TWO HALIFAX MEN

Very near death in the Reversing Falls St. John.

Saturday's St. John Standard says:

A disabled motor boat having on board
A. J. Estabrooks of the North End and
three companions, took a dive over the
upper pitch of the Reversing Falls yesterday afternoon about an hour below low
water, and if it had not been for the coursage of John and Arthur Sweet, employees
of the pulp mill, who went to her rescue
in a row boat, she would have gone over
the pitch under the bridge and in all
probability the four occupants would have
perished in the whirlpools below. The
frantic dive of the craft over the pitch opposite the pulp mill, the struggle of the
Sweet brothers to save her from going
over the falls below was witnessed by
many people on the bridge and river banks
and by the employees of the milk
Mr. Estabrooks and a party of three
left the St. John Power Boat Club
house in the motor boat Alasks, about
3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, with
the intention of giving his friends, two
of whom are from Halifax, a trip
around the cove, but when out in the
river the engine broke down, and the
boat began to drift towards the falls.
Soon it was in the race of the current,
and running rapidly stern foremest, to
the pitch of the falls. Then, while the
occupants crouched in the cockpit, the
watchers on the bridge and shore saw the
big boat shoot over the pitch of the fall,
then a roaring comber fifteen feet in
height, and disappear from sight in the
swirl of the current swung her over to the
eddy near the pulp mill.

Immediately John and Arthur Sweet put
out in a row boat from the pulp mill, and
as the motor craft swung in the eddy Saturday's St. John Standard says: immediately John and Artnur Sweet put-out in a row boat from the pulp mill, and as the motor craft swing in the eddy managed to put a line to her. Then bend-ing to their oars with a will they started to tow the craft towards the shore. This was not an easy job and for a while it look-ed as if the craft would be dragged out of ed as if the craft would be dragged out of the eddy and carried by the current over the falls below. But the (two rescuers held on pluckily and after—ten or fifteen minutes hard pulling managed to tow the disabled craft to the shore near the pulp mill, and give the frishtened occupants a shance to get their feet on dry land. Had the boat not gone over the first falls end on, there is little doubt that the four men in her would have loat their lives. As it was those who saw her dive, say it was a miracle that she emerged right side up. Frobably the fact that she was well covered saved her from being swamped when she went under.

REPORTER DETECTIVES

NEWSPAPERMEN OFTEN MAKE PRETTY FAIR SLEUTHS.

The Work of Following Criminal News on a Big London Daily Sometimes Results In Triumphs and Frequently in Disaster-Neither Time, Energy Nor Money Spared in Fer-

Every great modern newspaper has its own staff of detectives, whose business it is to be ready at a moment's notice to investigate any crime that has attracted public interest. These men—who are engaged as reporters, and are known as "crime investigators"—have a wider experience than many detectives, and their enterprise in search for exclusive news is often responsible for queer incidents, says a London paper.

One of the earliest experiences of the writer taught him to temper pertinacity with discretion. He had reason to suppose that an old woman who lived in a back street might have some valuable information concerning a case he was engaged on. 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DERVISH WORSHIPS. Barbaron Mortification of the Flesh

Part of Rites.

The religion of the Ditoman Empire is typical of its people—barbsrous and fantastic. The Dervishes, the regular religious order in Turkey, recognizes no authority but that of Allah, and in consequence, have been persecuted not a little by the jesious Spitans. Although the laymen who profess this faith have but to repeat one or two short prayers and wear the sacred cap for a few minutes every day, those who take the vows of poverty, abstinence from wine, and celibacy, from time to time perform strange rites in their, worship of Allah.

The Whirling Dervishes, after a few preliminaries, begin to chant the Koran to weird music played on flutes and tarboukas, which seems to intoxicate them. One by one they close their eyes, stretch their arms horizontally and begin to twist, slowly at first, but gain speed until they seem, like a sleeping top, to be motionless. All the time they never touch, although there may be a score or more whirling at the same time in the centre of the floor, never leave the spot where they stand, and never get out of tune, al-

floor, never leave the spot where they stand, and never get out of tune, always moving to the music. This they continue until they fall exhausted and are covered with a cloak until they

continue until they fall exhausted and are covered with a cloak until they have recovered.

The ceremonies performed by the Howling Dervishes, another sect, are quite as strange, and a great deal more barbarous even than those just mentioned, but in neither case are the rites performed secretly; for, unlike other Mohammedans, the Dervishes do not object to the "Christian deg" attending their places of worship, so long as he removes his shoes before he enters the "teklen," or temple.

Round the walls of the hall, used by the Howling Dervishes hang all sorts of cruel-looking implements — sharp darts, nippers. chains, pincers and other weapons. These the devotees use to mortify their flesh when they have worked themselves up to a state of religious ecstasy and delirium. This they do by nodding their heads backward and forward, keeping time to a strange, monotonous chant. Faster and faster they move their heads higher and higher rises the music, one by one the Dervishes leave their place and begin to leap high in the air, nodding all the time. Kettledrums are beaten, the chanting becomes louder. The Dervishes form a chain, placing their hands on each other's shoulders, then step one pace backward and one forward with a terrific simultaneous lurch, emitting a long-drawn howl, like the cry of some

simultaneous lurch, emitting a long-drawn howl, like the cry of some wounded animal.

The excitement is intense, and the

The excitement is intense, and the Dervishes, foaming at the mouth, begin to wound themselves with various implements from the walls. They handle red-hot irons, fill their mouths with burning charcoal, drive a spike right through one cheek and out the other side, and leave it there while they continue to nod and how! They perform—a sort of wild dance with a pointed dart in each hand, throwing themselves upon them, until, worn out they roll over, covered with blood and foam.

The Scented Court "The scented court" was the name y which the court of Louis XV. was In scented court was the name by which the court of Louis XV. was known throughout Europe on account of the rage for perfume which then prevailed in France. The expenditure of Mme. de Pompadour for this one branch of her toilet amounted to \$100,000 annually. It became the fashion for the host or hostess of a great entertainment to signalize to their guests what particular perfume was to be employed for scenting their rooms on the night for which the invitations were issued, and they were expected to use no other, so that the delicate effect of a unity of odors might be produced. At court a different perfume was presented for each day of the week.
