(Montreal Star.) The continuance of the British coal strike seems to be spreading contagion all round the world. It is only human nature that the coal miners everywhere should look upon this as a favorable opportunity to strike with effect; and it is not surprising that they have struck in Germany, that the French miners are restless and that a crisis is developing in the United States. One good big, smashing object lesson might convince civilisation that it is pursuing a fool's policy in permitting a necessity of life to be monopolized by any number of individuals.
