PRISON LABOR CONTRACT-I have already quoted the

resolution passed at the Provincial Liberal convention of 1904,

in which, among other things, the abolition of the contract

system in connection with prison labor was called for. This

was no new declaration of policy, the party having set its face

in that direction after the report of the special commission on

prison labor appointed by the Mowat Government, which report had been followed up by the abandonment of the contract

system in the woodenware department of the Central Prison,

and the giving of notice to the contractors for broommaking that their contract would not be renewed. In short, there was

no actual contract in existence at the time of the change of

Government, although a proposed contract had been drawn up






