

Asquith Throws **Down Gauntlet**

Declares Government Will Stake All on Result

London, April 14-Amid scenes of inase excitement hardly paralleled since Gladstonian home rule debate, the

Asquith's resolution dealing with the veto power of the house of lords, and heard the premier's declaration of policy for carrying them into statutory effect.

Having formally introduced, amid loud cheers, his bill embodying the resolutions, Mr. Asquith said that they were confronted by an exceptional and perhaps a unique case. The government's effective existence depended upon the passing of the resolutions into law. If the house of lords failed to accept or declined to consider their policy, the government would feel if their duty to advise the crown as to what steps are necessary to ensure unless the government found themselves in a position to give their policy statutory effect, they would either resign from of-fice or recommend a dissolution of parlia-ment. But in no case would they advise dissolution except under such conditions as would ensure that in the new parlia-ment the judgment of the people as ex-pressed at the elections, would be carried
