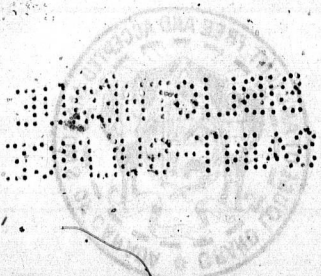

The Grand Lodge was opened in AMPLE FORM at half-past two o'clock, afternoon, in the Drill Shed, and from thence the brethren marched in procession, preceded by the Band of the 7th Fusiliers, to the site of the proposed Temple on the north-west corner of Richmond and King Streets.

The front of the procession having reached the site, a halt was made, and the ranks opened out and faced inwards, when the Grand Master, supported by the Grand Officers, passed through to the north-east corner, where a platform had been erected for their convenience.

R. W. Bro. the Rev. Wm. Hay then offered up the following prayer.

V. W. Bro. R. Lewis, President of the Masonic Temple Company then addressed the Grand Master, as follows:— Most Worshipful Sir.—“I have been deputed by the Directors of the Masonic Temple Company to present you with this trowel, as a slight testimonial of our esteem for you personally, and in commemoration of the important work to which you have kindly lent your aid today.”

The trowel, which was a very beautiful specimen of the silver-smith's handiwork, bore the following inscription:

Presented to

JAS. A. HENDERSON, Esq., Q. C.,

Most Worshipful Grand Master

of the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. Masons of Canada,

on the occasion of his laying the Corner Stone

of the Masonic Temple, London, Ontario,

5th August, A. L. 5880.

In receiving the handsome gift, the Grand Master said:— “Accept my thanks for this beautiful trowel which you have presented to me. I receive it with pleasure, and shall retain it as a pleasing memento of the work so happily begun. The passing of

the trowel among Freemasons as well as among operative masons is an emblem of fraternal feeling. In that sense I accept the gift, with the fervent wish that we may ever continue to be a society of friends and brothers, among whom no contention should ever arise, but that noble contention, or rather emulation, of who can best work and best agree."

The cement having been spread, the upper stone was lowered with three halts, at which intervals the band played bars of the National Anthem; when it had been guided into its place, the Grand Junior Warden applied the plumb-rule, the Grand Senior Warden the level, and the deputy Grand Master the square, and they having reported that the stone was just, true, and properly laid, the Grand Master said, "Having full confidence in your skill in our royal art, it remains for me to finish the work." He then struck the stone three times with the gavel and said: "*Well made, truly laid, true and trusty*; may this undertaking be conducted and completed by the craftsmen, according to the grand plan, in Peace, Harmony and Brotherly Love."

As they were handed to him, he poured out the customary libations, saying: "I strew corn upon the stone as an emblem of Plenty, I pour wine on it as the emblem of Cheerfulness, and I anoint it with oil as the emblem of Comfort and Consolation. May corn, wine, and oil, and all the necessaries of life, abound among men, throughout the world, and may the blessing of the Supreme Architect of the universe be upon this edifice, and all connected with it."

Response: So mote it be.

The implements having been handed to the W.M.G.M., he presented them to the Architect, saying: "The foundation stone of this building being now laid, I present you the implements applied to it, also the plans, in full confidence that, as a skilful and faithful workman, you will use them in such a manner, that the building may arise in order, harmony and beauty, being per-



ected in beauty and strength, that it may answer every purpose for which it is intended, to your credit and the satisfaction and honor of those who have selected you for the work."

The M. W. the Grand Master then delivered the following address:

Men and Brethren here assembled,—On special invitation, the Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of Canada have met to take part with me in laying the corner stone of an edifice which will not only be a memorial of the zeal, enterprise and architectural taste of the brethren of this flourishing city of the Western peninsula—"the Garden of Canada" but which will prove to be one of, if not the finest, of the buildings in your city. As the Grand Master of an Order, venerated for its antiquity and respected for its history and good works, I am proud to be in a position to show my esteem for the brethren of this city, and to mark my approbation of the commendable efforts of a body of Free Masons who have the courage and self-reliance to enter on the erection of so noble a Masonic Temple. The full representation here to-day of the Grand Lodge, and the goodly array of the brethren clothed in "purple and blue," show that the occasion of laying the corner stone with the ceremonial peculiar to our craft has called forth the general feeling of good will, sympathy and encouragement. The large assembly proves that the laying of the corner stone of a building like the one in progress ought to be celebrated by due ceremonial. Dignity and importance are added to the occasion, and the public see that there are legitimate authorities on whom a call may be made for the discharge of such duties. The ceremonies of this day convey to the brethren a meaning appropriate to the occasion, and awaken in the heart of the most stolid and indifferent person feelings of respect and veneration. Indeed, to those who are not Masons this day's proceedings must create a regard for an Order which justly claims the Bible for its guide, and takes care that every ceremony has a meaning and a tendency to impress on the mind the many excellencies which adorn our profession. From the elevation and

plans of the intended structure produced to me, I am enabled to judge of the handsome appearance the Masonic Temple will have when reared in our midst, and I consider this day's celebration an event not only in Masonic, but in architectural history. Custom, time-honoured, has enjoined that on auspicious occasions like the present, a few short and general remarks should be made respecting the ancient and honourable fraternity of Freemasons; an Order which is defined as a science which includes all other sciences, but more especially that which teaches a knowledge of ourselves, and the duties we owe to God and man. It awakens in our minds feelings of brotherly love and universal benevolence, and it endeavours to promote peace in raising the structure of moral duties, and in refraining from allowing differences of opinion to disturb good feeling. In a word, it is calculated to produce the greatest public good and private blessing. Hence it is impossible to practice the science of Freemasonry without becoming better men. It is an institution which binds together those who have no other bonds of union and enforces the practice of universal benevolence on those whose differences of religious and perhaps political opinions would, were it not for the Order, make them regard one another as enemies and not as brethren. It places all Masons on a level. It teaches us to promote the same great end, without offending each other in word or action. Freemasonry inculcates due obedience to the laws of the country in which we reside. On our entrance into the Brotherhood, I may say on the very threshold of the Order, we were instructed to conform with cheerfulness to the Government of the country in which we live. Let us, then, as Free and Accepted Masons of Canada, testify our respect and love for the Sovereign of these happy realms by giving three hearty cheers for the Queen—God bless her!

Three hearty cheers were then given, in accordance with the Grand Master's wishes, after which two verses of the National Anthem were sung by the Brethren.

The procession was then reformed, and the brethren returned to the Drill Shed, and the Grand Lodge having been closed in

The Grand Lodge having been opened in FORM at high twelve Rt. W. Bro. J. M. Meakins stated that he had been deputed by the M. Worshipful the Grand Master to perform the ceremony of laying the Corner Stone of St. John's Episcopal Church, about to be erected at Rockwood.

A procession was formed in accordance with the regulations as laid down in the Constitution of the Grand Lodge, and proceeded to the site of the Church, when a halt was made, and the ranks opened out and faced inwards, when the Acting Grand Master, supported by the Grand Officers, passed to the North-east corner of the building, where a platform had been erected for the Grand Officers and brethren.

At this part of the ceremony Bro. the Rev. W. J. Pigott, on behalf of the Building Committee of the Church, presented the acting Grand Master with a beautiful Silver Trowel, suitably engraved.

The Acting Grand Master expressed his sincere thanks for the beautiful gift, and remarked that nothing but a kindly and fraternal feeling dictated its presentation, and assured the Rev. gentleman that he would ever retain it as an honored memento of the day's proceedings.

The Acting Grand Master having spread the mortar, the stone was lowered with three halts. When placed in its proper position, the Deputy Grand Master and Wardens tested the stone with the Square, Level, and Plumb, and the Grand Master pronounced it well made and truly laid. Corn, wine and oil were poured upon it with symbolical explanation, and the Acting Grand Master entrusted to the architect and builders the tools and plans with which to complete the building.

The procession was then reformed, and the Brethren returned to the temporary Lodge Room, and the Grand Lodge having been closed in FORM, the visiting brethren were escorted to the Town Hall and hospitably entertained.

Mills, was laid by Dr. James A. Henderson, Q.C., M.W.G.M. of A. F. &  
A. M. of Canada, assisted by the Grand Officers and a large number of the  
Brethren, with the usual ceremonies and usages of the Order.

The Scroll with copies of the leading newspapers and some  
current coin of the Dominion, were enclosed in a tin box and  
placed in the cavity of the stone.

At this part of the ceremony, the minister in charge presented  
the Grand Master with a solid silver trowel.

On receiving the trowel the Grand Master said he received the  
gift with pleasure, and should retain it as a pleasing memento of  
the work so happily begun.

The necessary mortar being laid, the Grand Master said :—I

spread this cement as an emblem of that cement of peace and good-will which I trust will ever prevail among those who may worship in this edifice about to be erected.

The upper stone was then lowered to its proper position with the usual ceremonies.

The Grand Master then delivered the following address :—

**MEN AND BRETHREN.**—At the request of the clergyman and congregation of this Church and being also called thereto by the Worshipful Master and Brethren of the Prince of Wales, Lodge, No. 146, I have laid according to Masonic usage the corner stone of a sacred edifice dedicated to the service of the Most High. It is a source of great pleasure that as Grand Master of the Honorable Fraternity of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons, I have been asked to lay the corner stone of a building which is intended for the public worship of that Great Being whom we as Masons are taught to reverence and adore, from the very moment we enter on the threshold of Masonry. We publicly acknowledge that while performing our time-hallowed mysteries, God's Holy Book is ever open to our view and its contents are impressed on our hearts. The Mason who acts up to its principles which are so continually inculcated, must be a good moral and religious man. As Masons we have set apart this building for the worship of God, and we fervently pray that His blessing may rest upon all those who worship within its walls, may the pastor who officiates win perishing souls from the evils of this world, and the congregation exercise a true spirit of devotion and be imbued with that blessed desire of living peacefully with all men. This is one of the principles of a true Mason. Freemasonry is no new society sprung, within a few years, into existence, but it has its foundations in by-gone ages, and still pursues its onward course. What has preserved it through so many vicissitudes? What has kept it ever flourishing but that gift of brotherly love, without which all must hasten to ruin, and when "Brotherly love" is followed by "Relief" and "Truth", an edifice is completed, founded on a rock which malice cannot shake or time destroy. Some here assembled may ask, why, if there is

any good in the Order of Freemasonry, do not the brethren let the world at large be informed of it, and so let all share in Masonic knowledge? I assert that to every intelligent man, when properly vouched for, and who can prove himself worthy, are our mysteries, under proper cautions, revealed. However humble he may be in the walks of life, however little he may possess of this world's goods, no man is debarred from entering our order, our care being that the honor and credit of our Society may not be diminished by unworthy admissions. Men of good and sound morals are what we require and expect. It must not be forgotten that Freemasonry includes a multitude of men of every rank and every shade of moral and political feeling. In the different handicrafts, trades and businesses those only who by diligent attention and labor have proved themselves fit, can attain to that knowledge of their business which will crown their labors with success; and do these men proclaim abroad their trade secrets? Is not the apprentice-bound to keep the secrets of his master, and not to tell the art and mystery of his trade? It is through the efforts our Society has made to communicate the advantages of the fraternity to good and reliable men, and to these alone, that our predecessors have been enabled to transmit to us an ancient and honorable order. To my brethren let me address a few words. Freemasonry will not make a lasting impression, if we do not act up to our principles and so let the world at large see that our service is not mere lip service, that the principles we recommend others to adopt and follow out are practised by ourselves, that the brotherly love we recommend to others is acted up to by ourselves; in all these lies the true secret of Masonic success. Other Societies which have been formed, in many respects in imitation of our order, have only had a short-lived prosperity. That we have been enabled to survive through so many seasons of adversity; that the ring of "the working tools" is being heard wheresoever intellectual man exists, are proofs that the great moral truths of the order are not only professed but practised. In our intercourse with each other let us never lose remembrance of the duties inculcated by the Five points of fellowship. These duties can be carried into our every day life and if persevered in, will add strength and

cohesion to the order, and prove to the world that we are truly a band of Brothers.

Let all here assembled never forget the blessings we enjoy, living in a land where all have equal civil and religious privileges, and as Canadians proud of our country, attached to our homes and devoted subjects of a beloved Sovereign, we cannot better make progress towards closing the auspicious ceremonies of the day than by giving three hearty cheers, aye three times three, for the Queen, God bless her."

The procession then re-formed and returned to the Lodge Room, and the Grand Lodge was closed in AMPLE FORM. The Brethren, together with a large number of friends repaired to the adjoining grove, where a liberal supply of refreshments were provided, after which addresses were given by the Grand Master, Acting Grand Chaplain, and the Rev. A. Young, and the Rev. James Cormack.

R. W. Bro. John Nettleton informed the Brethren that the M. W. Grand Master had deputed him, as his representative, to take charge of the ceremonies of laying the foundation stone of a Methodist Episcopal Church, Meaford.

The Grand Lodge was opened in FORM at half-past two o'clock, afternoon.

A procession was then formed, as provided by the Constitution, under the guidance of the Acting Director of Ceremonies, and headed by the band, marched to the site of the new building, where they were received by the Rev. R. Large, pastor of the congregation.

The Church Choir then began the ceremony by singing the beautiful anthem, "The Lord is my light," after which the acting Grand Chaplain offered up a prayer, and an address was delivered by the Acting Grand Master. The Acting Grand Secretary then read the following scroll :

### The Corner Stone of this Methodist Episcopal Church,

erected by the Congregation and their friends for the worship of the Most High, was laid by R. W. Bro. John Nettleton, Esq., D. D. G. M. of the Georgian District, Acting Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M., of Canada, attended and assisted by Officers of the Grand Lodge, and a large concourse of the Brethren, and in accordance with the ceremonies and usages of the Order.

Which may the Great Architect of the Universe ever protect and prosper.

The Acting Grand Master then deposited in the cavity of the stone :

The parchment inscription.

List of the officers and members of Pythagoras Lodge.

Names of the principal members of the Church.

Coins of the realm.

Copies of the *Globe*, *Mail*, *Christian Advocate* and *Meaford Monitor*

The different documents having been deposited, the Acting Grand Superintendent covered the cavity with a copper plate, with an inscription giving the date of the laying of the stone, and by whom it was laid.



The ladies of the congregation presented the Acting Grand Master with a Silver Trowel, suitably engraved.

The stone was then lowered into its place with the usual ceremonies, the band playing the National Anthem.

The following address was then delivered by the Acting Grand Chaplain, Bro. the Rev. S. A. Dean :—

M. W. SIR AND BRETHREN :

I need scarcely say that it affords me much pleasure to be present on this very interesting occasion, and to address you on matters pertaining alike to the interests of the Church of God and the Order of A. F. & A. M., both of which institutions I have the honor to represent, and to which I am bound by ties the strongest and most sacred. I am to-day, sir, proud of the position I occupy in the Church of Christ, which he has purchased with his own blood, and in the ancient and honorable order under whose auspices this ceremony has been thus far successfully conducted. I stand here to-day as the advocate of religion and its handmaid, Freemasonry. To some with whom I was acquainted when stationed in your beautiful little town, my appearance in this company, and wearing this masonic apron may be matter for surprise ; but to all these friends let me say, that while I glory in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, I am proud also to be permitted to wear the lambskin apron of a mason. Its touch conveys no pollution ; its color speaks for its purity ; to wear it is no disgrace. I am glad to wear it to-day as the distinguishing badge of a mason ; more ancient than the Golden Fleece or Roman eagle ; more honorable than the Star and Garter, or any other order in existence. I wear it as the badge of innocence and the bond of friendship, and I fear no disgrace from contact with it, nay, I am well assured that if I never disgrace this badge, it will never disgrace me. He who wears it the most worthily is best described as a gentleman, a Mason and a christian. Freemasonry is not religion, nor is religion Freemasonry, and yet both teach the same truths, though in different forms. Ignorant and malicious persons have stigmatized

Freemasonry as organized infidelity, but the man who has passed the portals of the Lodge knows better than that. The three great principles on which Freemasonry is founded are Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth. And these are the fundamental principles on which the Church of God is built. Love to the brotherhood of mankind, relief to the distressed, and truth in its highest and noblest forms are taught in every branch of the Christian Church. Thus it is seen that Freemasonry is the handmaid of Christianity. I have no hesitation in giving utterance to this sentiment, which has been proven by the past experience of every mason, that the more earnest and devoted as a christian a man is, the better mason he will be; and the more carefully and efficiently a mason performs his allotted task, the more intelligent and devoted Christian will he become, and it is upon this common ground that we stand when as a Lodge and a Church we together enter upon work of so important a nature as the laying of a cornerstone. I am glad to know that it is now pronounced well and truly laid, and the wish of the Lodge and myself is, that on the foundation here laid, a superstructure may be erected perfect in all its parts and honorable to the builder.

This is no new ceremony which calls us together here to-day. In every age men have erected buildings for public use and in the volume of the sacred law the laying of cornerstones is frequently noticed. The word cornerstone is fifteen times used in the scriptures. The earliest mention of it is made by the Most High himself, in the course of his conversation with Job, in which he asks "where wast thou when I laid the foundations of the earth? Whereupon are the foundations thereof fostered, or who hath laid the cornerstone thereof, when the morning stars sang together and all the sons of God shouted for joy." It appears plain to me that in all ages men have been laying for themselves cornerstones, and I call upon each man here to-day to see that the cornerstone of his christian character be well and truly laid, and then let him take heed how he buildeth thereupon. As I look to-day upon this cornerstone and view the preparations being made for the erection of a house for the worship of the Most High, I am

carried back in imagination to the time of the building of Solomon's Temple at Jerusalem. Here in days to come may be heard the sound of the trowel and the noise of the hammer, but in the erection of that magnificent and superb edifice no sound was heard of hammer, axe or saw. We speak of our boasted civilization, of the perfection to which men have attained in the mechanical arts; of our great superiority over the ancients, but what are the facts. In the 6th chapter of the 1st Book of Kings it is stated that "The house when it was in building was built of stone, made ready before it was brought thither, so that there was neither hammer nor axe, nor any tool of iron heard in the house while it was in building." What modern architect can so arrange his work as this was arranged, in different parts of the country? The stones, many of them of immense size, were hewn in the quarry, then carved, marked and numbered. The timber was felled and prepared in the forests of Lebanon, and conveyed by floats from Tyre to Joppa. The metals were fused and cast on the plain of Zeredatha, after which the whole was conveyed to Jerusalem, and there set up by means of mauls and other implements prepared for that purpose. To give you an idea of the size of these stones, let me give you Dr. Thomson's words concerning some which he saw in the ruins of Baalbec in Syria. He says: "The corresponding surfaces of these stones are squared so truly and polished so smoothly, that the fit is most exact. I was at first entirely deceived, and measured two as one, making it 120 feet long. The joint had to be searched for, and when found, I could not thrust the blade of my knife between the stones."

Spiritualizing the account of the building of Solomon's Temple, we can apply it to the Christian in the world. God fashions a temple above, of which we are represented as stones built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone, of whom it is said, "Behold, I lay in Zion a chief corner stone, elect, precious," and again "The stone which the builders rejected, the same has become the head of the corner." Man as a stone to be fitted for the wall of the temple of the Most High, is well represented by the rough ashlar, which is a

stone, rough and unhewn, as taken from the quarry. Does not this rough stone well represent the mind of man in a primitive state, rough and unpolished, until by the care of his parents and the grace of God his mind becomes cultivated, and he is thereby rendered a fit member of the society of good men. The perfect ashlar is a stone of a true die, square, and fit only to be tried by the square and compasses. Surely this well represents the mind of a man at the close of a life of trust on the Son of God, a life spent in acts of piety and virtue, which he is not afraid to try by the square of God's Word and the compasses of his own conscience. But before the rough can be changed to the perfect ashlar, much labor must be expended upon it to bring it to a state of perfection. It must be cleansed from the soil which surrounds it; the rough jagged edges must be worn off; various excrescences upon it must be removed, and it must be polished until it has lost all traces of its former roughness. And what are the instruments by which the rough is changed into the perfect ashlar? The careful workman has his tools with which he makes the necessary alterations in the form of the stone, that it may be fitted for its place in the wall. These instruments include, among others, the square, the mallet or gavel, and the chisel. And the Great Architect of the Universe has his instruments by means of which he effects the necessary changes in the living stone that it may become fitted for its place in the temple of God above. The stone must be squared by

1. *His Word.* This is the only and sufficient rule of our practice. God has given it to us that by a careful study of its pages we may learn how far we yet come short of that perfection to which it is our privilege to attain, and may take the proper steps towards the accomplishment of it. He uses also the gavel of

2. *His Spirit.* Without it all other instruments would utterly fail. Even the Word itself unless accompanied by the Spirit will be of little or no service, we must have some supernatural influence brought to bear upon us, or we shall not become highly polished stones, fit for the temple of our God. I pray God that on this assembly the Spirit may so effectually perform His work that all

roughness may disappear and we be smoothed and fitted for the place which it is our duty to fill. But the Great Architect of the Universe uses also the chisel of

3. *His providential dispensations.* Closely and carefully does he cut, taking off a little here and a little there, till the stone once unshapely and unsightly shall become fully prepared for its position. Here he strikes a light blow and there a heavy one, but so infinitely correct is his judgment that in the midst of the suffering which the blows bring to us, we are compelled to admit that "He hath done all things well." The pressure brought to bear upon us is sometimes very heavy, in fact so heavy that it is made a test of the quality of the stone. If the stone be good it will bear the pressure, and the blows, but if spurious the strokes will reveal the fact. Are we such living stones, bearing patiently the affliction sent upon us! If so we can rejoice with Paul that "Our light affliction, which is but for a moment, worketh for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory." I notice also that the stones were made ready before they were brought to the temple, so that there was no sound of axe, hammer nor any other tool of iron within the temple precincts, and just so it is with the christian. His training is all done here. Here, at a distance from the temple above, the rough edges are smoothed by the cares and afflictions of this life. Here all the preparations for our place in the wall of the heavenly Zion are made. Let me urge upon all the necessity of seeing to it that you are prepared for the wall of the Temple of the King of Kings.

In conclusion I would give expression to the wish of the members of Grand and Subordinate Lodges here represented, that the work to-day begun under such favorable circumstances may be brought to a successful completion, and that the Divine Shekinah may enter at its dedication, and remain until all the house shall be filled with the glory of the Lord, and may we one and all perform carefully our allotted tasks while it is yet day, and so conduct ourselves that when the hour of death shall come, the Lord of Life

will enable us to trample the king of terrors beneath our feet and lift our eyes to the bright Morning Star, whose rising brings peace and salvation to the faithful and obedient of the human race. May we act according to the laws of the Divine Creator, that when we shall be summoned from this sublunary abode we may ascend to the temple above, where the G. A. of the U. lives and reigns for ever."

The procession was then re-formed, and the brethren returned to the Lodge Room, and the Grand Lodge was closed in FORM, after prayer, at half-past five o'clock, afternoon.

The upper stone being properly placed, after having been lowered by the regular halts, the Grand Master then instructed the

Acting Grand Junior Warden to apply the Plumb, the Acting Grand Senior Warden the Level, and the Acting Deputy Grand Master the Square.

Grand Master.—“Brother Grand Junior Warden, what is the proper Jewel of your office?”

Grand Junior Warden.—“The Plumb Rule, Most Worshipful Sir.”

Grand Master.—“Have you applied the Plumb to the edges of the stone?”

Grand Junior Warden.—“I have, Most Worshipful Sir, and the craftsmen have done their duty.”

The same questions as to the Level and Square, with a like response, were put to and given by the Acting Grand Senior Warden and the Acting Deputy Grand Master. The Grand Master said: “Brethren, having full confidence in your skill in our Royal Art it remains with me now to finish the work.” He then gave the stone three knocks with the Gavel, and said: “Well made, well proved, truly laid, true and trusty, and may this undertaking be conducted and completed by the Craftsmen, according to the Grand Plan, in Peace, Harmony and Brotherly Love.”

Response: “So mote it be.”

Corn, Wine and Oil were then handed him, and as he poured out the customary libations, said: “I strew Corn upon the stone as an emblem of plenty; I pour Wine on it as an emblem of cheerfulness; and I anoint it with Oil as an emblem of comfort and consolation. May Corn, Wine and Oil, and all the necessities of life, abound among men, and may the blessing of the Supreme Architect of the Universe be upon this edifice and all connected with it.”

Response: “So mote it be.”

The plans having been handed to the Grand Master, he presented them to the Architect, saying: "The foundation of this building being now laid, I present to you the implements applied to it, also the plans, in full confidence that, as a skilful and faithful workman, you will use them in such a manner that the building may rise in order and harmony, being perfected in beauty and strength."

He also addressed the revered incumbent as follows:—"Having completed our work according to ancient usage, I now wish that every success may attend your and the congregations zealous endeavors to erect a church which will be a credit to your parish; that, as the work has been happily begun, it will, with God's blessing, be carried to a happy ending; and may your parishioners be ever reminded of their duty to God and man."

The grand honors having been given according to ancient custom, the Acting Grand Superintendent of Works proceeded to make a collection for the workmen, while the Acting Grand Organist, Bro. Prof. Workman, assisted by the choir, rendered "The Church's One Foundation" very effectively, and at its conclusion the Grand Master re-ascended the platform and spoke as follows:—

#### MEN AND BRETHREN HERE ASSEMBLED:

It is an ancient Masonic custom, on closing the ceremony of laying the cornerstone, for the Brother in whose hand the gavel of authority for the time being may be placed, to offer a few remarks pertinent to the occurrence. It is my duty as Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of Canada, to perform that grateful task. We are here clothed in the working apparel of the ancient and honorable fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons, to lay with the honors peculiar to the craft the cornerstone of an Anglican Church for the worship of the Most High. The large number of Freemasons met together, the godly array of clergymen, and the very great concourse of people surrounding this platform show not only the great interest taken in

this day's proceedings, but also the desire to encourage those who have so zealously set their hands to forward this laudable work, the building of St. James' Church. For ages past Freemasonry has been a zealous worker in rearing for the Church those truly wonderful Cathedrals and edifices which adorn not only the continent of Europe but our Mother land. Wherever you see that beautiful order of architecture, the Gothic, remember that it is a gift of Freemasonry to the Church. From the time when our Grand Master, Solomon, erected that splendid temple on Mount Moriah, to the present day have Freemasons taken part in the glorious work of building those wondrous and majestic structures within which man breathes his prayers of peace and gladness. It is to our predecessors in the craft that mankind is indebted for those stupendous monuments of human skill, the Pyramids of Egypt, which, though many thousands of years have passed away, still exist; the colossal ruins of Memphis and Thebe; of Baalbec and Palmyra, testify to the amazing skill of the ancient builders. There exists in the minds of those who are unconnected with our order, erroneous ideas that Freemasonry is incompatible with religion. I fearlessly and openly assert that the connection between the two is absolute and cannot be severed or destroyed. Our order contributes to promote the social happiness of man in this world by the practice of every virtue. Religion promotes happiness in a future state. Hence masonry must be considered the handmaid of religion, because the practice of virtue, though it cannot absolutely save, is an essential condition of salvation. To be a good and perfect Mason, not only a thorough knowledge of the volume of the Sacred Law is essential, but there must be an acting up to and a carrying out of the precepts contained in that Holy Book. It is first recommended to the serious contemplation of every Mason, and he is charged to consider it as the unerring standard of truth and justice, and to regulate his actions by the divine precepts it contains. Though our order is universally accessible to all mankind without subjecting them to hear the discussion of tenents which are revolting to their feelings or alien to any preconceived notions which they might entertain respecting systems of religious worship, yet many among us see a christian

application of Freemasonry. No other religion that ever existed taught the sublime doctrine and practiced those amiable precepts which command us not to hide ourselves from our own flesh nor to shut up our bowels of mercy, but to show not only justice, equality and integrity, but mercy and compassion, every man to his brother. The forms and symbols in our lodges, co-eval with the earlier ages, have to many of us, like the Holy Bible, a christian reference. As a christian mason, and with no desire to obtrude these views on others, I cannot omit alluding to that beautiful exhortation which impresses itself on the mind of every widow's son, "That within us there resides a vital and immortal principle which inspires a holy confidence that the Lord of Life will enable us to trample the king of terrors beneath our feet, and lift up our eyes to that bright morning star whose rising brings peace and salvation to the faithful and obedient of the human race." Every Mason who is a follower of the meek and lowly Jesus, sees beyond the universal and acknowledged meaning, a reference to the risen Saviour of mankind, though others of our brethren consider its application as pointing to a Princely Messiah yet to come. Our brethren, whether Jew, Mahomadan, or Hindoo, may and do take different roads to travel to those realms of bliss, where the world's Great Architect presides and rules for ever. I now conclude by invoking the blessing of the Almighty upon the members of this church, that each may be a lively stone in the spiritual temple; and upon our ancient craft, that the blessing of heaven may rest on all Free and Accepted Masons over the world, and enable them to carry out the great aim of the order, "Peace and good will to all mankind."

At the conclusion of the address, the Grand Master called upon the Brethren, and others present, to give three cheers for "our Sovereign, the Queen," which was responded to with a hearty good will.

The procession then re-formed in the same order as before, and marched back to the Lodge Room, where Grand Lodge was closed in AMPLE FORM. Subsequently, and at the invitation of the ladies

of the congregation, the Brethren marched in procession, headed by the band, to the Drill Hall, where a splendid luncheon was in readiness, and it is needless to say that ample justice was done to the good things provided by the ladies, who exerted themselves and were equal to the task of serving all with refreshments so that profit and pleasure was the result.

The Grand Lodge was opened in FORM at half-past eleven o'clock, forenoon, by R. W. Bro. James Stephenson, M. D., Past D. D. G. M., who stated that he had been deputed by Most Worshipful, the Grand Master, at the request of the Master and Brethren of Friendly Brothers Lodge, No. 143, Iroquis, to perform the ceremony of laying the Corner Stone of the Canada Methodist Church, about to be erected at Dundela.

A procession was formed in accordance with the regulations, as laid down in the Constitution of Grand Lodge, and proceeded to the site of the church, when a halt was made, and the ranks opened out and faced inward, when the Acting Grand Master, R. W. Bro. James Stephenson, M. D., supported by the Grand Officers, passed to the corner of the building, where a platform had been erected for the Grand Officers and the brethren.

The Most Worshipful the Grand Master replied as follows :

It brings together, in the different localities, those brethren whom one would hardly meet if Grand Lodge was held in one city, and there is no doubt that the meetings of Grand Lodge always leave behind them pleasant recollections. You have alluded to my having filled the Grand Master's chair for two years with satisfaction to the craft. It is, indeed, a source of much gratification to me that I have so acted as to win the esteem of my brethren and fellows, and the present prosperity of the Order bears testimony to the successful and prudent legislation of the Grand Lodge. I can only hope that as the Grand Lodge has so happily met, so may we part, nothing happening to disturb the general harmony of our proceedings, and may we and the Hamilton brethren ever retain a pleasant recollection of this Grand Lodge meeting.

## GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

The Most Worshipful the Grand Master delivered the following address to the Brethren assembled in Grand Communication :—

BRETHREN OF GRAND LODGE :—Time, in its ceaseless onward flight, has again brought us together in our fraternal council. Prosperity and harmony, the strength and support of all institutions, prevail, for which we render devout acknowledgment to the Supreme Ruler, in whose might we are strong, and without whom, in our best and highest estate, we are but frail and feeble beings.

The mission of our order is truly that of peace and good will ; we have nothing to do with political turmoil, with the conflicts of contending parties in the state, or with the aggressive attempts of nations. Freemasonry, as properly understood, is not only a principle of systematic coherence founded on charity and sympathy, but a brotherhood of men who desire to promote the intellectual enlightenment and moral advancement of each other, to the honor of the Great Architect of the universe. It is a satisfaction to know that if imperfections are to be found among us, the order itself countenances no departure from the rules of rectitude and propriety ; the very clouds which occasionally obscure our horizon remind us of the rays of light behind, which augur a forthcoming glorious noon. With these principles before us let us then take counsel together as to the best means of advancing the work for which we are here associated, and so carry out the designs left by our predecessors on the Masonic Trestle-board.

But while with grateful hearts we render thanks, we are bowed with grief when announcing that the hues of mourning have rested on the dais of the Grand Lodge. Death has removed from our midst one whose presence always brought pleasure to our hearts, one whose brotherly grip will ever be remembered, a brother who aided and guided us by his marked wisdom, in our deliberations, and whose wise counsels tended to the advancement of the order ; the Most Worshipful Brother, William Henry Weller, Past Grand

Master, departed this life on the 28th of March last, at his residence in Cobourg. He was laid to rest by the Brethren of his Lodge, and the deputations from the Grand Lodge and many Lodges, show the esteem in which our brother was held. The Most Worshipful Brother was initiated into Masonry on the 20th of January, 1846, in St. Andrew's Lodge, Toronto. He was elected Worshipful Master of St. John's Lodge, Cobourg, in 1856 and thrice filled the chair, attentive and zealous. The members of this Grand Lodge placed him in the highest position to be attained, and elected him Grand Master in the years 1877 and 1878. We mourn his loss, but with the hope that his future, like his life, is one of peace.

I notice, with deep regret, that Right Worshipful Brother, James V. Mackey, our late representative to the Grand Lodge of Ireland, died on the 15th of November, A.D. 1880; a brother beloved and respected by all who knew him, and who, by his repeated acts of kindness and attention, endeared himself to the Canadian Brethren.

While on an errand of mercy the late Right Worshipful Brother William Mostyn, Past District Deputy Grand Master for the Ottawa District, met an accidental death by drowning on the 29th of March last; he was a Brother distinguished for his zeal and love for Freemasonry. In the pride of manhood, in the fullness of health, he was suddenly called away and we shall know him no more.

To our sister Grand Lodges who have been called on to mourn the loss of distinguished Officers, and worthy members, we extend our fraternal sympathy and heartfelt condolence.

A few days ago a shudder was felt in every breast when the intelligence was flashed throughout the land that an attempt had been made on the life of the Chief Magistrate of the neighboring Republic. Our heart-felt sympathies have been echoed in his behalf, and as lovers of order and as men who are taught to conform with cheerfulness to the government under which we live, we



deprecate the dastardly attempt of the assassin, and trust that God in his mercy will vouchsafe to the President of the United States a speedy restoration to health, and that what now appears a sad affliction may be the means of further increasing towards him the respect and affection of the nation over which he presides.

In pursuance of the authority granted at the last Communication of the Grand Lodge, I have signed the Warrants for the following Lodges:—

Kinistino Lodge, No. 381, Prince Albert, North West Territories.

Doric Lodge, No. 382, Hamilton, County of Wentworth.

Henderson Lodge, No. 383, West Winchester, County of Dundas.

Alpha Lodge, 384, Parkdale, County of York.

Spry Lodge, No. 385, Beeton, County of Simcoe.

Acting on the recommendation of the Board, I continued until this session, the dispensations for the McColl Lodge at West Lorne, and for the Lansdown Lodge at Lansdown.

I have granted dispensations for the hereinafter mentioned Lodges:

On 24th September, 1880.—Henderson Lodge, at Ilderton, in the County of Middlesex.

On 7th December, 1880.—Crystal Fountain Lodge, at North Augusta, in the County of Grenville.

On 11th February, 1881.—Florence Lodge, at Florence, in the County of Lambton.

On 15th February, 1881.—Morpeth Lodge, at Ridgetown, in the County of Both well.

On 17th February, 1881.—Huron Lodge, at Camlachie, in the County of Lambton.

On 5th March, 1881.—Cedar Lodge, at Warton, in the County of Bruce.

On 17th March, 1881.—Forest Lodge, at Chesley, in the County of Bruce.

On 7th April, 1881.—King Solomon Lodge, at Thamesford, in the County of Oxford.

On 9th June, 1881.—Parvaim Lodge, at Comber, in the County of Essex.

In each case I have been assured that the Officers appointed to take charge are intelligent and trustworthy Brethren.

I declined to grant a dispensation for a Lodge at Eden Grove, the District Deputy Grand Master for the Huron District not recommending the petition.

During the past year Corinthian Lodge, No. 51, Grahamville, and Enterprise Lodge, No. 310, Beachburg, have surrendered their Warrants. The former Lodge has not made any return to Grand Lodge since 24th June, 1873, and the latter owing to the removal of a number of its members, and other causes, found it impossible to continue in active working.

The relations of this Grand Lodge with other Grand Lodges have continued to be most harmonious, the usual interchange of proceedings has been made, and nothing has occurred to interrupt the harmony which has so long prevailed.

The much regretted difficulties between the Grand Lodges of New York and Connecticut are, I am happy to say, in a fair way of being removed, and we must rejoice that there is every prospect of a renewal of a fraternal spirit and intercourse between those venerable bodies.

The Grand Lodge of Scotland and the Grand Lodge of Quebec have entered on a course of action which will result in an interchange of representatives, based on the lasting feelings of a generous and mutual respect.

I have had much pleasure in appointing the following Brethren as our representatives near foreign Grand Lodges:—Right Worshipful Brother Simon B. Newcomb, near the Grand Lodge of New Mexico. Brother Felix Companioni, near the United Grand Lodge of Colon and the Island of Cuba. Right Worshipful Brother Humphry Minchin, near the Grand Lodge of Ireland. Worshipful Brother George F. Moore, near the Grand Lodge of Alabama, in the place of W. Brother, Henry A. Woolf, deceased.

Credentials have been received and accepted to this Grand Lodge, appointing Right Worshipful Brother Peter J. Brown, Representative of the Grand Lodge of New Mexico. Right Worshipful Brother, George H. F. Dartnell, Representative of the United Grand Lodge of Colon and the Island of Cuba. And the Grand Lodge of New Hampshire has been pleased to appoint me their Representative. May it be the means of further strengthening the cords of fraternal feeling which exists between that Grand Lodge and the Grand Lodge of Canada.

In my address of last year, I remarked that it was desirable to see our funds increased, not merely for the sake of accumulation, but that our circle of Benevolence may be still more enlarged. I have now the gratification of being able to announce that the payments during the period ending 31st May last, to the Widows and Orphans, and to distressed Masons, amounted to \$12,408.75, and yet our Funds have increased by \$2,628.76, our invested funds and cash balance on 31st May, 1881, being \$63,401.00. Truly the Grand Lodge of Canada is rewarded for its relieving with liberal hands the many objects of tender solicitude and compassion. I shall not further allude to our monetary affairs as the Financial Statements of the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary, full and complete in matters of detail, with the Report of the Board on Audit and Finance, will be laid before you.

Goderich Lodge, No. 33, and Maitland Lodge, No. 112, both held in the town of Goderich, submitted for my consideration and action, an application recommended by the District Deputy Grand Master of the Huron District, that these Lodges should be consolidated, the warrants surrendered, and a new special charter issued. I held that the whole matter should come before the Grand Lodge, as that body only could issue a warrant. The consolidation of Lodges in other towns and places has been suggested, and I believe that if properly carried out it would in many instances inspire more energy into the work where it now languishes, and tend to advance the interests and well-being of our order. I have deemed it a matter of such importance that I place before you a course of proceedings which may be adopted as the ground work of additions to our Constitution on the subject of consolidation of Lodges.

Two or more Lodges having concurrent or adjoining jurisdiction may consolidate and become one Lodge, under the name and number of the lodge so consolidating whose charter was first issued, upon the consent of two-thirds of the members of each Lodge present, voting at a regular meeting of the respective Lodges, and there not being seven brethren who oppose the consolidation, they being members of the Lodge whose warrant would be surrendered. The vote for such consolidation shall be had in the several Lodges desiring consolidation, at the regular meetings thereof, respectively, held nearest together in point of time. At least eight days notice of such proposed consolidation shall be given all members of each Lodge, residing within their respective jurisdictions, and the Lodge so continuing shall take possession of and own all books, papers, jewels, furniture, funds, credits and other property of the Lodges so consolidated, and shall assume their liabilities, and shall have exclusive personal jurisdiction over all the members, rejected and unfinished material, as well as all suspended and expelled members of the Lodge so consolidated. When the Lodges shall have consolidated as aforesaid, the approval of the proceeding by the District Deputy Grand Master having jurisdiction shall be obtained, and by him sent to the

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Grand Secretary, and the Secretary of each of the Lodges so consolidated shall within 30 days from the date of such consolidation transmit to the Grand Secretary a duly authenticated copy of all the proceedings held in his Lodge in connection with such consolidation, and at the same time the Lodge or Lodges losing its or their identity in consequence of such consolidation, shall transmit to the Grand Secretary its or their warrant or warrants, and such transmission shall be deemed a surrender thereof. All the members of the Lodge or Lodges so losing its or their identity shall be and become members of the Lodge so continuing, and subject to the By-laws and discipline of such continuing Lodge, in like manner and to the same extent as though his and their membership originated in the Lodge so continuing.

Among the many decisions made by me, the following are the more important :

The Worshipful Master and Brethren of a Lodge proceeded to ballot for a candidate for initiation knowing that no report of a committee on character had been received as the By-laws of the Lodge required. The ballot was not favorable. I held it was too late to take advantage of the irregularity, that the candidate must be held as a rejected candidate and must wait the twelve months before again applying, as is provided for by the constitution.

The warrant of a Lodge having been surrendered to Grand Lodge, I held that I had not the power to order its issue to certain petitioning Brethren, but that it rested with Grand Lodge to allow or refuse its issue.

Certain members having committed an irregularity which called forth a temporary suspension from Masonic privileges, after an investigation had, the brethren regretted the commission of the offence, and on the recommendation of the District Deputy Grand Master, I removed the suspension and restored the brethren to good standing.

I refused to grant a dispensation to initiate a candidate who

had lost the thumb of his right hand; and a candidate who had lost a foot, I held ineligible.

I granted a dispensation to initiate a candidate out of jurisdiction of the Lodge near which he resided, as that Lodge had ceased working, its warrant however, had not been called in or surrendered. I also granted a dispensation for a similar purpose, good and sufficient reasons having been laid before me.

I have visited several Lodges and have seen the work well and carefully exemplified, and the zéal and ability shown fully warranted the commendations I bestowed. Some changes, slight though they may be, I find, have crept in, and as it is some years since the degrees have been worked in Grand Lodge, I consider it would be for the advantage of the Brethren, if during this session steps were taken to remove doubts and restore the ancient purity of our ritual.

I recommed to the favorable notice of the craft, a digest of Masonic jurisprudence just issued. It is the first compilation of Canadian Masonic Law, which has been placed before the brethren, and as such reflects great credit on its author. The matter of this work has been ably collated and edited by Right Worshipful Brother Henry Robertson, for several years Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, and of the Committee on Grievances and Appeals. The book should be in the hands of every brother, for a careful study of its contents, and a reference to the rulings of Grand Masters, and decisions of Grand Lodge, will with the opinions of the editor based as they are on careful research, enable the officers and members of private Lodges to avoid the difficulties which so often arise in the performance of their duties.

The following special communications of the Grand Lodge have been held :—

On the 5th August, 1880, when I laid with Masonic ceremonies, the corner stone of the Masonic Temple in the City of London.

On the 28th October, 1880, when the new hall of Pnyx Lodge, 312, Wallaceburg, was consecrated by Right Worshipful Brother T. C. Macnabb, District Deputy Grand Master.

On the 8th February, 1881, when the new hall of the Corinthian Lodge, 96, Barrie, was consecrated by Right Worshipful Brother James Moffat, Deputy Grand Master.

On the 22nd February, 1881, when the same Right Worshipful Brother consecrated the new hall of King Solomon's Lodge, 43, and Oxtord Lodge, 76, Woodstock.

On the 15th March, 1881, when the new hall of Credit Lodge, Georgetown, was consecrated by Right Worshipful Brother J. M. Meakens, District Deputy Grand Master.

On the 24th May, 1881, when the corner stone of of St. John's (Episcopal) Church, Rockwood, was laid by the same Right Worshipful Brother.

On the 1st June, 1881, when the new hall of Petrolia Lodge, 194, and Washington Lodge, 260, Petrolia, was consecrated by Right Worshipful Brother T. C. Macnabb, District Deputy Grand Master.

On the 2nd June, 1881, when I constituted Alpha Lodge, 384, Parkdale, and consecrated their hall.

On the 16th June, 1881, when I laid the corner stone of a Presbyterian Church at Clark's Mills, in the township of Camden East.

On the 24th June, 1881, when the corner stone of the Methodist Episcopal Church at Meaford, was laid by Right Worshipful Brother John Nettleton, District Deputy Grand Master.

On the 30th June, 1881, when I laid the corner stone of St. James' (Episcopal) Church at Carleton Place, in the County of Lanark.

On the 1st July, 1881, when the corner stone of a Canada Methodist Church was laid at Dundela, in the township of Matilda, by Right Worshipful Brother James Stephenson, Past District Deputy Grand Master.

On the evening of the same day when I consecrated the new hall of Pembroke Lodge, 128, Pembroke.

By the Craft our laws have been well observed, and the Officials of Grand Lodge at all times performed their duties with intelligence and alacrity; no trouble of any importance or magnitude has arisen, that has not been promptly met and decided on. I retire from the Throne of the Royal Solomon, having the gratification of knowing that peace and good will extended throughout this Jurisdiction, and feeling that I can hand down to my successor a prosperous order.

May I hope that my official record for the past two years has met with general approbation, and that my short comings may be charitably attributed to the frailty of the man, rather than to want of Masonic zeal.

Brethren, a great and important trust has again developed on us, the representatives of the Ancient Craft, for there never was a time when Masonic influence was more felt than now. May we discharge that trust with diligence and fidelity, and see that the land-marks of the order are preserved, its precepts acted upon, and its professions carried out. Guided in the future by the past, may we not assert that so long as we continue to act according to the tenets of our time honoured order, and to carry out its principles, so long will our institutions prosper and exercise its influence on generations yet to come. Let each and all, during this communication, cultivate that unity which is the cement that unites, and that harmony which is the bond that binds us together, and gentle peace will hover over our deliberations and rest among us.

#### ST. CLAIR DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. of Canada.

**MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHERN.**—In accordance with the requirements of the Constitution of Grand Lodge, and in the discharge of the duties entrusted to me, I have the honor to submit my report for the year now closing on the condition of Freemasonry in St. Clair District. I have visited all the Lodges in the District, except five, and find them working satisfactorily.

By request of the M. W. the Grand Master, I had the honor to perform, in his name, the ceremony of consecrating the new Hall of Pnyx Lodge, No. 312, on the 28th of October, 1880, and the new Hall at Petrolia, for Petrolia Lodge, No. 194, and Washington Lodge, No. 260, on the first of June, 1881. The brethren of both places are to be congratulated on having provided such commodious and convenient Lodge Rooms. At Petrolia, after the consecrating ceremonies had been performed, I held a Lodge of instruction and was gratified at having a large attendance from the Lodges in that part of the District. The work was ably and correctly exemplified by V. W. Bro. A. Jamison, V. W. Bro. Wm. Milner, assisted by V. W. Bro. J. Sinclair, W. Bro. J. McLing and several other Masters and Brethren.

There have been, I am pleased to say, but four deaths in the

District during the past year. The deceased Brethren were interred with the usual Masonic ceremonies.

I am pleased to report that there has been no complaint referred to me during the year.

The usual dispensations for wearing Masonic regalia have been granted to the Brethren on proper occasions.

The Brethren of Morpeth Lodge, No. 111, having surrendered their warrant, I recommended a petition for a new Lodge, to be called Morpeth Lodge, and the Grand Master duly issued his dispensation. I also recommended the petition for the Huron Lodge to be held at Camlachie, the other, called Parviam Lodge, to be held at Comber, the Florence Lodge to be held at Florence. The Grand Master issued his dispensation for these three Lodges. I was present at the opening of each of the Lodges, and I think there is every prospect of all of them being successful Lodges.

In closing my report I must express my gratitude and sincere thanks to the officers and Brethren of the District, for the universal kindness, attention, and fraternal welcome with which I was received when paying my official visits, and pray that it may please the G. A. O. T. U. long to continue the harmony that prevails among the Brethren of St. Clair District.

#### LONDON DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful, the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. of Canada.

MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN.—I have the honor to submit my report on the condition of Freemasonry in the London District.

There is at present thirty-nine Lodges in the District, thirty-seven warranted and two under dispensation. Most of them I have visited, but owing to the great extent of territory embraced in this District, there are a few I did not reach, which I hope will not be attributed to lack of zeal on my part to perform the duties of the office. Quite a few Lodges have had a second visit owing to settlement of questions that have arisen and had to be disposed of, but those few have not been quite overlooked for all necessary enquiry as to their welfare and progress have been made, and I have much pleasure in stating that the Lodges in this District, with few exceptions, are doing their work skillfully and in strict accordance to ancient usage. The W. M. and officers are full of energy and zeal in the successful working of their Lodges, and I am proud to say that they will compare favorably under all circumstances with any Lodges working under your jurisdiction.

The Grand Master was pleased to grant a dispensation to institute a new Lodge in the village of Elderton to be called Henderson Lodge, which I formally opened, assisted by Brethren from London, Lobo, and surrounding Lodges, manifesting by their presence and the hearty and fraternal feeling displayed on that occasion the deep interest taken by them in extending the privileges of our time-honored institution.

In the month of April I held a Lodge of instruction in the Masonic Hall, London, which I am pleased to say was well attended, and I am led to believe was highly successful. The three degrees were skillfully exemplified, showing that great attention had been observed in acquiring a correct knowledge of the minutest parts of the ceremonies and ritual. The offices were filled by London and Strathroy Brethren, to whom great credit is due for the success attending that meeting of the Brethren.

Although the District is large, and the members numerous, I am pleased to say that comparatively few complaints have been submitted to me for investigation, and all have been amicably settled with but one exception, and my decision in that case I feel confident will be upheld by the Grand Lodge.

Two dispensations have been applied for and granted by me for the Brethren to attend divine service in regalia, one for London and one for St. Thomas, for which the fees were paid.

The death of four members of the Order in this District have reached me, viz:—Bro. Duncan Campbell, of Prince of Wales Lodge, No. 171, Bro. George E. Case, Doric Lodge, No. 289, Lobo; Bro. John Waugh, of Merrit Lodge, Dorchester St., No. 344, and Bro. Wm. Young of Nilestown Lodge, No. 456, who were all interred with Masonic honors.

I have been successful in breaking up a spurious lodge that has been in existence for some time past in the city of St. Thomas, thereby removing one blot from the heretofore spotless reputation of our Order in Canada, previous to the Ontario faction, which placed a Bar Sinister on our fair escutcheon, which time alone can wipe out. A number of the members of this Lodge have applied for affiliation and healing. A few who stood the test of the ballot and was found worthy, were duly healed by the permission of the Grand Master, and I think the Lodge who accepted them will have no cause to regret their admission to their ranks.

In concluding my report I beg leave to express my thanks for the uniform kindness that was manifested on all occasions by the Brethren of London District to me, not only on my official visits, but at other times, which will long be remembered by me.

An Emergency Meeting of the Grand Lodge was held in the Town of Woodstock, to consecrate the new hall erected for the Brethren of King Solomon and Oxford Lodges, which was attended by a number of distinguished brethren from all parts of Ontario, and all expressed themselves highly delighted with the beautiful rooms, and it gives me the greatest of pleasure to be able to say that the work as performed by the officers of the two Lodges is fully in keeping with the "Work Room."

I am rejoiced at being able to say that no formal complaint of unmasonic conduct has been brought before me, and the large correspondence which I have attended to, to the best of my ability, has been principally constitutional explanations.

I have, during my term of office, installed the officers of several of the Lodges.

In conclusion, I would take this opportunity of thanking the brethren of Wilson District for their kind and fraternal manner towards me during my term of office.

#### HURON DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful, the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M., of Canada.

**MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN.**—In compliance with the requirements of the constitution of Grand Lodge, I now submit a report of my stewardship, as D. D. Grand Master of Huron District for the past twelve months.

I have visited every Lodge in the District, some of them twice, and I have in every case seen portions of the work exemplified, and examined the Lodge books. It is satisfactory to me to be able to report that, with very few exceptions, the work is well done and in accordance with the work authorized by Grand Lodge.

The systems of book-keeping adopted by the several Lodges, is very diverse, and while in most cases they answer the purpose fairly well, it would be a great improvement if some uniform system could be adopted by all.

I have held three Lodges of Instruction; one at Exeter, in the County of Bruce, where I had the assistance of the R. W., the

Deputy Grand Master ; one at Paisley, in the County of Bruce, where the R. W., the Grand Secretary was present, and one at Stratford, in the county of Perth, where we were honored by the presence of R. W. Bro. Saunders, D. D. G. M., of Toronto. All of these Lodges were fairly well attended, and I think I may claim that the results were beneficial.

I have opened two Lodges under dispensation from the M. W. the Grand Master, viz : at Chesley and at Warton in the County of Bruce. Each of these Lodges begins life under very favorable auspices and with a good list of members, and I anticipate success and prosperity for both of them. The one at Chesley will probably make application for a warrant at this communication of Grand Lodge.

I have also to report the re-opening of St. John's Lodge, No. 284, after having held no meeting for over fifteen months. I went to Brussels, where this Lodge is situated, saw the brethren and advised with them, and I feel convinced that the re-opening of the Lodge at that time was, in a great measure, the result of that visit. I have also visited the Lodge since its re-organization, and found the brethren doing lots of work, and doing it well.

I am sorry to have to report that the enemy has been amongst us, and established a spurious lodge at Eden Grove, in the County of Bruce. The brethren who were engaged in the establishment of it have been tried, suspended, and recommended to Grand Lodge for expulsion.

I have had very few complaints or appeals referred to me. The few which I have received have been of a minor character, and easily adjusted.

I have granted four dispensations to enable brethren to appear in public in Masonic clothing.

In conclusion, I tender my sincere thanks to the brethren of the

Huron District for their uniform kindness and courtesy to your representative on all occasions.

MOST WORSIHFUL SIR AND BRETRHEN.—I beg leave to submit my report of the condition of Masonry in Wellington District for the past year.

In opening, I have to express regret that owing to pressing business engagements during the greater part of the year, I have been unable to give as much time to the duty of visiting the Lodges within my jurisdiction, as I could have desired; with one exception, however, I was enabled to answer all special calls, for my attendance at gatherings of the craft.

At all the Lodges I had the pleasure of visiting I found the work as approved by Grand Lodge, carefully exemplified by the different Worshipful Masters; that the admission of material was guarded with reasonable care, and that the Lodges were generally in a prosperous condition.

The subjects of Masonic complaints, I am happy to say, have been few. There has been some correspondence in the matter of an initiation by one Lodge of a candidate residing within the jurisdiction of another. The matter has not yet been brought to a conclusion, and I shall hand over the papers in the case to my successor in office for further action.



Complaints have been made by Irvine and Conestogo Lodges, that members of other Lodges had been presented as visitors at the organization of a clandestine Lodge at Pinkerton, in the County of Bruce. I have advised the aggrieved Lodges to take proceedings in the usual way against the offending brethren.

One or two points relating to Masonic jurisprudence have been referred to me, involving no question of difficulty, and have been satisfactorily settled.

The deaths of three brethren only have been referred to me during my term of office, and all were interred with the appropriate ceremonies of the order.

Dispensations have been issued to permit the brethren of several of the Lodges to appear in Masonic clothing at divine service and at social gatherings. In each case the proceedings, I have been assured, were attended with pleasure and profit.

In resigning the duties of my office, I have to acknowledge the uniform kindness and courtesy extended to me by the craft within this District; to record the universal expressions of loyalty and affection which have been made with reference to the Grand Lodge of Canada, and to express the hope that the harmony and prosperity which have marked the operations of the order within the borders of the district, may continue.

### NIAGARA DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful, the Grand Master, Officers and members of the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M., of Canada.

MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN.—I beg respectfully to submit the following report on Freemasonry in the Niagara District, for the past year.

At the last annual Communication of Grand Lodge in the city of Guelph, one lodge, St. Andrew's, No. 62, Caledonia, in this District, was allowed to withdraw and be attached to the Hamilton District, thereby leaving twenty-three Lodges in the Niagara District.

I have had the honor of visiting, with one exception, all these Lodges, and was much pleased with the able and zealous manner in which the work was performed. The books were well and

neatly kept, and most of the rooms neat and properly furnished, and while congratulating the different Lodges upon the beautiful appearance of their rooms, I desire particularly to congratulate the members of Niagara Lodge, No. 2, on the completion of the rebuilding and furnishing of their really fine Hall, and commend their zealous efforts.

Worshipful Brethren and myself being of opinion that good would result from the holding of a Lodge of Instruction somewhere in the District, I held one on the third and fourth days of February in the Masonic Temple in the city of St. Catharines, and being the first for some years it was quite as successful as I expected, and from expressions of approval I feel satisfied that were one held somewhere in the District in each year, it would be numerously attended.

In jurisprudence there was one complaint of invasion of territory by a Lodge in another District. I forwarded the complaint at once to the Grand Secretary. Other questions were of such a nature as to be easily answered, however. At the time of my visit to Welland Lodge, No. 36, Fonthill, it was moved and carried without dissent (so far as I recollect) that the dues of two members who had been previously suspended, and one of whom was said to be in indigent circumstances, be remitted, and that they be reinstated, but at the next regular meeting exception was taken by a brother who was not at the previous meeting, that the action was not legal, and that the minutes be not confirmed until the motion was struck out. The minutes were, however, confirmed. The brother then appealed to the M. W. Grand Master, and the M. W., the Grand Master was pleased to direct that I should proceed to Fonthill and investigate, and report so that the whole question might be laid before the Board of General Purposes. I did so and report accordingly.

In conclusion I beg very fraternally to thank the brethren throughout the Niagara District for their many acts of kindness

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towards me during the past year, as also for their courteous greeting at the time of my visits to their several Lodges.

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### TORONTO DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful, the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M., of Canada.

**MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN.** — In accordance with the provisions of the Constitution I have the honor to submit for your information the following report on the condition of Freemasonry in the district under my control for the past twelve months.

I have endeavored to discharge to the best of my ability the duties appertaining to the office of District Deputy Grand Master, by visiting the Lodges in my district, inspecting the books and accounts of the same, and holding a Lodge of Instruction, conducting the ceremonials of installation whenever desired to do so, and by giving prompt attention to all communications addressed to me in my official capacity.

During my term of office I have issued several dispensations to wear Masonic clothing in public, all of which have been duly reported to the Grand Secretary for your information.

I am pleased to report that a satisfactory settlement has been reached in the long pending case of McNair vs. Richmond Lodge, and that I know of no unsettled difficulty in my district to be adjudicated upon by my successor in office.

I have the pleasure to report that many of the Lodges in my

district own the buildings in which they meet, and that all are in good financial positions, and doing good work, though I regret that it is not more uniform in character, owing to differences in the ritual used. I would respectfully suggest that these dissimilarities be rectified, either by Grand Lodge issuing an authorized ritual, or what would perhaps be better, by the appointment of Grand Lecturers, who should devote their whole time to instructing the various Lodges in the jurisdiction in the correct way of working, and in explaining the principles, traditions and history of the order.

On the seventeenth and eighteenth days of February last I held a Lodge of Instruction in the Masonic Hall in Toronto. There were nearly two hundred brethren in all present during the two days, including fourteen past and present Grand Lodge officers, twenty-one Worshipful Masters, and forty-four Past Masters. The work was exemplified in sections in each of the three degrees, by V. W. Bros. J. Ross Robertson, T. F. Blackwood and J. B. Nixon, respectively, assisted by the brethren of City Lodges, time being given at the end of each section for answering questions on the ritual and for discussion on the work, which had the effect of bringing out many of the differences to which I have already alluded, and of showing the necessity of some means being taken to establish uniformity.

I regret to say that I felt it my duty to take up the warrant of Corinthian Lodge, No. 51, Grahamsville, and reported my action in the matter to the Grand Secretary, at the same time transmitting him the various papers, etc. Had this been done at an earlier period, I feel it would have been of benefit to the craft in general.

There is a matter of courtesy on the part of our brethren, composing the Webber Quartette Club, of Boston, U. S., which I have great pleasure in reporting to Grand Lodge. On the 18th of August, 1880, whilst the Club were on a visit to this City, St. John's Lodge, No. 75, had the melancholy duty of burying, with Masonic honors, their late Brother William Thornton. The

Webber Club in the most fraternal manner volunteered their services on the occasion, and rendered at the grave several appropriate pieces of music; thus greatly adding to the effect of our solemn and impressive funeral service. Such an act of Masonic courtesy is well deserving of notice. The names of the brethren composing the Club are recorded in the hearts of the members of St. John's Lodge, and I have great pleasure in making them known to Grand Lodge; they are as follows:

Bro. E. T. Webber, Mount Hermon Lodge, Meaford; Bro. W. L. Vennel, Mount Hermon Lodge, Meaford; Bro. W. R. Bate-  
man, Belmont Lodge, Belmont; Bro. G. R. Titus, John Abbott  
Lodge, Somerville, all under the jurisdiction of the Grand  
Lodge of Massachusetts; and Bro. J. B. Pond of Waverly Lodge,  
No. 51, Wisconsin, who was in charge of the Club.

I have to report that several of the Toronto Lodges have added vocal music in the performance of our ceremonies, Alpha (our youngest) Lodge being the pioneer in the movement. The effect is to me most pleasing, and I think it a beautiful addition to our ritual. Sharon Lodge, No. 97, has also shown musical proclivities, by forming amongst its members an instrumental band, and on the occasion of my official visit honored myself and other visitors with a serenade. Such a band could be made a source of profit as well as pleasure to the Lodge.

I regret that there have been a very large number of suspensions in my district for non-payment of dues, and that many of the brethren are still in arrears. I feel that the time has come when Grand Lodge should consider the whole question of suspension for this cause, and would respectfully suggest that the difficulty might be overcome, by adding to the initiation fee a sufficient sum, which, being handed to the Grand Secretary and invested by him, would yield in time such interest as would enable the Lodges to do away with the collection of yearly dues from their Members.

"From labor we go to refreshment."

One of the most refreshing and pleasing incidents of my term of office was the visit of the Most Worshipful Grand Master to the Toronto District. On the 1st of June last St. Andrew's Lodge, No. 16, had the honor of receiving as Grand Master Mason of Canada, that distinguished brother who now presides over us, in that Lodge where he first saw Masonic light nearly forty years since, and of proving to him by actual work that his Mother Lodge yet retained skilled craftsmen. On the following day the M. W. Grand Master consecrated and dedicated to Freemasonry Alpha Lodge, No. 384, Parkdale, and afterwards witnessed the initiation of a candidate, with the addition to the ceremony of the musical service I have before alluded to. In the evening the Craft in my district had the honor of receiving at the Horticultural Gardens, Toronto, the Most Worshipful Grand Master and Officers of the Grand Lodge. The attendance (not only of the brethren but of ladies) was the largest ever known at any Masonic ceremonial in Canada, and I shall ever remember the event as the most pleasing in my Masonic career.

In conclusion, I deem it a duty as well as a pleasure, to place on record my appreciation of the invariable kindness, sympathy, and co-operation which I have experienced at the hands of the craft in my district, they having cheerfully aided me in carrying on my duties during my year of office, and I take this opportunity of tendering to them my heartfelt thanks. This assistance has made the discharge of my duties a pleasure, and will be ever remembered by me with gratitude.

**MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN.**—I beg respectfully to submit my second annual report of the condition of Masonry in the Georgian District for the past Masonic year.

I have visited nearly all the Lodges in the District, and in each case have had the work exemplified in the different degrees, and I am glad to report that in nearly every case it was well and creditably done, and that all the Lodges are governed by able and zealous officers.

Peace and harmony have generally prevailed. Only one serious complaint has been brought before me for adjudication, and I am glad to report that the differences have been satisfactorily adjusted, and I hope the brethren are now working together in harmony.

One application for dispensation to open a new Lodge at Fort Edmonton, N. W. T., was forwarded to me for recommendation to the Grand Master, but I refused in consequence of the distance being so great from this Grand Lodge that we could have no practical influence over it.

On the 8th of February last, I attended a special communication of Grand Lodge, held at the town of Barrie, and had the honor of assisting the R. Worshipful Deputy Grand Master Bro. Moffat in dedicating and consecrating a new hall. I have to congratulate the brethren of Corinthian Lodge, No. 96, Barrie, on their new Lodge room which is both handsome and commodious. After the dedication, a social conversazione was held, which was very largely attended, and a very enjoyable evening was spent.

In May last I summoned all the Lodges in the District to meet the Grand Master at a General Lodge of Instruction, at Barrie, on May 31st, and the result was highly gratifying.

All the Lodges in the District with the exception of eight were represented. Very Worshipful Brother Huber and officers of Muskoka Lodge, Bracebridge, worked the first degree ; W. Bro. James Ward, W. M., and officers of Corinthian Lodge, Barrie, worked the second degree, and V. Worshipful Bro. R. King, and officers of Minerva Lodge, Victoria, worked the third degree. D. G. M. Bro. Saunders, and Brethren of Toronto District, for the very fraternal greeting accorded me as the representative of this district.

On the 24th of June (St. John's Day), by command of the Grand Master, I had the honor to represent him and lay the foundation stone of a new M. E. Church in the town of Meaford. There was a very large gathering of the brethren from Owen Sound, Clarksburg and Collingwood Lodges. I was ably assisted in the ceremony by Right Worshipful Bro. Robertson and the brethren of the Lodges present.

In retiring from the office which I have had the honor to hold for the last two years, I desire to thank the brethren for the very

courteous and warm reception accorded me on all occasions when I have visited Lodges throughout the district, and I trust their choice of a successor may result in the election of one who will be able to devote more time and fill the office more satisfactorily than it has been in my power to do.

### ONTARIO DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. of Canada.

MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN.—If it be true that "happy are the people who have no annals," then the Ontario District is a fortunate case, for the past year has been entirely destitute of any occurrence of great importance.

I have to report that increasing prosperity prevails among the various Lodges within this jurisdiction as evidenced by the increasing "work" spread upon the notices of the various meetings.

I have received no complaints whatever during the past year, and have had but few questions on jurisprudence or procedure to answer, and these of such a nature as not to call here for any remark.

I have not been able to visit as many of the Lodges as I could have wished. It is my pleasure to state, that as usual, I have been received in those I did visit with fraternal courtesy and kindness.

I would again express the hope that there should be a rearrangement or division of this District. Numerically Toronto

exceeds it, but nearly one-third of the Lodges are in Toronto or its suburbs. It is almost impossible that sufficient justice can be done in exercising Masonic supervision over so many Lodges situated as they are within this District.

I have to complain that some of the Lodges have not sent me any notice of their meetings, as required by the constitution, and again that in many cases I received notices only a day or two before the time fixed. I would suggest the Secretaries be recommended to send earlier notice to our D. D. G. M. than to their own members.

It was my intention to have held a Lodge of Instruction in Peterboro' some time during the present spring. Since the completion of the Grand Junction Railway it is a point easily accessible from all parts of the District. I regret to say circumstances over which I had no control prevented me from carrying out my intention.

I had the melancholy satisfaction of attending the funeral of our late Grand Master, William Henry Weller. An intimate personal friendship, of many years standing, enables me to speak of his sterling good qualities as a man and a Mason. His loss indeed is a great one, both to the craft and to his many personal friends.

Negotiations have been pending for some time, looking towards the amalgamation of the two Lodges meeting at the village of Colborne. I have had some correspondence with the brethren of both Lodges as to the best means of carrying this out. I deem it conducive to our best interests of Masonry that such amalgamation should take place, but I have heard nothing lately on the subject.

There have been a good many alterations in the By-laws of private Lodges during the past year, chiefly in one direction of reduction of dues. These have been uniformly approved of by the M. W., the Grand Master.

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I do not think the finances of the Lodges will suffer, while the number of members suspended for non-payment of dues will be likely to be diminished, and the loss in one way made up by the gain in another.

I have granted dispensations during the past year to the following Lodges, and for the purposes hereunder stated ;—

Lorne Lodge, 375, Omemee ; to install a serving Brother without fee.

Faithful Brethren, Lindsay ; to attend a Masonic Concert.

Lorne Lodge, Omemee ; to attend Divine Service.

Brock Lodge, Cannington ; to hold a public entertainment and reception.

Faithful Brethren Lodge, Lindsay, to attend Divine Service.

Brock Lodge, Cannington ; to attend Divine Service.

It is worthy of note that while I have had during the past two years no applications for dispensations for balls or other similar festivities, the majority of applications are for permission to attend Divine Service.

In surrendering my trust to Grand Lodge, I desire again to express my thanks to the members of the district for their many acts of personal kindness, and for their forbearance towards my shortcomings. To many members of the Grand Lodge I am particularly indebted for advice and assistance.

## ST. LAWRENCE DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. of Canada.

MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN.—The past year has, in St. Lawrence District, been marked by even and steady progress in masonry. No remarkable events have occurred amongst us, nor have I been called to exercise the powers entrusted to me for any but the most pleasant purposes.

The centre of our District has been occupied by a new Lodge, whose formation I had much pleasure in advocating, not only because it marked a step in our progress, but because it established a place of meeting for the brethren in a very important but hitherto unoccupied District. May the stream which flows from Crystal Fountain Lodge be as pure, bright and refreshing as the source from which it springs.

In accordance with what I conceived to be the most useful course which I could adopt, I held in the city of Kingston, in the early part of the present year, a Lodge of Instruction, to which I invited all the brethren within my district. In July of last year I paid a visit to every lodge which could receive me, and I was convinced both from personal observation and from what I heard from the brethren that a Lodge of Instruction would effect much more real good than an hurried visit to each particular Lodge.

The Lodge which I formed was devoted to the exemplification of the work of the three degrees, and I am glad to think that its results in harmonizing the work of the Lodges were of the most beneficial character. At the same time I must express my regret that only a limited number of the Masters of Lodges found it convenient to attend. I would strongly recommend that the holding of Lodges of Instruction be enjoined on the District Deputy Grand Masters as a positive duty. They are the best means of conveying instruction, and of securing the exclusion of spurious works which brethren in authority are sometimes in the habit of consulting.

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Besides holding this Lodge I visited many of the Lodges, and performed the ceremony of installation on several occasions.

It is a sincere pleasure to me to be able to state that no differences have arisen amongst the Lodges under my jurisdiction, which I have been unable to settle by a few temperate words. Differences when they do exist are generally caused by some one or two brethren in a Lodge who have not learned the Masonic lesson of obedience and the duty of subordinating their pride and ambition to the principles of their order. I have endeavoured to discourage captiousness and petty complaints, but, in truth, I have found little occasion for giving advice during my term of office.

I leave the affairs of my district in the most satisfactory condition. I have endeavored to leave nothing undone which I ought to have done, and if I have not given all that time and attention to my duties which I could have desired, I trust that the brethren will remember that I am in the midst of active life, with many calls upon my time, and many engagements to fulfill.

Before I close I must express my gratitude at having been called upon to grant several dispensations for attendance of Lodges at Divine Service, clothed in regalia. The practice of so attending will do much to dispel false and erroneous notions prevailing in the outside world respecting Freemasonry.

Through you, Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren, I bid my constituents farewell, and I trust that they will cultivate the duty of relying implicitly on the Great Architect of the Universe, to whose protection and guidance I earnestly and fraternally commit them.

## OTTAWA DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. of Canada.

**MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN.**—I beg to submit the following report on the state of Masonry in the Ottawa District. The Lodges generally are working well, and the little differences that existed in one of the Lodges, at the commencement of my term of office, have all been satisfactorily adjusted.

I have not been able to visit all of the twenty-two Lodges during the year, but some of the country Lodges I have visited two or three times, and in one case four times.

Our Brethren of Pembroke Lodge met with a great loss by fire on the night of the 24th of December, when all their beautiful furniture, regalia, warrant, etc., were destroyed. The brethren set to work with a will and leased another hall, and have furnished it in a style worthy of the Order. It would be well for Masonry, if every Lodge would manifest the same spirit. I consider the Pembroke Lodge one of the best in the District. I had the honor of taking the new warrant to Pembroke, and installing the officers for the ensuing year, in which I was ably assisted by Right Worshipful Bro. White, and the Past Masters of the Lodge.

I have granted several dispensations during the year for Brethren to appear in regalia to attend Divine Service, and also for the Ottawa Brethren, for a moonlight excursion down the river, in aid of the burial plot fund.

I have been asked by several Masters during the year, to get them a Ritual, but on application to the Grand Secretary was told there were no more to be given.

I cannot see how young Masters can be expected to work uniformly without such aid. I think good would result if a Ritual were furnished, said Ritual to be considered the property of the Lodge and not of the Master, except during his term of office.



On the 19th of June, the St. John's Lodge, No. 63, Carleton Place, applied for a dispensation to appear in regalia, on the occasion of the laying of the foundation stone of St. James' Church, at which ceremony our Most Worshipful the Grand Master officiated assisted by about 250 brethren of the several Lodges of the district.

Great praise is due to the ladies of Carleton Place, for the kind manner in which they entertained the brethren after the ceremony was performed.

Four brethren have been removed by death during the year, viz : R. W. Bro. Dr. Mostyn, of Mississippi Lodge, Bro. Stanley of Doric Lodge, Ottawa ; Bro. Nicholson of Fidelity Lodge, Ottawa ; and Wor. Bro. John Orr of Builder's Lodge, Ottawa, all of whom were buried with Masonic honors.

Before closing my report, I must heartily thank the brethren for the honor they conferred on me in electing me D. D. G. M., and also for the uniform kindness shown me when visiting their Lodges.

Your board have considered the application of Hiram Lodge, No 342, Wolfe Island, praying Grand Lodge to accept a composition of debt, and cannot recommend that the prayer of that Lodge be granted. The board are pleased to learn that Lodges which were in a worse financial position than this Lodge, and who had been unsuccessful applicants for assistance, have, by continuous

effort on the part of their officers, been enabled to pay off their indebtedness, and are now in a flourishing condition.

St. John's Lodge No. 284, Brussels, asks for assistance, their Lodge room and furniture having been destroyed by fire. During the session of 1879, this fire was reported to Grand Lodge, and assistance was then asked and granted, the dues of that Lodge to date having been remitted. Although Grand Lodge has in the past assisted Lodges meeting with loss, it has repeatedly of late urged upon Masters the necessity of securing their Lodges against loss by fire, by seeing that the furniture, &c., was properly covered by insurance. The Grand Secretary issued a circular to Lodges to that effect, and every summons to attend the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge since issued, has contained a clause in reference to insurance. After the repeated warnings given, Lodges neglecting to insure and meeting with loss, need not expect assistance from Grand Lodge.

As regards the petition of Merrickville Lodge No. 55, Merrickville, claiming a remission of dues, on the ground that they had for years past been paying more than the proper amount to Grand Lodge, the board cannot recommend that any allowance be made, as the sums paid were the amounts which that Lodge owed, as shown by the returns made by the proper officers, and certified to as correct. The board cannot recommend the re-opening of accounts between Lodges and the Grand Lodge, years after returns have been made.

The letter of R. W. Bro. Martyn, explaining the reason why the benevolent orders paid through his Lodge were not endorsed, was considered. While the board are satisfied with the explanation, they deem it advisable that the resolution of Grand Lodge as to endorsements should be strictly carried out.

With respect to Shawenegan Lodge No. 49, on the Grand Registry of Quebec, asking that they be paid interest on the amount which they had subscribed to the Asylum Fund, the board are of opinion that the resolution of Grand Lodge passed in 1877

is intended to cover interest as well as principal. The principal sum subscribed by that Lodge having been already refunded them, the Board recommend that interest be computed and placed to the credit of that Lodge.

A petition has been received from the Ottawa Masonic Hall Committee, praying that the assets of Corinthian Lodge, No. 59, be handed over to them, on account of that Committee having been forced to liquidate some of the debts of said Corinthian Lodge. The Board recommend that the consideration of the petition be deferred until the assets of this Lodge, whose Warrant has been surrendered, are in the possession of Grand Lodge.

At the last session of Grand Lodge, the Grand Secretary was instructed to notify all Lodges in arrears for two years, that unless returns were made and fees paid, the Grand Lodge would, at its next Annual Communication, suspend the Warrant of such Lodges. A large proportion of said Lodges having responded and paid up their indebtedness, and the Grand Secretary being in communication with others, the Board are of opinion that another and final opportunity should be given those still in arrears, and recommend that their Warrants be not now cancelled, and that they be notified that unless the resolution already referred to be complied with before the next Communication of Grand Lodge, their Warrants will then be cancelled.

The Board having considered the advisability of securing the presence of the Grand Treasurer at meetings of the Board, where his accounts come up for audit, recommend that his expenses attending said meeting, be defrayed by Grand Lodge.

The Board have received tenders for printing, according to a form prepared, and recommend that the tender of G. C. Patterson, Toronto, be accepted, he being the lowest; that security for the proper fulfillment of the contract be taken, in the shape of a bond for \$1000, and that Grand Lodge, reserve the right to cancel the

agreement at any time that the work shall be considered unsatisfactory by the Grand Master.

R. W. Bro. James Moffat, on behalf of the Board, presented and read the following

#### REPORT:

The Board beg to submit the following report on the Condition of Masonry:

Reports have been received from the D. D. G. Masters of the St. Clair, London, Wilson, Huron, Wellington, Hamilton, Niagara, Toronto, Georgian, Ontario, St. Lawrence and Ottawa Districts, and on the whole the condition of Masonry in Canada is entirely satisfactory, so much so that there is very little for your Board to draw the attention of the Grand Lodge to. It is with great satisfaction and pleasure we observe that our esteemed and most worshipful Grand Master has visited many of the districts, and by his

presence given encouragement to the members of the Order, and created confidence and good will amongst the brethren.

Your Board find that there have been a number of new Lodges established, and that general prosperity and good-will prevail amongst the members of the Order.

Your Board observe with great pleasure that many of the D. D. G. Masters have been able to visit every Lodge in their respective districts, besides holding numerous Lodges of Instruction. This course cannot be too highly commended, and your Board would recommend that in future it be followed out as far as possible.

Regarding the petition from Shuniah Lodge No. 287, your Board require further information on the subject before reporting as to the advisability of establishing a new Masonic District for Algoma.

Your Board very deeply regret the loss by death of a number of brethren during the last Masonic year, and most prominent amongst them our late much lamented Brother, Most Worshipful Past Grand Master William Henry Weller, and Right Worshipful Brother W. Mostyn, P. D. D. G. Master, and would recommend that memorial pages be set apart in the proceedings of Grand Lodge to each one of the distinguished Brothers.

In reference to the application of the widow of the late William Campbell, P. M. of King Solomon's Lodge, Toronto, asking for a new Grand Lodge Certificate in lieu of the one originally issued by Grand Lodge, and which is alleged to have been lost:

The Board recommend that upon the certificate and recommendation of King Solomon's Lodge, setting forth that they are satisfied of such loss, that a duplicate certificate be signed by the Grand Secretary upon payment of the prescribed fee.

Bro. James F. Brown applies both personally and through his Lodge, St. John's Lodge No. 20, London, for a new certificate, under the name of James F. De Jean, it being alleged that such is his true name. St. John's Lodge apparently being satisfied of the correctness of the allegation, the Board recommend that the precedent laid down in the case of Fitz Kham, and Galt Lodge 257 (see Proceedings, 1877, page 132) be followed in this case, and that an endorsement be made by the Grand Secretary on Bro. Brown's original certificate, sufficient to identify him as the person mentioned in the body of it, and that an entry be made in the books of Grand Lodge and his own Lodge, showing such change.

In regard to the application of the St. John's Grand Lodge of Hungary for recognition, there being nothing before the Board except the application, it is recommended that the whole matter be laid over till next year.

action of this Lodge in remitting the dues of certain brethren in violation of Art. 14 of the By-laws of said Lodge, such Article reading as follows :—"Any Brother suspended for non-payment of dues shall not be permitted to re-join his Lodge until all such back dues shall be paid."

The W. Bro. further appeals against the action of the District Deputy Grand Master of Niagara District when presiding at a meeting of Welland Lodge, No. 56, for having declared a motion for the re-instatement of a Brother Mason in this Lodge carried when the vote was a tie vote.

As to the first appeal, the facts are not sufficiently before the Board, and they recommend that it be referred to the D. D. G. M. of Niagara District for investigation.

As to the second appeal, the D. D. G. M. of Niagara District states that he did not declare the motion carried. The Board

recommend that the minutes (if incorrect) be amended by stating that the motion was lost.

Apart from this consideration it is improper that any brother should be found guilty on merely verbal evidence. The statements should be taken in writing, so that in the event of an appeal the evidence can be produced to the higher tribunal. The Board have no means of judging whether the defendant was, or was not guilty of the offence charged against him. They would remark that the summons for trial treats the amount alleged to be due as a simple debt: "amount of dues \$65.00, up to and including next Monday, which please pay."</p>
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The Board are of opinion that the suspension was illegal, and

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recommend that the matter of the complaint should be remitted back to the Lodge, to enable it to proceed properly.

VIENNA LODGE, NO. 237,

vs.

BRO. M. S. BROWNELL,

1878, p. 133; 1879, p. 91 and 1880, p. 115.

} This matter appears in the Grand Lodge Proceedings,

Bro. Brownell has been suspended by Vienna Lodge, and his expulsion is asked for by the Lodge.

The charges preferred are an alleged desertion of his wife and family, and an attempted fraud on a Masonic Benefit Association.

His wife alleges that he was drowned in Seneca Lake, N. Y., on Dec. 28th, 1877. It is asserted by the Lodge he absconded to Texas with a woman, not his wife, and that the pretended drowning was a part of a scheme to obtain the insurance on his life.

The evidence upon which the Lodge acted is now before the Board, and they have given much attention to this extraordinary and painful case.

After a careful perusal and consideration of the voluminous papers and evidence submitted, the Board have arrived at the decision that the evidence is not sufficient to warrant a sentence of expulsion.

It is therefore recommended that the request of the Lodge be not complied with.

PARTHENON LODGE, No. 267,

vs.

BRO. A. W. BROWNE.

In this case, which has been twice before Grand Lodge, the Board see no reason for departing from the conclusion arrived at on the occasions referred to, and therefore recommend that no action be taken.

ST. DAVID'S LODGE, No. 302,

vs.

BRO. W. C. REID.

On the 24th day of June, 1879, Bro. W. C. Reid was suspended by St. David's Lodge, No. 302, for unmasonic conduct, and recommended to Grand Lodge for expulsion.

He has been summoned to show cause why he should not be expelled. He does not show any cause.

The Board recommend that Bro. W. C. Reid be expelled from the Craft.

ORIENT LODGE, No. 339,

Bro. J. Fletcher Cross was suspended for unmasonic conduct by Orient Lodge, No. 339, on the 1st day of June, 1880, and his expulsion is asked for.

He has been summoned to show cause why he should not be expelled. He does not show any cause.

The Board recommend that Bro. J. Fletcher Cross be expelled from the Craft.

In the matter of  
 DUFFERIN LODGE, No. 364,  
 and  
 W. BRO. SINCLAIR AND BRO. J. E. NORTH-  
 COTT. } Brother Northcott  
 was suspended by  
 this Lodge for un-  
 masonic conduct, in  
 having used intem-  
 perate and disrespectful language to W. Bro. Sinclair while he was  
 Master of the Lodge, and during one of its meetings. After a sus-  
 pension of over two years Brother Northcott was by this Lodge  
 recommended for restoration to his Masonic privileges.

W. Bro. Sinclair complains that Bro. Northcott did not first properly apologize for his language.

W. Bro. Sinclair also appeals against the action of the D. D. G. M., of London District, in connection with this matter.

W. Bro. Sinclair and the D. D. G. M., of London District, both being present before the Board at this meeting, and the latter stating that he had been authorized by Bro. Northcott to tender a full apology to the Lodge, W. Bro. Sinclair withdrew his appeal.

The Board recommend that the suspension of Bro. J. E. Northcott be removed and that he be restored to good standing.

PALMER LODGE No. 372,  
 vs.  
 ST. JOHN'S LODGE, No. 68. } This is a complaint  
 by Palmer Lodge,  
 No. 372, against St.  
 John's Lodge, No. 68, for having violated the constitution in in-  
 initiating one William C. Allinson, claimed by the complainants to  
 have been within their jurisdiction at the time of his initiation,  
 without a dispensation from the Grand Master. This is the sub-  
 stance of the charge, which is not preferred in proper form. It  
 appears from the statements made in the defence that the initiated  
 brother was, at the time of his initiation, resident within the juris-

diction of Palmer Lodge, No. 372, and the Board are of opinion that St. John's Lodge, No. 68, acted improperly in initiating him without a dispensation. There are, however, some extenuating circumstances in this case, and it is therefore recommended that the latter Lodge be reprimanded for their action, and be required to pay the usual dispensation fee. The brother should, the Board consider, be allowed to be in good standing, and to receive his third degree.

The Board are of opinion that this is a matter which should be solely under the control of the Lodge to which the Brother may apply for admission, and they cannot recommend any interference with the action of Union Lodge, No. 380, in this matter.

Card, that the following be added to Clause 8, "of the Grand Lodge," in the Book of Constitution, "that the Proxy be made in duplicate—one copy of which is forwarded to the Grand Secretary at least one week previous to the meeting of the Grand Lodge."

In amendment, it was moved by R. W. Bro. R. T. Walkem, seconded by R. W. Bro. G. H. F. Dartnell, that the debate be adjourned, and that the matter be referred to a Committee to report to-morrow morning.

The amendment was put to the Grand Lodge and declared *carried*, whereupon the M. W. the Grand Master named the following as the Committee, viz:—R. W. Bro. R. T. Walkem, V. W. Bro. Isaac Huber and W. Bro. James Noble.

## MOTION RESPECTING APPOINTMENT OF GRAND LECTURERS.

In accordance with notice given at the last annual Communication, it was moved by W. Bro. E. H. D. Hall, seconded by W. Bro. E. H. Long:

"That the Constitution of the Grand Lodge be amended so as to provide for the appointment by the Board of General Purposes of Grand Lecturers, under salary, whose duty it shall be to visit all the Lodges under the jurisdiction of Grand Lodge once, at least, in every year, for the purpose of giving instruction in the Ritual, and explaining, by addresses or otherwise, the principles, traditions and history of the order, so that a uniform system of working may be introduced in the Lodges, and a knowledge of the science of Speculative Masonry acquired by the brethren. The questions of the number of such Grand Lecturers, their tenure of office, and

salaries, to be under the control of the Board. The jurisdiction of the D. D. G. M. to remain as at present."

The motion having been put to Grand Lodge, it was declared *Lost*.

#### PRESENTATION TO GRAND LODGE LIBRARY.

The R. W., the Grand Secretary, on behalf of the Grand Lodge, A. F. & A. M., of the State of Maine, presented to Grand Lodge a copy of the history of Portland Lodge, No. 1, from its organization, 1769, to the year 1880, edited by M. W. Bro Josiah H. Drummond, P. G. M.; and on behalf of R. W. Bro.
