



The War Has Developed Medicine. Taught the Value of Thrift and

"During the great war from which we have just emerged, preventive medicine has made wonderful advances," says a military writer Wherever typhoid prophylaxis has been carefully and systematically car ried out and proper serum provided typhoid has been absent. Tetanus no longer is a cause of death. So aswho loves her own child may be a very ordinary mother, but she who takes someone else's and loves it as her own, she is one of God's mothers."

longer is a cause of death. So astounding have been the advances of preventive medicine and sound sanitation that vast armies have been maintained in excellent health under conmaintained with so low a disability rate, under conditions of the most try-

ing kind. "Another by product has been the wise reaction against the excessive use of alcohol and a better understanding of just what its true value is. Another valuable by-product has been the building up of thrift habits among our people and the demonstration of the possibilities in the way of saving, for prior to the war we were wasting enough to live on.

Gained Knowledge of Many kinds.

"Another useful by-product of the war is a better knowledge of our people as to the real resources of the country for war. Our people have learned that those engaged in the manufacture of implements of agri-culture and the machines of industry are not necessarily qualified to turn out high-speed airplanes or modern machines of war without training.

"A valuable lesson has been furnished by the great training camps, which brought forcibly to the attention of the people the heavy percentage of illiteracy, the alarmingly heavy percent of physical disability unfitting for hard military service, the men for hard military service, the large amount of vice diseases in certain racial groups, and the great amount of physical disability, deformity, and physical short-comings, which generally could have been cor rected by proper physical training in

"The war has also brought to our attention the need of having but one language in the schools below the high schools. If we wish to have real national solidarity our people should read, think and speak the English

language.
"Assembling all the men in the great training camps also resulted in an-other very fine by-product of the war; that is, a better understanding of each other. The different elements of our population, men from different se tions, the native-born and the new comer, rich and poor, capital and labor, and the different racial groups —all have been thrown together in the training camps. They have learn

ed to know and appreciate each other Made Men Better Citizens.

"This life has also resulted in the training of vast numbers of men sanitation, personal and general; it given them habits of neatnes promptness, thoroughness, and re spect for law and order, for constituted authorities, and for the rights of others. It brought to thousands of men and to thousands of women the necessity for organization and pre-paration in time of peace. Wooden rifles and improvised rifles will soon be forgotten.

"The women and the youth of the various groups and classes of our population have been thrown together earnest workers in the great war to prepare for war and to provide our men with things necessary for their comfort and welfare. They will never stand apart in groups again—at least not as they did before—for each has learned to appreciate qualities of the other, and the cheap and shallow distinctions have been

largely 'ironed out.' "The war has given several thous ands of men an opportunity to cross the sea, and they have come home with a higher appreciation of their own country and a deeper love for the motherland. They brought with them clear ideas as to the need of better roads. They have gained some familiarity with European customs and manners. They have an altogether broader view of the world and a bet-ter understanding of Canada's re-

sponsibilities. "They will not fall so easily vic-tims of the political faker. They will be better Canadians for their experience overseas, and as the years go by and they digest what they have seen and gone through they will become a more and more dependable element and more and more a force for law and order and for sound government. "The war has been a great melting pot. The flames of war have fused all

of these diverse elements of our population into a mass more homogeneous than ever before. Now let us stand together, shoulder to shoulder. There are many problems ahead of us, and we must do our evel best to solve them successfully.



Many Valuable Crops Saved by Mulching.

This Season Especially Trying to Cream Producers—Great Losses Prevented by Cooling Cream During Hot Weather In Properly Constructed Tank.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

ATER is one of the essential requirement tial requirements for the growth of plants. Its functions are a solvent and carrier of plant-food, a food directly or indirectly for the plants and it helps to maintain the plants in a turgid condition, thus enabling them to stand more erect and resist the force of the winds. Also the evaporation of the water from the surface of the leaves equalizes the temperature of the plants. Thus water serves the plants in no small way, and so the farmer is always very anxious each spring that his soil have sufficient water stored within it to supply the growing plants during the next three or four months; when the rainfall may not be sufficient for their requirements

The amount of water required for crops is rather surprising; in hamid regions they require from 200 to 500 pounds for every pound of dry mat-ter produced, and in dry climates the amounts are about double of the amounts are about double of these. Of the ordinary farm crops the legumes including clovers, peas and beans, use the most water; then comes potatoes next; then in order oats, buckwheat, barley, wheat, rape

oats, buckwheat, barley, wheat, rape, maize and millet.

The water that the plants take from the soil exists in the form of thin films around the soil grains. If the soil be well drained and otherwise in good physical condition, these films will occupy about one-half of the air space of the soil, the other half being available for air, which isvery necessary for the growth of the roots. The water in the form of films has the power to rise up through the soil grains in a marther similar to that of the rise of oil in a lampwick or water through a lump of sugar.
