London, Mar. 6.-The dismissal of Admiral Sir John R. Jellicoe from the st of First Sea Lord, last December as the subject of attacks on Sir E was the subject of attacks on Sir Eric Credices, First Lord of the Admiraity, in the House of Commons this afternoon. Sir Edward Carson, the former First Sea Lord of Admiraity, termed it a mational calamity. He asserted that the war cabinet, of which he was at that a member, was not responsible, and said that naval officers protested against it. Admiral Sir Hedworth Meux, declared that Sir Eric Geddes had fouted the whole fleet.

Andrew Bonar Law, spokesman for the government, explained how Premier Lloyd George had summoned him to the cabinet room Geddes was there and said he had come to the conclusion that in the public interest there should be this change.

Would Have Resisted.

Sir Edward Carson, interrupting Mr. Bonar Law, interjected: "If I had con-tinued to be First Sea Lord, I would certainly have resisted the removal of Admiral Jellicoe."

A HOLY WAR MAY BE DECLARED BY THE BOLSHEVIKI

Petrograd Government Will Probably Not Keep Its Peace Agreement With Germans-Evacuation of Petrograd Begun by Bolsheviki and the Populace—Revolutionary Forces Prepared to Fall Back Even to Ural Mountains to Thwart

Situation in Far East Still Much in Dark - Rumania Makes Peace—U. S. Troops Take Up Another Position on Western Front-British Successfully Raid German Lines.

Late reports from Russia indicate that the Bolshevik government probably will not keep its engagement with the Germans to ratify next Tuesday the peace compact agreed upon at Brest-Litovsk. The evacuation of Petrograd by the Bolshevik government and the populace already has begun and Trotzky, the foreign minister, has announced that the leaders of the revolution are prepared to fall back even to the Ural Mountains, which separate Great Russia from Siberia and proclaim a holy war in order to circumvent the plans of the Germans to make the revolution unsuccessful.

It seems evident that the Germans have not yet ceased their operations against the Russians, for Krylenko, the Bolshevik commander in chief, has sent a protest to the German commander asking whether all steps had been taken by him for a cessation of hostilities. A like message was despatched to the Austro-Hungarian commander. BY THE ENEMY SEEM LIKELY

Germans Still Adding to Number of Their Divisions on Western Front and Enemy Preparing for Another Drive in Italy—Teutons Have Sixteen Divisions in West More Than Allies But Still Not Superior in Strength.

General F. B. Maurice States Enemy Can Attack as Soon as He Completes Local Preparations— Important Movements of Enemy Troops on the Italian Front.

London, March 6.-The Germans are still adding to the number of their divisions on the western front, General F. B. Maurice, chief director of military operations at the war office, declared in his weekly talk with The Associated Press today. The Germans now have sixteen divisions more than the Allies in the west, he said, but this did not mean that they were in superior strength, as the Allied divisions were numerically larger.

Gen. Maurice said the Entente forces still held the superiority in rifles, guns and aircraft, but that this superiority was diminishing.

"I have said heretofore that a German offensive was immediately likely, because the Germans required time to prepare new troops," said General Maurice, "but these major preparations are now more or less complete and the enemy can attack whenever he completes his local preparations.

"It is now to these local preparations that we must look for indications of an approaching attack. These indications are not always easy to gauge. We have now reached a stage when you cannot prophesy. If the enemy wishes to attack there is nothing to prevent."

Mr. Bedmond, who underwent an operation in London on last Friday, passed a fair day yesterday and apparently was maintaining the progress shown on Monday. He passed away peacefully at 7.45 o'clock this morning. Death was due to heart failure, tollowing the recent operation.

The Irish convention, which had been supported by Mr. Redmond, yesterday adopted a message of sympathy in which an earnest wish was expressed for his early and complete recovery.

Heart Failure.

The operation was for an intestinal bstruction. This was bo ne courage-usly and it relieved the patient, but eart failure intervened on Tucsday

"The physicians attending Mr. Redmond issued the following announcement: "We regret to announce that John Redmond died at 7.45 this morning. Owing to several attacks of illness a severe operation was faced with great courage. It had become imperatively necessary, owing to an intestinal obstruction. This was relieved by the operation and for some days satisfactory progress was maintained. After a fairly comfortable day on Tuesday heart failure supervened during the night and after a few hours Mr. Redmond passed peace-

King and Premier Shocked.

The news of the death of the Nationalist leader brought measages of sorrow and regret from all sections of the community. King George, whenhe was informed of the event, was deeply shocked and expressed his profound regret. Premier Lloyd George was similarly moved when he learned the news, The premier will move an appropriate resolution in the House of Commons.

This will enable the premier and former Premier Asquith, who have been life-long supporters of home rule, and other leaders to pay tribute to the memory of Mr. Redmond, who had himself during his long parliamentary career spoken on similar occasions most eloquently of departed political colleagues.

Home Rule Champion.

For more than twenty-five years
John E. Redmond fought for home
rule in Ireland and for a majority of
that time he was the recognized leader of Ireland's "struggle for liberty."
As chairman of the Irish parliament.

As chairman of the Irish parliamentary party—the Nationalists—he exerted a powerful influence in bringing about the creation of the Irish convention in July 1917. to devise a system of government for the island.

When Premier Lloyd George in that year offered two methods of settling the vexed Irish question, it was Redmond who, as spokesman for the Nationalists, rejected the proposition for a partition of Ireland, and instead, seconted Lloyd George's plan for the for a partition of Ireland, and instead, accepted Lloyd George's plan for the convocation of the Irish convention in which Irishmen of nearly all parts en of nearly all parts part in colonial wars—may be met which Irishmen of nearly all parts and creeds might meet in the effort to compose their differences and draft a constitution that would afford satisfaction to all. Redmond was one of the delegates to the convention, which sat at various times in Dublin and Cork in 1917 and 1918.

Long In Parliament.

Born in 1851, son of W. A. Redmond, member of the British parliament from Wexford, Ireland, John E. Redmond had sat almost continuously in the British House of Commons since 1881. There his parliamentary fights for home rule earned for him the so-briquet of the "stormy petrel of the House."

GERMAN AVIATORS AVOID ALCOHOL

Its Consumption Strongly Dis countenanced by Commander of Flying Corps.

French Front, Feb. 25—(Correspondence)—Alcohol is regarded by the chiefs of the German aviation service as an enemy to be avoided by flying men, and its consumption is strongly discountenanced in an advisory circular issued by the general in command of the flying corps. This document, which had just come into the hands of the corresopndent of The Associated Press, asserts that alcohol is a bad heat-producer whose effects are very fugitive and its consumption may produce fatal results to an aviator flying at high altitudes.

Other recommendations considered essential to the efficiency of the flying man advise him not to wash his hands and face nor shave just before a flight.
