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EDITORIAL NOTES.

It cannot have escaped observation that during the war in South Africa the Japanese, along with other peoples, have expressed a wish for the speedy success of the British arms. The Mikado was, we believe, the only Sovereign who telegraphed to Queen Victoria congratulations upon the relief of Ladysmith, the victory of Paardeberg, and the occupation of Bloemfontein. It must also have been noted that since the beginning of April when the early triumphs of the English began to seem assured, almost the whole of Japan's Navy has been mobilized, together with a considerable part of her Army. As to the doings of the Japanese fleet, great secrecy has been observed, no one except the British Commander-in-Chief has been permitted to see the fleet, and the purpose of the naval manoeuvres in the Straits of Korea was the blockade and capture of a squadron, supposed to represent the Russian fleet.

There is, in fact, no doubt that the Japanese regard a war between themselves and the Russians as inevitable; that, in their opinion, they have much to lose by delay; and that they will enter upon a "trial of their strength," as soon as England's hands are left free by the subjugation of the Transvaal. Why must Japan wait for the close of the contest in South Africa? Because, while she may not desire co-operation in order to hold her own against Russia in the Far East, it is indispensable that England should enforce neutrality upon France and Germany. Russia and France and Germany that Japan felt constrained to surrender the territory acquired on the Chinese mainland by the Treaty of Shimoda, and she knows that it would be impossible for her to face a renewal of that combination, or even to cope with the combined navies of the United States and Germany. It is almost certain that, unless England forbade it, France would place her feet at the Casr's disposal. England will issue no such injunction, so long as the Casr is in the hands of the Boer republic. Hence, however, the subjugation of the Transvaal is completed, England's strength will be generally recognized as greater than that of Russia at any other time since the close of the Peninsula War. She may then count upon securing deference to her announcement that she would not sue for peace, and that she would not accept of any European Power to assist Russia against Japan in any way.

The moment the war in South Africa is over it will be for Japan's interest to enter forthwith upon the contest with Russia which, in no event, can be long postponed. Just now, Japan's naval power in the Far East is weak, and it is not likely that she will be able to maintain her position in the Pacific, because she will no longer be permitted to use the British coaling stations on the route thither. Her battleships would have to turn back as did those of Spain which were on their way to the Philippines.

The Japanese undoubtedly believe that they can beat the Russians, and if they can fight this summer, and if, with England's help, they can compel the acquisition of Korea, they will reassert their title to the Liao-Tsun Peninsula, which they won from China, but of which Russia deprived them.

HINTS FOR THE FARMER.

THE RELATION OF FOOD TO MILK FAT.
This subject has been before us as one of the most interesting problems of the industry of feeding cows for the dairy, for fully a score of years and more, but it was many years before it was regarded as one of the problems to be studied and settled by the medical profession and physiologists generally. Dr. Henry Stewart, it might seem to be really a subject better fitted for the attention of such experts rather than for persons who do not make their experiments in a truly scientific manner. The question to be put accurately is, does the cow extract the fats from her food by ordinary process of assimilation convey, we cannot say convert, the fats thus consumed into the butter fat in milk which we call the butter fat? In other words, is it possible to increase the quantity of butter a cow will yield by feeding foods rich in fat? The question is not whether we can make a cow eat animal fats or oils and thus increase the proportion of fat in her milk, but this simple proposition—can the dairyman, by feeding foods naturally rich in fat, and such foods as the cow naturally is able to digest and assimilate, increase the proportion of fat in the milk, or increase her yield of butter in any way?

FIGHTING THE CODLING MOTH.

At the recent session of the Ontario Legislature an act for the prevention and destruction of noxious insects was adopted, in pursuance of which acts are being taken which, it is anticipated, will greatly lessen the evil. The Act provides that such regulations as may be issued by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council on the recommendation of the Minister of Agriculture for the purpose shall have the force of law. The Act has been adopted by the Legislature.

What the Record Shows.

Some of our magazine Conservative friends pretend to believe that a great reaction is going on in the country against the Liberal party. The record of elections to the House of Commons since the change of Government after the general election in 1896, does not, however, bear out this view of the matter. Forty-five seats have been vacated since that time and all of those formerly held by Liberals, have been retained, while no less than ten of those held by Conservatives have been captured by the Liberals.

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THE WAR!

LONDON, June 23.—Great Britain's great army in South Africa is slowly accomplishing the work of pacification. The smooth-running of the war is a fact which is not generally appreciated. The British military progress in the Transvaal is scarcely more interesting now than the events in the Orange River colony during the last two months. The Transvaal annexation proclamation is soon expected. Almost all reports indicate that the Boers are rapidly realizing the possibility of a further struggle was opposed to such an overwhelming force.

LONDON, June 24.—According to a special despatch from Cape Town it seems that in the recent fight at Zand River the Boers captured 2,000 mail bags, containing three weeks' accumulation of letters for Lord Roberts' army and 24,000 worth of stamps, intended for the use of the troops.

LONDON, June 25.—One of the most noticeable features of the week in South Africa was Lord Roberts' abandonment of humane measures towards the Boers which was insisted in spite of the criticism of the British colonists and many officers. The stern vengeance that now will be visited not only on those who give the Boers passive assistance, but on those who, after surrendering, fail to assist the British army, avows more of General Kitchener, than of "Boas."

W. Richmond Smith, war correspondent of the Montreal Star in South Africa, cables as follows:—

"PRETORIA, June 25.—The Strathcona Horse has done one of the grand deeds of the war. Leaving Cape Town a month ago they went to Durban by water and then proceeded on foot, reaching General Buller's forces in time to do splendid service in the advance from Newcastle to the Tugela river and Pretoria—service for which they received special mention in General Buller's despatches to the 'War Office,' approved by Lord Roberts. Now they have done a deed which will live in history. They have blown up the railway bridge at Komati Poort, on the railway between Pretoria and Komati Poort, and have cut off all communication with the Boers with the sea. All the Delagoa Bay rolling stock, the Boer artillery, the whole Boer army, including gold taken by President Kruger from the mine here and west of that point and most of the Boer army, are bottled up at Komati Poort. The Boers have been effectively bottled up at Komati Poort."

Again Misapprehension.

The Montreal Times says the Globe strongly condemns Mr. Emmons' prospective retirement from the political field to take a seat on the bench. The Globe has done nothing of the kind.

Referring to the rumor of Hon. Provincial Secretary Tweedie's probable accession to the premiership in the event of Premier Emmons' retirement from local politics the Montreal Review says:—

If the forecast be correct, then the North Shore is to be honored, in all probability, by one of her sons being called to the Premiership in the person of the Hon. J. L. Tweedie. This will be the first time in the history of New Brunswick that the Premiership has been called from a North Shore constituency, and the compliment will therefore be duly appreciated in this section. Mr. Tweedie will receive the hearty support of the friends of the Local Government and we doubt not will do credit to the honorable position so aptly filled by the colleagues who have preceded him. His experience in the financial affairs of the Province will make it the more easy for him to adjust the problems connected with the New Brunswick property with credit to himself and to the benefit of the Province. We cannot wish him better than that his administration may be as popular and beneficial as that of his predecessor has been.

St. John Exhibition.

The St. John Exhibition opens this year on the 10th of September, and closes on the 19th. The management delayed announcing the dates up till the present, hoping to be able to make some arrangement with Halifax so that the two exhibitions would not conflict. As our Nova Scotia friends would not change their date of opening from the 12th Sept., to enable the St. John people to either precede or follow them, the shows must conflict. New Brunswickers should help their own and enable the St. John management to put up just as good an Exhibition as can Nova Scotia. We believe, with the assistance of our farmers, New Brunswick need take no second place. All the local agriculturists should make a special effort to forward good exhibits of live stock and farm produce, and keep one continuing to the front. The only lot obtaining transportation rates, will soon be out.
