CO FORWARD!

Optimistic View of the Great Advance in Temperance.

Fifty Years of Progress at Mome and Abroad — Its Application to the Forward Movement in This City.

Go forward, said the Rev. Charles Smith, when discussing the 7 o'clock closing movement before a large congregation in the Colborne Street Methodist Church last Sunday evening. The Biblical text for the occasion was found in the differenth verse of the fourteenth chapter of the Book of Exodus, being the behest of God to Moses, "Speak unto the children of Israel that they go forward."

After glancing at the primary application of the words, and nothing how the good cause of emancipating Hebrew serfs was harried and obstructed; but how despite multiplied impediments they eventually reached the goal of their desires, Mr. Smith said this subject was to him a sort of historic parable having a vivid parallelism in many phases of social reform to-day. Those Hebrews as they sought to throw off the chains of their enslavement were a fine example to all lovers of purity now, to throw off every unholy social fetter, and particularly the chains which were tinselled and gilded by the liquor traffic.

As to obstructions to this 7 o'clock closing—what good cause had not been obstructed? Here the speaker instanced not only the opposition to these Hebrews by the ancient Egyptians, but opposition to the repeal of the inflamous corn laws; opposition to the famous vaccination acts; yet all these good causes and many other humanitarian schemes went forward, notwithstanding the hostility of modern Egyptians, because they were harnessed to the mighty motor of God's benign purpose to bless and enfranchise our race.

And for the same reason the cause of temperague reform must go forward—can.

God's benign purpose to bless and chise our race.

And for the same reason the cause of temperance reform must go forward—cannot but go forward. It is not a little significant to my mind, said the speaker, that this cause has always been designated a "movement"—the temperance movement. It will be remembered that Gallileo netwithstanding his recantation muttered through his teeth, "The world does move after all." That brave axiom of the old Florentine, so true of the earth in its orbit, so true also of

flow on towards Lake Ontario and thence to the Atlantic sea-board. So betimes someone afflicted with pessimistic dolors focused his gaze on some little local point of turbulent opposition to this gest forward movement and wailed out. The tide sets the other way, our hepe is lost. But what, after all, is the true trend of the movement? Any person of candor—not to say an optimist—could tell that this aspect of social reform had chronicled a series of magnificent achievements, and that despite these comparatively trivial alternating whirls the great stream goes forward like Niagara, because, as an expression of the beneficent purpose of omnipotent wisdon and goodness, it cannot, on the whole, do otherwise.

At this point Mr. Smith reviewed rapidly for about 30 minutes in a sort of kaliedoscopic fashion the history of this progressive movement during the last 50 years, contrasting sentiments and facts as they were five decades ago and as they now are. The change for the better was being most manifestly seen and felt everywhere. All classes were bettered by it. This was not only the verdict of the idner of the decade and the progression of the medical faculty, of eminent jurists, of moneyed merchants, of intelligent workingmen and of pure womanhood; for all were now banding against his most formidable foe which meaced their hearts and

LONDON AND ELECTRIC LIGHTING On one of the ballots to be placed in the hands of London electors on Monday next each voter will be able to place himself or herself on record on the question of municipal ownership of electric light plant. The taxpayers cannot decide the question at this time. They can only give the new aldermen some idea of what they think about civic ownership of the public lighting system. If they decide that, under certain conditions, it would be a good thing, then it will be for the council of 1893 to prepare the necessary bylaw and submit it to the freeholders, who alone can vote on bylaws of this description. Thus Monday's voting is only to elicit an expression of opinion.

The ADVERTISER has been asked to state the case in favor of municipal ownership, as made out by Ald. Parnell's special com-

The committee points out that lighting the streets at present by electricity is costly compared with what it was in the last year when gas was used. Gas cost \$8,463 15 a rear, while the electric system has required an expenditure of \$20,300, or far more than double. The city now is lighted with 213 lights, but the committee hold that to illuminate it properly 250 lights are needed. This would bring up the total cost to \$23,500. If the city owned its own lighting plant—which could be purchased, entirely new, for \$50,000—213 lights could be supplied for \$16,950, or \$59 per light, instead of \$94, as now. This is for a steam plant, and does not take into account the possibility of nunning by water power from Springbank, which, if feasible, would enable a further saving to be made. The following is the estimate made by the committee after consulting competent engineers and manufac-

Fish and Game Inspector McCann, of this city has received the following letter from A. D. Stewart, secretary of the Ontario Fish and Game Commissioners:
"In reply to your letter, I have to say that the little animal, commonly called the cotton tail," and generally supposed to be a rabbit, is not a rabbit at all, but in reality a hare, and as such is protected after Dec. 15. This, however, does not prevent the animal from being shot at by farmers and others, if found damaging crops, fruit trees and other property, because the laws provide clearly and distinctly that any animal or hird found destroying may be killed at sight for so doing.

"The trouble is with the shooting of these animals that boys and others go out under the pretense of shooting cotton tails, and kill every other sort of game that they come across.
