THE LIBERAL SUCCESSION.

A BARROOM TRACEDY.

An Old Man Killed at Strathroy.

The Result of a Drunken Brawl-Arrest of the Victim's Assailant,

STRATHROY, Oct. 5.—Richard Upton, a well-known resident of Strathroy and Adelaide, aged about 80 years, about 5 o'clock on Friday evening entered the Western Hotel, kept by Peter Fitzpatrick. While there he met William Wilson, of Metcaif, a powerful young man of about 35 years of age, and a son of the late Francis Wilson, who was for a long time bailiff of the Sixth Division Court. They were drinking together, when an altercation arose between them, Upton using insulting language towards Wilson. It is said Wilson pushed him away from him, which caused him to fall and strike his head on a large spittoon, fracturing his skull, which was the cause of his death. his death

The two of them joined in the last two drinks, the one treating the other. They were chatting together quite friendly, and apparently on the best of terms. At length Wilson made the remark, referring to Fitzpatrick: "Now, I like that boy: I have known him a long time." Upton replied: "I have known him longer than you have." Wilson said: "Now, you haven't, Dad." Upton then said: "You're a liar, you ———." At this Wilson said: "Now don't you repeat those words. I respect gray hairs, but don't say words. I respect gray hairs, but don't say that again." Wilson then said: "Now go away from me," and gave the old man a push, and he fell over on the floor. Fitzpatrick at once came from behind the bar, and found Wilson raising the old man up.

A ROW IN ROME

Between French Pilgrims and Victor Emmanuel's Admirers.

Rome, Oct. 3.—Yesterday a company of pilgrims, after having been received by the Pope, visited the notable sanctuaries of the city. While they were at the Pantheon they manifested open disrespect of the tomb of King Victor Emmanuel, and some of the bystanders protested vigorously. One word led to another and a row between the pilgrims and the defenders of Victor on word led to another and a row between the pilgrims and the defenders of Victor Emmanuel followed. The church attendants summoned the police, who placed three of the pilgrims under arrest. When the news spread through Rome bands of young men began to gather in many quarters and marched in procession through the streets singing anti-clerical and patriotic airs, and hooting and hissing at any pilgrims who chanced across their path. The processionists marched to the hotels occupied by the pilgrims and loudly demanded that the Italian flag be displayed. The proprietors were quick to accede to this demand, and when the national flag appeared the crowd raised an enthusiastic cheer. At the same time the groans for the pilgrims were redoubled. After several hours of uproarious marching the processionists dispersed. The pilgrims who caused the original trouble were French.

WITH THE WORKINGMEN.

A Plea For the Chaudiere Strikers. TORONTO, Oct. 3.—At last night's meeting of the Trades and Labor Council Mr. Patterson, of Ottawa, explained the situation on the Chaudiere among the striking lumbermen, whose grievance, he said, was a serious one and deserving the support of the labor unions all over the country. men had been ground down till they could not stand it any longer. The mill-owners had deceived the public when they stated that there had been no profit in the trade, and their object in in the trade, and their object in reducing wages was to take advantage of a large influx of labor into Ottawa dur-ing the year. In Perley's mill alone, with 288 men, which cut from 300,000 to 350, 288 men, which cut from 300,000 to 350,000 feet per day, the saving in the export duty to the States—reduced from \$2 to \$1 per 1,000 feet—would be sufficient to pay all the wages of the men. The strikers were confident of entire victory and were standing by each other. If the strike were won it meant the addition within six months of 40,000 to 50,000 to the ranks of

months of 40,000 to 50,000 to the ranks of organized labor.

OTTAWA, Oct. 3.—The mill owners having asked for more police protection in the attempt to ship lumber at the Chaudiere, yesterday the whole body of Ottawa policemen, except those on special duty elsewhere, marched on to the seene. Shipping was carried on slowly without interruption

was carried on slowly without interruption was carried on slowly without interruption by three or four of the mills. At a meeting of the police commissioners held in the City Hall some twenty special constables were elected to be sworn in. Since the trouble of two days ago some of the strikers have armed themselves with hardwood batons, which would prove formidable in case of a row. At the next meeting of the Ottawa Typographical Union a resolution will be moved granting \$100 to the strikers.

Rome, Oct. 3.—On the Corso yesterday a procession was formed of great magnitude which marched to the capitol, hooting at pilgrims in the hotels along the route. Large crowds of excited citizens collected in front of the French Catholic seminary and loudly demanded that the pontifical arms be removed from the façade of the building. The police, however, dispersed the crowd. The intense feeling displayed by the people is explained by the fact that yesterday the people of Rome were celebrating the anniversary of the plebiscite of 1870, by which Rome pronounced in favor of a union with the kingdom of Italy. One story is that when the officials in charge of Victor Emmanuel's tomb asked the pilgrims to write their names in the visitors' book, the French pilgrims refused and deliberately spat upon the book. Another report declares the pilgrims shouted "Viva le Pope!" "A bas Victor Emmanuel!" Last night the whole city was brightly illuminated. All the principal streets were crowded. The parading was resumed, and a long procession marched through the principal thoroughfares. The paraders chered for Italy and King Humbert. The pilgrims did not venture out last evening.






