

When soft rub through a sieve, return to the kettle and add three pounds of granulated sugar, two cupfuls of vinegar, one teaspoonful each of ground black pepper, cinnaunon and allspice. Boll for one hour and bottle while hot.

Grape Juice.—One quart of water, two cupfuls of grape juice and one pound of sugar. Bell the sugar and the water together for eight minutes. Pulp the grapes and add the pulp and skins to the syrup; press through a sleev, being very careful not to mash the seeds. When cold turn into the freezer and freeze.

Grape Mousse.—To two cupfuls of thick cream add three tablespoonfuls of sugar, one tablespoonful of vanilla extract and one cupful of grape juice. Beat all with an egg-heater, put into a closely-covered mold and pack in broken bee and reck salt for fully two hours.

Grape Water.—Two breakfast cupfuls of grapes and three-quarters of a pint of boiling water. v'ash and mash grapes, add the water, shimmer for ten minutes, strain, chill, and serve.

Grape Sauce.—One cupful of sugar, one cupful of grape juice, one tablespoonful of orange or lemon juice or three tablespoonful it forms a syrup. Serve hot or cold.






Last month, the Railway Commission headed by Judge Mabee, Chairman, visited Prince Rupert, and made a trip over the hundred miles of the Grand Trunk Pacific east of Prince Rupert, which is now in operation. General Superintendent Mehan was the recipient of many compliments as to the physical conditions of the new railroad. Judge Mabee said in an interview with a reporter of the "Evening Empire" in Prince Rupert: "I saw a spiendid piece of roadbed. It is a fine road all the way from this point to Mile 102. A better piece of road cannot be found among many of the roads of older Ontario. On our return trip we ran over 35 miles an hour over some portions of the line and the gains was remarkably steady for a new road. When the Government accepted the road, there was an order limiting the speed of trains to be increased to 35 miles an hour.

This is in line with the entire construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, which is being built as a permanent road from the start.


