Land Added to the Wealth of

GULL LAKE, Sask., July 29-One of the most remarkable features of the development of Western Canada, and especially of Saskatchewan, has been the gradual shifting of population, westward into fine farming lands that for many years had been given over to the rancher or condemned as unfit for

In this manner a few years back saw the beginning of the notable influx of settlers into the Soo Line country, which in less than a decade has be-come one of the richest farming districts in the whole west, the settle ment following resulting in the driv-ing back of the ranchers further afield where the land was reputed to be not so fit for cultivation. Ten years ago the Soo Line country was labelled as too dry for wheat raising, and the catlemen were careful to maintain that pinion as far as possible, in order preserve so rich a grazing country their herds. But a few intrepid settlers made their way into those des

Then the rush started. At that time land was worth two or three dollars an acre over most of the Soo Line country, and hard to sell at that. Today, in the more thickly settled districts, such as Yellow Grass and Weyburn, it is worth from fifteen to as high as

RANCHERS DRIVEN BACK.

But this process of agricultural settlement, whereby the ranchers are being driven further and further back to make way for the plough, the seeder and the reaper, is being repeated on just such an important scale in the country north and south of the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway and west from Swift Current as far as Medicine Hat. It is a development that forms the most notable feature of setforms the most notable feature of set-tlement during the present season and it means that within half a dozen years this rich country will be given over to straight wheat growing or mixed farming. The big ranchers are bowing to the inevitable, for now that the major Huntington that after his quaring to the inevitable, for now that the irg to the inevitable, for now that the free ranges are a thing of the past, they are selling what tracts of land they still own to the incoming settlers, and are trekking west, or further south toward the boundary. The true significance of the agricultural movement is to be found in the rapidity with which school districts are being formed throughout this country that but a few years ago echoed only to the shouts of cowboys or the tramp of but a few years ago echoed only to the shouts of cowboys or the tramp of hoofs. In a dozen years to come this great territory lying west of Moose Jaw will be growing as fine spring wheat, oats, flax and barley as the Portage Plains or the famous Indian Head district.


