

New York, April 18.—General sentiment was cheerful over week-end and this was reflected by a volume of scattered buying at opening this morning, which carried active stocks fractionally above Saturday's closing. On this bulge, however, it was noted that there was a freer supply of stock than immediately heretofore, and as the session progressed this supply increased until prices gave way sharply declines ranging from 1 to 2 points in the general list.

The selling of U. S. was particularly insistent but this seemed to be based on nothing more than the fact that lists of stockholders as of March 15, which was exhibited at the annual meeting showed that considerable blocks of the stock remained in the names of commission houses despite the heavy market liquidation which had occurred first previous to that dute. Opinions differed as to the character of the selling many observers pronouncing the weakness to be merely the result of a natural desire to take profits after a sustained recovery. Other people of equal shrewd ness counted that the market show ed every evidence that distribution had been accomplished upon considerable live that a further decline was in order.
