VERONICA TRAGEDY.

LIVERPOOL, G. B. March 14.—At the police court this morning, further evidence was given before Mr. Stewart in the charge of mutiny and murder against Otto Monson, aged eighteen; Gustav Rau, aged twenty-nine, and William Smith, aged thirty, sailors on board the British bark Veronicia, the victims, according to the prosecution, were Captain Alex. Shaw, master of the Veronicia; A. McLeod, first mate; Fred Abrahamson, second mate; Aleno Bravo, Gus Johansen, Julius Parsson, and Patrick Doran, able seamen. The prisoners were further charged with having fully set free the Veronicia and Mr. Trubshaw, and having allowed Mr. Trubshaw to go.
