COMPOST.

Permit no opportunity for composting unimproved. If you cannot acquire materials without purchase them when you can, and at any price, provided it exceed the cost of barn dung, for you better pay exorbitantly than not have compost. A vigorous and very active manure is *compost* of ashes, lime, sun, nitre and clay. The latter ingredients should be as pure as possible, and cost the largest part of the mass. To one of this, add three bushels of salt, 10 lbs. S. leeches ashes, (unsalted) and one of sun. This should be placed in a heap the autumn under cover, and turned twice before using it in the spring. Application to corn it is invaluable, especially in the hill, and on soils rather light and *Saturday Empirum.*

SWELLINGS.

Swellings on oxen, cows and other animals, may be easily scattered using an embrocation composed of the following ingredients. One quart proof spirit, and half a pound soft soap, and ounce of camphor. The soap is to be dissolved in the whiskey, (or other proof spirit) and the camphor added after the mixture is poured into the bottle. These articles should be used in the manner above prescribed, liquid opodeldock, with which every swelling should be supplied. Lameness in oxen, especially at seasons when the weather is of most consequence to the

INCOMBUSTIBLE WASH.—Slake some lime in a large tub or barrel, with boiling water, covering the same up to keep in the steam. When thus slaked, pass six quarts of it through a fine sieve. It will then be in state of fine flour. Now, to six quarts of lime add one quart of tuck or Turk's ash, and one gallon of water; then beat the mixture, and skim it clean. To every gallon of this mixture add one pound of half a pound of copperas, by slow degrees three quarters of a pound of potash, and three quarts of fine sand or hard wood ashes. This mixture will now admit of any composition you please, and may be applied to a variety of uses. It is well adapted to be made into a wash, or a washable as slate. It will stop small holes in the roof, prevent the moss from growing and rotting the wood, and render combustible from sparks falling upon it. When laid upon brick work, it renders brick impervious to rain or wet.
