BRUTAL MURDER

Headless Body of Thomas Georgieft Found in Gravel Pit.

Hamilton, March 12.—The headless body of a man, later identified by the police as Thomas Georgieft, a Bulgarian, 29 years old, was found early this morning in the old civic gravel pit near the high level bridge. The discovery was made by Andrew Cross, a Grand Trunk towerman, as he was on his way to work.

A Brutal Murder.

Investigation by Coroner Hopkins revealed one of the most brutal murders in Hamilton's criminal annals. The theory is that the victim was taken to the spot in a semi-conscious condition, dragged down the steep sides of the gravel pit, and the head then hacked from the body in an effort to conceal identification. The remains were also stripped of clothing with the exception of the socks. The murderer apparently 200k the head to the Desjardine Canal and dropped it into the swift current.



Former Londoner Makes This Declaration at Vancouver.

TELLS OF GREAT PROGRESS

Playing the Game With Allies, Says Forest City

According to an interview given in Vancouver on March 5 by F. W. Horne, a former Londoner, and for the past 21 years head of a large Japanese mahinery house, five Japanese divisions had been dispatched for Harbin before he left the Orient. Harbin is in Manchuria, and is on the way to the Russian

border, Mr. Horne, in an interview, throws some interesting light on Japanese prosome interesting light on Japanese progress.

When he was salling for Canada, he heard a report that John F. Stevens, the great railway engineer, the man who was chief engineer under Goethals on the Panama Canal, and who has probably held down more big railway jobs than any other man of his profession, was going into Russia with a crew of 300 skilled railway mechanics. Previously Stevens had been attempting to bring order out of chaos with these men up at Vladivostok on the Trans-Siberian line, but had given it up. All orders had failed and there was no use in trying to do anything. The fact that he has made another attempt indicates that he knows he can accomplish what he is after.

"Japan is building, building, building; the only limit to her production is her ability to secure steel," said Mr. her ability to secure steel," said Mr. Horne. "This applies to ships, to manufacturing plants, to all factors of production and distribution. When we left the big question was the negotiations between Japan and the United States over deliveries of steel. 
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BIRMINGHAM AND THE WAR

By J. P. COLLINS. [Special Correspondent of The Empire Press Union.]

Most things in reason find mention in Boswell's "Johnson," and Birmingham is no exception. What is more, it is mentioned in aspects of pride that characterise it today-its passion for ideas and its executive capacity. "I sell here, Sir," said Watt's partner, Boulton, "what all the world desires to have-Power," and the Doctor came away duly impressed. But the Soho works as they existed a century and a half ago could be comfortably dropped inside any one of a hundred big concerns that stud the Birmingham area today, and virtually all of them have settled down to the business of war in one form or other. Which is all the more notable because, having always been a centre of Quakerdom and peace notions, and opposed to war in the abstract as inimical to trade and progress, the city has made itself a stronghold of war-production whenever the war was on the side of freedom. Thus it made small arms for Cromwell's troops, for the French revolutionary army, and for the French again in 1870, not without an eye to the main chance, of course. But if it coins fortunates in war-time, it certainly earns them by dint of inventiveness and terrific energy. Besides, Birmingham's passion for ideas has always overruled its sense of gain, and that is why it is in our present struggle heart and soul. Chamberlain taught it to study affairs with big maps and a far perspective, so it is under no illusions now about civiliza-

SIX MILLIONS IN FIVE DAYS.

In the last three years Birmingham has bestirred itself to some effect. It has shelved many of its normal avocations for the sake of helping the war along. It has trained an army of war workers in its technical schools. It has supplied some of the shrewdest and latest devices in the region of food distribution and air defence. The shortage of petrol finds it undisturbed, because its gas department (biggest of its kind and the best investment the city ever made) has long adapted its supply to every need of factory employ
one, down to those garret-masters that are still a type of local independence. Livery other civic department and every local institution, from the University downwards, has joined in our crusade for liberty. The city has five V.C.'s to its credit, and has recruited more than two hundred thousand men, or about the number Sir Douglas Haig launched so victoriously upon the somme. The local V.A.D. staff have met every Red Cross train passing through, whether by day or night, so that over a quarter of a million wounded have a contract and stamped postcards—all this without a penny had a meal, fruit, cigarettes, and stamped postcards-all this without a penny of cost to the public purse. Nor in providing guns and shells and other requisites of war has Ironopolis neglected the demand for "silver bullets." It has touched enormous figures in our war loans, and in the last rally it has topped all record. In the five days of a Tank's visit it has poured six millions of sterling through that Tank's windows, thus beating London's total by 70 per cent, and all provincial rivals so handsomely that they have sent generous messages of congratulations. And to watch that week of fair days in front of the city's Council House you would have thought the Lord Mayor had mounted the roof of the Tank in order to proclaim the peace.

PRACTICAL PATRIOTISM.

Motor and wagon and cycle have carried the fame of many a local firm to the ends of the earth, and most of these concerns have scrapped costly installations of machinery to make room for munition plant. By courtesy of the Ministries concerned, two of these firms have been thrown open for inspection, as if to show the contrast between the senior type and the junior. The senior—for many years a pioneer in the compounding of specialized metals—has concentrated on cartridge-making; and 50 furnaces are now putting through as many tons in a day or a night as used to occupy a week or more. A line of demarcation shows where the war-half of the place begins and the other half ends. Vivid contrasts occur between former methods and the new, but they are all typified by two vast rolling mills competing on opposite sides of the line. One rumbles and whirls with cumberstone fly-wheels and their centrifugal roar and fuss; the other is run by a hive of dynamos that treble the power, halve the cost, and annihilate risk and noise. "extrusion" department affords a moral of general applicability in was It uses up the sawn-off ends of ingots, so that the outcasts of old are restored to usefulness and the waste of re-melting avided. One gigantic shop stands idle—and the only one—because for the moment the French Government have more of the Lebel cartridges than they can use; but when this avenue of machinery awakes to life again it will turn out millions of the nimble things day and night as before. Managerial experience, with keen recollection of labor troubles in the past, extols the new welfare system as beneficial all round, by ventilating grievances and increasing the worker's comforts and advantages. Another touch of the past is not without its topical appeal. Outside the main door hangs a bronze panel recording the "duty, mutual help, and practical patriotism" of employees who fought in the South African War—"happily without loss of life"—as well as of the comrades who stayed on and took over the care of the wives and children. Close alongside, in a plain glazed case, are the paper records (unfinished, alas!) of 50 times the number who are serving in the present war, or have dropped into the sadder categories of wounded, captured, missing, or dead. The tale of suffering between the two wars is wholly different, but the spirit is the same.

WHAT ORGANIZATION CAN DO.

The junior firm we proceed to visit is an outgrowth of the last dozen years—you might almost say of the war. In three years it has multiplied its employees by fifteen, and the numbers are growing faster than ever. In this great ganglion of energy planted amid the fields, each section told off for aeroplanes, shells, lorries, engines, small arms, and the rest, forms a giant factory in itself. The output is prodigious. Everything around is on a similar scale—two big cinema theatres inside the works, the residential hostels, the handsome canteen-saloon, which dines 15,000 souls a day, a new and well-equipped railway station, and a daily service of motor-buses and seven big trains, all of them packed morning and evening. Plenty of good air and light, and a green and a pleasant outlook keep ideas in brisk circulation, and everlasting vigilance eliminates discontent and waste, just as the recessing drill carves away superfluous tissue from an aeroplane wing part, leaving it weightless, docile, and swift. The soul of the idea cannot altogether quit its casing of material, but it can work towards salvation, and galvation here consists in a maximum of liberty with a minimum of load.

SWIFT AND SURE.

Here again they practice what they preach, for without stipulating the impossible they produce the incredible. With all its immense scope and capacity, this junior firm of ours cannot get steel girdering for its great aeroerecting and trial pavilions, so it goes in for Belfast roofing, and makes it a success. Space is of the essence of the bargain, you see, and a creature of the skies like the aeroplane demands abundant room, even in embryo. This fighting scout evolving before your eyes is built up of 10,000 parts, the proportion being four of metal to one of wood. The secret of speed is to have found how to make parts interchangeable, and this is possible only by undeviating measurements. A hair's breadth does it; or as we read in many a boldly-lettered legend hung about the place, "A concealed mistake may cause loss of life to a brave man." A rigid jig or framework grips the frail part in process, and there is a new frame at every stage. Nothing can enter unless it is exact in fit; or leave the jig until it is perfect in cohesion and shape. The same with the finished biplane, and the nuisance hitherto has been to dismantle and pack everyone before it could be passed, usually at some trial

The present type does 120 miles an hour, and the speed is growing. In fact, everything grows apace in this vast war allotment we call Birmingham. It has always had its own views about war in general, and they are hard to beat, as all British things should be. WALL STREET CONDITIONS.

There are many reasons why no one at the present can predict with any reasonable assurance of the hoped-for result—peace, peace, universal peace, within the next twelve months. In view of this uncertainty, and the certainty of the enormous amount of money it will take to carry on the war under unprecedented expenditures such as we are now seeing pile up daily-for another year or two-the market is acting most satisfactorily. That the situation is grave no one will deny, but we Britishers have seen the British Empire pass through crises before and what we have not seen we may read about in her history. She always has suffered at the beginning of an armed conflict only to triumph the more gloriously in the end, and for this reason her subjects are never discouraged, even though millions of lives are being sacrificed, and huge debts are rolling up. The great American people were a little tardy in coming in with their armed forces, ships and money, but it is yet a matter of opinion whether the interests of Great Britain and France is yet a matter of opinion whether the interests of Great Britain and France would have been better served had they alfied themselves before the will of the people as a whole had been properly sensed. When President Wilson knew he had those whom he serves as chief magistrate behind him, he acted decisively, quickly and effectively, and Germany will yet feel the overwhelming force of a new quantity and quality among the Allies in the American manhood, brains and money now being poured into the blood-stained arena. Germany must and will be battered into summission. It may take longer than many now suppose, and again it may come much sooner than present indications would warrant us in expecting, but meantime the market shows great and unremitting confidence in the outcome, and while a trading market with few interesting movements may continue for some time yet, the comof summer will be reflected in much better prices for the "selects."

PROFITS OF PACKERS.

T LONG LAST, the regulations governing the profits of packers have been issued at Ottawa, and definitions of profits and capital have been given. The new orders are effective from January 1 of this year.

One of the provisions of the order leaves a great deal to the discretion of the minister of inance, Sir Thomas White, and the use he makes of the power placed in his hands will be watched with interest. The clause says: "If after January 1, 1918, the capital stock of any incorporated company is increased or additional stock is issued, or if the stock is in any way changed or reorganized in such a manner as to increase the amount of the capital for the purpose of the regulations, the minister of finance may decide whether or not it is fair and proper to include such increase or any part thereof when determining the capital of such company for the purpose of the regulation, and the decision of the minister

Prior to this clause comes one which decrees that the capital actually invested in a business shall be the amount, paid up in cash, of the capital stock, and where stock has been issued for any consideration other than cash the fair value of the stock at the date of issue shall be deemed to be the amount paid up in such stock, this never to exceed the par value. The actual unimpaired reserve, rest or accumulated profits of an incorporated company will be included as part of

Self-preservation may induce them to abandon that neutrality which Germany has denied, and to join openly with the Entente.

Green onions are usually obtained from sets (young onions), planted as soon as the soil can be worked in the spring. They are planted right side up in drills 12 inches apart, each onion being 3 inches from its neighbor. By this very easy method young green onions may be had in June and they will be fit for table use by July 1.






The Income War Tax Act

Forms giving particulars of income for the year 1917, must be filled in and filed on or before the 31st March, 1918

Section 4 of the Act provides that all persons resident or ordinarily resident in Canada, shall pay a tax upon income exceeding \$1500 in the case of those single and widows and widowers without dependent children, and upon income exceeding \$3000 in the case of all other persons. It also provides that all Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, no matter how created, shall pay the normal tax upon income exceeding \$3000.

The Forms provided by the Department of Finance to be filled in with particulars of the 1917 income of all those whose incomes are liable under the Act, and by Trustees, Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, with information required of them, may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at



Assures Sympathy and Hope For Ultimate Freedom.

WASHINGTON, March 11 .- On the ve of the gathering at Moscow of the Russian Congress of Soviets, which is to pass judgment on the Germanmade peace accepted by the Bolsheviki at Brest-Litovsk, President Wilson has sent a message of sympathy to the Russian people through the congress, with a pledge that the United States will avail itself of every opportunity to aid them in driving out autocracy and restoring Russia to her place in the world with complete sovereignty and inde-

with complete sovereignty and inde The United States now recognizes n

pendence.

The United States now recognizes no government in Russia, but the president cabled this message to the American consul at Moscow for delivery tomorrow to the congress, which is made up of soldiers' and workmen's representatives, and speaks for at least a considerable part of the Russian people. The message, which was made public tonight by the American state department, was as follows:

Sincere Sympathy of United States. "May I not take advantage of the meeting of the congress of soviets to express the sincere sympathy which the people of the United States feel for the Russian people at this moment when the German power has been thrust in to interrupt and turn back the whole struggle for freedom, and substitute the wishes of Germany for the purpose of the people of Russia? Although the Government of the United States is, unhappily, not now in a position to render the direct and effective aid it would wish to render. I beg to assure the people of Russia through the congress that it will avail itself of every opportunity to secure for Russia once more complete sovereignty and independence in her own affairs and restoration to her great role in the life of Europe and the modern world. The whole heart of the people of Russia in the attempt to free themselves forever from autopeople of Russia in the attempt to free themselves forever from auto-cratic government and become the masters of their own life.
