





CANADIANS ARE NOT ATVERDUN

Ottawa, March 17—A few Canadian officers attached to the staff of the French army, may be at Verdun, watching operations, but the Canadian divisions are nowhere near the point of siege.

This information was received at the militia department today apropos of reports that troops from this country are in the fight. The exact position of the Canadian divisions cannot be indicated, but it may be stated that they are somewhere near the border line of Belgium. While the reported extension of the British lines may have brought them somewhere near the great conflict, they are still far removed from the territory where the French have effectively repulsed the Huns.

As to the change of the route to St. John, he declared that it had all been done on the recommendations of Mr. Gutelius, and had been practically settled in about a week's time, and that the New Brunswick government had promptly acquiesced. The fine is to end, apparently, at Westfield, as a junction point with the C. P. R. At some time in the distant future, Mr. Rogers held out hope that the original project might be carried through by the dominion government. The provincial government is to do nothing more.

Meanwhile the C. P. R. holds the whip hand. With regard to the proposed branch line from Fredericton connecting with the Maine Central, involving another expenditure of a million and a half, the province is apparently to be also sadled with the cost of this.

Mr. Carvell effectively demonstrated that this branch was absolutely unnecessary and would mean another millstone around the neck of the province. It was being put through merely to gratify a whim of Mr. Gutelius.
