very disappointing indication of lack of faith in and love to Christ. Some, I fear, are deterred from giving because they feel they can give so little. To these I say, give something, however small, bear some share of the work, show that it has your sympathy; it is that the Church wants, and sympathy is not measured by the amount given, but by the willingness to give. The widow's mite was a richer offering to God than the unworthy contribution from the wealthy man's abundance. "If there be a willing mind, it is accepted, according to that a man hath." Let every one give something this year, however small.

If we were all living the Gospel, we would all give for the spread of that Gospel, not as a reluctant duty but as a great privilege. And that in our different spheres in life, we may all be found more and more living the Gospel of Christ, witnesses of its power in us, is my prayer for us all, during this year.

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We regret to learn from the report of the Trustees that there has been a slight deficiency in the revenues of the Church during the past year, and that the envelope system, recommended to the members of the congregation at the beginning of the year by the Kirk-Session and Trustees as a desirable method of conrtibuting on the Lord's Day towards the maintenance of ordinances, has not been so generally adopted as was expected. It is therefore earnestly hoped that the plan now proposed by the Board of Trustees, and adopted at the annual meeting, for equalizing the revenue and expenditure, will meet with the approval and cordial support of the seat-holders—the more that it is not the intention of the Trustees that the small additional pew-rent shall be burdensome to any members of the congregation.

The amount received by the committee having charge of the Missionary and Benevolent Schemes of the Church is slightly in advance of the sum contributed for these purposes last year, though it is still far less than might reasonably be expected from this congregation. It will be remembered that at the annual meeting held in 1877, it was unanimously resolved to adopt the "Schedule System" as the plan deemed best adapted to the circumstances of the congregation for contributing to the various missionary and benevolent funds of the General Assembly, as well as for others more particularly connected with our own congregation. That method has ever since been continued with a certain measure of success. The whole amount contributed during the past ten years in this way was \$45,450—an average of \$4,545 annually. The highest number of contribu-

tors, however, in any of these ten years was 133 (in 1886); the average number of contributors was only 118, out of the three hundred and upwards to whom the schedules were annually sent! A very large majority of the members and adherents of St. Paul's Church have, by this showing, contributed nothing whatever for these important purposes through the schedule system, and that is the only way in which they have been asked to contribute. There are surely very few in the congregation who are unable to contribute something, however small, for the maintenance and extension of the work of the Presbyterian Church in Canada at home and abroad. Without presuming to dictate to individual members how much they should give for such purposes, the Session earnestly commend this subject to the prayerful consideration of all, and hope that the number of contributors, at least, during the present year will be greatly increased. "As ye abound in everything . . . see that ye abound in this grace also."

THE SESSION FUND.—The demands made on the funds at the disposal of the Kirk-Session have been many and urgent during the past year; nor, indeed, can it be expected that it should be otherwise. It is characteristic of the Christian Church in all times—"Ye have the poor always with you," and it is by large-hearted and openhanded sympathy with those of our brethren who stand in need of assistance, that we learn fully to appreciate the true meaning and force of the Scriptural adage—"It is more blessed to give than to receive." The Session fund has hitherto been derived from collections taken up at the communion seasons, and on a few other special occasions, which produce annually about \$750. For the first time, in the Treasurer's financial statement this year, mention is made of a "Legacy Fund," which may suggest to some of the wealthier members of the congregation a way in which their benefactions to the poor might be of permanent value, either in the form of bequests or of donations for investment.

THE VICTORIA MISSION.—It is highly gratifying to notice in the report under this heading on another page, that the *Victoria Mission*, carried on these many years as a congregational work, has at length being erected into a congregation by the Presbytery of Montreal under circumstances that auger well for its future development.

At the meeting of the congregation held on 11th January, the Schedule committee was authorized to make an annual grant of five hundred dollars for three years towards the support of the new con-

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gregation, which the Session feel sure will always have the best wishes of the members of St. Paul's Church for its usefulness and prosperity. (See the Victoria Mission Report, below.)

Bearing ever in mind that "The Son of Man came not to be ministered unto but to minister," and that His followers are enjoined by Him to imitate His example, "Let us be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch, as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord."

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The Annual Meeting.

Minutes of Annual Meeting of St. Paul's Church, held within the School-room of the Church, on Monday, the 11th of January, 1892, at 8 o'clock p. m.

The report of the Trustees and the Treasurer's financial statement, having been placed in the pews on the previous Sunday, were taken as read.

Mr. J. L. Morris read the report of the Committee for increasing the collections of the Church by means of the envelope system.

The following motions were then carried unanimously:

That the Report of the Trustees be approved and adopted, and that they be authorized, as suggested in the report, to make the necessary increase in the pew rents, and that the report with the Treasurer's statement and the minutes of the Annual Meeting be printed for circulation among the members of the Congregation.

Whereupon, it was moved by Mr. T. Samuel, seconded by Mr. J. Russell, and carried:

That Mr. John Hope and Mr. A. Riddell be re-elected Trustees for the usual term.

The following resolutions were then unanimously carried:

That the thanks of the Congregation are due, and are hereby tendered to the Organist, for the attentive and able manner in which he has conducted the musical services of the Church, and to the members of the Choir for their valuable assistance.

Moved by Mr. J. Tasker, seconded by Mr. A. McFee:

That the thanks of the Congregation are due, and are hereby tendered to Mr. John L. Morris and to Mrs. Morris, for their very zealous and successful work in connection with the Sunday School of the Church.

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ohn Fair: with the other R.S. Kinghorn Mr. Tasker reported the result of a joint meeting of the Kirk-Sessions of St. Paul's Church and St. Matthew's Church, in reference to the Victoria Mission, and moved, seconded by Mr. Larmonth:

That this meeting approving of the recommendation of the Kirk-Sessions in this matter, hereby authorize the Schedule Committee to make a grant to Victoria Mission of \$500.00 for three years commencing January 1st, 1892.

Mr. Tasker then moved a cordial vote of thanks to Mr. Alex. Mitchell, for the able mannner in which he had acted as chairman of the meeting. This was seconded by Mr. J. Taylor, and carried unanmously.

There being no further business, the meeting was closed with prayer.

Report of the Trustees

of St. Paul's Church for the year ending 31st December, 1891.

The Trustees have pleasure in submitting to the congregation their Annual Report, with the statement of the Treasurer for the year.

In doing so, they wish again to state that owing to the able and very satisfactory manner in which all the duties of the pastorate have been performed by the Rev. Mr. Barclay, the congregation has had a very prosperous year. All the sittings in the church have been let, and the services very largely attended, and the most cordial relations continue to exist between the congregation and its minister.

The pew rents show a slight increase, being \$7,910.10 for this year, and \$7,816.77 for last. The plate collections show a small decrease, being \$1,925.43 against \$2,146.31 for last year, but this is more than made up by the increase in the amount collected through the envelopes, which is \$2,105.11 against \$1,619.76 last year, an increase of \$485.35. This makes a net gain on the collections of \$264.47.

During the year, the balance due to the Contractors for building the manse has been paid. The amount expended on the manse at the date of the last Annual meeting was \$12,625.08, and \$35.39

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charged in "Sundry accounts" last year. This year there has been paid \$1,646.55 making the total cost of the building \$14,307.02, of which amount there was collected, as shown on the statement submitted at the last Annual meeting, \$12,667.60, and this year there has been collected \$130.00, making \$12,797.60. There has been also received from the rent of the manse \$833.33, making the receipts in all \$13,630.93. The deficiency \$676.03 will be paid out of the rent as it comes in. The Church has besides, an asset in the value of the "mitoyen" wall, which will be paid whenever the adjoining vacant lot is built on. It will thus be seen that the Church property has been enriched by a handsome manse, similar in architectural style to the Church, and suitable for the minister's residence, and all paid for.

The financial statement accompaning this report, shows, that the balance due to the Treasurer has increased from \$1929.70 last year, to \$4181.99. Of this difference however of \$2252.29, the great portion is for the payments on account of the manse spoken of above, \$1646.55 less the receipts of \$172.52 = \$1474.03, leaving a deficiency of \$778.26 between the ordinary receipts and expenditure. The Guarantee Fund for three years, alluded to in last report, ends with the year just completed. This amount, \$650.00, will not be received next year. It will thus be seen that to provide for the probable deficiency for next year, and any contingent expenses that may occur, about \$1400.00 more than the present revenue will be required.

In making this comparison and calling the expenditure on the manse \$1474.03, the amount received as rent has not been taken into account, as it will come in each year, and this comparison is made to find out the probable deficiency for next year. The amount actually chargeable to the manse fund is of course not \$1474.03, but \$640.70, as this fund must be credited with the rent received \$823.33 during this year and last year.

The Trustees and the members of the Session have consulted together to consider the best way to provide the amount required for next year, and they have decided to recommend to the congregation that a small increase should be put upon the pew rents, sufficient to equalize the revenue and expenditnre. If the finances of the church are thus put upon a satisfactory basis, it is felt that there will be little difficulty in collecting the amount of the floating debt.

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RECEIPTS

The Board of Trustees is much indebted to the Committee appointed at the last annual meeting to co-operate with the Trustees and Kirk Session in increasing the subscriptions to the ordinary collections of the Church by means of the envelope system, of which Mr. John L. Morris was the chairman, for the great assistance rendered, and they recommend that a similar Committee be appointed for this year.

During the year the Trustees received the resignation of Mr. Alex. Ewan as Treasurer, which they were very unwilling to accept, and only did so at his urgent request. Mr. Ewan has acted as a Trustee since 1877 and as Treasurer since 1880, and has always fulfilled the duties of his office in a most energetic and efficient manner, and the Board wishes to put on record its strong sense of obligation to Mr. Ewan for his able conduct as a member of the Board, and as Treasurer for so many years.

The Board elected Mr. A. F. Riddell as a Trustee to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Ewan, and requested him to act as Treasurer of the Church, which he agreed to do.

Mr. John Hope and Mr. A. F. Riddell, (who has been elected for the balance of Mr. Ewan's term of office expiring this year) are the two Trustees to retire by rotation. They are both eligible for reelection.

The number of officers and teachers at present on the roll is, male, 16, female, 17—total, 32. The number of scholars is, male, 140, female, 109—total 249.

Little change has taken place in the outward aspect of the School since last annual report. The year has been one of quiet, steady work. The teachers have been regular in their attendance and faithful and earnest in the performance of their duties.

The course of study has been principally that indicated by the International scheme, and the attention of the scholars has been directed to benevolent and missionary objects.

The School has been visited from time to time by some of the elders appointed for that purpose by the Kirk-Session.

Interesting addresses have also been given by Messrs. James Croil and J. Murray Smith, to whom the thanks of the school are due.

The Rev. Mr. Barclay has continued to carry on his Bible-class with great success, the attendance being large and regular.

A very enjoyable annual festival was held in March; the programme of music and recitations having been provided by the scholars themselves.

Circumstances and engrossing occupations have necessitated the

resignation of three of our most valued and experienced teachers, viz: Miss Macdonald, Miss C. Thompson and Mr. McArthur. The names of Mrs. White and Miss Monk have been added to the roll.

The amount collected for missionary and benevolent objects by the scholars during the year is \$289.67, of which \$150.00 have been devoted to the support of our Missionary in India.

The Society of Christian Endeavour connected with our Chapel has wonderfully increased in numbers of late, and is now acknowledged to be one of the most active and energetic in the city. Their meetings held every Wednesday evening, immediately after the Prayer Meeting, are largely attended, not only by the members, but also by their parents and friends. We must admit that this Society has been a blessing to our Mission, binding together the hearts of our young people in Christian work and effort, as nothing else could have done. We certainly have cause to thank the Lord for what He has accomplished through their instrumentality. The moving spirit in this good work has been Mr. Thomas Hall Allan, one of our young teachers, and editor of the "Endeavour Banner." Mr. Allan is at present attending the Presbyterian College here, with a view to entering the Ministry.

The Prayer Meeting has been conducted every Wednesday evening throughout the year, and has been well attended, especially by the younger portion of the community.

As was stated in our last report, the work of the mission having been transferred to the Session of St. Matthew's Church, they in the early part of January engaged Mr. W. D. Reid, B.A., of the Presbyterian College, to conduct morning and evening Sabbath services throughout the year. The services were largely attended, the Chapel at times being filled to overflowing.

In the month of September, the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered to 84 members, by the Rev. W. R. Cruikshank, B.A. of St. Matthew's Church, assisted by several of his elders. Encouraged by this manifestation of the feelings of the people connected with the Chapel, and also by permission being granted by the Montreal Presbytery to organise a Congregation, a meeting was held in the early part of December, when it was unanimously agreed

upon to carry out the work of organization. A meeting has been called for the 16th day of January, 1892, at which a Board of Management will be chosen, and the foundation laid for our new VICTORIA CHURCH.

We are greatly encouraged by the good feeling that exists among the different denominations represented in the district, towards the new Church, and are therefore looking forward with pleasure to the work that lies before us. The sum of \$500.00 granted by St. Paul's Church for the past year, has enabled St. Matthew's Church Session, to carry on the work successfully and to close with a balance on hand.

There has been a great awakening among the members of the Bible classes during the year, almost every member of both classes having decided to give their hearts to Christ. We can therefore truly say, that the Lord has blessed and prospered us during 1891.

St. Paul's Missionary, Dorcas, and Zid Society.

During the year that has just closed, we have, as a Society, had many opportunities of extending a helping hand to the Charitable Institutions so much needed in our city, and inasmuch as we have distributed our charity with a truly loving and sympathetic feeling in our hearts for God's poor, we will not only have *given* happiness but also gained it.

In the early part of the year we were engaged in work for a bazaar, in aid of the building fund of St. Matthew's Church, which when finished, was valued at \$41.30 and with donation of \$10.00 in cash, made a total of \$51.30 sent.

Clothing was made up for the Protestant Infants' Home and Hervey Institute.

In answer to an appeal from the Y.M.C.A., to unite with the ladies of other churches in furnishing their new building, a collection was taken up amounting to \$190.55.

During the autumn, our time was almost entirely given to work for the Industrial Bazaar. The value of work sent was \$157.95, also special collection amounting to \$173.50, and proceeds from "Children's Tea Party," \$32.35, making a total value of \$363.80.

There were given to the Day Nursery, two pieces of cotton cloth, also distributed among the poor 42 made up garments, 6 pairs of shoes, 17 yards of material and some parcels of tweed samples.

At the request of the Woman's Presbyterian Missionary Society that we should form an Auxiliary Society, to be of a specially missionary nature and to co-operate with them in their work, it was thought advisable not to form a separate organization, but simply add the word "Missionary," to the name of the present Society and to appoint office-bearers to take charge of this special branch of the work.

It was with sincere regret we received the signation of Mrs. Tasker, as president, and would express our keen sense of the loss

St. Paul's Church Ladies' Missionary Zuxiliary.

St. Paul's Church Missionary Auxiliary in connection with the Ladies' Aid Society, was organized in March, 1891, and a scheme of work, by means of circles, comprising from one to four families agreed upon. A few garments were made in the spring, the material being contributed by the Dorcas and were given to the nurse, Miss McSween, to be distributed among the city poor. In December, boxes were sent to four missionaries in the North-West, recommended to us by the Rev. Dr. Robertson. Eleven circles have already been formed and are at present engaged on clothing, to be given to the nurse connected with the Presbyterian Woman's Missionary Society. Owing to the Auxiliary being organized so late in the year, our report of work is necessarily short, but we trust that in the coming year, our numbers will increase and our capacity for helpfulness be thereby much enlarged.
