Baltimons, Md., July 10.—Lord Wolseley, in a letter received in this city writes:

There must never be war between us, no matter how much either or both may be egged on by those who hate the English race, and would therefore like

Gen. Fisk's Death.

New York, July 10.—Gen. Clinton B. Fisk, who died yesterday, was in the 62nd year of his age. The burial will be at his old home, Coldwater, Mich., on Saturday, July 12. Clinton Bowen Fisk was born in York, Livingstone county, N. Y., Dec. 8, 1828. His parents removed to Michigan in his infancy. He was a man of business in his teens, and settling at Coldwater he, at 21, married Miss Jeannette C. Crippen. He engaged in various enterprises and acquired a snug fortune for a man of his years. When the war broke out Mr. Fisk enlisted as a private in the Thirty-third Missouri Infantry, soon became its colonel and a year later was made brigadier-general. At the close of the war he was brevetted major-general of volunteers. Gen. Fisk was very prominent in the affairs of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Ore ignally a Republican, Gen. Fisk was for years before his death a most conspicuous member of the Prohibition party. He was the candidate of that party for governor of New Jersey in 1886, and in 1888 was its candidate for the presidency.

UNITED STATES SENATE OFFICERS. It costs something to keep up the dignity of a United States Senator. According to of a United States Senator. According to a statement made in the House of Representatives a few days ago, it appears that the Senate provides for 291 officers and employes, exclusive of the reporters of debates, at salaries aggregating \$422,296. This gives an average of three official assistants gives an average of three official assistants to each Senator at an average salary of \$1,451, being \$4,353\$ as the cost of running each Senator. Many of these officers are at once employes of the Senate and the correspondents of newspapers, and it needs no explanation to say that under such circumstances they have no value as public critics in their capacity of correspondents. Every Senator has a private secretary or clerk provided for at the public expense, and the other officers do the general work in the usual civil the public expense, and work in the usual civil merice way of "how not to do it." The members of the House of Representatives, on the other hand, are served by 320 officers, exclusive of the reporters of debates, whose work is formed to the reporters of debates, whose work is formed to the reporters of debates, whose work is form your Iriends. There is really more from your Iriends. of the reporters of debates, whose work is done at a cost of \$367,113. This in an average of less than one officer to each member, and at an average salary of \$1,116 to each employe. A bath is a sanitary necessity in every country, but with a summer temperature such as is normal in Canada it is a positive seed that cannot be left unattended to such as is normal in Canada it is a positive need that cannot be left unattended to without causing serious discomfort if not ill-health. With flowing streams running through the city outdoor bathing is a great temptation for the young, though, notwith-standing the shallowness of the summer flow, not always attended with safety. Indeed, the great drawback in London and in most cities on the continent is the lack of safe and easily-got-at [bathing places for the rising generation. The result is an appallingly large annual crop of drownings through inability to swim. Young men and young women enjoy boating. Why should they not? They are end of bathing, and it is a pastime that

should be encouraged. But accidents will happen; boats will upset, and the unwary will get beyond their depths. Then sad and sudden deaths. Why should this be? No head of a household ought to be contented unless each member of his household. tented unless each member of his household is able to swim and to swim well. It is all nonsense to say that it is an accomplish-ment which can be dispensed with and that inability to swim will act as a deterrent to keep young people away from the water. Luck of knowledge how to comport himself or herself in the water will not keep the

or herself in the water will not keep the average boy or girl away from the river or from the lake when pleasant society is to be found there. Nor is it advisable that the youth of the city should be deprived from participating in such innocent and pleasure giving out-door enjoyments. Rather should they be encouraged.

Once the city organized such a resort and it was extensively patronized and bore good fruits in after years. 
